On May 4, 1982, the Commission found reason to believe that your clients, Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee ("IRTL-PAC") and Indiana Right to Life Committee, Inc. ("IRTL"), had violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441a(a)(1)(A), 434 and 441b, provisions of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act") in connection with the above referenced MUR. However, after considering the circumstances of this matter, the Commission has determined to take no further action and close its file. The file will be made part of the public record within 30 days. Should you wish to submit any materials to appear on the public record, please do so within 10 days.

The Commission reminds you that IRTL-PAC's contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Committee before achieving multicandidate status nevertheless appears to be a violation of Section 441a(a)(1)(A) and you should take immediate steps to insure that this activity does not occur in the future. In addition, the Commission found reason to believe that the distribution of the anti-Bayh letter along with copies of the Quayle brochure produced jointly by IRTL-PAC and the Quayle Committee was improperly reported as an independent expenditure. We, therefore, recommend that you amend your reports to show that payments for distribution of these materials were an in-kind contribution to the Quayle for Senate Committee.

SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

RAD's analysis of the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee's ("IRTL-PAC") reports raised the question whether IRTL-PAC was qualified as a multicandidate committee at the time it made \$3,031.53 in contributions to the Quayle for Senate Committee ("QSC"). If IRTL-PAC was not qualified as a multicandidate committee, its contribution limit under Section 441a(a)(2)(A) of the Act would have only been \$1,000.

FACTUAL BASIS AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

IRTL-PAC's 1980 Quarterly Report disclosed four contributions to QSC totalling \$3,731. A Request For Additional Information ("RFAI") was sent to IRTL-PAC on May 7, 1981, asking whether IRTL-PAC was fully qualified as a multicandidate committee to contribute up to the \$5,000 limit imposed by Section 441a(a)(2)(A) of the Act. According to the Commission's records, IRTL-PAC did not achieve multicandidate status until September 13, 1980, although their reports indicate that IRTL-PAC made \$3,731 in contributions to QSC between July 23, 1980, and August 26, 1980. RAD advised IRTL-PAC to seek return of the excess contributions to QSC.

On July 6, 1981, and July 18, 1981, IRTL-PAC responded that IRTL-PAC's connected organization, the Indiana Right to Life Committee, Inc. ("IRTL") had made contributions to ten congressional candidates (totalling \$150) that were originally reported as a debt owed by IRTL-PAC to IRTL. IRTL-PAC also provided the Commission with an amended 1979 October Quarterly Report that characterized payments made by IRTL-PAC to extinguish this debt as in-kind contributions to the ten congressional candidates.

Since Section 441b of the Act prohibits a PAC's connected organization from advancing money for PAC contributions, the solution proposed by respondents in their July communications with the Commission is technically impermissible. At the same time, it is clear that IRTL-PAC is now and was, within a short time after the excess contributions were made, qualified to make the maximum multicandidate committee contribution of \$5,000. It seems a futile exercise to require the committee to seek refund from QSC to IRTL-PAC at this time, over a year and one-half after the fact, when IRTL-PAC could immediately remake the full contribution to QSC. Therefore, the Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe that the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee committed a violation of Section 441a(a)(1)(A) of the Act by contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Committee before achieving multi-candidate status. But the Office of General Counsel also recommends that the Commission take no further action on this issue.

Since IRTL made contributions totalling \$150 to ten congressional candidates, there is also a Section 441b violation. For a connected organization to advance contributions for a PAC amounts to making the contributions itself. The Office of General Counsel recommends, therefore, that the Commission find reason to believe that IRTL committed a violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441b of the Act by making ten contributions to congressional candidates. But because the amount of money involved is not significant (especially when apportioned among the ten congressional recipients), we recommend that the Commission take no further action on this issue, send the respondents a letter of admonition and close the file.





IRTL-PAC also provided the Commission with an amended 1979 October Quarterly Report that characterized payments made by IRTL-PAC to extinguish this debt as in-kind contributions to the ten congressional candidates.

It seems a futile exercise to require the committee to seek refund from QSC to IRTL-PAC at this time, over a year and one-half after the fact, when IRTL-PAC could immediately remake the full contribution to QSC. Therefore, the Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe that the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee committed a violation of Section 441a(a)(1)(A) of the Act by contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Committee before achieving multi-candidate status. But the Office of General Counsel also recommends that the Commission take no further action on this issue.

Since IRTL made contributions totalling \$150 to ten congressional candidates, there is also a Section 441b violation to be reckoned with. For a connected organization to advance contributions for a PAC amounts to making the contributions itself. The Office of General Counsel recommends, therefore, that the Commission find reason to believe that IRTL committed a violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441b of the Act by making ten contributions to congressional candidates. But because the amount of money involved is not significant (especially when apportioned among the ten congressional recipients), we recommend that the Commission take no further action on this issue, send the respondents a letter of admonition and close the file.

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Central Committee in the amount of \$105.00 (see complaint). CAP states that their president attended this event during which it is alleged that "he personally observed the Indiana Right to Life PAC attendees demonstrate against Senator Bayh." Therefore, CAP concludes, at least some of the purchase price of these tickets should have been attributed as an additional in-kind contribution from IRTL-PAC to QSC. IRTL-PAC's response to this item is as follows:

IRTL-PAC purchased tickets from the Indiana Democratic State Central Committee. The IRTL-PAC Chairman, Mary Pat Marstall, Treasurer, Michele McRae, and an IRTL-PAC volunteer, Ann Minnis, attended. The purpose of attending the dinner was to show support for pro-life Democratic candidates such as Congressmen Adam Benjamin, Floyd Pithian and Dave Evans. None of these three persons participated in any incident regarding Bayh and, indeed, have no knowledge of it (Attachment 3 at page 24).

The Commission has before it, then, the signed and sworn statement by CAP that certain, unnamed IRTL-PAC representatives demonstrated against Senator Bayh by holding up placards during his presentation. On the other hand, respondent IRTL-PAC states that IRTL-PAC personnel attended the fundraiser only to show support for pro-life Democratic candidates denying participation or even knowledge of the incident mentioned in the complaint. Again, the shortcoming of the allegation that the \$105.00 should have been reported as an in-kind expenditure (in addition to the problem that it is not claimed by IRTL-PAC as an independent expenditure), is the lack of evidence that there was any consultation or coordination between IRTL-PAC and QSC on this

#### GENERATION OF MATTER

Part of this MUR was generated by a signed and sworn complaint filed on November 2, 1981, by the Committee for American Principles ("CAP") against the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee ("IRTL-PAC"). The other part of the MUR was generated internally through a RAD referral. The

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Commission determined on December 23, 1981, to merge the two parts as there were common elements within each.

#### SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

The complaint alleges that IRTL-PAC violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 433 and 434 of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1974 ("the Act") by mischaracterizing certain in-kind contributions to the Quayle for Senate Committee ("QSC") as independent expenditures. The complaint also alleges that due to this mischaracterization of the in-kind contributions and other factors, IRTL-PAC exceeded the \$5,000 limit on total contributions to QSC in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441a(a)(2)(A). Although not specifically alleged in the complaint, a determination that IRTL-PAC committed the violation cited above might also entail a violation of Section 441a(f) by QSC for accepting excessive contributions.

With respect to the internally generated complaint, RAD's analysis of IRTL-PAC's reports raises the question whether IRTL-PAC was qualified as a multicandidate committee at the time it made \$3,031.53 in contributions to QSC. If IRTL-PAC was not qualified as a multicandidate committee, its limit under Section 441a(a)(2)(A) of the Act would have been \$1,000.

#### FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

##### A. Complaint Generated Matters

The nub of CAP's theory that IRTL-PAC violated 2 U.S.C. §§433, 434 and 441a of the Act is found in the language of the complaint that reads, "early and continued involvement [of IRTL-PAC] in the Quayle campaign's general election advertisements and

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brochures prevented the other expenditures for advertisements supporting Quayle from being "independent". However, the complaint fails to provide any factual evidence of cooperation, consultation, prior consent or suggestion between IRTL-PAC and QSC (see 11 C.F.R. § 109.1). Neither do complainant's allegations bring into play any of the presumptions recognized by the Commission's regulations that might give rise to a conclusion that otherwise independent expenditures by IRTL-PAC were actually in-kind contributions (see 11 C.F.R. § 109.1(b)(4)(i)).

In support of its general allegations, CAP presents the Commission with a list of reported in-kind contributions from IRTL-PAC to QSC, independent expenditures reported by IRTL-PAC for QSC, samples of two brochures in favor of Quayle and a copy of a letter urging the defeat of Quayle's opponent in the general election, Senator Birch Bayh. CAP maintains that all of these items should have been reported as in-kind contributions to QSC. In addition, CAP argues that a portion of certain expenditures reported by IRTL-PAC as expenses for administrative, consulting and legal fees should have been allocated by IRTL-PAC as in-kind contributions to the Quayle campaign.

The brochure samples submitted to the Commission do appear to have been similarly designed and printed (see complaint). However, this similarity is relevant to CAP's allegations only if at least some of the expenditures made by IRTL-PAC for the

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brochures were reported as independent.<sup>1/</sup> CAP does not make this allegation, and the complaint does not otherwise inform the Commission which of IRTL-PAC's expenditures were related to these brochures.

The responses of QSC and IRTL-PAC received by the Commission on December 1, 1981 and January 18, 1981, respectively, shed more light on the origins of brochures, however. According to QSC, both of the brochures submitted with the complaint were the result of in-kind expenditures by IRTL-PAC (see Attachment 2 at page 21). And according to IRTL-PAC's item-by-item analysis of expenses related to the Quayle campaign during July and August of 1980, IRTL-PAC made contributions totalling \$3,631.53 for the preparation and printing of a brochure supporting Quayle. IRTL-PAC states that the expenditures made for the brochure were made in cooperation with QSC. The existence of this brochure is acknowledged by QSC and attached to both the complaint and the IRTL-PAC response (see complaint and Attachment 3 pages 35 and 36). Further, IRTL-PAC notes that the other similar brochure attached to the complaint was later produced "exclusively by the Quayle Committee." (See Attachment 3 at page 23 ). Since no expenditures for the two pro-Quayle brochures were ever reported by IRTL-PAC as independent expenditures, the physical similarity of the two brochures is irrelevant to CAP's allegations. All

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<sup>1/</sup> Otherwise the Commission would have to accept the theory that independent expenditures are "tainted" if they are combined with in-kind contributions made before, during or after the independent expenditures.

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expenditures by IRTL-PAC for the brochures appear to have been properly reported as in-kind contributions to QSC.

The next item which CAP alleges to have been improperly characterized as an independent expenditure is an anti-Bayh letter dated September 20, 1980. CAP cites as evidence the October 16 and 20, 1980 entries in IRTL-PAC's FEC filing for \$126.00 and 121.52 -- listed as independent expenditures against Bayh for letters. CAP has submitted a copy of a letter on IRTL-PAC stationery signed by both Mary Pat Marstall, Chairman of IRTL-PAC, and Dan Quayle (see complaint). The responses from QSC and IRTL-PAC admit that the Bayh letter submitted by complainant was a cooperative effort, but maintain that the reported independent expenditures of October 16 and 20, 1980, were for a anti-Bayh letter distinct from the one submitted by the complainant. IRTL-PAC states in its response that the letter in CAP's complaint was mailed by QSC, and that the only contributions to the letter by IRTL-PAC were the signature of Mary Pat Marstell and the enclosure of one of the Quayle brochures already reported by IRTL-PAC as an in-kind contribution (see Attachment 3 at pages 24, 35 and 36).

IRTL-PAC produced and distributed copies of another letter that is attached to their January 18 response (see Attachment 3 at pages 49-52). This letter was sent to 1,500 Catholic priests in Indiana and was produced independently of QSC according to IRTL-PAC (see Attachment 3 at pages 23 and 24). IRTL-PAC maintains that it was for this letter that IRTL-PAC reported an

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anti-Bayh, independent expenditure. The expenditure, totalling \$247.52 were presumably made for payment of postage to distribute the letter and an enclosed copy of the Quayle brochure that QSC and IRTL-PAC jointly produced. While the distribution of the anti-Bayh letter by itself would seem to qualify as an independent expenditure, enclosing a copy of the brochure would compromise the independence of the entire communication. IRTL-PAC was, in effect, paying for the distribution of Quayle campaign literature. Thus \$247.52 was improperly reported as independent expenditure. Therefore, the Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe that IRTL-PAC committed violations of 2 U.S.C. § 434 of the Act by improperly reporting an in-kind contribution of \$247.52 as an independent expenditure.

However, since the distribution of the anti-Bayh letter and Quayle brochure involves a situation where otherwise an independent expenditure was compromised indirectly, and since the amount of money involved is not large, the Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission take no further action on this issue except to send both IRTL-PAC and QSC letters of admonition. We suggest that the letters recommend that IRTL-PAC and QSC amend their reports to reflect the change in the status of the payments associated with distribution of the letter and brochure.

The last specific item which CAP alleges is a mischaracterization of in-kind contributions concerns IRTL-PAC's purchase of tickets to a fundraiser from the Democratic State

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Central Committee in the amount of \$105.00 (see complaint). CAP states that their president attended this event during which it is alleged that "he personally observed the Indiana Right to Life PAC attendees demonstrate against Senator Bayh." Therefore, CAP concludes, at least some of the purchase price of these tickets should have been attributed as an additional in-kind contribution from IRTL-PAC to QSC. IRTL-PAC's response to this item is as follows:

IRTL-PAC purchased tickets from the Indiana Democratic State Central Committee. The IRTLPAC Chairman, Mary Pat Marstall, Treasurer, Michele McRae, and an IRTLPAC volunteer, Ann Minnis, attended. The purpose of attending the dinner was to show support for pro-life Democratic candidates such as Congressmen Adam Benjamin, Floyd Pithian and Dave Evans. None of these three persons participated in any incident regarding Bayh and, indeed, have no knowledge of it (Attachment 3 at page 24).

The Commission has before it, then, the signed and sworn statement by CAP that certain, unnamed IRTL-PAC representatives demonstrated against Senator Bayh by holding up placards during his presentation. On the other hand, respondent IRTL-PAC states that IRTL-PAC personnel attended the fundraiser only to show support for pro-life Democratic candidates denying participation or even knowledge of the incident mentioned in the complaint. Again, the shortcoming of the allegation that the \$105.00 should have been reported as an in-kind expenditure (in addition to the problem that it is not claimed by IRTL-PAC as an independent expenditure), is the lack of evidence that there was any consultation or coordination between IRTL-PAC and QSC on this

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expenditure. The Office of General Counsel recommends, therefore, that the Commission find no reason to believe IRTL-PAC committed any violation of Sections 433 or 434 by mischaracterizing any in-kind contributions as independent expenditures.

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Finally, CAP has submitted a list of administrative, consulting and legal expenses reported by IRTL-PAC and alleges that since over 30% of the PAC's activities benefited the Quayle campaign, a portion of those expenditures should also be allocated as in-kind contributions to QSC. The December 30, 1980 report shows an administrative expense for labels used in The Communicator, IRTL-PAC's house organ. Respondent IRTL-PAC agrees that some of the \$391.74 for these labels should probably have been allocated to in-kind expenses for the Quayle campaign and, in recognition of this reporting error, has amended its report for November 25, 1980, through December 15, 1980. The amended report allocates \$52.23, or 1/5 of the cost of the IRTL-PAC advertisement, in the October/November 1980 issue of The Communicator to an in-kind contribution in favor of QSC. The Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission accept this amendment to the report.

CAP provides the Commission with no legal or factual basis for the allegation that other portions of IRTL-PAC's administrative, consulting or legal expenses should have been reported as in-kind contributions to QSC. IRTL-PAC correctly notes in its reponse that such expenditures are appropriately

administrative and not attributable to any candidate (see Attachment 3 at page 24).

**B. Internally Generated Matters**

IRTL-PAC's 1980 October Quarterly Report disclosed four contributions to QSC totaling \$3,731. A Request For Additional Information ("RFAI") was sent to IRTL-PAC on May 7, 1981, raising the question whether IRTL-PAC was fully qualified as a multi-candidate committee to contribute up to the \$5,000 limit imposed by Section 441a(a)(2) of the Act. According to the Commission's records, IRTL-PAC did not achieve multicandidate status until September 13, 1980, although their reports indicate that the \$3,731 in contributions to QSC were made between July 23, 1980 and August 26, 1980. RAD advised IRTL-PAC that it should seek return of the excess contributions to QSC.

On July 6, 1981, and July 13, 1981, IRTL-PAC responded that IRTL-PAC's connected organization the Indiana Right to Life Committee, Inc. ("IRTL") had made in-kind contributions to ten congressional candidates (totalling \$150) that were not originally reported, but considered by respondent to be a debt owed by IRTL-PAC to IRTL. IRTL-PAC also provided the Commission with an amended 1979 October Quarterly Report that characterized payments made by IRTL-PAC to extinguish this debt as in-kind contributions to the ten congressional candidates (see Attachment 1).

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Since Section 441b of the Act prohibits a PAC's connected organization from advancing money for PAC contributions, the solution proposed by respondent is technically impermissible. At the same time, it is clear that IRTL-PAC is now and was, within a short time after the excess contributions were made, qualified to make the maximum multicandidate committee contribution of \$5,000. It seems a futile exercise to require the committee to seek refund from QSC to IRTL-PAC at this time, over a year and one-half after the fact, when IRTL-PAC could immediately remake the full amount of the contributions to QSC. Therefore, the Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe that the respondent committed a violation of Section 441a(a)(1)(A) of the Act by contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Campaign before achieving multicandidate status but take no further action on the issue.

Since IRTL made contributions totalling \$150 to ten congressional candidates, there is also a Section 441b violation to be reckoned with. For a connected organization to advance contributions for its PAC amounts to making the contribution itself. The Office of General Counsel, therefore, recommends that the Commission find reason to believe IRTL committed a violation of 2 U.S.C § 441b of the Act by making the ten contributions to congressional candidates. Since, however, the amount of money involved is not significant (especially when apportioned among the ten candidates), we recommend that the Commission take no further action, send the respondents a letter of admonition and close the file.

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RECOMMENDATIONS

The Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission:

1. find reason to believe that the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee committed violations of 2 U.S.C. § 433 of the Act, by improperly reporting in-kind contributions of \$247.52 to the Quayle for Senate Campaign as independent expenditures;

2. find no reason to believe that the Quayle for Senate Committee committed any violation of 2 U.S.C. §§ 433, 434 or 441a of the Act as alleged in the complaint;

3. accept the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee's amendment to the November 25, 1980 Report allocating \$52.23 as an in-kind contribution to the Quayle for Senate Committee;

4. find reason to believe that the Indiana Right To Life Political Action Committee committed a violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441a(a)(1)(A) of the Act by contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Committee before achieving multicandidate status;

5. find reason to believe that the Indiana Right to Life Committee, Inc. committed a violation of 2 U.S.C § 441b by making ten contributions to congressional candidates; and



For your information, these contributions were made by the committee's connected organization in the amount of \$150. Because the apparent 2 U.S.C. 441b violation does not exceed the threshold contained in the Review and Referral Procedures (Chart #4), it has not been noted as a non-compliance matter in this referral. (Note: you may wish to refer to MUR 1110 --- relating to NRA Political Victory Fund and its connected organization, in which similar issues are raised.)

Excessive Contributions Made by a Non-Qualified Committee to  
a Federal Candidate --- 2 U.S.C. 441a(a)(1)(A)

The 1980 October Quarterly Report disclosed four (4) contributions <sup>1/</sup> totalling \$3,731 to Quayle For Senate designated for the General Election (Attachment #2). A Request For Additional Information was sent on May 7, 1981 (Attachment #3). The Chairman of the committee called the Commission soon after to state that the committee was qualified. <sup>2/</sup>

On May 26, 1981, the committee responded by reiterating that the committee had met all the criteria for achieving multi-candidate status (Attachment #4). Although the committee, based upon Commission records, had become qualified on September 13, 1980, at the time that the four (4) contributions were made, the committee had not yet met the criterion of giving to 5 or more Federal candidates. Thus, on May 29, 1981, a Second Letter was sent for an inadequate response (Attachment #5).

On June 18, 1981, the committee's attorney called and stated that several in-kind contributions had been made during the 1978 election. However, the caller explained that since these expenditures were less than \$200 each, they were not itemized on their reports. The caller was advised that all contributions had to be itemized regardless of amount. The attorney stated that they would respond by disclosing these in-kind contributions (Attachment #6).

The committee responded on July 6, 1981, by providing an explanation that certain in-kind contributions had been made, but that the committee would soon send in the appropriate back-up information (Attachment #7). On July 13, 1981, the committee responded by explaining that in 1978, Indiana Right To Life, the committee's connected organization, ran an advertisement in its newspaper which constituted endorsements of ten (10) Congressional candidates. However, the purchase of this was originally listed as a debt owed by the committee to their connected organization, as noted on the 1978 Pre-General Election Report. The committee also provided an amended 1979 October Quarterly Report which disclosed the payments made to extinguish this debt, as in-kind contributions to the ten (10) respective Congressional candidates (Attachment #8).

1. We filed our statement of organization on April 11, 1978, and have been active in elections since that time.
2. We have received well in excess of 50 contributions from individuals.
3. We have supported 5 or more Federal candidates beginning with the 1978 elections.

All of this information should be substantiated and in your files. It appears that from the above data that we have fulfilled the criteria for a multi-candidate PAC.

It is somewhat of a puzzle to us that this would not be known, as we have made our reports to the FEC diligently since our inception. It has also been somewhat of an embarrassment to have had this question arise, thereby causing distress to the Quayle campaign in thinking they would have to refund money to our PAC.





This letter is in response to your recent undated letter regarding a complaint filed against the Indiana Right to Life PAC. The complaint was filed by Mr. Robert Blaemire and alleges that the Indiana Right to Life PAC made certain independent expenditures that were not independent of the Quayle for Senate Committee.

We have reviewed this complaint as well as our records and FEC reports and note the following. Contributions to the Quayle for Senate Committee including in-kind contributions have been properly reported by the Committee. All contributions from the Indiana Right to Life PAC of which we are aware have been reported and are within the statutory limits. The Committee, however, has no knowledge or record of any in-kind contribution of \$10 dated 2/16/79, or of \$5 dated 9/14/79, or of \$180 dated 8/22/80, as alleged in the complaint. The in-kind contributions reported by the Committee do include expenses relating to the letter and the brochures appended to the complaint as exhibits.

In regards to the independent expenditures listed in the complaint, we have no records or knowledge as to what these expenditures by the Indiana Right to Life PAC may be. Mr. Blaemire, I note, does not even provide any examples or materials that comprise these independent expenditures. Since we were unaware of these expenditures, it is difficult to understand how they can in any way be imputed as contributions to the Committee. By the same token, since we didn't know of this activity it could hardly have been anything but independent activity.

As General Counsel for Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee, (IRTLPAC), I hereby submit the response of IRTL PAC to the complaint filed by the Committee for American Principles (CFAP). Specifically, IRTL PAC denies that it committed any violation of the Federal Election Campaign Act in making expenditures in connection with the Bayh-Quayle Senate race in 1980 and the report thereof.

The complaint alleges that IRTL PAC spent in excess of \$5,000 in direct or in-kind contributions to the Quayle election effort. Specifically, they allege that claimed independent expenditures by IRTL PAC were, in fact, in cooperation with the Quayle campaign and should have been reported as in-kind contributions. In addition, they claim that other expenditures of IRTL PAC, including administrative, consulting and legal, should have been listed as in-kind contributions to Quayle. The aggregate of these expenditures, they claim, exceed the \$5,000 contribution limit. IRTL PAC denies each of these allegations by CFAP.

General Legal Principle

The Federal Election Campaign Act recognizes that a PAC may expend an unlimited amount of money on independent expenditures advocating the election of a federal candidate. In addition, a political action committee may contribute up to \$5,000 to a federal candidate for an election. An independent expenditure is any expenditure of funds made by someone without consultation or knowledge of the candidate about whom the expenditure is made. Authorization or consultation with the candidate turns the expenditure into a direct or in-kind contribution.

Independent expenditures are a protected form of First Amendment speech and may not be subject to limitation on amount. Buckley v. Valeo, 96 S.Ct. 612 (1976). No provision of the FECA prohibits a person making an indirect or direct contribution from making an

independent expenditure. Indeed, the Supreme Court in Buckley v. Valeo struck down a provision of the FECA, § 608(e)(1), which sought to prohibit "any expenditure...relative to a clearly identified candidate during a calendar year which, when added to all other expenditures...advocating the election or defeat of such candidate, exceeds \$1,000." This provision was struck down because it limited amounts that may be spent on independent expenditures. Each expenditure must be viewed independently to determine whether or not it was made in consultation with the candidate. If it is, it is in-kind; if it is not, it is independent.

In addition, § 106.1 of FEC regulations requires the attribution of expenditures, made on behalf of more than one candidate, to each. This regulation specifically exempts expenditures for "rent, personnel, overhead, general administration, fundraising, and other day-to-day costs of political committees...unless these expenditures are made on behalf of a clearly identified candidate and the expenditures can be directly attributed to that candidate."

#### Analysis of Expenditures

Complainant lists certain expenditures made by IRTL PAC on page one of his complaint. Each of these expenditures is analyzed below:

02-16-79 \$10.00 in-kind for Quayle, ad for general election  
09-14-79 \$ 5.00 in-kind for Quayle, ad for general election

Each of these expenditures were for an ad in The Communicator which is the newspaper of IRTL, for an ad which appeared before the general election of 1978, not 1980. At that time Quayle was running for Congress in the 4th District of Indiana. The same ad carried an endorsement of other congressional candidates, such as Thornson, running in the 3rd District, and Bosma, running in the 11th District, who both ran in 1978 but not 1980. This was listed as an in-kind contribution since the ad was previously discussed with the Quayle committee.

04-30-80 \$75.04 Independent expenditure, ad for Quayle

This expenditure was for an ad in the April/May, 1980 issue of The Communicator endorsing Quayle for the primary election. A copy is attached as "Exhibit 1". No communication was made with the Quayle campaign regarding this expenditure. The amount was calculated by allocating a portion of the ad's cost to Quayle. Other candidates were attributed an allowable amount.

These expenditures related to the production of a brochure for Quayle. A copy is attached as "Exhibit 2". 150,000 copies of this brochure were produced in cooperation with the Quayle campaign and distributed primarily by IRTL PAC volunteers. Quayle later produced a similar brochure paid for exclusively by the Quayle Committee. This brochure is attached to the complaint.

08-22-80 \$ 180.00 in-kind for Quayle, purchase ad

In the September, 1980 issue of The Communicator, IRTL PAC purchased an ad for \$180.00 endorsing Quayle. Copy is attached as "Exhibit 3". While no contact was made with the Quayle campaign, IRTL PAC listed it as an in-kind contribution since the body of it was taken from the brochure, above Exhibit 1, prepared with the cooperation of the Quayle campaign. This ad was not authorized, however, by the Quayle campaign.

08-26-80 \$ 100.00 direct contribution to Quayle

This is a cash contribution to the Quayle campaign.

10-20-80 \$ 200.00 Independent expenditure for Quayle,  
postage for distribution of The Communicator with PAC ad enclosed  
10-24-80 \$ 462.60 Independent expenditure for Quayle,  
printing of PAC ad in Communicator  
11-03-80 \$ 65.35 Independent expenditure for Quayle,  
design for PAC ad

These expenditures relate to a 4 page ad insert in the October/November 1980 issue of The Communicator. A copy is attached as "Exhibit 4". 300,000 copies of this Communicator were distributed by right to life volunteers. This ad was prepared without consultation or approval of the Quayle campaign. Quayle was apportioned a 1/15 share of the cost of production and printing of this ad.

Priests in Indiana. Enclosed with it was a Quayle brochure, Exhibit 2 above. Here, the complainant mistakes this letter with another sent by the Quayle campaign. The Quayle campaign was not consulted regarding this letter.

The letter mailed by the Quayle campaign, which complainant attached to his complaint, was a cooperative effort with the Quayle campaign and the Republican State Committee. The only contribution to it by IRTL PAC was the signature of Mary Pat Marstall, IRTL PAC Chairman, and enclosure of the Quayle brochure, Exhibit 2, which had previously been reported.

06-05-80 \$ 105.00 Indiana Democratic State Central Committee

IRTL PAC purchased tickets for the Indiana Democratic State Central Committee. The IRTL PAC Chairman, Mary Pat Marstall, Treasurer, Michele McRae, and an IRTL PAC volunteer, Ann Minnis, attended. The purpose of attending the dinner was to show support for pro-life Democratic candidates such as Congressmen Adam Benjamin, Floyd Fithian and Dave Evans. None of these three persons participated in any incident regarding Bayh and, indeed, have no knowledge of it.

12-30-80 \$ 391.74 Western American Mailer for computer labels

These labels were purchased by the IRTL PAC to distribute the October/November 1980 issue of The Communicator, Exhibit 4. The total bill for these labels was \$783.47, one-half of which was allocated to the federal account of IRTL PAC. This amount was listed as an administrative expense since most of this issue of The Communicator (4 pages) had no PAC material in it. These pages were, therefore, considered educational material. In addition, 7/16 of the PAC ad explained IRTL PAC without any endorsement. Some portion of this expenditure, however, probably should have been allocated to federal candidates. As a result, attached hereto as "Exhibit 6" is an amended report for November 15, 1980 through December 31, 1980. Quayle's portion is allocated at 1/15 of the entire PAC ad (1/3 of one page of a 4 page ad). As a result, his amount is \$52.23.

#### Administrative, Consultation and Legal Expense

These funds were spent, according to federal election law, on appropriate administrative expenditures not attributable to any candidate. As a result, according to the FEC regulations, these amounts need not be allocated to any candidate.

Complainant seeks to aggregate all in-kind and independent expenditures by IRTL PAC on the theory that, if one makes in-kind contributions, one, therefore, is precluded from making independent expenditures. Obviously this is not the law. In addition, simply because in-kind contributions are made does not, therefore, establish that the candidate has authorized or been communicated with concerning the independent expenditures. Here, there is no allegation of any communication, consultation or authorization regarding IRTL PAC's independent expenditures with the Quayle campaign. As General Counsel for IRTL PAC, I hereby specifically deny that any such communication or consultation took place. Each of these expenditures were for separate projects and each were self contained. Thus, no communication was necessary and none took place.



## 1980—AMERICA AT THE CROSSROADS Abortion-on-Demand or Protection of Life

On January 22, 1973 the U.S. Supreme Court legalizes abortion-on-demand, nullifying laws in all 50 states.

Acting on two separate cases before them (*Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton*) the Justice ruled 7-2 that as a matter of law the unborn child is not a "person" within the constitutional definition of that term, and that the right to privacy of the mother bars any government, state or federal institution from interfering with her absolute "right" to terminate her pregnancy up to the time of viability (ability to exist outside the womb). The Court abruptly decided that viability occurs in the last three months of pregnancy. In practice the Court decision means:

In the first, second and third months of pregnancy there can be no legal restrictions on abortion. The state must leave the abortion decision entirely to a woman and her physician.

In the fourth, fifth, and sixth months of pregnancy the state may only enact laws which make the procedure safer for the mother such as requiring that abortion be done in a hospital by a licensed physician.

In the seventh, eighth, and ninth months of pregnancy abortion is still allowed if one licensed physician determines it is necessary to preserve the woman's life or health. The Court defines health as "physical, emotional, psychological, familial and the woman's age."

The effect of the Supreme Court decision is abortion-on-demand. This means a woman can have an abortion at any time she finds a doctor willing to do it.

Following this decision, the Court bent over backwards again and again to protect the woman's "right to privacy" to the detriment of family stability. In the *Bethel* case the Court ruled:

A father's consent is not necessary for the abortion of his child ("despite the fact that his interest in having a child may be outweighed by any other interest in his life".... *Justice's opinion*)

A parent's consent is not necessary for a minor, unwed girl to have an abortion.

And, despite a four-year ban on the use of funds for abortion-on-demand as legislated by the U.S. Congress, the U.S. taxpayer must fund abortions not just to save the life of the mother, but for mental and social well-being...in fact, government-financed abortion-on-demand (Feb. 18, 1980 decision by the Supreme Court to keep in effect a ruling by Judge Douglas's District Court)

The enactment of Indiana caused quickly to the Supreme Court decision which overturned the restrictive Indiana abortion law. In the same year, our state legislature passed a joint resolution directing the United States Congress to call a constitutional convention. This resolution requested that a Human Life Amendment "to the Constitution of the United States be adopted to protect the right to life" because "the legislators of this state believe it to be for the best interest of the people of the United States." Since that time this same resolution has been passed in 17 states. On March 2, 1980 Idaho, the 17th state brought us half way to a necessary 34 state total.

The Indiana Legislature again acted in 1975 when repealing the state law on abortion to conform with the Supreme Court decision.

It is not the intent of the Indiana General Assembly in repealing this legislation, to acknowledge that there is a Constitutional right to abortion-on-demand or to indicate that it approves of abortion except to save the life of the mother," the House Committee said. "The General Assembly is, however, committed to a course acted by recent Supreme Court decisions and this legislation is an attempt to abide by those decisions to the extent necessary."



The U.S. Supreme Court later disagreed with Indiana lawmakers, though, on what constitutes the state's most important right regarding the abortion procedure.

Parts of the revised Indiana law were struck down by the Court in 1976 decisions. The entire statute then included a ban on either a self-performed abortion, or assistance for parental consent for girls under 16, and the requirement that the abortion be performed in a hospital or licensed health facility. The Court ruled that these restrictions were an infringement on the woman's right to abortion as guaranteed by their "73 decision."

In 1977, the Indiana legislature approved legislation which provides that the girl desiring an abortion sign a consent form only after 24 out of a 24-hour waiting period. Recently, Gov. Brown signed HB 1414. This prohibits state and local funding of abortion unless it is necessary to preserve the life of a pregnant woman.

In the Indiana Third District Court of Appeals this state is asking that abortion clinics be subject to regulation to the same extent as other regulated medical centers. Presently there are "no regulations."

**The Common Goal of Pro-Life Groups**

**THE HUMAN LIFE MOVEMENT**

Section 1 With respect to the right to life, the word "person" as used in this Article and in the 13th and 14th Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the United States applies to all human beings irrespective of age, health, position or condition of dependency including their unborn offspring at every stage of their biological development.

Section 2 No unborn person shall be deprived of life by any person, provided, however, that nothing in this article shall prohibit a law permitting only those medical procedures required to prevent the death of the mother.

Section 3 The Congress and the several states shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

8. Register to vote and vote for otherwise acceptable candidates who will support a Human Life Amendment.
9. If you are a student discuss abortion as a topic for a speech.

### Answers—Pro-Life I.Q.

1. **Q:** When the Supreme Court ruled on abortion, it allowed the states the opportunity to regulate only if they did not act only after the fetal death. Therefore, as long as a doctor is willing, a woman may obtain an abortion, even during labor (the related story on Page 1.)
2. **Q:** The Supreme Court decision of 1970 took away parental rights regarding abortion. (See story on Page 1.)
3. **Q:** Nationally over 1.1 million abortions are done each year. In Indiana in 1974 abortions done on Indiana residents, including those who went outside, was 12,000. At last count, in 1970 this was to over 20,000.
4. **Q:** True. In 1970 Washington D.C. became the first American city in which abortions on residents outnumbered live births.
5. **Q:** While pro-lifers have worked diligently through Congress to prohibit our tax dollar from being used for abortion, tax money are paying for abortion-on-demand.
6. **Q:** Research on live, aborted babies is prohibited by law in a few states while in others private laboratories may do as they choose. *Newsday Magazine* reported in 1977 that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency disregarding advice from the effects that genetic health and ecological effects, funded a controversial pesticide research project on human fetuses. This project was not successful but we have to say any of knowing how many other projects on aborted babies may be funded by government and industry.
7. **Q:** False. The fact is, as the number of legal abortions and illegally funded abortions have skyrocketed in America, so has the incidence of child abuse. With fewer and fewer infants and children, we have more and more child abuse. (Write a month of column, these headlines appeared, "Police Found Near Point of No Turned Back" (New York Times, Jan. 8, 1970), "Child Abuse Epidemic SEW Days" (Washington Post, Dec. 2, 1970). This is just the opposite of what abortion proponents claimed would happen.
8. **Q:** General Rogers in "The Death of America" says there is probably not a parent alive who has not felt anger towards their child at some time or another. But, in addition, child abuse is an extremely abnormal act where a parent uses complete control and forces the child by a sudden outbreak of anger. He continues that abortion will not do anything to help the parent control their anger.
9. **Q:** False. Great Britain has 50 million people living in an area smaller than California. Why is it that, that there are fewer murders on the entire British Isles annually than there are in the city of Chicago, or Cleveland, or even of Greater Kansas City? Obviously, population density itself does not produce high crime rates and social ills.

### Of Life and Death Matters

#### In Contention

The Center for Disease Control weekly report has concluded that in Texas at least, few doctors remain, despite federal or state funds for abortion, tend to keep their "doors" off limits. The fear that women would access to free abortion would put private practitioners was found to be correct.

#### Medical Not Ethical

Harvard Medical School reports say physicians should condemn the use of medical personnel in administering capital punishment. Death by lethal injection has been adopted by Oklahoma, Texas, Idaho and New Mexico.

Professor William J. Dawson and Dr. Wood Campbell said this type of involvement by the medical profession represents "a corruption and exploitation of the healing profession's work in society."

"No medical procedure and if a qualified or allied health professional," said Dawson. "Because its members to life" (Information from Indianapolis Star, January 24, 1976).

#### Indiana Abortionist

Dr. Arnold Robinson, the abortionist who was diagnosed, Inc., a clinic on North Meridian Street in Indianapolis, is now in Terre Haute. In jail. He is serving his 3-year sentence in the federal penitentiary there for mail fraud.

Robinson was among the abortionists exposed in the Chicago Sun Times series on Abortion Profiteers. The Indiana Medical Licensing Board has unanimously revoked his license.

#### Frequency

Frequency in one of the most common methods to check out the abortion process for determining if they were successful. It is taken by mouth soon after the abortion to determine if it is still in the uterus.

This new test is still experimental and according to an article in the *Chicago Sun Times* (1/28/76) it gives a false sense of "substantially lowering abortion."

### How Many Abortions?

Probably more has been heard in Indiana's abortion statistics for the past year in a few. The 70 counties failed to include Marion County Clinic for Women, about 1,500 abortions.

In 1975, Indianapolis, the Marion County, reported only three abortions in six months. At that time Dr. Robert A. Callahan, State Director of the Indiana Board of Health, advised that he would have reported "one birth, or else a double number." Callahan said the state makes an attempt to check percentages... and in fact, there is no way to check.

When contacted about this year's discrepancy by the Walsh of 20% of Indianapolis, Callahan agreed to call the Clinic for Women. He reported back that 1,500 abortions are indicated by the clinic but missing from the report.

In addition to the total 70 abortion statistics 1976, and the number is 13,500.



became pregnant through rape despite the fact that the doctor had taken "all the precautions available at that time," the doctor said. "You have the option of an abortion." Abortion for rape was legal in the state in which she lived with a doctor's recommendation. "I can get it for you, and will recommend someone who will give you the good care, and it will be done properly in a hospital."  
 "You have the option," he said.  
 "Then he looked at Jean. "No you don't," he said. "You could never take that option."  
 "That was the end of it," she sobs. "He had been through my other pregnancy with me. He knew me as a mother."  
 "I could have still said O.K. I'll relieve myself and have an abortion, and the child will be a memory. But that's not it. The child is never a memory. The child is totally real. It's not someone else. It's not me. The child is the child. Love and attention and caring can change a child's personality. I think they've got more bearing than heredity."  
 The man who raped Jean was a friend of her husband. He had come to the house to supposedly pick up something that belonged to him. He brought a gun.  
 "You fight for a certain period of time" Jean says. "then you decide it's so good to fight anymore in that situation because I knew I would have been killed."  
 "I was bruised somewhat. Not as badly as some, but the police found clothing all from the gun under the pillow on the

bed. And afterwards when they talked to him, the rapist admitted the gun was loaded and cocked though he said he wasn't sure he would have killed me."  
 "I moved out of the house afterwards. I had decided to prosecute and I had phone calls threatening me if I did. I had nightmares for a long time. I woke up screaming in the middle of the night. For six or eight months I would still wake up screaming. It didn't bother me so much during the day unless I had encountered the individual at a shopping center or someplace. Then it would bother me for long periods."  
 Did carrying the baby make it harder?  
 "It may have even made it easier to know that I was doing what I myself believe in, what was fair to the child, if not to myself. And I think probably in the end it was a little selfish to go ahead and have the child because I could release those feelings of hurt and guilt by loving this child who had never hurt anyone."  
 The only one who pushed abortion was Jean's parish priest, because in his "I wouldn't be able to handle what was happening."  
 Jean credits the support of her family and friends with helping her survive. "I didn't have a husband's support," she says. "I think it's necessary to have some support, but it doesn't even have to come from family—just someone who's willing to say "you're still who you are and we accept you for that. Someone who won't shut you off."

## What is the IRTL PAC?

What is the IRTL PAC? It's an organization that can endorse pro-life candidates, support them financially by campaign contributions, and inform the public of our recommended pro-life candidates.

Why do we need a PAC? Under federal and state laws, groups like Indiana Right to Life are not permitted to actively support specific candidates. We feel a responsibility to do as much as we possibly can to help those already in office who have stood up to defend the unborn child. Also we need to support pro-life candidates running for office whose election victory would improve our legislative strength.

Why aren't we just with letters and hot lines directed toward our elected officials? We agree with that and would like to do that as well. However, writing a thousand letters to one elected legislator will not help the unborn child as much as electing a candidate to the office who is committed to the pro-life cause. It's much more productive to elect candidates who don't just talk the talk, but actually do the deed. And remember, the IRTL PAC is not just for endorsing candidates, but also for promoting other legislation to support pro-life life.

## How Did IRTL PAC Choose the Endorsed Candidates?

Our criteria includes the voters records if incumbent, the responses to our survey and the CENSIBILITY of the candidate. Also, IF ALL OTHER THINGS ARE EQUAL, THE INCUMBENT WINS because of his proven support and the advantages of his seniority in office. **WISLUFT or "wisdom"** of a candidate may be included but it alone has never been the single deciding factor.

Based on our criteria and a careful study of each individual vote, the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee presents, for you, the candidates we feel can be most effective in speaking for the right to life of the unborn child.

In certain cases, the choice was easy because the candidates differed significantly in their responses to our questions or perhaps did not respond after repeated requests.

However, there are several cases where both the incumbent and his opponent agree with the Right to Life position. This situation is most common when we seek all candidates to support our efforts. But based on our criteria, we must endorse the incumbent because of his proven support and the advantages of his seniority in office. The "at the top of a candidate's

name indicates that the opponent also supports Right to Life.

The questions asked of the candidates were:

Of the Congressional candidates

1. Would you add your name as co-sponsor to the amendment (the National Right to Life Human Life Amendment) already showing your support of its passage in Congress?
2. Would you vote for the Human Life Amendment in committee or on the floor of the House or Senate to support its passage in Congress?
3. Would you vote against Federal funding of abortion, except to save the life of the mother?

Of the State Representatives and State Deputies

1. Would a Human Life Amendment be passed by Congress, would you vote for its ratification in the Indiana legislature?
2. Would you vote for the Human Life Amendment if it were necessary to preserve the life of the unborn child?

# THE HUMAN LIFE AMENDMENT

Section 1: With respect to the right to life, the word "person" as used in this Article and in the 9th and 14th Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the United States applies to all human beings irrespective of age, health, function or condition of dependency including their unborn offspring at every stage of their biological development.

Section 2: No unborn person shall be deprived of life by any person, provided, however, that nothing in this article shall prohibit a law permitting only those medical procedures required to prevent the death of the mother.

Section 3: The congress and the several states shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

# RIGHT TO LIFE GAINS SUPPORT

In fact, by the House of Representatives in Washington, D.C., on January 10, 1977, the House passed a bill to support the Hyde Amendment to reduce the right to life by cutting the total amount of federal funds for abortions to \$130 million (only \$5 million for a low-income family). 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# OUR OPPONENTS

That is, murder, theft, rape. "The bottom line is that it (the choice of abortion) is unethical... in light of what we have come to know about the unborn child," quote from Dr. Bernard Nathanson, former abortionist and founder of NARAL.

Our opponents claim we lack compassion for victims of rape.

THE TRUTH is that pregnancy as the result of rape is rare (see study found 50%). When it does occur, the mother's child is as innocent as any other. As the result of the rape of her 13-year-old mother, seven and a half year old Walter was born unwanted. But she spent her adult life caring for others. This included 20 foster daughters.

Our opponents say that we want parents to have defective children.

THE TRUTH is we support research which improves the health of born and unborn children. What we do not support is taking the child's life. Already doctors are doing abortions for retardation and hemophilia. Some women are aborting perfectly healthy babies whose only defect is to be the wrong sex. As reported in *Microscopically Suspicious* for May, 1977: "It cost her (one woman) three round trip plane tickets (from Atlanta to a New York Medical Center) about \$250 for each amniocentesis, and the cost of two abortions to have the boy she and her husband wanted."

Our opponents say that if we make

abortion legal again, women will want to have only abortions.

THE TRUTH is that the number of illegal abortion complications before 1973 was greatly exaggerated by our opponents. Former abortionist, Dr. Bernard Nathanson, admits that before the legalization of abortion nationwide, our opponents used dubious tactics to sway public opinion. They claimed that illegal abortions took 5,000 to 10,000 lives per year. Nathanson says: "I realize that I know the figures were totally false, and I suppose others did too if they stopped to think of it. But in the 'sincerity' of our conviction, it was a useful figure, widely accepted, so why go out of our way to correct it with honest statistics. The resulting concern was to get the law eliminated." (from his book *Aborting America*).

The U.S. Government's Center for Disease Control statistics have proven that "In Texas, pregnant, low-income women who do not have federal or state funds for abortions do not appear to be turning to illegal abortion to terminate unwanted pregnancies."

Yes, I do believe our opponents are losing the battle on abortion. They are frightened and they are frustrated because during the last eight years our attempts to curtail the majority of the American public that abortion is wrong, have been successful.

Now our opponents have moved from calling us "Catholics," to "Conservatives," to "Reactionaries."

Those who believe abortion is wrong must continue to inform themselves of THE TRUTH and continue to try to stop abortion.

# Hyde Victory in Congress

The most extensive National legislation which sets off on track for abortion is called the "Hyde Amendment." It is named for Congressman Henry Hyde of Illinois who introduced it as a rider to the yearly appropriations bill for Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW), now called Health and Human services.

This year, however, Richard Judge John Dingell, noted that "Hyde" was unconstitutional, and that the government did indeed have to pay for welfare abortions. Thus, in an unprecedented move, 247 U.S. Congressmen and Senators signed a "Statement of the Court" or *Amicus Brief* which argued that only Congress has the right to appropriate funds, and that the Supreme Court would, in this case, be illegally encroaching a Congressional right.

To the relief of Right to Life people nationwide, this means the Supreme Court, in a close decision, finally declared the Hyde Amendment constitutional. Congressman Hyde was aided by action if this cut-off of funds for abortion beneficiaries against poor women. He replied:

With this amendment we can save the lives of the children of the poor. And when we reach our ultimate goal of a Human Life Amendment, we can also save the children of the middle-class and the rich.

Dear Father:

Six years ago the priests in Indiana received the attached letter from Senator Birch Bayh. He was running for reelection to the U. S. Senate and this letter on abortion was part of his campaign -- note the "HOOSIERS for Birch Bayh" stationery. In it, Senator Bayh went to great lengths to convey the impression he was opposed to abortion, even including excerpts from a letter from Cardinal Medeiros whom the Senator had previously convinced that he was really opposed to abortion. The Senator concluded his letter to each priest requesting "...that you have faith in the sincerity of my intentions."

Since that letter, Senator Bayh has served another six year term, and we thought it would be appropriate now to review his record on abortion. While continuing to proclaim his "personal" opposition to abortion, Senator Bayh has:

- a. Voted to kill all constitutional amendments on abortion, supporting the continuation of abortion-on-demand throughout pregnancy in America. Eight-million unborn lives taken, 1.4 million this year alone. Senator Bayh also is the key leader of the pro-abortion forces in the Senate.
- b. Voted the pro-abortion position 23 consecutive times on the Senate floor including supporting the tax funding of over one-million abortions.

In recognition of his activities in support of abortion, Senator Bayh was:

- a. Supported in his presidential campaign by Karen Mulhauser, Director of the National Abortion Rights Action League (NARAL) and by abortion advocate Gloria Steinem.
- b. Honored by the National Abortion Rights Action League at a breakfast on Capitol Hill on January 31, 1977.
- c. Invited to speak at the fifth anniversary party of the largest abortion clinic in Pennsylvania held on April 28, 1978. (He accepted.)

Please read Senator Bayh's October 26, 1974, letter and compare it to his record. Consider also as you read his letter that, when Senator Bayh announced on September 12, 1975, that he intended to oppose the constitutional amendments on abortion, he explained his purpose for holding hearings as follows:

\*\*\*\*\* VOTE PRO-LIFE \*\*\*\*\*

8, 2, 0, 4, 0, 3, 2, 1, 9, 1, 1

"The reason I have been careful to hold hearings on the questions is to allow Congress, the public and the media a chance to realize the consequences of right-to-life amendments."

Others attributed an additional motivation - a pre-election political tactic to neutralize the abortion issue in the election. Holding this view were Dr. Louise Tyrer, Project Director, Family Planning Division, the American College of Ob/Gyn (4/16/74), Jack Germond of the Washington Star (9/26/75), and Charles Mohr of the New York Times (2/12/76).

We have been extremely disappointed with Senator Bayh's record over the past six years. Moreover, we are shocked that he has come back to Indiana still talking about his "personal" opposition to abortion. Senator Bayh wrote to you six years ago and he may very likely contact you again. Please know that what the Senator "says" about his personal feelings on abortion in Indiana is in direct contrast to the Senator's public actions and his voting record in Washington.

Dear Father:

I know that the question of the proposed Constitutional amendments dealing with abortion are of great interest to you. I would like to bring you up to date on proceedings before the Senate Constitutional Amendments Subcommittee relative to those amendments.

As you know, I decided some time ago that of all the proposed amendments pending before my subcommittee, the most important were those dealing with abortion and that public interest was such that it was imperative that we commence the first step in the amending process--public hearings. To date we have had 11 days of hearings and heard the testimony of over 60 witnesses. Our witnesses have been of different faiths and backgrounds and have included both those who favor and oppose the proposed Constitutional amendments. Several members of the clergy, doctors and lawyers and concerned citizens have appeared. Among our distinguished witnesses were four Cardinal Archbishops of the Church--Cardinal Krol of Philadelphia, Cardinal Cody of Chicago, Cardinal Manning of Los Angeles, and Cardinal Medeiros of Boston.

While I continue to adhere to my personal opposition to abortions our hearings have brought forth many of the complexities involved in this issue. To my knowledge, never has a more complicated question with so many moral, legal, philosophical, scientific and medical ramifications come before a legislative body. The recent testimony we received on October 8, perhaps underscores some of the difficulties we have faced. At that time three distinguished scholars, while differing widely on other aspects of abortion, agreed that the amendments before the subcommittee would not, as presently drafted, accomplish the goal of overturning the decision of the Supreme Court.

Because of the complexities involved in the proposed amendments, I have insisted on thorough and complete hearings. I do not believe that the process of amending the Constitution should be taken lightly, and I speak from experience. Because of the careful work of our subcommittee, three Constitutional amendments have been approved by Congress since I assumed the role as Chairman of the subcommittee.

Of course, this careful and thorough approach has brought considerable criticism from both those who believe we are moving too slowly and those who would prefer to see no action at all. This is to be expected. I would, however, like to call your attention to a few words from a letter I received from Cardinal Medeiros shortly after he testified:

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"I was well aware," he noted, "from the very beginning of this session that you are deeply concerned with protecting unborn human life and have anxieties concerning the problems attendant upon abortion. I certainly understand the tremendous responsibility which your subcommittee has assumed by your decision to hold public hearings and am sympathetic with the difficult problems in the formation of a Constitutional Amendment. While your questions and those of your colleagues were very probing, I really realize their necessity if you and your colleagues are to obtain the most complete information and knowledge which is so essential and so useful in the drafting of a Constitutional Amendment."

I firmly believe that my responsibility is to insure a complete examination, through the hearing process, of all aspects of the problem. The committee is now engaged in those hearings and will continue with them until we have the necessary information. I will not abandon this responsibility by rushing into precipitous action, although some argue that this would be the politically expedient thing to do. Nor will I bow to the pressure of those who want me to abandon our hearings. All I can do is ask that you have faith in the sincerity of my intentions, while I attempt to deal with this most difficult moral and legislative problem.

On April , 1982, the Commission found reason to believe that your clients, Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee ("IRTL-PAC") and Indiana Right to Life Committee, Inc. ("IRTL"), had violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441a(a) (1) (A), 434 and 441b, provisions of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act") in connection with the above referenced MUR. However, after considering the circumstances of this matter, the Commission has determined to take no further action and close its file. The file will be made part of the public record within 30 days. Should you wish to submit any materials to appear on the public record, please do so within 10 days.

The Commission reminds you that IRTL-PAC's contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Committee before achieving multicandidate status nevertheless appears to be a violation of Section 441a(a) (1) (A) and you should take immediate steps to insure that this activity does not occur in the future. In addition, the Commission found reason to believe that the distribution of the anti-Bayh letter along with copies of the Quayle brochure produced jointly by IRTL-PAC and the Quayle Committee was improperly reported as an independent expenditure. We, therefore, recommend that you amend your reports to show that payments for distribution of these materials were an in-kind contribution to the Quayle for Senate Committee.

SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

RAD's analysis of the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee's ("IRTL-PAC") reports raised the question whether IRTL-PAC was qualified as a multicandidate committee at the time it made \$3,031.53 in contributions to the Quayle for Senate Committee ("QSC"). If IRTL-PAC was not qualified as a multicandidate committee, its contribution limit under Section 441a(a)(2)(A) of the Act would have only been 1,000.

FACTUAL BASIS AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

IRTL-PAC's 1980 Quarterly Report disclosed four contributions to QSC totalling \$3,731. A Request For Additional Information ("RFAI") was sent to IRTL-PAC on May 7, 1981, asking whether IRTL-PAC was fully qualified as a multicandidate committee to contribute up to the \$5,000 limit imposed by Section 441a(a)(2)(A) of the Act. According to the Commission's records, IRTL-PAC did not achieve multicandidate status until September 13, 1980, although their reports indicate that IRTL-PAC made \$3,731 in contributions to QSC between July 23, 1980, and August 26, 1980. RAD advised IRTL-PAC to seek return of the excess contributions to QSC.

On July 6, 1981, and July 18, 1981, IRTL-PAC responded that IRTL-PAC's connected organization, the Indiana Right to Life Committee, Inc. ("IRTL") had made contributions to ten congressional candidates (totalling \$150) that were originally reported as a debt owed by IRTL-PAC to IRTL. IRTL-PAC also provided the Commission with an amended 1979 October Quarterly Report that characterized payments made by IRTL-PAC to extinguish this debt as in-kind contributions to the ten congressional candidates.

Since Section 441b of the Act prohibits a PAC's connected organization from advancing money for PAC contributions, the solution proposed by respondents in their July communications with the Commission is technically impermissible. At the same time, it is clear that IRTL-PAC is now and was, within a short time after the excess contributions were made, qualified to make the maximum multicandidate committee contribution of \$5,000. It seems a futile exercise to require the committee to seek refund from QSC to IRTL-PAC at this time, over a year and one-half after the fact, when IRTL-PAC could immediately remake the full contribution to QSC. Therefore, the Office of General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe that the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee committed a violation of Section 441a(a)(1)(A) of the Act by contributing over \$1,000 to the Quayle for Senate Committee before achieving multi-candidate status. But the Office of General Counsel also recommends that the Commission take no further action on this issue.

Since IRTL made contributions totalling \$150 to ten congressional candidates, there is also a Section 441b violation to be reckoned with. For a connected organization to advance contributions for a PAC amounts to making the contributions itself. The Office of General Counsel recommends, therefore, that the Commission find reason to believe that IRTL committed a violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441b of the Act by making ten contributions to congressional candidates. But because the amount of money involved is not significant (especially when apportioned among the ten congressional recipients), we recommend that the Commission take no further action on this issue, send the respondents a letter of admonition and close the file.

As General Counsel for Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee, (IRTLPAC), I hereby submit the response of IRTL PAC to the complaint filed by the Committee for American Principles (CFAP). Specifically, IRTL PAC denies that it committed any violation of the Federal Election Campaign Act in making expenditures in connection with the Bayh-Quayle Senate race in 1980 and the report thereof.

The complaint alleges that IRTL PAC spent in excess of \$5,000 in direct or in-kind contributions to the Quayle election effort. Specifically, they allege that claimed independent expenditures by IRTL PAC were, in fact, in cooperation with the Quayle campaign and should have been reported as in-kind contributions. In addition, they claim that other expenditures of IRTL PAC, including administrative, consulting and legal, should have been listed as in-kind contributions to Quayle. The aggregate of these expenditures, they claim, exceed the \$5,000 contribution limit. IRTL PAC denies each of these allegations by CFAP.

General Legal Principle

The Federal Election Campaign Act recognizes that a PAC may expend an unlimited amount of money on independent expenditures advocating the election of a federal candidate. In addition, a political action committee may contribute up to \$5,000 to a federal candidate for an election. An independent expenditure is any expenditure of funds made by someone without consultation or knowledge of the candidate about whom the expenditure is made. Authorization or consultation with the candidate turns the expenditure into a direct or in-kind contribution.

Independent expenditures are a protected form of First Amendment speech and may not be subject to limitation on amount. Buckley v. Valeo, 96 S.Ct. 612 (1976). No provision of the FECA prohibits a person making an indirect or direct contribution from making an

independent expenditure. Indeed, the Supreme Court in Buckley v. Valeo struck down a provision of the FECA, § 608(e)(1), which sought to prohibit "any expenditure...relative to a clearly identified candidate during a calendar year which, when added to all other expenditures...advocating the election or defeat of such candidate, exceeds \$1,000." This provision was struck down because it limited amounts that may be spent on independent expenditures. Each expenditure must be viewed independently to determine whether or not it was made in consultation with the candidate. If it is, it is in-kind; if it is not, it is independent.

In addition, § 106.1 of ~~FECA~~ regulations requires the attribution of expenditures, made on behalf of more than one candidate, to each. This regulation specifically exempts expenditures for "rent, personnel, overhead, general administration, fundraising, and other day-to-day costs of political committees...unless these expenditures are made on behalf of a clearly identified candidate and the expenditures can be directly attributed to that candidate."

#### Analysis of Expenditures

Complainant lists certain expenditures made by IRTL PAC on page one of his complaint. Each of these expenditures is analyzed below:

02-16-79 \$10.00 in-kind for Quayle, ad for general election  
09-14-79 \$ 5.00 in-kind for Quayle, ad for general election

Each of these expenditures were for an ad in The Communicator which is the newspaper of IRTL, for an ad which appeared before the general election of 1978, not 1980. At that time Quayle was running for Congress in the 4th District of Indiana. The same ad carried an endorsement of other congressional candidates, such as Thornson, running in the 3rd District, and Bosma, running in the 11th District, who both ran in 1978 but not 1980. This was listed as an in-kind contribution since the ad was previously discussed with the Quayle committee.

04-30-80 \$75.04 Independent expenditure, ad for Quayle

This expenditure was for an ad in the April/May, 1980 issue of The Communicator endorsing Quayle for the primary election. A copy is attached as "Exhibit 1". No communication was made with the Quayle campaign regarding this expenditure. The amount was calculated by allocating a portion of the ad's cost to Quayle. Other candidates were attributed an allowable amount.

07-23-80 \$ 250.00 in-kind for Quayle, preparing brochure  
08-01-80 \$ 827.53 in-kind for Quayle, preparing brochure

These expenditures related to the production of a brochure for Quayle. A copy is attached as "Exhibit 2". 150,000 copies of this brochure were produced in cooperation with the Quayle campaign and distributed primarily by IRTL PAC volunteers. Quayle later produced a similar brochure paid for exclusively by the Quayle Committee. This brochure is attached to the complaint.

08-22-80 \$ 180.00 in-kind for Quayle, purchase ad

In the September, 1980 issue of The Communicator, IRTL PAC purchased an ad for \$180.00 endorsing Quayle. Copy is attached as "Exhibit 3". While no contact was made with the Quayle campaign, IRTL PAC listed it as an in-kind contribution since the body of it was taken from the brochure, above Exhibit 1, prepared with the cooperation of the Quayle campaign. This ad was not authorized, however, by the Quayle campaign.

08-26-80 \$ 100.00 direct contribution to Quayle

This is a cash contribution to the Quayle campaign.

10-20-80 \$ 200.00 Independent expenditure for Quayle,  
postage for distribution of The Communicator with PAC ad enclosed  
10-24-80 \$ 462.60 Independent expenditure for Quayle,  
printing of PAC ad in Communicator  
11-03-80 \$ 65.35 Independent expenditure for Quayle,  
design for PAC ad

These expenditures relate to a 4 page ad insert in the October/November 1980 issue of The Communicator. A copy is attached as "Exhibit 4". 300,000 copies of this Communicator were distributed by right to life volunteers. This ad was prepared without consultation or approval of the Quayle campaign. Quayle was apportioned a 1/15 share of the cost of production and printing of this ad.

Priests in Indiana. Enclosed with it was a Quayle brochure, ~~Exhibit 2~~ above. Here, the complainant mistakes this letter with another sent by the Quayle campaign. The Quayle campaign was not consulted regarding this letter.

The letter mailed by the Quayle campaign, which complainant attached to his complaint, was a cooperative effort with the Quayle campaign and the Republican State Committee. The only contribution to it by IRTL PAC was the signature of Mary Pat Marstall, IRTL PAC Chairman, and enclosure of the Quayle brochure, Exhibit 2, which had previously been reported.

06-05-80 \$ 105.00 Indiana Democratic State Central Committee

IRTL PAC purchased tickets for the Indiana Democratic State Central Committee. The IRTL PAC Chairman, Mary Pat Marstall, Treasurer, Michele McRae, and an IRTL PAC volunteer, Ann Minnis, attended. The purpose of attending the dinner was to show support for pro-life Democratic candidates such as Congressmen Adam Benjamin, Floyd Fithian and Dave Evans. None of these three persons participated in any incident regarding Bayh and, indeed, have no knowledge of it.

12-30-80 \$ 391.74 Western American Mailer for computer labels

These labels were purchased by the IRTL PAC to distribute the October/November 1980 issue of The Communicator, Exhibit 4. The total bill for these labels was \$783.47, one-half of which was allocated to the federal account of IRTL PAC. This amount was listed as an administrative expense since most of this issue of The Communicator (4 pages) had no PAC material in it. These pages were, therefore, considered educational material. In addition, 7/16 of the PAC ad explained IRTL PAC without any endorsement. Some portion of this expenditure, however, probably should have been allocated to federal candidates. As a result, attached hereto as "Exhibit 6" is an amended report for November 15, 1980 through December 31, 1980. Quayle's portion is allocated at 1/15 of the entire PAC ad (1/3 of one page of a 4 page ad). As a result, his amount is \$52.23.

Administrative, Consultation and Legal Expense

These funds were spent, according to federal election law, on appropriate administrative expenditures not attributable to any candidate. As a result, according to the FEC regulations, these amounts need not be allocated to any candidate.

As General Counsel for IRTL PAC, I hereby specifically deny that any such communication or consultation took place. Each of these expenditures were for separate projects and each were self contained. Thus, no communication was necessary and none took place.

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

Have our opponents lost the battle on abortion?

A new tactic in the pro-abortion camp is to divert attention from the issue of abortion. A National Abortion Rights Action League (NARAL) pamphlet passed out at the Planned Parenthood fair booth near Evansville says: "You know them as 'Right to Life' People. They oppose abortion. But did you know . . . (then, inside) that they are against contraception? . . . that they actively oppose sex education in the schools?" . . .

In another case Elle Smeal, President of the National Organization for Women (NOW), used her appearance on the Phil Donahue Show to accuse us of being against women who used the IUD. No mention was made of the over one million legal abortions done last year, or the eight million unborn babies whose bodies have been disposed of since the '73 Supreme Court decision.

Obviously our opponents have lost the battle on abortion. Now they try to say to the average citizen, "Don't listen

to those people. They're against everything, even contraception and sex education which would eliminate the 'need' for abortion."

THE TRUTH IS that our organization takes no stand on the issues of contraception and sex education, because we respect the different views of our members in these areas. What we do take a stand on is our respect for life after it has begun.

This confusion comes in because the IUD does not prevent conception, but rather, medical science has determined that it destroys the newly developing baby. How many people are aware of this?

And in the area of sex education, should we allow speakers like those from Planned Parenthood and abortion clinics to promote abortion in our schools. As an organization we are concerned that our young people are being told by these speakers and by some teachers that abortion is legal, safe, and very often the best alternative.

Our opponents make us sound un-American because we are against "free choice." If we outlaw abortion, they say, we are "imposing our morality on others."

THE TRUTH IS that there are many choices we are not free to make;

# 1980—AMERICA AT THE CROSSROADS

## Abortion-on-Demand or Protection of Life

On January 22, 1973 the U.S. Supreme Court legalized abortion-on-demand, nullifying laws in all 50 states.

Acting on two separate cases before them (*Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton*) the Justices ruled 7-2 that as a matter of law the unborn child is not a "person" within the constitutional definition of that term, and that the right to privacy of the mother bars any government, state or federal institution from interfering with her absolute "right" to terminate her pregnancy up to the time of viability (ability to exist outside the womb). The Court arbitrarily decided that viability occurs in the last three months of pregnancy. In practice the Court decision means:

In the first, second and third months of pregnancy there can be no legal restrictions on abortion. The state must leave the abortion decision entirely to a woman and her physician.

In the fourth, fifth and sixth months of pregnancy the state may only enact laws which make the procedure safe for the mother such as requiring that abortions be done in a hospital by a licensed physician.

In the seventh, eighth and ninth months of pregnancy abortion is still allowed if one licensed physician determines it is necessary to preserve the woman's life or health. The Court defines health as "physical, emotional, psychological, familial and the woman's age."

The lawmakers of Indiana reacted quickly to the Supreme Court decision which overturned the restrictive Indiana abortion law. In the same spring, our state legislature passed a joint resolution directing the United States Congress to call a constitutional convention. This resolution requested that a Human Life amendment "to the Constitution of the United States be adopted to protect the right to life" because "the legislature of this state believes it to be for the best interest of the people of the United States." Since that time this same resolution has been passed in 17 states. On March 3, 1980 Idaho, the 17th state brought us half way to a necessary 34 state total.

The Indiana Legislature spoke again in 1973 when re-writing the state law on abortion to conform with the Supreme Court decision.

"It is not the intent of the Indiana General Assembly in enacting this legislation, to acknowledge that there is a Constitutional right to abortion-on-demand or to indicate that it approves of abortion except to save the life of the mother," the Hoosier lawmakers said. "The General Assembly is, however, controlled to a certain extent by recent Supreme Court decisions and this legislation is an attempt to abide by those decisions to the extent necessary."



nact laws which make the procedure safe for the mother such as requiring that abortions be done in a hospital by a licensed physician.

In the seventh, eighth and ninth months of pregnancy abortion is still allowed if one licensed physician determines it is necessary to preserve the woman's life or health. The Court defines health as "physical, emotional, psychological, familial and the woman's age."

The effect of the Supreme Court decision is abortion-on-demand. This means a woman can have an abortion at any time she finds a doctor willing to do it.

Following this decision, the Court bent over backwards again and again to protect the woman's "right to privacy" to the detriment of family solidarity. In the Danforth case the Court ruled:

A father's consent is not necessary for the abortion of his child ("despite the fact that his interest in having a child may be unmatched by any other interest in his life" . . . minority Justices' opinion)

A parent's consent is not necessary for a minor, unwed girl to have an abortion.

And, despite a four-year ban on the use of funds for abortion-on-demand as legislated by the U.S. Congress, the U.S. taxpayer must fund abortions not just to save the life of the mother, but for mental and social well-being. In fact, government-financed abortion-on-demand (Feb. 19, 1980 decision by the Supreme Court to keep in effect a ruling by Judge Dooling's District Court)

### The Common Goal of Pro-Life Groups

#### THE HUMAN LIFE AMENDMENT

Section 1: With respect to the right to life, the word "person" as used in this Article and in the 5th and 14th Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the United States applies to all human beings irrespective of age, health, function or condition of dependency including their unborn offspring at every stage of their biological development.

Section 2: No unborn person shall be deprived of life by any person, provided, however, that nothing in this article shall prohibit a law permitting only those medical procedures required to prevent the death of the mother.

Section 3: The Congress and the several states shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

"It is not the intent of the Indiana General Assembly in enacting this legislation, to acknowledge that there is a Constitutional right to abortion-on-demand or to indicate that it approves of abortion except to save the life of the mother," the Hoosier lawmakers said. "The General Assembly is, however, controlled to a certain extent by recent Supreme Court decisions and this legislation is an attempt to abide by those decisions to the extent necessary."

The U.S. Supreme Court later disagreed with Indiana lawmakers, though, on what restrictions the state could enact regarding the abortion procedure.

Parts of the revised Indiana law were struck down by the Court in 1976 decisions. The sections struck down included a ban on saline or salt-poisoning abortions, requirements for parental consent for girls under 18, and the requirement that the abortion be performed in a hospital or licensed health facility. The Court ruled that these restrictions were an infringement on the woman's right to abortion as guaranteed by their '73 decision.

In 1977, the Indiana lawmakers approved legislation which provides that the girl considering an abortion sign a consent form only after the end of a 24-hour waiting period. Recently, Gov. Bowen signed HB 1414. This prohibits state and local funding of abortion unless it is necessary to preserve the life of a pregnant woman.

In the Indiana Third District Court of Appeals this state is asking that abortion clinics be subject to regulation to the same extent as other outpatient surgical centers. Presently there are "no regulations."

## The Stumbling Block

by Ruth Ann Hanley

This "indication for abortion" is the toughest one. In Indiana one legislator sees rape as the only unequivocally necessary grounds.

"Sure," we say, "what the father has done does not influence the humanity of the child conceived through rape, its uniqueness, its right to life. It's still a child of its mother. How could we condone the taking of an innocent life?"

Like most Right-to-Lifers I was pretty vague about the societal attitudes that cause a victim, pregnant through rape, to abort.

This past month I've set up three interviews with victims who had their children and did not put them up for adoption. Only one made it to the interview. It's not an easy thing to talk about.

### HARD TO OVERCOME

In fact, most rape victims have the hardest time with the "opinions and attitudes of others." According to a survey described in *The Psychological Aspects of Abortion* by Mall and Watts, "there is a self-serving comfort in promulgating belief in the culpability of the victim—it distances and protects us, and masks our own shared vulnerability."

Briefly those attitudes which tend to blame the victim of this violent crime are:

- Anger: nice women don't get raped.
- Concealment: refusal to discuss it, and thus punish the woman.
- Disgust: the woman (like any other property) is tainted or ruined.

### A few more facts:

The victim is usually attacked by someone she knows.

70-90% of rapes occur between persons of the same race.

The frequency of pregnancy from rape is approximately 0.6% (of 2190 victims—Hayman and Lanza study reported in *Psychological Aspects of Abortion*). The reasons given for this infrequency are that in over half the rapes there was a sexual dysfunction on the part of the rapist and an absence of sperm. As to the victim, pregnancy can be hampered by fear, age, sterility, use of contraceptives, previous pregnancy, and the fact that even if a woman is raped on the day she ovulates, there is only a one-in-ten chance of pregnancy.

But it's there. It can happen. You can be that one in 2,000.

### HAPPENED TO HER

Joan was.

Joan is a happy, well-adjusted wife and mother, with three kids, a home in the suburbs and a husband whose job puts him in the \$25,000-30,000 bracket. She's on the old-fashioned side in that she doesn't work outside her home, spends a lot of time volunteering for church and school and mothering her kids.

But eight years ago—before the Supreme Court legalised abortion-on-demand—Joan was in the midst of divorce proceedings, unemployed, and the mother of a little boy. When she

# LAPAC Suit Injurious to Movement

The LAPAC lawsuit against the U.S. Catholic Bishops is injurious to the movement and an insult to those bishops and Catholic members of Right to Life," according to Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee Chair-Mary Pat Marstall. (LAPAC is a national political pro-life group formerly no longer sponsored by National Right to Life. The LAPAC lawsuit alleges that the U.S. Bishops are blocking distribution of LAPAC political materials to the churches.)  
"We wish to publicly disassociate ourselves from this lawsuit," says Mrs. Marstall. "Furthermore, we'd like to reaffirm the U.S. Catholic Bishops' commitment to the restoration of protection to the unborn and their encouragement and support of Right to Life efforts.  
"We've been dismayed in the past by the tactics of LAPAC (Life Amendment Political Action Committee) and have encouraged Hoosier pro-lifers from being involved in their efforts or contributing to their activities. We have our own Political Action Committee in Indiana Right to Life and in National Right to Life and see no reason for Hoosier pro-lifers to be involved in any way with LAPAC."

# IRTL SUPPORTS REAGAN REPUBLICAN PLATFORM

The Republican platform plank which affirms "support of a Constitutional Amendment to restore protection of the right to life for unborn children," and the Republican Presidential nominee, Ronald Reagan, drew strong support from Indiana Right to Life spokesman, Michele McRae.

By contrast the Democratic party's platform plank which seeks to restore Federal abortion funding was disavowed.

"We want to commend the Republican Party and our Hoosier delegates for adopting this platform plank, Mrs. McRae said.

"Justice demands equality of rights under the law, and for seven years and seven million aborted babies the only rights recognized were the rights of mothers to abort their children.

"Indiana Right to Life recognizes that there are two lives involved in the abortion decision. Since 1973, we have given the mother the arbitrary right to destroy her unborn child for the sake of convenience.

"It is a more just society that works toward improving the quality of life for all without resorting to the violence of abortion," Mrs. McRae continued.

"We also commend Gov. Ronald Reagan for his strong statements in defense of the unborn and his support for

a Human Life Amendment to make abortion illegal again. We pledge the resources of our Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee to elect Ronald Reagan in November."

There can be no doubt that the question of abortion, despite the complex nature of its various issues, is ultimately concerned with equality of rights under the

law. While we recognize differing views on this question among Americans in general—and in our own party—we affirm our support of a Constitutional Amendment to restore protection of the right to life for unborn children. We also support the congressional efforts to restrict the use of tax-payer dollars for abortion. We protest the Supreme Court's intrusion into the family structure through its denial of the parents' obligation and right to guide their minor children.

Adopted to a separate section to the platform:


We pledge the appointment of new justices on the Supreme Court who respect traditional family values and the sanctity of all human life.

## DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM

Although the official wording of the Democratic platform is pro-abortion, Mrs. McRae commended the courage of Hoosier delegates who voted for life. The Indiana delegates tallied 29 against the admission of the pro-abortion wording, 26 for, and 15 not voting. Despite our state's efforts, the pro-abortion wording carried in the national count.

The amendment reads:

The Democratic Party recognizes reproductive freedom as a fundamental human right. We therefore oppose government interference in the reproductive decisions of Americans, especially those government programs or legislative restrictions that deny poor Americans their right to privacy by funding or sub-

Dear Father:

Six years ago the priests in Indiana received the attached letter from Senator Birch Bayh. He was running for reelection to the U. S. Senate and this letter on abortion was part of his campaign -- note the "HOCUSIES for Birch Bayh" stationary. In it, Senator Bayh went to great lengths to convey the impression he was opposed to abortion, even including excerpts from a letter from Cardinal Medeiros whom the Senator had previously convinced that he was really opposed to abortion. The Senator concluded his letter to each priest requesting "...that you have faith in the sincerity of my intentions."

Since that letter, Senator Bayh has served another six year term, and we thought it would be appropriate now to review his record on abortion. While continuing to proclaim his "personal" opposition to abortion, Senator Bayh has:

- a. Voted to kill all constitutional amendments on abortion, supporting the continuation of abortion-on-demand throughout pregnancy in America. Eight-million unborn lives taken, 1.4 million this year alone. Senator Bayh also is the key leader of the pro-abortion forces in the Senate.
- b. Voted the pro-abortion position 23 consecutive times on the Senate floor including supporting the tax funding of over one-million abortions.

In recognition of his activities in support of abortion, Senator Bayh was:

- a. Supported in his presidential campaign by Karen Mulhauser, Director of the National Abortion Rights Action League (NARAL) and by abortion advocate Gloria Steinem.
- b. Honored by the National Abortion Rights Action League at a breakfast on Capitol Hill on January 31, 1977.
- c. Invited to speak at the fifth anniversary party of the largest abortion clinic in Pennsylvania held on April 28, 1978. (He accepted.)

Please read Senator Bayh's October 26, 1974, letter and compare it to his record. Consider also as you read his letter that, when Senator Bayh announced on September 12, 1975, that he intended to oppose the constitutional amendments on abortion, he explained his purpose for holding hearings as follows:

\*\*\*\*\* VOTE PRO-LIFE \*\*\*\*\*

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"The reason I have been careful to hold hearings on the questions is to allow Congress, the public and the media a chance to realize the consequences of right-to-life amendments."

Others attributed an additional motivation - a pre-election political tactic to neutralize the abortion issue in the election. Holding this view were Dr. Louise Tyrer, Project Director, Family Planning Division, the American College of Ob/Gyn (4/16/74), Jack Germond of the Washington Star (9/26/75), and Charles Mohr of the New York Times (2/12/76).

We have been extremely disappointed with Senator Bayh's record over the past six years. Moreover, we are shocked that he has come back to Indiana still talking about his "personal" opposition to abortion. Senator Bayh wrote to you six years ago and he may very likely contact you again. Please know that what the Senator "says" about his personal feelings on abortion in Indiana is in direct contrast to the Senator's public actions and his voting record in Washington.

Please call us if we can provide you with any documentation or if you have any questions. In the event that you have not seen the brochure we prepared for public distribution, we enclose it here.

Dear Father:

I know that the question of the proposed Constitutional amendments dealing with abortion are of great interest to you. I would like to bring you up to date on proceedings before the Senate Constitutional Amendments Subcommittee relative to those amendments.

As you know, I decided some time ago that of all the proposed amendments pending before my subcommittee, the most important were those dealing with abortion and that public interest was such that it was imperative that we commence the first step in the amending process—public hearings. To date we have had 11 days of hearings and heard the testimony of over 60 witnesses. Our witnesses have been of different faiths and backgrounds and have included both those who favor and oppose the proposed Constitutional amendments. Several members of the clergy, doctors and lawyers and concerned citizens have appeared. Among our distinguished witnesses were four Cardinal Archbishops of the Church—Cardinal Krol of Philadelphia, Cardinal Cody of Chicago, Cardinal Manning of Los Angeles, and Cardinal Medeiros of Boston.

While I continue to adhere to my personal opposition to abortions our hearings have brought forth many of the complexities involved in this issue. To my knowledge, never has a more complicated question with so many moral, legal, philosophical, scientific and medical ramifications come before a legislative body. The recent testimony we received on October 8, perhaps underscores some of the difficulties we have faced. At that time three distinguished scholars, while differing widely on other aspects of abortion, agreed that the amendments before the subcommittee would not, as presently drafted, accomplish the goal of overturning the decision of the Supreme Court.

Because of the complexities involved in the proposed amendments, I have insisted on thorough and complete hearings. I do not believe that the process of amending the Constitution should be taken lightly, and I speak from experience. Because of the careful work of our subcommittee, three Constitutional amendments have been approved by Congress since I assumed the role as Chairman of the subcommittee.

Of course, this careful and thorough approach has brought considerable criticism from both those who believe we are moving too slowly and those who would prefer to see no action at all. This is to be expected. I would, however, like to call your attention to a few words from a letter I received from Cardinal Medeiros shortly after he testified:

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"I was well aware," he noted, "from the very beginning of the session that you are deeply concerned with protecting unborn human life and have societies concerning the problems attendant upon abortion. I certainly understand the tremendous responsibility which your subcommittee has assumed by your decision to hold public hearings and am sympathetic with the difficult problems in the formation of a Constitutional Amendment. While your questions and those of your colleagues were very probing, I really realize their necessity if you and your colleagues are to obtain the most complete information and knowledge which is so essential and so useful in the drafting of a Constitutional Amendment."

I firmly believe that my responsibility is to insure a complete examination, through the hearing process, of all aspects of the problem. The committee is now engaged in those hearings and will continue with them until we have the necessary information. I will not abandon this responsibility by rushing into precipitous action, although some argue that this would be the politically expedient thing to do. Nor will I bow to the pressure of those who want me to abandon our hearings. All I can do is ask that you have faith in the sincerity of my intentions, while I attempt to deal with this most difficult moral and legislative problem.



This letter is in response to your recent undated letter regarding a complaint filed against the Indiana Right to Life PAC. The complaint was filed by Mr. Robert Blaemire and alleges that the Indiana Right to Life PAC made certain independent expenditures that were not independent of the Quayle for Senate Committee.

We have reviewed this complaint as well as our records and FEC reports and note the following. Contributions to the Quayle for Senate Committee including in-kind contributions have been properly reported by the Committee. All contributions from the Indiana Right to Life PAC of which we are aware have been reported and are within the statutory limits. The Committee, however, has no knowledge or record of any in-kind contribution of \$10 dated 2/16/79, or of \$5 dated 9/14/79, or of \$180 dated 8/22/80, as alleged in the complaint. The in-kind contributions reported by the Committee do include expenses relating to the letter and the brochures appended to the complaint as exhibits.

In regards to the independent expenditures listed in the complaint, we have no records or knowledge as to what these expenditures by the Indiana Right to Life PAC may be. Mr. Blaemire, I note, does not even provide any examples or materials that comprise these independent expenditures. Since we were unaware of these expenditures, it is difficult to understand how they can in any way be inputted as contributions to the Committee. By the same token, since we didn't know of this activity it could hardly have been anything but independent activity.

STATEMENT OF THE CASE

A signed and sworn complaint was filed by the Committee for American Principles ("CAP") on November 2, 1981, against the Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee ("IRL-PAC") alleging violations of 2 U.S.C. §§ 433 and 434 of the Federal Election Campaign Act (the "Act") for purportedly mischaracterizing certain in-kind contributions to the Quayle for Senate Committee (QSC) as independent expenditures. Complainant further alleges that due to the mischaracterization of in-kind contributions, IRL-PAC exceeded their \$5,000 limit on total contributions to QSC in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441a. Although not specifically alleged in the complaint, proof of the violations cited above would also entail violations of Section 441a by QSC for accepting excessive contributions.

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The factual record presented to the Commission by the complainant is a copy of the in-kind contributions and independent expenditures reported by IRL-PAC as well as samples of campaign materials from both the committees. The complainant argues that the early and continued involvement of IRL-PAC in the QSC campaign through in-kind contributions for advertisements and brochures precludes IRL-PAC from characterizing other expenditures as "independent" as defined by the Act in 2 U.S.C. § 431(17) and Commission regulation in 11 C.F.R. § 109.1(a).

## II. Preliminary Discovery Plan

Whether there is reason to believe that respondents committed violations of the act as alleged by complainant, turns, in part, on the workability of CAP's theory that the early involvement of IRL-PAC in QSC's campaign "tainted" certain expenditures characterized by IRL-PAC as independent. However, complainants have also presented the Commission with evidence, in the form of sample brochures and a campaign promotion letter attacking Qualyle's opponent, that supports the argument that consultation and cooperation occurred between IRL-PAC in the production of campaign related materials reported by IRL-PAC as independent expenditures. Therefore, the complaint seems largely self-sufficient at this point and may require little or no further discovery. However, after reviewing the rebuttal of the allegations (if any are provided to the Commission by the respondents), it may be necessary to request answers to interrogatories concerning the issues of consent,

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consultation and cooperation between QSC and IRL-PAC on campaign expenditures. There is also a possibility that the Office of General Counsel would ask for authorization to take depositions of key persons at QSC and IRL-PAC if the written responses to the Counsel's interrogatories are insufficient to base further recommendations upon.

With reference to your inquiry about whether or not Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee, Inc. made contributions to five federal candidates before the October 15, 1980, quarterly report, enclosed herewith is an amendment to our October 10, 1979, quarterly report. During the 19 elections, Indiana Right to Life ran an ad in its newspaper entitled The Communicator which constituted endorsements of ten congressional candidates and several state legislative candidates. The purchase of this ad was listed on our 10 day report preceding the general election on November 7, 1978, on page 5, as a debt to Indiana Right to Life. A copy of this newspaper and ad are attached. At the time this ad was purchased, we considered it an in-kind contribution to the respective congressional candidates since we communicated about the ad with them and obtained their cooperation in the form of a picture of them to use in the ad. In our October 10, 1979, quarterly report, we listed this debt as having been paid by the PAC to Indiana Right to Life.

The attached amendment to the October 10, 1979, quarterly report, therefore, reflects these in-kind contributions. They were not listed on our original report because the expenditures were less than \$200.00.

I believe that this information should satisfy your inquiry on whether or not Indiana Right to Life qualified as a multi-candidate PAC for the 1980 election. If you have any other questions regarding this matter, please let me know.

This letter is prompted by the Commission's preliminary review of your October Quarterly Report. The review raised questions as to specific contributions and/or expenditures, and the reporting of certain information required by the Federal Election Campaign Act. An itemization of these areas follows:

-Schedule B of your report (pertinent portion attached) discloses a contribution which appears to exceed the limits set forth in 2 U.S.C. 441a. The Act precludes an individual or a political committee, other than a multicandidate committee, from making a contribution (including in-kind contributions), to a candidate for Federal office in excess of \$1,000 per election. If you have made an excessive contribution, the Commission recommends that you notify the recipient and request a refund of the amount in excess of \$1,000. (Any refund itemized on Schedule A should be reported on Line 26a of the Detailed Summary Page of your next report.)

If you find the contribution in question was disclosed incompletely or incorrectly, please amend your original report with the clarifying information.

Although the Commission may take further legal steps concerning the excessive contribution, prompt action by you to obtain a refund will be taken into consideration by the Commission. The recipient of the excessive contribution is also being informed of this matter.

An amendment to your original report correcting the above problems should be filed with the Federal Election Commission within fifteen (15) days of the date of this letter. If you need assistance, please feel

With regards to your letter of May 7, 1981, I submit the following information.

After receiving your letter, I promptly called your office and spoke to one of your representatives. I assured him that we were a multi-candidate Political Action Committee. He explained the three criteria which constitutes a multi-candidate PAC. I stated that we fulfilled these criteria. He agreed that we did, but suggested that I state this in a letter to you.

1. We filed our statement of organization on April 11, 1978, and have been active in elections since that time.
2. We have received well in excess of 50 contributions from individuals.
3. We have supported 5 or more Federal candidates beginning with the 1978 elections.

All of this information should be substantiated and in your files. It appears that from the above data that we have fulfilled the criteria for a multi-candidate PAC.

It is somewhat of a puzzle to us that this would not be known, as we have made our reports to the FEC diligently since our inception. It has also been somewhat of an embarrassment to have had this question arise, thereby causing distress to the Quayle campaign in thinking they would have to refund money to our PAC.

If possible, could we please have a written response, with a copy to the Quayle campaign, if you find the matter to be resolved.

On May 7, 1981, you were notified that a review of your October Quarterly Report raised questions as to specific contributions and/or expenditures, and the reporting of certain information required by the Federal Election Campaign Act.

Your May 21, 1981 response is incomplete because you have not provided all the requested information. For this response to be considered adequate, the following information is still required:

-You have indicated that you are a multicandidate committee, however, at the time the contributions were made, your committee was not a multicandidate committee as defined in 2 U.S.C. 441a(a)(4). (Because you had not yet made contributions to five federal candidates.) (Note: The date your committee became a multicandidate committee was September 13, 1980.)

-Schedule B of your report (pertinent portion attached) discloses a contribution which appears to exceed the limits set forth in 2 U.S.C. 441a. The Act precludes an individual or a political committee, other than a multicandidate committee, from making a contribution (including an in-kind contribution) to a candidate for federal office in excess of \$1,000 per election. If you have made an excessive contribution, the Commission recommends that you notify the recipient and request a refund of the amount in excess of \$1,000. (Any refund itemized on Schedule A should be reported on Line 26a of the Detailed Summary Page of your next report.)

If you find the contribution in question was disclosed incompletely or incorrectly, please amend your original report
