Re: "The Guam Tribune"; 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a)

Enclosed herewith for whatever attention the Federal Election Commission considers appropriate under 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a), is a copy of pertinent portions of material that was furnished to us by United States Attorney D. Paul Vernier, Jr., of the District of Guam. This correspondence concerns an alleged violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a) by the owner of "The Guam Tribune", a newspaper of general circulation on Guam, arising out of the alleged donation of \$5,000 in free advertising to the re-election campaign of Guam Delegate Bill Blaz.

We have determined that this matter does not reflect a prosecutable violation of the criminal penalty applicable to the Federal Election Campaign Act (2 U.S.C. § 437g(d)), and for that reason we have closed the matter.

Should the Commission conduct an investigation of this matter which reveals evidence suggesting that knowing and willful violations of the Federal Election Campaign Act took place such as might be prosecutable under the provisions of 2 U.S.C. § 437g(d), we trust that you will refer the matter back to us for further prosecutive evaluation pursuant to 2 U.S.C. § 437g (a)(5)(C).

II. RELEVANT STATUTE: 2 U.S.C. §441a(f)

III. BACKGROUND:

Receipt of Excessive Contributions

The Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz ("the Committee") has during 1990, accepted two (2) excessive contributions totalling \$8,000. These contributions were made by one (1) non-registered political organization.

Schedule A of the Committee's 1990 October Quarterly Report discloses the receipt of two (2) contributions of \$5,000 each from the Commonwealth Republican Party on August 31, 1990 (Attachment 2).^{1/} These contributions were designated for both the Primary and General Elections.

A Request for Additional Information ("RFAI") was sent to the Committee on April 16, 1991 (Attachment 3). The RFAI notes the receipt of the excessive contributions and requests that the Committee refund the amounts in excess of the \$1,000 per election limit. In addition, the RFAI notes the possibility of further Commission action concerning the acceptance of excessive contributions.

^{1/} Registration notices were sent to the non-registered political organization on April 22 and May 30, 1991, however, no response was received.

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On April 29, 1991, the Committee responded by letter (Attachment 4). The letter states that at the time of the contribution the Committee believed that the contributor was a qualified multicandidate committee. In addition, the letter states that the Committee is seeking to determine the contributor's status and requests additional time to respond to the RFAI.

On May 9, 1991, a Second Notice was sent to the Committee for failure to adequately respond (Attachment 5). The Second Notice notes the receipt of the Committee's letter and requests that the Committee provide the requested information.

On May 16, 1991 a representative of the Committee, Paul Borja, phoned a Reports Analysis Division analyst (Attachment 6). Mr. Borja stated that the Committee was trying to determine if the Commonwealth Republican Party was a multicandidate committee. He stated that the Committee intended to respond within the time period noted on the letter and added that the candidate would make a loan to the Committee which would be used to refund the contributions if a refund was necessary.

On May 22, 1991, the analyst returned a phone call from Mr. Borja (Attachment 7). Mr. Borja stated that the Committee was still awaiting word from the contributor about their status. He stated that in order to respond by the deadline in the Second Notice the Committee was going to refund the excessive contributions.

On May 22, 1991, the Committee responded by letter (Attachment 8). The letter states that the Committee intends to refund all but \$2,000 of the amounts noted in the RFAI. A copy of an \$8,000 check dated May 22, 1991 payable to the Commonwealth Republican Party is attached to the letter.

This letter is prompted by the Commission's preliminary review of the report(s) referenced above. The review raised questions concerning certain information contained in the report(s). An itemization follows:

-Schedule A of your report (pertinent portion attached) discloses a contribution(s) which appears to exceed the limits set forth in the Act. An individual or a political committee other than a qualified multi-candidate committee may not make a contribution to a candidate for federal office in excess of \$1,000 per election. The term "contribution" includes any gift, subscription, loan, advance, or deposit of money or anything of value made by any person for the purpose of influencing any election for federal office. (2 U.S.C. §441a(a) and (f); 11 CFR §110.1(b), (e) and (k))

If the contribution(s) in question was incompletely or incorrectly disclosed, you should amend your original report with the clarifying information. If the contribution(s) you received exceeds the limits, you should either refund to the donor the amount in excess of \$1,000 or get the donor to redesignate the contribution in writing. All refunds and redesignations must be made within sixty days of the treasurer's receipt of the contribution. Copies of refund checks and copies of letters redesignating the contributions in question may be used to respond to this letter. Refunds are reported on Line 20 of the Detailed Summary Page and on Schedule B of the report covering the period in which they are made. Redesignations are reported as memo entries on Schedule A of the report covering the period in which the authorization for the redesignation is received. (11 CFR §104.8(d)(2), (3) and (4))


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Although the Commission may take further legal steps, prompt action by you to refund or seek redesignation of the excessive amount will be taken into consideration.

-When a committee reports receiving a loan from the candidate, it is necessary to clarify whether or not the candidate used his/her personal funds or borrowed the money from a lending institution or any other source. If the candidate borrowed funds from a lending institution, or any other source, please provide the name of the lending institution and the complete terms of the loan. If the loan(s) was from personal funds, please acknowledge that fact in an amendment to this report. It is important to note that "personal funds" is strictly defined by Commission Regulations and may be found in 11 CFR §110.10. (11 CFR §§100.7(a)(1) and 104.3(d))

A written response or an amendment to your original report(s) correcting the above problem(s) should be filed with the Clerk of the House of Representatives, 1036 Longworth House Office Building, Washington, DC 20515 within fifteen (15) days of the date of this letter. If you need assistance, please feel free to contact me on our toll-free number, (800) 424-9530. My local number is (202) 376-2480.

Dear Mr. Zehe:

I am writing in response to your letter of April 16, 1991, regarding our October Quarterly Report for the period from August 13, 1990, through September 30, 1990. I am writing in my capacity as Treasurer, and all future correspondence should be directed to my attention at the above address.

With respect to the first issues raised in your letter, it was our understanding at the time of receipt of the contributions in question that the contributor was a multi-candidate committee within the meaning of 12 C.F.R. Section 100.5(e)(3) (1990). Accordingly, we accepted in good faith such contributions in an amount which may be made by a multi-candidate committee but which would be excessive if made by an individual. We are endeavoring to confirm our understanding of the contributor's status for federal election purposes and request additional time to respond to this matter because of the geographical remoteness of the contributor and the related difficulties in communication.

With respect to the second issue raised in your letter, the candidate's source of funds for his loan to the campaign was from his personal funds and was not from a lending institution or from any other source. Per your request, an amended report for the period will be filed reflecting this fact on Schedule C.

Please contact me regarding the above if you any questions. We expect to be able to resolve the first issue within 30 days.

I. GENERATION OF MATTER

The Office of the General Counsel received a referral from Craig C. Donsanto, Director of the U.S. Department of Justice Election Crimes Branch, Public Integrity Section, Criminal Division, containing materials furnished that department by United States Attorney D. Paul Vernier, Jr., of the District of Guam. These materials relate to alleged violations of 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a) by the Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz and Edward Pangelinan, as treasurer, as well as The Guam Tribune, a newspaper of general circulation on Guam, arising out of the alleged donation of \$5,000 in free advertising to the

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re-election campaign of Guam Representative Bill Blaz.

Shortly after the Justice Department referral was received by the Office of the General Counsel, the Reports Analysis Division ("RAD") referred the Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz ("the Committee")

The basis for that referral was the alleged acceptance of two excessive contributions during 1990 from a unregistered political organization. Attachment I.

II. FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

A. The Law

Pursuant to 2 U.S.C. §§ 441a(a)(1)(A) and (2)(A) of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act"), contributions to a federal candidate or his authorized political committee are limited to an aggregate of \$1,000 for individuals, and \$5,000 for multicandidate committees with respect to any election for Federal office.² The Act prohibits candidates and their committees from knowingly accepting any contributions in excess of the Act's limitations. 2 U.S.C. § 441a(f). Commission regulations require each committee treasurer to examine all contributions to determine whether they exceed the limitations of the Act, and to refund, redesignate or reattribute excessive contributions within sixty days. 11 C.F.R. § 103.3(b)(3). In addition, the Commission's

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regulations further provide that any contribution which appears to be excessive on its face, and which is deposited into a campaign depository shall not be used for any disbursements by the committee until the contribution has been determined to be legal. 11 C.F.R. § 103.3(b)(4).

It is also unlawful for any federal candidate or political committee to knowingly accept or receive any contribution from a corporation. 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a). Corporations are prohibited from making a contribution or expenditure, defined to include "anything of value," in connection with federal elections and it is unlawful for any officer or director to consent to such contributions or expenditures. 2 U.S.C. §§ 441b(a) & (b)(2). Commission regulations further explain that "anything of value" includes all in-kind contributions, including the provision of any goods or services without charge or at a charge which is less than the usual and normal charge for such goods or services. 11 C.F.R. § 100.7(a)(1)(iii)(A). Finally, for each reporting period a political committee must disclose in its financial reports the amount, the date given and the identities of all contributors whose aggregate monetary or in-kind contributions exceed \$200 within the calendar year.

2 U.S.C. § 434(b)(3).

B. The Facts

1. The Guam Tribune Transaction

According to the Justice Department referral, a former employee of the Guam Tribune, Mr. Douglas Cyfers, alleges that \$5,000 in free advertising was provided to Congressman Ben Blaz

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during his 1990 election campaign. According to Mr. Cyfers, Representative Blaz contacted Mark Pangelinan, the owner of the Guam Tribune, in September, 1990, to request the Tribune's support. Thereafter, Representative Blaz's son, Thomas Blaz, met with Mark Pangelinan and obtained a note from Pangelinan directing Douglas Cyfers, former Editor of the Guam Tribune, to extend \$5,000 in advertising credit to the Committee. Upon delivery of that note to Mr. Cyfers, Thomas Blaz allegedly stated "no one should know about this." See Attachment II, pg. 3. When Mr. Cyfers inquired about the possible inequity of granting credit to only one candidate, Mark Pangelinan instructed Mr. Cyfers to send the advertising bill to Pangelinan, himself, and "write-off" the bill. Cyfers alleges that he refused to "write-off" the debt and subsequently left the Guam Tribune. However, the Assistant Comptroller for the Guam Tribune, Nonoy, wrote a note dated January 17, 1991, stating, "\$5,000 ad credited to 'In-House' sales and charged to advertising expense." Attachment II, pg. 7 & 8. The referral contains a photocopy of Nonoy's note and a bill addressed to the Committee.³

In light of the discussion above, the Office of the General Counsel recommends that a MUR be opened in this matter and that the Commission find reason to believe that The Guam Tribune and Mark Pangelinan, as publisher, as well as the Friends of

Congressman Ben Blaz and Edward Pangelinan, as treasurer, violated 2 U.S.C. 441b(a).⁴ It is also recommended that the Commission find reason to believe that the Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz and Edward Pangelinan, as treasurer, violated 2 U.S.C. § 434(b)(3), for failure to report this in-kind contribution.

2. RAD Referral Excessives

Schedule A of the Committee's 1990 October Quarterly Report discloses the receipt of two (2) contributions of \$5,000 each from the Commonwealth Republican Party ("CRP") on August 31, 1990. After receiving two Requests for Additional Information ("RAFI") from the Commission, the former treasurer of Blaz's Committee, Paul D. Borja, contacted RAD and stated that the Committee was trying to determine if the CRP was a multicandidate committee. In fact, CRP is not a multicandidate political committee. Thus, the Committee accepted \$8,000 in excess of the applicable Section 441a limit. Although the Committee refunded \$8,000 to the CRP on May 22, 1991, that was not within the time period prescribed at 11 C.F.R. 103.3(b)(3). Thus, the Office of the General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe that the Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz and Edward Pangelinan, as treasurer, violated 2 U.S.C. § 441a(f).

4. At this time the Office of the General Counsel makes no recommendation as to whether any of the apparent Section 441b violations were committed knowingly and wilfully pending the discovery of the actual circumstances of the transaction.

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III. MERGER

In light of the foregoing, the Office of the General Counsel recommends that the Commission open a MUR concerning both Pre-MUR 244 and RAD Referral 91L-71. Given that both matters arose during the same election cycle and involve the Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz Committee and Edward Pangelinan, as treasurer, this Office further recommends that the Commission merge these two matters.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Merge Pre-MUR 244 with RAD Referral 91L-71.
2. Open a MUR.
3. Find reason to believe that the Guam Tribune and Mark Pangelinan, as publisher, violated 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a).
4. Find reason to believe that the Friends of Congressman Ben Blaz and Edward Pangelinan, as treasurer, violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 434(b)(3), 441a(f) & 441b(a).
5. Approve the appropriate letters and attached Factual and Legal Analyses.





Please take notice that the Guam Tribune and Mr. Pangelinan, as Publisher, are interested in pursuing pre-probable cause conciliation. Mr. Pangelinan is currently off-island and has been off-island since November 12, 1991. He is expected to return on December 6, 1991. In light of the allegations, consultation with Mr. Pangelinan himself is necessary to respond. We therefore request twenty days extension to submit answers to the interrogatories and to forward any additional documentation relevant to the matter. Your favorable consideration of this request is greatly appreciated and will probably most efficiently facilitate this investigation.

We are in receipt of the November 4, 1991 letter ("Letter") from the Federal Election Commission ("FEC") advising us that this committee and its treasurer are the subject of a Matter Under Review ("MUR") and allowing us 15 days from the date of the Letter to submit information to the FEC. Our opportunity to review the Letter was delayed because of significant overseas travel during the month of November, thus delaying this response. As we have had no opportunity to provide a prior response, we respectfully request that you consider this response together with the materials currently being considered by the FEC. Due to the short time frame within which we have prepared this letter, we also respectfully request permission to supplement this brief letter with additional comments.

As to the Guam Tribune described within the Legal and Factual Analysis attachment to the Letter, we disagree with Mr. Douglas Cyfers' allegation that such transaction constituted either a prohibited corporate contribution or an unreported in-kind contribution. Such transaction resulted in a debt which was incurred by the committee and paid as such, as reported in the report filed on July 31, 1991 for the semi-annual period ended June 30, 1991 (copy attached). We are unaware of the basis of Mr. Cyfers' allegations or the nature of internal accounting for this transaction at the Guam Tribune. It is also unclear to us whether Mr. Cyfers' departure from the Guam Tribune was on good terms or whether it precipitated his allegations. It is clear, however, even from Mr. Cyfers' story, that the committee and its treasurer were not involved in the manner in which the Guam Tribune or Mr. Cyfers chose to characterize or account for this transaction. The committee and its treasurer did not, at any time, seek to obtain any contribution from the Guam Tribune or any in-kind contribution in advertising from its publisher. Rather, the committee and treasurer sought and obtained advertising services and ensured that the bill for such advertising services received from the Guam Tribune was paid in full upon receipt.

As to the excessive contributions transaction, it was presumed by the committee at the time that any state-level political party committee would be sufficiently diverse and sophisticated to have long qualified as a multi-candidate party committee. The committee has received numerous contributions from political organizations and does not have a history of seeking or accepting contributions from entities which fail to qualify as donors. Although the committee did not refund the excess contributions within sixty days of receipt, it did fully refund such amounts within the time frame set forth by the FEC in its letter advising the committee that such contributions may have been excessive. As noted in the Legal and Factual Analysis, the committee refunded such contributions even before it had determined whether such contributions were excessive. This was done to avoid even the appearance of impropriety and to demonstrate to the FEC its good faith intent to comply with the law. We urge the FEC to consider the committee's willingness to satisfy FEC concerns and its promptness in doing so.

With respect to concerns alluded to in the Legal and Factual Analysis as to the timely response of the committee to FEC requests, we have undertaken steps to ensure that FEC correspondence is quickly retrieved from incoming mail and given prompt attention. Principally, we have determined to change the mailing address of the committee and enclose herewith for your information a copy of the appropriate form as filed with the Clerk of the House of Representatives indicating a change of address.

We request the opportunity to meet with you in an informal conference to further discuss these matters. If you have any questions, please contact the undersigned.

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Plaset Apotguan to open in February

QUAM- Guam residents will have another public area to enjoy Guam's beautiful sunset when the \$1.2 million Plaset Apotguan Public Park in East Agaña is completed in February. J. Conall Tansman, president of Pacific Rim Real Development, Inc., said.

Tansman, one of the partners for Alagang Beach Club Associates, said that in exchange for the construction of the park, Gov-Guam gave them a 2,000 square meter property.

Another government-donated property, which is adjacent to the park, will be the site of a 12-story, 138-unit condominium and also

will be ready by February, he said. Tansman said the park will include spacious seating areas, a barbecue area, a restaurant and a ramp for the physically handicapped.

The other partners of ABC Associates, the development company putting up the park are: Henry M. Simpson Jr., president of Island Imports Inc.; Clifford A. Guzman, president and chief executive officer of the International Design Consortium; Euclia Kawato, president of Taka Enterprises U.S.A. Inc. and Y. Kishimoto, president of Corporate Directions, Inc. During the park's groundbreaking ceremony Friday afternoon

Simpson said that a statue will be constructed on the park commemorating the role of the Chamorro women in the preservation of Guam's culture and heritage.

Gov. Joseph F. Ada who led the panel of speakers during the groundbreaking ceremony, lauded ABC Associates as an example for other developers to follow.

Ada said the company is returning to Guam part of what it has received.

"The people of Guam can enjoy once more the pristine beauty of the ocean and particularly its beautiful sunset as they relax in the park," he said.

Kawato, managing general part-

ner of ABC Associates referred to the project as "a gift of beauty to the people of Guam."

In his opening remarks, Simpson assured everyone that the park will provide a safe and beautiful access to Agaña Bay for fishermen, windsurfers, jet skiers and the general public.

Simpson repeated Ada's reference to the spectacular view of the sunset from the boardwalk and gazebos in the park.

"This park represents a dream I have always maintained of one day tearing down these old buildings and opening the view along Marine Drive.

"This dream has finally become

a reality through the planning, coordination and cooperation of many including the legislature, the governor's office, the various governmental agencies and a lot of designers, planners and contractors.

"This park is our effort to set the pace of how development could and should be directed in the future. The community must benefit in a tangible fashion through proper planning and foresight," he said.

Simpson stressed that the park is the result of a joint venture eyed at the future of Guam.

"The company will do its part to make our island a more beautiful and exciting place to live in or visit," he said.

Another speaker, Sen. Elizabeth P. Arriola, chairwoman of the Committee on Youth, Human Resources, Senior Citizens, and Cultural Affairs, said she hoped that other developers like ABC Associates will share in "the enthusiasm for our island's beauty and commit themselves to projects such as this one."

Arriola said, "The project will enhance the beauty of our island and show the rest of the world that Guam, where America's day began, is not only a highly developed and advanced island but also one that believes in creating areas for people, both visitors and residents."

In an interview before her speech, Arriola said that the bill she authored safeguarding people who go to the park is now a law and will soon be enforced.

By virtue of the law, she said, a park patrol police will be created to protect people in the park from burglary and other crimes such as vandalism now rampant in these public places.

Speaker Jon T. San Agustin said that the park will be a lasting monument for those who were killed in the area during World War II.

Sen. Edward D. Royce, chairman of the Committee on Economic Development, said that businessmen should realize the importance of social responsibility as the ABC Associates did or their businesses cannot hope to succeed.

He also said that the company's investment in the project only proves that ABC Associates believes in the economic prosperity of the island and its bright future.

The chairman's program was held under a rainbow which was captured at 4:30 p.m. at the corner of the park site. Inside, guests inspected a miniature reproduction of the park.

It was hot earlier during the program but when Ada took his shovel into the ground of beach sand, it started raining - a sign which /local/ interpreted as symbols of heaven's blessing of the project.

BI-PARTISANSHIP

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U.N. functions as world peace-maker

Editor's note: Last in a two-part series. The following article recognizes the United Nations on its 45th birthday. All material on the U.N. was provided by Strategic Air Command News Service by SSGT. WENDY E. FRABLE.

Member states may send five representatives to the United Nations, but each state has only one vote. Most ordinary matters are decided by a simple majority vote, while important matters require a majority two-thirds vote.

The General Assembly meets once a year from Sept. to Dec., but it can also meet at other times if necessary.

The actual power of the U.N. is shared between the Security Council and the General Assembly.

While the G.A. only passes resolutions, enforcement action must come from the S.C.

The 15-member S.C. is responsible for the maintenance of peace, and security in the world. China, France, Soviet Union, United Kingdom and the U.S. are all permanent members of the S.C.

The other 10 non-permanent members are elected by the G.A. for two year terms.

Procedural decisions by the S.C. require nine votes, all other decisions require agreement by all permanent members. If a permanent member chooses to abstain or vote against a decision, the resolution is vetoed.

The five-member Trusteeship Council was established to ensure that governments responsible for the administration of Trust Territories take adequate steps to prepare these territories for self-government or independence.

Conditions such as housing, education, political and economic problems, and measures which the Administering Authority takes to help the territory become self-governing are discussed by the Trusteeship Council.

Over the years, the activities of the TC have diminished, with only one of the original 11 trusteeships remaining, the Pacific Islands administered by the U.S.

All other Trust Territories

achieved self-government or independence, either as separate States or by joining neighboring independent countries.

Coordination of the economic and social work of the UN is accomplished by the Economic and Social Council under the authority of the General Assembly. The 54 members of the ESC are elected by the General Assembly for a three year term. Each member has one vote, and decisions are made by a simple majority of those present voting.

The Council recommends and directs activities aimed at encouraging economic growth of developing countries; promoting the observance of human rights; est-

ing discrimination; and fostering world cooperation in areas such as better housing, family planning and crime prevention.

The principal judicial organ of the UN, the International Court of Justice, is located in The Hague. The Court is composed of 15 independent judges of different nationalities, elected for nine years by the Security Council and the General Assembly.

The Court has two main functions, to give binding judgments on disputes brought to it by states, and to give advisory opinions on legal questions brought to it by the G.A., the SC or other organizations of the UN.

Cases are submitted to the Court in two ways: either by a special agreement under which both parties to the dispute agree to submit the matter to the Court, or by an application of one country. Only countries, not private individuals, may be parties in cases before the Court.

Countries can't be forced to take part in proceedings, unless required by special treaty provisions. However, if a country consents to become party in a case, it's obligated to comply with the Court's decisions.

Countries which have signed the Court's Statute may also make declarations agreeing in advance to accept the Court's authority. About 60 countries have made such declarations of compulsory jurisdiction. Such countries' consent is only the International Court for deciding their cases; they may also go to other courts to settle their disputes.

A judgment of the Court is final and binding, and there can be no appeal. If a country refuses to comply with the Court's judgment, the other country in the case may take the case before the Security Council to demand measures to enforce the judgment.

The Secretariat carries out the day-to-day work of the UN. The Secretariat is made up of the Secretary-General and the International staff of over 20,000. Staff members are drawn from over 150 countries. As international civil servants, they work for the UN as a whole, and take an oath not to seek or receive instructions from any government or outside authority.

The Secretariat arranges for military observers when there is a peace-keeping problem; economic advisers and technical experts when needed; and prepares studies and reports to help countries help themselves.

Secretariat members are interpreters, secretaries, librarians, economists, lawyers, engineers, officers, welders, and many other experts who help the Secretary General prepare reports.

Eighteen other specialized agencies, established by inter-governmental agreement, have wide international responsibilities in the economic, social, cultural, educational, health, and related fields. The agencies, which make up the UN system were all independently established, and all have their own staffs and budgets.



**Doctor says Pan Am victims
might have survived if treated**

DUMFRIES, Scotland (UPI) - Two passengers on a Pan Am jet that was destroyed by a terrorist bomb may have survived their 6-mile fall to earth if they had received immediate medical treatment, a doctor said at an inquiry Wednesday.

Dr. Anthony Bessell, head of the pathology team that did postmortem examinations on the 270 people who died in the disaster 21 months ago, said the two passengers would have been unconscious during the short time they lived after the blast.

"The chances are that even if they survived they would have been deeply unconscious after sustaining their injuries," Bessell said.

"There is a possibility, and in-

deed if resuscitation was available immediately with access to medical facilities, there could have been survival."

The names of the two passengers were withheld by the request of relatives.

Bessell, who holds the chairmanship of forensic medicine at Edinburgh University, also said some of the 243 passengers on the jumbo could have been conscious for at least part of their freefall.

Another member of the pathology team gave a chilling description of what it would have been like for those passengers who were conscious while falling.

Oxygen would have been low within five seconds of the explosion, he said.

"I think everything will go dark

from combustion. Everything will be blown about. There will be noise, confusion, darkness, perhaps rather like a nightmare ... a word sensation."

The temperature would have been about minus 58.

Bessell said 201 of the passengers were instantly killed by multiple injuries. Another 19 were less severely injured but would also have died outright or very quickly.

In a third category were the two whose injuries were less severe and who could have lived for a short time.

Asked by the Scottish lord advocate, Lord Fraser of Carmichael, if they would have been conscious, Bessell said, "It is a possibility but I cannot put it in a definite category."

He said that all three members of the flight-deck crew and 13 members of the cabin crew had sustained unsurvivable injuries.

Those aboard would have fallen to the ground at about 120 miles an hour - faster if attached to a heavy piece of the plane and slower if attached to a part that fluttered like a leaf, Bessell said.

A fall of 31,000 feet would take 2 1/2 minutes, he said.

The inquiry is considering the circumstances of the Dec. 21, 1988, bombing and is not seeking blame. It examined the crime, failure of the aircraft and alternative air routes that would have been available.

Anybody involved in the crash was charged with manslaughter.

**Marine who refused
Saudi Arabia flight
will face court-martial**

KANEOHE MARINE CORPS AIR STATION, Hawaii (UPI) - A Marine who refused to board a plane for Saudi Arabia faces a court-martial even though a military official said Wednesday that significant issues have clouded the legality of the orders he is accused of having disobeyed.

Major James Axelrod recommended a military trial after presiding over an investigative hearing last month for Cpl. Jeff Paterson, who is seeking conscientious objector status rather than fight for "imperialistic economic interests."

Paterson, 22, assigned to F Battery, 1st Battalion, 12th Marine Brigade at Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station, refused to board a plane at Hickam Air Force Base as his unit was deployed in Saudi Arabia Aug. 29. When his request tried to

push him aboard, he sat down in the lounge.

He spent three weeks in the brig before a federal judge ordered his release and is now confined to the base in Kaneohe.

Marine spokesman Capt. Leonard Ryan said the court-martial has not been scheduled but could start as early as Monday. Paterson's attorney Eric Seitz, said he will seek a delay because he is handling an upcoming murder trial.

Paterson faces trial on one count of insubordination, two counts of disobeying a lawful command, and two of unauthorized absence.

If convicted of all charges, he would face up to five years and one month in prison, reduction to private, forfeiture of all pay and benefits, and a dishonorable discharge, Ryan said.

Seitz, however, predicted that military authorities would lose the court-martial and Paterson would be discharged either by them or by a federal court - and he said the case will prove "embarrassing" to the Marine Corps.

"The orders they gave to him were illegal," Seitz said. "They were not supposed to assign him to duties that might conflict with his conscientious objections and they weren't supposed to send him anywhere he couldn't talk to his lawyer and complete his conscientious objector application."

Seitz also said authorities used "subjectively" because "they hated what he was saying and what he stood for, and they weren't handling the situation with any realistic sense of fairness."

Another challenge to the court-martial is that "insubordination" means the "significant issues" must be resolved (being told, since some evidence raises the question of the legality of the orders Paterson was given.

One of the issues is whether reasonable officers were made to assign Paterson to duties that conflicted as little as possible with his beliefs.

The Marine was to be assigned as a supply clerk in his military unit, but Axelrod said that would have "immediately" required him to support the "oil" policies in Saudi Arabia, promote or handle.

**Marines call up

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Marine Corps called up its first reserves to active duty Wednesday for Operation Desert Shield, including those in all the divisions of Marines in Hawaii who were sent to Saudi Arabia.

The Army, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard have called up more than 27,000 reserves to support Desert Shield to help support military operations in Saudi Arabia and the Persian Gulf region. But the Marines had not called up any reserves until Wednesday.

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Bush shrugs off pressures of twin crises

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Facing uncertainties that will test and define his presidency, George Bush shrugged off the political pressures of the threat of war in the Persian Gulf and a deficit-induced economic recession.

"Look, nobody said it would be easy," Bush said at a news conference Wednesday. Asked whether his presidency is "on the line," he noted that "every once in a while the going gets a little tough," but "I don't feel embattled at all."

Fielding questions from reporters for out-of-town news organizations, Bush spoke with guards of the broad support for his policy in the Gulf and with passion of the need for a \$300 billion deficit-reduction plan before Congress.

His comments also revealed a certain "I told you so" attitude toward critics and skeptics who have questioned the decisions left in the wake of his passage from honeymoon to hot seat in the 30

months he has been in office. "I try not to sound egotistical, but we've been right on German unification," he said as Germans rejoiced in the end of their postwar division. "And yet, I remember many people saying, 'It's impossible, the Soviets aren't going to

push a unified Germany to be in NATO, it isn't going to happen, you can't have a unified Germany before you have two peace treaties with Poland.'"

In fact, Bush did not respond with emotional fervor last year at the early events that as a matter of weeks snowballed into the unification juggernaut. On Wednesday, however, the re-emergence of a single, strong Germany was trumpeted as a dramatic vindication of his repeated talk over the last year of a "Europe whole and free."

For a politician previously accused of lacking vision, a stretched of special significance, but Bush, riding high in the polls, seemed flustered in political terms, saying, "The American people are entitled to something a little bit more bread-and-butter than that."

"I guess it's about as complicated a period as we've had since I've been president," he said, but "I'm not looking at it in terms of reelection."

Bush viewed as a companion to Jimmy Carter, who was voted out of office after being dogged by energy and hostage crises of his own, and indicated he would not allow his current problems to exact a heavy toll, at least for now.

"We've got two big things coming together now," he said. "One is the deficit and one is the crisis halfway around the world. But I'm telling you honestly I don't look at it in terms of whether it's good for a Bush presidency or popular popularity."

In the confrontation with Iraq, Bush at times has exercised decisiveness with aplomb. Clearly more comfortable with foreign policy than domestic affairs, he has seemed invigorated by the challenge, as evidenced by the scores of telephone calls and messages he has held with U.S. friends and allies since the onset of the crisis two months ago.

Bush has been less aggressive in the budget debate. Though he has

spoken frequently in recent days of the need for assertive leadership, whatever the political costs, it will not until early summer that Bush and Congress begin negotiating a fiscal fix to the deficit mess, their efforts prolonged by inaction on both sides, even perhaps most vividly in Bush's down-to-the-wire clinging to his call for a lower tax on capital gains.

Bush is counting on military stimulation and economic deprivation to force a retreat by Saddam Hussein and congressional approval of an "emergency" budget compromise to reassure the financial markets and restore confidence in the economy.

Both are gambles that will determine the difference between war and peace, recession and prosperity. Try as he may to brush them aside as simply "difficult issues" intrinsic to a tough job, Bush will not be able to ignore the political consequences of success or failure.

Left-handedness may start in the womb

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A study of thumb sucking among fetuses shows the tendency to be left-handed may start in the womb, researchers reported.

About 10 percent of the adult population is left-handed, and scientists have long debated whether this preference stems from genetic factors or is developed by some kind of brain abnormality during birth. Now, left-handedness and Wednesday they have found evidence either fetuses display preferences for sucking their left thumbs as early as 15 weeks after conception.

Using ultrasound to examine the fetuses of 224 women who had normal pregnancies, the researchers found 12 of the 224 fetuses - or about 5.4 percent - favored their left thumb. The position of the fetus in the womb had no effect on thumb preference. Follow-up observations of 17

fetuses indicated "preference for a particular thumb is maintained during pregnancy," the researchers said.

In a letter published in the British journal *Nature*, Peter Hager and his colleagues from Queen's University of Belfast said their study "demonstrates for the first time the existence of behavioral organization before birth."

Furthermore, the work shows, "preference didn't develop after birth, but was a result of early and 'hardwired' genetic organization of handedness," the researchers said.

Dr. Stanley Coren, a University of British Columbia psychologist who has studied left-handedness for 20 years, called the findings "a cute, little study" that provides the first direct evidence supporting the handedness preference in the womb. However, he said he doubts the conclusions drawn by Hager's team are too broad.

Death risk called higher for unmarried middle-aged

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - Unmarried middle-aged men and women face twice the risk of dying within 10 years as those still living with their spouses, a study showed Thursday.

The study of 7,853 people in California and Pennsylvania found 23 percent of the men (between 45 and 54) who lived alone or with someone other than a spouse died within a decade, (only 11 percent of married men died) during that period.

Of the unmarried women in the study, 27 percent died.

Only 4 percent of married women died. The higher death rate seemed connected to low income, with poorer women at greater risk.

The gap between the married and unmarried groups slightly narrowed as the individuals grew older, the study said.

Researchers had been previously concerned about the health of unmarried middle-aged men and women who live with someone other than a spouse or equally disadvantaged for survival," said Michael J. Davis, an associate professor of epidemiology and biostatistics who led the study. "The central factor seems to be the presence of a spouse."

Because of the high divorce rate in the United States and the trend for older adults to live alone if

widowed, there should be "general concern about the social isolation, health and well-being of older adults living alone," she said.

The study, which is consistent with previous research, also found the percentage of people living with someone increased with age and was higher for women than men. About 60 percent of people 65 years and older were living with someone, compared to 49 percent of the men.

Also in that age group men were healthier than in any other. For instance, 32 percent of the women studied lived alone. "This is the group for which there is general concern," Davis said.

Man found fit for trial in dismemberment case

NEW YORK (UPI) - A Lower East Side man accused of murdering his wife by dismembering her body parts was found mentally fit to stand trial Wednesday.

Judge Robert M. Goldstein said the prosecution's expert testimony by Dr. Daniel Rubowitz, "clearly revealed discrepancies between the two examinations of the defendant's mind."

The lawyer, Philip Hoffmann, argued that the defendant was "mentally responsible for the crime" of murder.

The 35-year-old defendant, employee of a restaurant, was found guilty of the murder of his 29-year-old wife in 1989.

During the summer, Rubowitz insisted on satisfying over Hoffmann's objections. He was uneasy about his feelings for his own case and his desire to be tried by a jury of his peers - married men.

As a result of these hearings, the judge ruled Wednesday that Rubowitz is mentally fit to stand trial.

The judge ordered Hoffmann with Manhattan attorney Christine Condi, also known for his defense of Robert Williams Jr., 22, sentenced to 30 years of killing a man, struck a deal with a judge with a 10-year bid.

Rubowitz, who had been in a psychiatric hospital for several months, is charged with second-degree murder in the death of Michael Deeds, 26, a resident of the Lower East Side.

Police said he made 30 attempts to kill his wife, dismembering and hiding her body parts and

Guam bills affect global events

GUAM - For the second time in as many months, global events are underway that reflect the intent of resolutions adopted by the Asian-Pacific Parliamentarians' Union, resolutions introduced by Guam, according to a press release from Senator Gordon Mallouk.

Mallouk said that a resolution introduced at the last APPU General Assembly in Seoul, Korea, urging the Soviet Union to withdraw from the Kuril Islands claimed by Japan, seems to have come to fruition with the recent announcement by the Soviet government that it may return the islands.

The Kuril Islands dispute has prevented both Japan and the Soviet Union from formalizing relations since the Soviets seized the islands after the second world war.

Mallouk, who is Guam's deputy secretary general to the APPU, said, "I am constantly amazed at the amount of influence our little island has in the APPU. And I am continually amazed at the impact the APPU seems to have on international affairs. This is the second time in recent days when a Guam-sponsored APPU resolution seems to have dramatically influenced world events."

The matter was making reference to early August when the global community united against aggressive action of Iraq in its invasion of neighboring Kuwait. It just so happens Mallouk introduced an APPU resolution in Seoul calling for united Super-power resolution against aggression by any third-world nation. Political resolution specifically addresses nuclear aggression, but world events in the Persian Gulf are a direct reflection of the resolution's tone and concept, the release said.

The APPU is an international brotherhood of Pacific island lawmakers, a mini-United Nations consisting of Pacific Rim nations and territories including Japan, Taiwan, China, Thailand, Philippines, Guam, CNMI, FSM, Vanuatu, Tonga and a host of other island nations, according to Mallouk.

The association's next meeting is scheduled for December in Palau, FSM, Mallouk said.



Youth and adult affairs discussed


