GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT

BACKGROUND

On May 15, 1978, the Reports Analysis Division referred the Nat West for Congress Committee and the La Gente Committee to the Office of General Counsel for their failure to file the ten day pre-primary report required by 2 U.S.C. §434(a)(1)(A)(i).

The Commission found reason to believe on April 28, 1978, and reasonable cause to believe on May 1, 1978, that the Nat West for Congress Committee and the La Gente Committee were in violation of 2 U.S.C. §434(a)(1)(A)(i). Both committee's names appeared as non-filers in the Commission's publication of May 3, 1978.

EVIDENCE

The Nat West for Congress Committee and the La Gente Committee are required by 2 U.S.C. §434(a)(1)(A)(i) to file a ten day pre-primary report. The Texas primary election was held on May 6, 1978.

On May 6, 1978, the Nat West for Congress Committee filed its ten day pre-primary report. The April 10th and ten day

pre-primary reports filed by the Nat West Committee reveal financial activity of \$2,190 in receipts and \$2,186 in expenditures.

The April 10th report filed by the La Gente Committee reveals financial activity of \$2,070 in receipts and \$2,000 in expenditures. The candidate, Luis A. Diaz De Leon, represents the Raza Unida Party, a minority party. Repeated attempts have been made to reach the La Gente Committee by telephone but neither Information in Austin, Texas, nor the Secretary of State's office has a listing for the candidate or his committee.

RECOMMENDATION

1. In view of the fact that the Nat West for Congress Committee's aggregate receipts plus expenditures totalled under \$25,000, and that the Committee did file the report, we recommend the Commission take no further action against the Nat West for Congress Committee and close the file.

2. In view of the fact that the La Gente Committee's aggregate receipts plus expenditures totalled under \$25,000, that the candidate represents a minority party, and that repeated attempts to locate the committee have failed, we recommend the Commission take no further action against the La Gente Committee and close the file.



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Runoff Results:

Texas: Another Incumbent Loses Bid for Renomination

Democratic Rep. John Young, a 22-year House veteran, on June 3 became the second member of the Texas congressional delegation to lose a bid for renomination this year.

Young was defeated in the 14th District Democratic primary runoff by state Rep. Joe Wyatt of Bloomington. Wyatt collected 36,379 votes (56.4 percent) to Young's 28,072 (43.6 percent).

Runoffs also were held June 3 in five other congressional districts. Runoffs were required in Texas primary contests where no candidate received more than 50 percent of the vote in the May 6 primary. The top two primary finishers competed in a runoff. (*Primary results, Weekly Report p. 1190*)

In addition to Young, Rep. Dale Milford, D, was defeated for renomination. Milford lost in the May 6 primary. Their defeats, coupled with the retirements of five House members from Texas and the senatorial ambitions of another, mean that at least one-third of the 24-member Texas delegation in the House will be new next year.

After finishing second to Wyatt in the May 6 primary, Young began campaigning more actively, concentrating his efforts in his home base of Nueces County (Corpus Christi). Young's strategy apparently was to win big there in order to offset Wyatt's majorities in the northern part of the district. It did not work.

Young had been hopeful of capturing votes received in Nueces County by former Corpus Christi Mayor Jason Luby, who finished third in the May 6 primary and was eliminated from the runoff. Young led Wyatt by a 7,400-vote margin in Nueces County in May, but his lead dropped to 6,600 votes in the runoff.

White cutting into Young's margin in Nueces County, Wyatt maintained the 6,500-vote advantage he established in Victoria County in May. The only county in the district lost by Wyatt was Nueces, which accounted for slightly more than half of the June 3 runoff vote.

Wyatt capitalized on sentiment in the northern part of the district that Young had ignored the area in favor of Corpus Christi. He also charged that Young was ineffective in Washington, but made no mention of 1976 allegations by a former Young aide that the incumbent forced her to have sex with him as part of her job.

Wyatt's Republican opponent is Joy Yates, a Corpus Christi real estate broker.

Like Young's 14th District, the Democratic runoff in the 6th District involved regional rivalries. Phil Gramm, a professor at Texas A & M University in College Station in the southern end of the district, defeated Ron Godbey, who was well known in the northern part of the district from his days as a television weatherman in Fort Worth. Gramm received 23,772 votes (52.9 percent) and Godbey 21,132 (47.1 percent). They were competing for the seat of retiring Rep. Olin E. Teague, D.

Gramm carried Brazos County (College Station) 6,555 to 2,994, a margin which offset Godbey's advantage in the northern part of the district. Gramm also was able to re-

Waning Influence

Texas is losing clout in Congress.

Retirements from its House delegation and primary defeats this year are costing the state 188 years of seniority in Congress. Most of that — 150 years — is accounted for by four very senior members.

Texas will lose two committee chairmen, including one of the most powerful in Congress, a vice-chairman, and a high ranking member of the Ways and Means Committee.

The most prominent loss for Texas is Rep. George Mahon, D, a 44-year veteran who is chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and its influential defense subcommittee. But also leaving will be Democratic Rep. Olin E. Teague, with 32 years of service, who is chairman of the Science and Technology Committee and the second-ranking member of both the Veterans' Affairs and the Standards of Official Conduct Committees. Had he stayed Teague would have headed the latter panel because its current chairman, John J. Flynt Jr., D-Ga., also is retiring.

The other two senior retirements are Rep. Omar Bureson, D, (32 years), fifth-ranking member of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee and sixth ranking on the Budget Committee, and Rep. W. R. Poage, D, (42 years), the vice-chairman of the Agriculture Committee.

Also leaving the House are Reps. Barbara Jordan, D, (six years), and Robert "Bob" Krueger, D, (four years). Both had gained national attention — a rather unusual feat for such junior House members. Jordan has retired from Congress altogether; Krueger is retiring to run for the Senate.

Defeated for renomination were Rep. Dale Milford, D, (six years), and Rep. John Young, D, (22 years), fourth ranking on the Rules Committee.

Who's Left

In spite of the departures, the Texas delegation still will have considerable influence in the House.

A key member will be Rep. Jim Wright, D, the current House majority leader. However, Wright may face a serious challenge for that job before the 96th Congress begins in 1979.

Another power in the delegation will be Rep. Jack Brooks, D, chairman of the Government Operations Committee and second ranking on Judiciary.

Other influential Texans include Reps. Bob Eckhardt, D, and Ray Roberts, D. Eckhardt is chairman of the Commerce Committee's Consumer Protection and Finance Subcommittee and is an outspoken supporter of consumer interests in the House. Roberts is chairman of the Veterans Committee and second-ranking member of the Public Works Committee, where he chairs the Water Resources Subcommittee.

Poage's position as No. 2 Democrat on the Agriculture Committee will be taken by Rep. E. "Kika" de la Garza of Mission, Texas.

But the biggest hole, so far as Texas is concerned, will be on Appropriations. With Mahon's retirement, the next Texan on the committee is Charles Wilson, D, who now ranks 33rd out of 37 Democratic members.

duce Godhey's May 3 margin in Tarrant County, where Fort Worth is located. But Gramm carried only four of the district's 11 counties.

An unsuccessful opponent of Sen. Lloyd Bentsen in the Democratic primary two years ago, Gramm will face Republican Wesley H. Mowery in November. Mowery was the Republican House candidate in 1976.

The only Republican runoff was won by George W. Bush, a Midland petroleum producer and son of ex-CIA Director George H. W. Bush, in the 19th District, where House Appropriations Committee Chairman George Mahon, D, is retiring. Bush, who led a three-man Republican primary field in May, received 6,737 votes (55.9 percent) in the June 3 runoff. Jim Reese, a former Odessa mayor and Mahon's 1976 Republican opponent, received 5,322 votes (44.1 percent).

Out of the 17 counties in the district, Bush carried only one county — Midland. But that was enough. Midland cast half of the district's GOP runoff vote and Bush carried the county, 4,787 to 1,278.

Reese was unable to overtake Bush despite an endorsement by Ronald Reagan and the support of staunch conservative elements.

Bush will oppose Democratic state Sen. Kent Hance in November. It is unclear how much help Bush will receive from Reese's followers.

For the 11th District seat of retiring Democratic Rep. W. R. Poage, Marvin Leath of Marlin consolidated conservative voters and defeated former state Rep. Lane Denton, who had a reputation as the relative liberal in the Democratic field. Leath, a former Poage special assistant, collected 40,210 votes (54.9 percent), while Denton received 33,095 votes (45.1 percent). Denton had finished first in the May 6 primary.

Leath was endorsed by state Rep. Lyndon Olson, who placed third in the May 6 primary. Leath won all but two counties in the 19-county district. He even won Denton's home county of McLennan.

Leath's Republican opponent will be Jack Burgess, who received 42.6 percent of the vote against Poage two years ago.

Although A. L. "Dusty" Rhodes' campaign spent more than a quarter of a million dollars, Charles W. Stenholm, a Stamford rancher, won the Democratic nomination for the 17th District seat of Rep. Omar Burleson, D, who is retiring. Stenholm received 46,599 (67.1 percent) and Rhodes, an Abilene lawyer, 22,571 votes (32.9 percent).

Rhodes had been the front-runner early this year, but his lavish spending apparently irritated the district's voters. His campaign lost its momentum when he finished second to Stenholm in the May 6 primary. Rhodes arranged for country singer Tammy Wynette to appear at a campaign rally shortly before the runoff election, but even that could not rescue his sinking campaign.

Stenholm won 31 of the district's 33 counties. In November he will face Republican Bill Fisher, an Abilene lawyer.

State Rep. Mickey Leland virtually was assured of election to the House by defeating state Rep. Anthony Hall in the Democratic primary to replace retiring Rep. Barbara Jordan, D. There is no Republican candidate in the 15th District, although an independent candidate may qualify for the November ballot.

Leland was the choice of 15,537 voters (56.7 percent), while Hall received 11,821 votes (43.2 percent).

Mississippi Results:

Thad Cochran Wins GOP Senate Primary; Democrats Must Have a Runoff Election

Mississippi voters June 6 filled one of the slots in this fall's U.S. Senate race by handing Rep. Thad Cochran a one-sided victory in the Republican primary.

But the Democratic nomination cannot be decided until a June 27 runoff between former Columbia district attorney Maurice Dantin and Gov. Cliff Finch. None of the seven Democratic candidates came close to winning the required majority.

The November winner will replace retiring Sen. James O. Eastland, who is retiring after 36 years in the Senate.

There were congressional primaries in every district except the 5th, where Rep. Trent Lott, R, is running without opposition from either party.


All three Democratic incumbents were challenged but won easily, while in Cochran's 4th District the Republican nomination went to his former administrative assistant, John C. Hinson. The Democratic nomination in the 4th will be decided in a run-off between state Rep. John Hampton Stennis, son of the U.S. senator, and a young legislative colleague, state Rep. James D. Disharoon.

The Democratic Senate results were a disappointment to Finch, who was expected to run ahead. A controversial populist with support among blacks and rural whites, Finch was considered to be in trouble if he didn't come close to a majority in the June 6 vote.

Finch was hurt in the primary by a low turnout among blacks and saw his vote-getting appeal limited mainly to rural northern Mississippi.

Dantin, who was backed by many of Eastland's political allies as well as the state AFL-CIO, ran slightly ahead of Finch by rolling up a big edge in the southern part of the state. The only candidate from south Mississippi, Dantin won the most populous counties of the region, including Jackson (Pascagoula), Harrison (Biloxi and Gulfport), Jones (Laurel) and Forrest (Hattiesburg).

Former Gov. William Waller won his home base of Hinds County (Jackson) and several counties nearby, while Sullivan — carrying the banner of old-time conservative Democrats — won his home of Coahoma County (Clarksdale) but little else. Statewide, Waller and Sullivan ran within 25,000 votes of Finch, but both missed the runoff.
