Dear Ms. Dinh,

I am active in the League of Women Voters. As you may be aware, the League is a well-respected nonpartisan political organization that encourages informed and active participation of citizens in government and influences public policy through education and advocacy. The League is nonpartisan in that it does not support or oppose any political party or candidate. It is political in that it takes positions on selected governmental issues after member study and agreement.

I understand that the Federal Election Commission is considering a proposal to limit communication to the public that may be critical of the current administration. Such changes would limit our ability to raise and spend funds in pursuit of our stated mission and it could affect meaningful conversations about public policies that affect Americans. We certainly count on the grants and contributions that our national organization receives. Our organization has an established Ed fund that qualifies as a 501 (c) (3) account. I feel that these changes would limit needed political debate and might actually diminish civic participation in government rather than strengthen it. This would be exactly the opposite result intended by most supporters of campaign finance reform of which the League is one.
