## CONCILIATION AGREEMENT

This matter was initiated by a signed, sworn, and notarized complaint by the National Republican Senatorial Committee. An investigation has been conducted, and probable cause to believe has been found that Joseph Kozlowski ("Respondent") violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f by making contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in the names of other persons.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Commission and Respondent, having duly entered into conciliation pursuant to 2 U.S.C.

\$ 437g(a)(4)(A)(i) do hereby agree as follows:

- I. The Commission has jurisdiction over the Respondent, and the subject matter of this proceeding.
- II. Respondent has had a reasonable opportunity to demonstrate that no action should be taken in this matter.
- III. Respondent enters voluntarily into this Agreement with the Commission.
  - IV. The pertinent facts in this matter are as follows:
- Respondent was an individual volunteer for the Dixon for Senate Committee ("Committee") during 1979.
- 2. Respondent, during August, 1979, provided an individual, Mitch Maczko, with \$100 in cash in exchange for

a check signed by Mr. Maczko and made payable to the Committee. The Committee has acknowledged the receipt of a \$100 contribution from Mr. Maczko on September 7, 1979.

- 3. Respondent provided his wife, Marjorie

  Kozlowski, with \$200 in cash in exchange for a check signed

  by Marjorie Kozlowski on August 24, 1979, and made payable

  to the Committee. The Committee reported the receipt of a

  \$200 contribution from Marjorie Kozlowski on August 30, 1979.
- 4. Respondent provided Marjorie Kozlowski with \$200 in cash in exchange for a check signed by Marjorie Kozlowski on September 12, 1979, and made payable to the Committee. The Committee reported the receipt of a \$200 contribution from Marjorie Kozlowski on September 20, 1979.

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- V. Respondent violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f when he made contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in the names of other persons. Respondent contends that he did not violate 2 U.S.C. § 441f knowingly, willfully, or intentionally.
- VI. Respondent will pay a civil penalty to the Treasurer of the United States in the amount of Two-Hundred and Fifty dollars (\$250), pursuant to 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(5)(A).
- VII. Respondent agrees that he shall not undertake any activity which is in violation of the Federal Election

  Campaign Act of 1971, as amended, 2 U.S.C. § 431, et seq.

VIII. The Commission, on request of anyone filing a complaint under 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(l) concerning the matters at issue herein or on its own motion, may review compliance with this agreement. If the Commission believes that this agreement or any requirement thereof has been violated, it may institute a civil action for relief in the United States District Court for the District of Columbia.

- IX. This agreement shall become effective as of the date that all parties hereto have executed same and the Commission has approved the entire agreement.
- X. Respondent shall have no more than ninety

  (90) days from the date this agreement becomes effective to

  comply with and implement the requirements contained in this

  agreement and to so notify the Commission.

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

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GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT

I. Background

On October 15, 1980, the National Republican Senatoffal
Committee filed a complaint with the Commission against the
Dixon for Senate Committee ("Committee"). The complaints
alleged that illegal methods of fundraiser ticket sales by the
Committee resulted in the Committee's acceptance of
contributions made in the name of another in violation of 2
U.S.C. § 441f, acceptance of corporate contributions in
violation of § 441b(a), and acceptance of cash contributions in
violation of § 441g. Testimony upon which the complainant
relied also implicated Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski,
and Mitch Maczko as respondents in this matter.

On December 9, 1980, the Commission found reason to believe that the Committee violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441b(a) and 441f, and 11 C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2), and determined that Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f. Notification letters were mailed on December 10, 1980. Responses were received from the Committee on December 29, 1980, and January 27, 1981, and from

Mitch Maczko on January 6, 1981. On January 2, 1981, counsel for Joseph Kozlowski and Marjorie Kozlowski notified the Office of General Counsel that because his clients were potentially under criminal investigation by the U.S. Attorney's Office in Chicago, they would not respond to the interrogatories issued to them, pursuant to the fifth amendment privilege against self-incrimination. 1

On March 12, 1981, the deposition of Charles Smith was conducted. Supplemental responses were submitted by the Committee on March 13, 1981, March 30, 1981, and April 10, 1981. On April 8, 1981, the Commission issued an order to the Committee to produce certain documents. The depositions of Joseph McMahon, Carl Catuara, Robert Guzlas, and Gene Sullivan were conducted on April 16, 1981, and also on this date the Committee submitted documents pursuant to the Commission's order. On September 9, 1981, the deposition of Joseph Kozlowski was conducted. 2 A brief was mailed to Joseph Kozlowski on January 27, 1982; to date, no response has been received.

<sup>2</sup> Throughout his deposition Joseph Kozlowski asserted his fifth amendment privilege against self-incrimination and refused to answer almost all questions.

## II. Factual Basis and Legal Analysis

(a) The factual background

The complaint filed in this matter was based primarily on the unsworn testimony of Joseph Kozlowski. Accompanying the written complaint was a videotape of Mr. Kozlowski's responses to questions propounded by agents of the complainant, and a statement signed by Joseph Kozlowski on October 10, 1980, which states that Mr. Kozlowski agreed to the recording of the "discussion" of matters "pertaining to the Secretary of State's Office."

During the time period relevant to this matter, Joseph Kozlowski was employed by the Office of Secretary of State of Illinois, <sup>3</sup> and Alan Dixon, the Secretary of State of Illinois, was a senatorial candidate in both the 1980 primary and general elections in Illinois. The Dixon for Senate Committee is the principal campaign committee of Alan Dixon.

According to information obtained in the course of the investigation, Joseph Kozlowski was on leaves of absences during the following periods of time: September 24, 1979, through October 15, 1979, December 17, 1979, through December 31, 1979, January 10, 1980, through February 14, 1980, and May 6, 1980, through September 4, 1980. Mr. Kozlowski's

employment with the Secretary of State's Office was terminated in January or February 1980. Prior to his termination, Mr. Kozlowski apparently was reprimanded several times, including the day before the videotape of Mr. Kozlowski was shown on Chicago television (approximately the same day the instant complaint was filed).

In the course of his videotape testimony, Mr. Koslowski alleged that he and other employees of the Illinois Secretary of State's Office granted drivers licenses to individuals and corporate employees who were not qualified to receive licenses in exchange for funds, usually in the amount of \$100 - \$300. According to Mr. Rozlowski's testimony, some of the money was used to effect contributions to the Committee through the purchase of tickets to various Committee fundraising events. 4 The funds he received for licenses, it is alleged, were accepted in the form of both cash and personal checks; cash was accepted from corporations, and individuals tendered personal checks. 5 Mr. Kozlowski alleged that in those instances where he would receive cash, he would ask a friend to write him a check in exchange for the cash. Based upon documentation submitted with the complaint and information obtained during this investigation, it appears that some checks were generated in this manner, and they were made payable to the Dixon for

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<sup>4</sup> Mr. Kozlowski stated that he engaged in this activity because he felt that if he did not sell tickets he would not receive any raises or "fringe benefits." He also stated that although some supervisors who accepted bribes put the money into "the pocket," he did not want "to go that route."

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> Mr. Kozlowski reasoned that since corporate checks were prohibited, he could accept only cash from the corporations who paid to have their employees receive drivers licenses.

Senate Committee. <sup>6</sup> While Mr. Roxlowski was employed in offices located in Cook County, Illinois, the complaint alleges that the actions of which it complains "have been repeated in many other offices of the Secretary of State of Illinois and that such funds have been knowingly and willfully diverted to the Dixon for Senate Campaign." It should be noted that this allegation has not been supported by the complainant.

The responses filed by the Committee in November and

December 1980 stated that the Committee had no knowledge of any
of the acts alleged in the complaint. The responses also
stated that based upon information then available to the

Committee, Joseph Kozlowski was not an agent of the Committee,
that no agent of the Committee provided Joseph Kozlowski with
tickets to fundraising events, and that the Committee did not

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The complaint also alleges that Mitch Maczko permitted his name to be used to make contributions to the Committee in the name of another during August 1979. It appears that Mitch Maczko was the other unidentified individual who made the following statement in the complaint: "In August of '79 Mr. X approached me and asked me as a favor to write a check for the Dixon for Senate campaign for the amount of \$100, which I did, and at the same time, he gave me \$100 in cash." (The Committee has stated, in response to an interrogatory that it accepted a \$100 contribution from Mitch Maczko on September 7, 1979.)

The complaint included a copy of two checks in the amount of \$200 each, written on the joint account of Joseph and Marjorie Kozlowski. The checks are signed by Marjorie Kozlowski and are dated August 24, 1979, and September 12, 1979. (Both contributions were reported by the Committee on its October 10, 1979 quarterly report.) It seems that Marjorie Kozlowski was the unidentified individual who made the following statement in the complaint: "my husband came home with tickets and with cash he had for the tickets and I took the cash, deposited it in the bank, and wrote him a check on two different occasions,..., August XX, and September XX, 1979."

accept the proceeds of ticket sales from Joseph Kozlowski.

Furthermore, the Committee's replies contended that none of its agents were aware of any instances whereby individuals Obtained drivers licenses by purchasing tickets to Committee fundraisers from state employees with either their own funds or corporate funds.

The investigation conducted in this matter has revealed that the Committee held fundraisers in Cook County, Illinois, on September 26, 1979, March 11, 1980, August 17, 1980, and September 23, 1980. 7 With respect to each of the four fundraisers it has been determined that tickets were sold by employees of the Office of Secretary of State of Illinois, and by other individuals as well. Joseph McMahon and Charles Smith, the Deputy Secretary of State and Assistant Deputy Secretary of State, respectively, during the time period relevant to this matter, were responsible for the recruitment of volunteers from the Secretary of State's Office. 8 Both Messrs. McMahon and Smith testified that in recruiting volunteers they sought the assistance of state employees who

<sup>7</sup> Tickets to the September 26, 1979, and September 23, 1980, fundraisers were sold for \$100, and tickets to the March 11, 1980, and August 17, 1980, fundraisers were sold for \$50.

While the Committee conducted fundraisers throughout the state, there is no evidence of any improper ticket sales other than in Cook County.

<sup>8</sup> Charles Smith was employed as the Assistant Deputy Secretary of State of Illinois from January 1977 through January 21, 1981. Joseph McMahon was employed as the Deputy Secretary of State from 1977 through January 1981.

had participated in Alan Dixon's previous campaigns for the office of Secretary of State, and that in Spring 1979 they conducted an organizational meeting which was attended by approximately 10-15 volunteers who were state employees. 9 Mr. Kozlowski did not attend the meeting.

Sometime subsequent to the organizational meeting discussed supra, volunteers were provided with contribution cards to effect ticket sales to the September 1979 fundraiser, according to the testimony of several Committee volunteers. Upon receipt of a contribution the volunteer was instructed to fill in the required information on a contribution card (e.g. name, address) and return the card and contribution to the Committee, either by mail or in person. The Committee would then send the appropriate number of tickets to the contributor. This procedure was apparently followed for all four fundraisers, except that sometime after the first fundraiser the volunteers were required to sign for the contributor cards they received; the receipt stated some of the restrictions on contributions under federal election law, and that the person signing for the cards could not "give any tickets to any other individual to sell until they [had] signed a copy of this

<sup>9</sup> Charles Smith testified that the prohibitions on corporate contributions and cash contributions in excess of \$100, and the limitations on contributions were explained at the meeting. Additionally, the employees were informed that they, and other employees, were not required to purchase tickets, and that no solicitations should be conducted in the office.

letter and it had been transmitted to the campaign office.\*

This office has not determined whether the stated policy was followed in practice.

Based upon the testimony obtained in this matter, the individual volunteers who sold tickets to the first fundraiser gave some of the contributor cards they received to other persons so that these additional persons could also effect ticket sales. Several volunteers have testified that they were never informed that such a transmittal of contributor cards was prohibited, and Charles Smith and Joseph McMahon have acknowledged that it was a permissible practice. Thus, it appears that the Committee was aware of, and condoned, the practice.

While Joseph Kozlowski did not attend the 1979 organizational meeting of volunteers, he did receive some contributor cards to effect ticket sales. Gene Sullivan, the immediate supervisor of Mr. Kozlowski at the North Facility and a Committee volunteer, testified that he gave Mr. Kozlowski between one and five contributor cards for the September 26, 1979, fundraiser, and that when he gave Mr. Kozlowski the cards, he informed him of the restrictions on contributions under the federal election law. 10 Mr. Sullivan stated that he

<sup>10</sup> Gene Sullivan was one of the 10-15 volunteers who attended the 1979 organizational meeting. Mr. Sullivan testified that he received between 150-200 contributor cards from Robert Guzlas, who had also attended the meeting, and that he in turn gave the cards to approximately seven other persons, including Joseph Kozlowski.

provided the Committee with the names of the persons to whom he had given the cards, and that it was his recollection that the Committee requested the information from him. According to Mr. Sullivan's testimony, Mr. Rozlowski returned some proceeds through Mr. Sullivan, 11 but others he returned directly to the Committee himself. Mr. Sullivan also stated that it was his belief that Mr. Rozlowski did not sell all of the contribution cards given to him. Although Mr. Sullivan did not give Mr. Rozlowski contribution cards for any other fundraisers, he did testify that he accepted a contribution from Mr. Rozlowski in February 1980 after he refused Mr. Rozlowski permission to sell tickets to the March 1980 fundraiser. 12

Charles Smith, Joseph McMahon, Robert Guzlas, Carl Catuara, and Gene Sullivan have denied, in deposition testimony, that they were aware that any employee of the

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<sup>11</sup> While it was Mr. Sullivan's recollection that he received a \$200 contribution check from Joseph Kozlowski which was signed by Marjorie Kozlowski, he did not recall the names of any other persons who made contributions through Joseph Kozlowski.

<sup>12</sup> While Mr. Sullivan could not recall the amount of the contribution, it appears to have been in the amount of \$50. The Committee has stated, in response to an interrogatory, and provided documentation which demonstrates, that it accepted a \$50 contribution from Marjorie Kozlowski on March 5, 1980, attached to a contributor card bearing Joseph Kozlowski's name.

Secretary of State's Office granted drivers licenses in exchange for funds. 13 These five volunteers also testified that they were not aware that Committee fundraising events were used as a vehicle to transmit illegal monies to the Committee. It would seem that these individuals would have been aware if such a practice was "repeated in many other offices" of the Secretary of State, as alleged in the complaint, due to the nature of their positions within the Secretary of State's Office. Additionally, with the exception of Gene Sullivan, all of the volunteers whose depositions were conducted have testified that they did not give Joseph Kozlowski any contributor cards or accept any contributions from him which represented his own, or other persons', contributions to the Committee. Significantly, Messrs. McMahon, Guzlas, and Catuara have stated that Joseph Kozlowski did not even ask them for any contributor cards with which to effect ticket sales.

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<sup>13</sup> As stated above, Joseph McMahon and Charles Smith were employed as the Deputy Secretary of State and Assistant Deputy Secretary of State, respectively. During the time period relevant to this matter, Robert Guzlas was employed as the Superintendent of Facilities in the Secretary of State's Office; as Superintendent he was responsible for all offices of the Secretary of State in Cook County, including those which issued driver's licenses and automobile registrations. Mr. Guzlas was directly responsible to Joseph McMahon. Carl Catuara was employed as the Assistant Superintendent of Facilities and was mainly responsible for three Cook County facilities, the North, South, and West Facilities. Eugene Sullivan supervised the Drivers License Facility and the Motor Vehicle Division at the North Facility.

With respect to Mitch Macsko and Marjorie Koslowski, who are alleged to have permitted their names to be used to effect contributions to the Committee, this office has obtained information pertaining to the actions of only Mr. Maczko. As discussed supra, counsel for Mrs. Kozlowski had stated that his client will not answer any questions issued by the Commission. Mr. Maczko's response to the Commission's interrogatories does not indicate that the Committee was aware that in accepting a contribution from Mr. Maczko, it accepted a contribution made in the name of another person. Mr. Maczko's response states that he did not contribute to the Committee, but he did write a \$100 check to the Committee in August 1979 as a favor to Joseph Kozlowski, and that he received \$100 in cash from Mr. Kozlowski in exchange for the check. The reply of Mr. Maczko also states that he had no knowledge of any impropriety and that when he was asked by Mr. Kozlowski and Mr. Greener to "bear witness on a tape recorder," the entire matter was "misrepresented" to him. 14

## (b) The law applicable

Section 441f of Title 2, <u>United States Code</u>, prohibits any person from making a contribution in the name of another or knowingly permitting his or her name to be used to effect such a

<sup>14</sup> Mr. William Greener III, is one of three witnesses to the statement signed by Mr. Kozlowski which was included with the NRSC complaint.

contribution. In addition, \$ 441f prohibits any person from knowingly accepting a contribution made by one person in the name of another person. Under 2 U.S.C. \$ 441b(a) it is unlawful for a political committee to knowingly accept or receive contributions from corporations. Pursuant to 2 U.S.C. \$ 441g no persons may make contributions of currency which, in the aggregate, exceed \$100 with respect to any election to federal office. While the making of cash contributions in excess of \$100 is prohibited under \$ 441g, the acceptance of such contributions is addressed only in the criminal penalties section of the statute, 2 U.S.C. \$ 437g(d). Commission regulations, however, at 11 C.F.R. \$ 110.4(c)(2) require that a committee receiving such funds shall promptly return any amount over \$100 to the contributor.

While it has not been possible to obtain testimony from Mr. Kozlowski to corroborate his testimony on the videotape accompanying the complaint, testimony from other volunteers employed by the Secretary of State's Office indicates that Mr. Kozlowski's allegations pertain to only his own actions, and those of no one else. Accordingly to the testimony of the five Committee volunteers discussed <a href="mailto:supra">supra</a>, they knew of no state employee who funnelled illegal monies to the Committee, or who even accepted funds in exchange for the granting of driver's licenses. Furthermore, there is no concrete evidence that any corporate funds were received by the Committee through ticket sales, or that any corporations gave Mr. Kozlowski cash in

exchange for licenses, and in doing so knew that the funds would reach the Committee. However, as the response of Mitch Maczko indicates that Mr. Kozlowski made at least one contribution (\$100) in the name of another, part of Mr. Kozlowski's allegations are true, and the evidence indicates that Mr. Kozlowski also made two contributions of \$200 each in the name of his wife, Marjorie Kozlowski.

Since Joseph Kozlowski was given tickets to sell for Committee fundraisers, and the Committee, through its agent, Gene Sullivan, was aware he was selling tickets, Mr. Kozlowski could be viewed as an agent of the Committee. The circumstances imply that it was the intent of the parties to create an agency relationship. See In re Brown, 412 F. Supp. 1066 (W.D. Okla. 1975).

It is a settled proposition of law that the principal is liable for the acts of its agents within the general scope of their authority. See Marohn v. Burnham Van Services, Inc., 478 F. Supp. 49, 51 (N.D. Ill. 1979); Southern Pacific Transportation Co. v. Continental Shippers Assn., Inc., 485 F. Supp. 1313, 1319 (W.D. Mo. 1980). The acts of an agent will be imputed to the principal if it is the agent's purpose to benefit the principal. United States v. Beusch, 596 F.2d 871, 877 (9th Cir. 1979). Even when the agent's actions go against the express orders of the principal, the principal may be held liable if the acts are performed for the benefit of the principal. See New York Central Railroad v. United States,

Association, AFL-CIO v. MLRB, 293 F.2d 141, 149 (D.C. Cir. 1961). Moreover, the principal is considered to have the knowledge that its agent possesses within the scope of the agency. W.R. Grace and Co. v. Western U.S. Industries, Inc., 608 F.2d 1214, 1218 (9th Cir. 1979). This latter proposition is significant here because the statutory provisions at issue require "knowing" acceptance by the Committee.

Although Joseph Kozlowski could be viewed as an agent of the Committee, thus committing the Committee to liability, it is the position of the General Counsel that no further action should be taken against the Committee in this matter. The evidence available indicates that no one else at the Committee was aware of any improprieties in ticket sales by Joseph Kozlowski, that Mr. Kozlowski was the only agent who accepted illegal contributions, and that the Committee attempted to insure that no prohibited contributions were accepted when its agents informed each volunteer involved in fundraising of the restrictions of federal election law. In view of the above, and in consideration of the fact that the amount of prohibited contributions involved herein apparently total only \$500, and that the Committee has cooperated completely throughout this investigation, it is the recommendation of the General Counsel that no further action be taken against the Committee.

With respect to Mitch Maczko and Marjorie Kozlowski, it is also recommended that no further action be taken. The

contribution involving Mr. Maezko totalled only \$100, and Mr.

Maczko was apparently unaware he was violating the law when he wrote a check to the Committee as a favor to Joseph Kozlowski. The contributions involving Mrs. Kozlowski totaled only \$400.

Moreover, the account into which Joseph Kozlowski apparently deposited cash and from which Mrs. Kozlowski drew the two checks was a joint checking account. Mrs. Kozlowski arguably had a basis for believing that she was not permitting her name to be used by her husband to make a contribution.

While it is the General Counsel's recommendation that no further action be taken against the Committee, Mitch Maczko, and Marjorie Kozlowski, it is the recommendation of the General Counsel that the Commission find probable cause to believe that Joseph Kozlowski violated 2 U.S.C. § 44lf. Unlike the other respondents in this matter, Mr. Kozlowski initiated the actions which resulted in illegal contributions reaching the Committee. Counsel for Mr. Kozlowski did not respond to the General Counsel's brief recommending a finding of probable cause to believe and, therefore, the legal analysis with respect to Mr. Kozlowski remains the same. See General Counsel's Brief. III. Discussion of Conciliation and Civil Penalty

## IV. General Counsel's Recommendations

- 1. Take no further action against the Dixon for Senate Committee with respect to possible violations of 2 U.S.C. \$\$ 441b(a) and 441f, and 11 C.F.R. \$ 110.4(c)(2).
- 2. Take no further action against Mitch Macsko with respect to a possible violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441f.
- 3. Take no further action against Marjorie Kozlowski with respect to a possible violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441f.
- 4. Find probable cause to believe that Joseph Kozlowski violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f.
- 5. Approve the attached conciliation agreement and letters.

On December 9, 1980, the Commission found reason to believe that your client, the Dixon for Senate Committee ("Committee"), violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441b(a) and 441f, and 11 C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2). Subsequent to the Commission's findings, the depositions of Committee agents were conducted, and the Committee produced certain documents pursuant to Commission order.

After considering all the circumstances of this matter, the Commission has determined to take no further action against your client. The Commission reminds your client, however, that it is nevertheless a violation of 2 U.S.C. §§ 44lb(a), 44lf and ll C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2) for an agent of a political committee to knowingly accept corporate contributions, to knowingly accept contributions made in the name of another, and to accept cash contributions in excess of \$100, respectively. Your client should insure that this activity does not occur in the future.

The file in this matter will be made public within 30 days after this matter has been closed with respect to all other respondents involved. Should you wish to submit any materials to appear on the public record, please do so within 10 days. Additionally, please be advised that the confidentiality provisions of 2 U.S.C. §§ 437g(a)(4)(B) and 437g(a)(12)(A) remain in effect until the entire matter is closed. The Commission will notify you when the entire file has been closed.

## GENERAL COUNSEL'S BRIEF

## I. Statement of the Case .

On October 15, 1980, the National Republican Senatorial Committee filed a complaint with the Commission which indicated that Joseph Kozlowski violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f by making contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee ("Committee") in the names of others. On December 9, 1980, the Commission found reason to believe that Joseph Kozlowski violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f. Notification of the Commission's finding was mailed to Mr. Kozlowski on December 10, 1980. On January 2, 1981, counsel for Joseph Kozlowski notified the Office of General Counsel that because his client was potentially under criminal investigation by the U.S. Attorney's Office in Chicago, he would not respond to the interrogatories issued to him, pursuant to the fifth amendment privilege against self-incrimination. On September 9, 1981, the deposition of Joseph Kozlowski was conducted. 1

<sup>1</sup> Throughout his deposition Joseph Kozlowski asserted his fifth amendment privilege against self-incrimination and refused to answer almost all questions.

The complaint filed in this matter was based primarily on the unsworn testimony of Joseph Koslowski. Accompanying the written complaint was a videotape of Nr. Koslowski's responses to questions propounded by agents of the complainant, and a statement signed by Joseph Koslowski on October 10, 1980, which states that Mr. Koslowski agreed to the recording of the "discussion" of matters "pertaining to the Secretary of State's Office."

During the time period relevant to this matter, Joseph Kozlowski was employed by the Office of Secretary of State of Illinois, <sup>2</sup> and Alan Dixon, the Secretary of State of Illinois, was a senatorial candidate in both the 1980 primary and general elections in Illinois. The Dixon for Senate Committee is the principal campaign committee of Alan Dixon.

In the course of his videotape testimony, Mr. Kozlowski states that he and other employees of the Illinois Secretary of State's Office granted drivers licenses to individuals and corporate employees who were not qualified to receive licenses in exchange for funds, usually in the amount of \$100-\$300. According to Mr. Kozlowski's testimony, he used the money to effect contributions to the Committee through the purchase of tickets to various Committee fundraising

<sup>2</sup> According to information obtained in the course of the investigation, Joseph Kozlowski was on leaves of absences during the following periods of time: September 24, 1979, through October 15, 1979, December 17, 1979, through December 31, 1979, Janaury 10, 1980, through February 14, 1980, and May 6, 1980, through September 4, 1980.

events. <sup>3</sup> The funds he received for licenses, Mr. Rozlowski asserts, were accepted in the form of both cash and personal checks; cash was accepted from corporations, and individuals tendered personal checks. <sup>4</sup> Mr. Rozlowski stated that in those instances where he would receive cash, he would ask a friend to write him a check in exchange for the cash. Based upon documentation submitted with the complaint and information obtained during this investigation, it appears that at least some checks were generated in this manner, and they were made payable to the Dixon for Senate Committee. <sup>5</sup>

The complaint also alleges that Mitch Maczko permitted his name to be used to make contributions to the Committee in the name of another during August 1979. It appears that Mitch Maczko was the other unidentified individual who made the following statement in the complaint: "In August of '79 Mr. X approached me and asked me as a favor to write a check for the Dixon for Senate campaign for the amount of \$100, which I did, and at the same time, he gave me \$100 in cash."

Mr. Kozlowski stated that he engaged in this activity because he felt that if he did not sell tickets he would not receive any raises or "fringe benefits." He also stated that although some supervisors who accepted bribes put the money into their "pocket," he did not want "to go that route."

<sup>4</sup> Mr. Kozlowski reasoned that since corporate checks were prohibited, he could accept only cash from the corporations who paid to have their employees receive drivers licenses.

The complaint included a copy of two checks in the amount of \$200 each, written on the joint account of Joseph and Marjorie Kozlowski. The checks are signed by Marjorie Kozlowski and are dated August 24, 1979, and September 12, 1979. (Both contributions were reported by the Committee on its October 10, 1979, quarterly report.) It seems that Marjorie Kozlowski was the unidentified individual who made the following statement in the complaint: "my husband came home with tickets and with cash he had for the tickets and I took the cash, deposited it in the bank, and wrote him a check on two different occasions, August XX, and September XX, 1979."

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The investigation conducted in this matter has revealed that the Committee held fundraisers in Cook County. Illinois, on September 26, 1979, March 11, 1980, August 17, 1980, and September 23, 1980. 6 With respect to each of the four fundraisers it has been determined that tickets were sold by employees of the Office of Secretary of State of Illinois, and by other individuals as well. Joseph McMahon and Charles Smith, the Deputy Secretary of State and Assistant Deputy Secretary of State, respectively, during the time period relevant to this matter, were responsible for the recruitment of volunteers from the Secretary of State's Office. 7 Both Messrs. McMahon and Smith testified that in the Spring of 1979 they conducted an organizational meeting which was attended by approximately 10-15 volunteers who were state employees. 8 According to the testimony obtained from Committee agents who attended the meeting, Mr. Kozlowski was not present.

Tickets to the September 26, 1979, and September 23, 1980, fundraisers were sold for \$100, and tickets to the March 11, 1980, and August 17, 1980, fundraisers were sold for \$50.

<sup>7</sup> Charles Smith was employed as the Assistant Deputy Secretary of State of Illinois from January 1977 through January 21, 1981. Joseph McMahon was employed as the Deputy Secretary of State from 1977 through January 1981.

<sup>8</sup> Charles Smith testified that the prohibitions on corporate contributions and cash contributions in excess of \$100, and the limitations on contributions, were explained at the meeting. Additionally, the employees were informed that they, and other employees, were not required to purchase tickets, and that no solicitations should be conducted in the office.

Sometime subsequent to the organizational meeting discussed supra, volunteers were provided with contribution cards to effect ticket sales to the September 1979 fundraiser, according to the testimony of several Committee volunteers. Upon receipt of a contribution the volunteer was instructed to fill in the required information on a contribution card (e.g. name, address) and return the card and contribution to the Committee, either by mail or in person. The Committee would then send the appropriate number of tickets to the contributor. This procedure was apparently followed for all four fundraisers, except that sometime after the first fundraiser the volunteers were required to sign for the contributor cards they received; the receipt stated some of the restrictions on contributions under federal election law, and that the person signing for the cards could not "give any tickets to any other individual to sell until they [had] signed a copy of this letter and it had been transmitted to the campaign office." Based upon the testimony obtained in this matter, the individual volunteers who sold tickets to the first fundraiser gave some of the contributor cards they received to other persons so that these additional persons could also effect ticket sales.

While Joseph Kozlowski did not attend the 1979 organizational meeting of volunteers, he did receive some contributor cards to effect ticket sales. Gene Sullivan, the immediate supervisor of Mr. Kozlowski at the North Facility and a Committee volunteer, testified that he gave

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Mr. Kozlowski between one and five contributor cards for the September 26, 1979, fundraiser. Mr. Sullivan also stated that when he gave Mr. Kozlowski the cards, he informed him of the restrictions on contributions under the federal election law. According to Mr. Sullivan's testimony, Mr. Kozlowski returned some proceeds through Mr. Sullivan, 9 but others Mr. Kozlowski returned directly to the Committee himself. Mr. Sullivan further stated that it was his recollection that Mr. Kozlowski did not sell all of the contribution cards given to him. Although Mr. Sullivan did not give Mr. Kozlowski contribution cards for any other fundraisers, he did testify that he accepted a contribution from Mr. Kozlowski in February 1980 after he refused Mr. Kozlowski permission to sell tickets to the March 1980 fundraiser. 10

The response received from Mitch Maczko, who, the complaint alleges permitted his name to be used by Joseph Kozlowski to make a contribution to the Committee, states that he wrote a check for \$100 to the Committee in August 1979 as a favor to Joseph Kozlowski. Mr. Maczko also stated

<sup>9</sup> Mr. Sullivan stated that he accepted a \$200 contribution check from Joseph Kozlowski which was signed by Marjorie Kozlowski.

While Mr. Sullivan could not recall the amount of the contribution, it appears to had been in the amount of \$50. The Committee has stated, in response to an interrogatory, and provided documentation which demonstrates, that it accepted a \$50 contribution from Marjorie Kozlowski on March 5, 1980, attached to a contributor card bearing Joseph Kozlowski's name.

that he received \$100 in cash from Mr. Rozlowski in exchange for the check. That this contribution was transmitted by Mr. Rozlowski to the Committee is evidenced by the fact that the Committee stated it received a \$100 contribution from Mr. Maczko on September 7, 1979. Other than the check he wrote for Mr. Rozlowski, Mr. Maczko apparently did not contribute to the Committee,

## II. Legal Analysis

(a) The law applicable

Section 441f of Title 2, <u>United States Code</u>, prohibits any person from making a contribution in the name of another or knowingly permitting his or her name to be used to effect such a contribution.

(b) Application of the law to the facts

While it has not been possible to obtain sworn testimony from Mr. Kozlowski to corroborate his testimony on the videotape accompanying the complaint, the evidence obtained in the course of this investigation indicates that Mr. Kozlowski's statements are partially true, at least with respect to his own actions. 11 Based upon Gene Sullivan's testimony, Mr. Sullivan provided Mr. Kozlowski with contributor cards, and accepted some proceeds from ticket sales from Mr. Kozlowski. Thus, Mr. Kozlowski's statement that he sold tickets to Committee fundraisers is true. It

<sup>11</sup> There is no evidence, other than Mr. Kozlowski's videotape assertions, that other supervisors or employees of the Secretary of State's Office accepted funds in exchange for the granting of drivers licenses.

is also true that Mr. Kozlowski made at least one contribution in the name of another. The response of Mitch Maczko, which states that he wrote a check for \$100 to the Committee as a favor to Mr. Kozlowski in exchange for cash, corroborates Mr. Koslowski's statement in the videotape that he asked friends to write checks in exchange for cash, and that he submitted the checks to the Committee. The evidence also indicates that Mr. Kozlowski made two contributions of \$200 each in the name of his wife, Marjorie Kozlowski. In view of the foregoing, it is the position of the General Counsel that there is probable cause to believe Joseph Kozlowski violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f.

## III. General Counsel's Recommendation

1. Find probable cause to believe Joseph Kozlowski violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f.

## Comprehensive Investigative Report # 1

on July 21, 1981, the Commission approved the issuance of a subpoena for deposition to Joseph Kozlowski; the deposition was conducted on September 9, 1981. Although the complaint filed in this matter was based on the (unsworn) testimony of Joseph Kozlowski, Mr. Kozlowski asserted his fifth amendment privilege at the deposition and refused to answer any questions relating to his employment at the Illinois Secretary of State's Office or his volunteer activities with the Dixon for Senate Committee. Thus, this

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In the General Counsel's view, an effort to compel Mr. Kozlowski to answer the questions propounded to him in our deposition would probably not succeed. The standard for compelling a witness to answer questions in spite of a fifth amendment assertion is difficult for the government to meet in the Seventh Circuit. A witness may successfully refuse to answer a question if it can be shown that the possibility of incrimination is not fanciful. See, e.g., In re Folding Carton Antitrust Litigation, 609 F.2d 867 (7th Cir. 1979).

the witness has already provided to the prosecutor a videotape of himself admitting his acceptance of bribes and making contributions in the names of others, it is probable that a court would rule that he has shown more than a fanciful possibility that his answers would incriminate him.

office has been unable to substantiate, through Mr. Kezlowski, the allegations made in the complaint.

Based upon testimony obtained from several deponents in this matter, this office, on September 24, 1981, mailed David Greenfield several questions pertinent to this investigation. Mr. Greenfield is a former employee of the Secretary of State's Office and may have given ticket order forms to Joseph Kozlowski so that he could solicit contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee. Upon receipt of Mr. Greenfield's response, this office expects to be able to make a recommendation to the Commission concerning the Dixon for Senate Committee and two other respondents, Mitch Maczko and Marjorie Kozlowski.

With respect to Joseph Kozlowski, his counsel has indicated that it may be possible to negotiate a conciliation agreement with Mr. Kozlowski concerning violations of 2 U.S.C. § 44lf. As the response of Mr. Greenfield is expected to provide information which may affect a conciliation agreement involving Mr. Kozlowski, this office is awaiting receipt of Mr. Greenfield's reply before it commences any negotiations with counsel for

Joseph Koslowski. Mr. Greenfield's reply is expected by mid-October.

On February 19, 1980, the Commission approved the issuance of subpoenss to four individuals who appeared to have knowledge pertinent to the Commission's investigation of the Dixon for Senate Committee, Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko. The deposition of one of the individuals, Charles Smith, was conducted on March 12, 1981. The depositions of the three remaining persons were postponed after it was determined that one of the persons was on vacation, and the other two persons would probably claim a flat fifth amendment privlege.

In his deposition, Charles Smith indicated that two other persons, Joseph McMahon and Gene Sullivan, were authorized to sell tickets to fundraising events sponsored by the Dixon for Senate Committee and may have communicated with Joseph Rozlowski about ticket sales. Additionally, Mr. Smith indicated that Gene Sullivan and the Dixon for Senate Committee have certain documents in their possession which are pertinent to this investigation. Therefore, the General Counsel recommends that the Commission approve the issuance of subpoenas to Joseph McMahon and Gene Sullivan, and an order to the Dixon for Senate Committee. This office anticipates scheduling these two depositions proximate in time to the depositions of the three persons already subpoenaed. Negotiations with counsel for two of the persons already subpoenaed are underway in an effort to persuade these witnesses to testify without asserting a flat refusal based on fifth amendment self-incrimination claims.

This matter was generated by the filing of a complaint on October 15, 1980. The complainant's allegations were based on the testimony of Joseph Kozlowski, who acknowledged improperly obtaining corporate and other funds and using those funds to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in the names of others. On December 9, 1980, the Commission found reason to believe the Dixon for Senate Committee violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441f and 441b(a) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2), and reason to believe Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f. Questions were sent to all respondents, but responses were received only from Mitch Maczko and the Dixon for Senate Committee. Counsel for Marjorie Kozlowski and Joseph Kozlowski informed the Office of General Counsel that his clients are currently under criminal investigation and will not respond to the Commission's Orders to answer questions, pursuant to the fifth amendment privilege against self-incrimination.

of the case law, it appears that Joseph Kozlowski could successfully invoke the privilege and not be compelled to provide us with testimony.

As we are unable to obtain information from Joseph Kozlowski, and as the responses of the Dixon for Senate Committee and Mitch Maczko do not give a clear indication of whether the allegations in the complaint are true, it is the view of this

office that additional factual information is needed before a further determination can be made by the Commission. Therefore, the General Counsel recommends that the Commission approve the issuance of subpoenas for deposition to Louis Mitchel, Robert Guzlas, Carl Cotura, and Charles Smith, who all appear to have knowledge of information pertinent to this investigation. Mr. Mitchel, Mr. Guslas, and Mr. Cotura are all identified in Mr. Kozlowski's videotape testimony as persons he worked with who also were involved in fundraising for the Dixon campaign. Mr. Smith was identified by counsel for the Dixon for Senate Committee as the person who was most familiar with committee fundraising in the areas where Joseph Kozlowski allegedly sold tickets to fundraising events. The Federal Election Commission notified you on October 16, 1980, of a complaint which alleges that your client may have violated certain sections of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act"). A copy of the complaint was forwarded to you at that time.

Upon further review of the allegations contained in the complaint and information supplied by you, the Commission, on December 9, 1980, determined that there is reason to believe your client violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 44lb(a) and 44lf, and 11 C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2). Specifically, it appears that Joseph Kozlowski may have been acting on behalf of the Dixon for Senate Committee and that he may have effected and accepted on behalf of the Committee contributions made in the names of others (see 2 U.S.C. § 44lf), contributions by corporations (see 2 U.S.C. § 44lb(a)), and cash contributions in excess of \$100 (see 11 C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2)). You may submit any factual or legal materials which you believe are relevant to the Commission's analysis of this matter.

Your response to the Commission's initial notification of this complaint did not provide complete information regarding the matters in question. Please submit answers to the enclosed questions within 10 days of receipt of this letter. Where appropriate, statements should be submitted under oath.



SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

On October 15, 1980, Lawrence McCarthy, Communications Director of the National Republican Senatorial Committee, filed a complaint with the Commission against the Dixon for Senate Committee (Attachment 1). Testimony upon which the complainant relies implicates Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko as respondents in this matter as well. The complaint alleges that illegal methods of fundraiser ticket sales by the Dixon for Senate Committee ("committee") have resulted in the committee's acceptance of contributions made in the name of another in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441f, the committee's acceptance of corporate contributions in violation of § 44lb, and the committee's acceptance of cash contributions in excess of \$100 in violation of \$ 441g. Respondents Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko are alleged to have violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f by making contributions in the names of others or permitting their names to be used for such contributions. Complainant asserts that the actions of which it complains "have been repeated in many other offices of the Secretary of State of Illinois and that such funds

have been knowingly and willfully diverted to the Dixon for Senate Campaign."

Notification letters were mailed to the Dixon for Senate Committee, Marjorie Kozlowski, Joseph Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko on October 16 and 17, 1980. The response of the Dixon for Senate Committee was received by the Office of General Counsel on November 3, 1980 (Attachment 2). To date, no responses have been filed by Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, or Mitch Maczko.

#### II. FACTUAL BASIS AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

Complainant makes the following allegations: "[t]hat ticket sales to raise funds for the respondent committee [Dixon for Senate Committee] have been made in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 44lf in that funds which were shown as contributions from Joseph R. Kozlowski and Marjorie A. Kozlowski on August 24, 1979, and similar contributions of approximately the same date from Mitch Maczko were not the funds of the purported donor"; "[t]hat corporate funds received in the office of the Secretary of State of Illinois which were not official funds were used to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 44lf"; and, "[t]hat corporate and personal funds in cash in excess of \$100 from contributors were received in such office and used to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 44lg."

Complainant's allegations, by its own admission, are based solely upon the testimony of Joseph Kozlowski. In addition to a written complaint, complainant submitted a videotape of Mr. Kozlowski's responses to questions apparently presented to him by agents of the complainant. 1/

The Dixon for Senate Committee is the principal campaign committee of Alan Dixon. During the time period relevant to this matter, Alan Dixon was the Secretary of State of Illinois and a 1980 senatorial candidate in the Illinois primary and general elections. Joseph Kozlowski's testimony is apparently based on his own conduct as an employee of the Secretary of State's office, as well as his association with other employees

<sup>1/</sup> The complaint included a signed statement, dated October 10, 1980, issued by Joseph Kozlowski which indicates that he agreed to the recording of the "discussion" of matters "pertaining to the Secretary of State's office."

of that office. 2/

During the course of the videotape testimony of Joseph Kozlowski, Mr. Kozlowski acknowledges that he and other employees of the Illinois Secretary of State's office granted drivers licenses to individuals or business employees who were not qualified to receive the licenses in exchange for funds, usually in the amount of \$100-\$300. 3/ According to Mr. Kozlowski's testimony, the money was used to effect contributions through the purchase of tickets to various fundraising events sponsored by the Dixon for Senate Committee. The funds received for licenses, it appears, were accepted in the form of both cash and personal checks; cash was accepted from corporations, and individuals tendered personal checks. 4/ In those instances where he received cash, Mr. Kozlowski stated that he would then ask a friend to write him a check in exchange for the cash. While Mr. Kozlowski did not clarify whether the checks involved in the various transactions were made payable to him or to the Dixon for Senate Committee, it appears that the checks were made payable to the Dixon for Senate Committee. This assumption is based on the documentation submitted with the complaint. Presumably, Mr. Kozlowski gave tickets to Dixon for Senate fundraiser events to those who gave him checks.

The complaint included a copy of two checks in the amount of \$200 each, written on the joint account of Joseph and Marjorie Kozlowski. The checks are dated August 24 and September 12, 1979, are made payable to the Dixon for Senate Committee, and are written by

<sup>2/</sup> Although Mr. Kozlowski states that he was employed by the Office of Secretary of State, the dates of his employment were not disclosed. Respondent, the Dixon for Senate Committee, has informed this office that Mr. Kozlowski has been on at least four leaves of absence since June 1, 1979, from his employment with the Secretary of State's Office.

<sup>3/</sup> Mr. Kozlowski stated that he engaged in this activity, not because he was in any way pressured or forced to, but because he felt that if he did not sell tickets he would not receive any raises or "fringe benefits." He also stated that although some supervisors who accepted bribes put the bribe money in their "own pockets," he did not want "to go that route."

<sup>4/</sup> Mr. Kozlowski reasoned that since corporate money was prohibited, he could accept only cash from corporations who paid to have their employees receive drivers licenses.

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Marjorie Kozlowski. 5/ That these two checks and the statement of an individual identified in the complaint only as "Individual #1" (see page 3 of attachment 1) relate to the same transaction seems likely. Individual # 1 is quoted as saying the following:

Well, my husband came home with tickets and with cash he had for the tickets and I took the cash, deposited it in the bank, and wrote him a check on two different occasions as you see, August XX, and September XX, 1979.

Furthermore, "Individual # 2," who may be Mitch Maczko, the other individual named in the complaint, is quoted as saying:

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In August of '79, Mr. X approached me and asked me as a favor to write a check for the Dixon for Senate campaign for the amount of \$100, which I did, and at the same time, he gave me \$100 in cash. I understand this information will be given to the proper authorities and I'm in full understanding of this. 6/

The testimony of Joseph Kozlowski states that Alan Dixon "had five tickets" or "wanted five contributions" in the last five years of his administration. While Mr. Kozlowski's statement is at the least ambiguous, he seems to imply that he sold tickets, in the manner previously described, to five separate fundraising events for Alan Dixon in the previous five years. As Alan Dixon has been a senatorial candidate since only April 27, 1979, it is unclear as to whether Mr. Kozlowski's accusations pertain to fundraisers benefitting Mr. Dixon's senatorial race or his state race for the Office of Secretary of State. However, the statements of "Individuals l and 2" indicate that at least some of the allegations pertain to Mr. Dixon's Senate race.

<sup>5/</sup> The October 10, 1979, quarterly report of the Dixon for Senate Committee reported the receipt of two \$200 contributions from Marjorie Kozlowski, one on September 20, 1979, and the other on October 20, 1979.

<sup>6/</sup> The complaint alleges that Mitch Maczko permitted his name to be used to make contributions in the name of another to the Dixon for Senate Committee during August 1979. Although reports filed by the Dixon for Senate Committee do not report the receipt of any contributions from Mitch Maczko, the committee, at that time, was required to itemize only the contributions it had received in excess of \$100. If Mr. Maczko contributed \$100 to the Dixon for Senate Committee his name would not have been required to be itemized.

Joseph Kozlowski testifies that, in his opinion, Alan Dixon was aware that tickets were sold in exchange for drivers licenses; his opinion, however, appears to be based solely on the logic that because there was a "volume" of tickets sold, Mr. Dixon was aware of the manner in which they were marketed. The complainant, however, has not provided any information which documents or supports Mr. Kozlowski's contention that Alan Dixon or other persons working for the Dixon for Senate Committee were aware of, or condoned, the alleged activities. In answer to the complaint the Dixon for Senate Committee denies that it "authorized, condoned, or had knowledge of any of the acts alleged in the complaint." The committee further "denies that it had any knowledge of the matters set forth in the attached 'testimony' prior to the time such matters were alleged by the Republican candidate for the United States Senate from the State of Illinois." Thus, the committee's response maintains that the complaint should be dismissed because it fails "to allege that Respondent 'knowingly' committed any of the alleged acts, such allegations being a prerequisite to a charge of violation of the sections cited." The Dixon for Senate Committee maintains that since "the 'testimony' upon which Complainant relies constitutes unsworn hearsay," the testimony should be striken and not considered by the Commission. In support of this position, and as information pertinent to this matter, the committee's response asserts the following: The individual who is identified in Paragraph 5 [Joseph Kozlowski] is an employee of the Illinois Secretary of State's Office who has been on at least four leaves of absence since June 1, 1979 and whose erratic, belligerent, obnoxious and profane behavior while on the job casts extreme doubt on his veracity; that Complainant knew or should have know of the unreliability of its "witness" since the "testimony" was obtained within 48 hours of the "witness" being severely reprimanded by his supervisors for his last episode of bizarre and irrational actions while on the job. In reply to the allegation that "massive fundraising by the respondent has been made through employees of the Secretary of State office of Illinois and it is probable that much of it is similarly tainted as the funds here alleged," the Dixon for Senate committee has stated that the allegation "should be striken for the reason that it consists solely of conclusions of the Complainant and sets forth no facts upon which said conclusions are premised." Moreover, the committee states that a complete audit of

the committee's books demonstrated that its "books, reports, and records, whether internal or publicly filed, are fully accurate and in total compliance with all appropriate statutory and regulatory requirements." Finally, the committee maintains that it "returned each and every contribution which Respondent felt did not or might not have complied with the requirements of statute or regulation, such total amount to date

(October 30, 1980) being \$44,606.00.

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Section 441f of <u>Title 2</u> prohibits any person from making a contribution in the name of another or knowingly permitting his name to be used to effect such a contribution. In addition, § 441f prohibits any person from knowingly accepting a contribution made by one person in the name of another person. Under 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a) it is unlawful for a political committee to knowingly accept or receive contributions from corporations. Pursuant to 2 U.S.C. § 441g no person may make contributions of currency which, in the aggregate, exceed \$100 with respect to any election to federal office.

The evidence available indicates that Mr. Kozlowski may have used cash received to give to friends in exchange for checks payable to the Dixon for Senate Committee thereby making contributions in the names of others. Ms. Kozlowski and Mitch Maczko appear to have permitted their names to be used to effect contributions by Mr. Kozlowski. Only by further investigation will we be able to accurately discern the facts and be able to properly judge Mr. Kozlowski's credibility.

As to the Dixon for Senate Committee, it appears that at least contributions in the name of another were accepted. While there is nothing more than Mr. Kozlowski's testimony to substantiate the allegation, it appears possible that some corporations may have given cash to Mr. Kozlowski with the understanding that the cash would then be used to effect contributions to the Dixon for Senate campaign. 7/ The Dixon for Senate Committee would have thereby accepted corporate funds given in connection with a federal election.

<sup>7/</sup> At this point we have no indication of which corporations, if any, may have made such cash contributions.

The response of the Dixon for Senate Committee asserts that it had no knowledge of the activities alleged in the complaint prior to the time such matters were alleged by the Republican candidate for the United States Senate from the State of Illinois. Thus, the committee's response does not deny that the alleged acts occurred, but rather argues that it can not be held culpable under the "knowing" standard of \$\$ 441f and 441b(a).

As it appears that Joseph Kozlowski sold tickets to fundraisers conducted by the Dixon for Senate Committee, Mr. Kozlowski could be viewed as an agent of the Dixon for Senate Committee. As an agent of the committee, Mr. Kozlowski's actions could conceivably commit the Dixon for Senate Committee to liability under the "knowing" standard of \$\$ 441f and 441b(a). Moreover, further investigation might reveal that some of the officials or other agents of the Dixon for Senate Committee were aware of Mr. Kozlowski's acts.

Because some of the money given to Joseph Kozlowski was in the form of cash, there may have been violations of the cash contribution prohibitions. While the making of cash contributions in excess of \$100 is prohibited under \$ 441g, the acceptance of such contributions is addressed only in the criminal penalties section of the statute, 2 U.S.C. \$ 437g(d). Commission regulations, however, at 11 C.F.R. \$ 110.4(c)(2) require that a committee receiving such funds shall promptly return any amount over \$100 to the contributor. Although it appears that cash did not ultimately reach the Dixon for Senate Committee's account, Mr. Kozlowski apparently accepted cash and may have committed the committee to liability. Therefore, in the General Counsel's view, the Dixon for Senate Committee may have violated 11 C.F.R. \$ 110.4(c)(2), as well.

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In view of the foregoing, the General Counsel recommends that the Commission find reason to believe Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko violated 2 U.S.C. § 441f, and reason to believe the Dixon for Senate Committee violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441b(a) and 441f, and 11 C.F.R. § 110.4(c)(2). It is also recommended, in view of certain respondents failure to respond to the complaint, that the Commission order Joseph Kozlowski, Marjorie Kozlowski, and Mitch Maczko to answer questions in this matter. As the Dixon for Senate Committee has voluntarily complied in this matter to date, it is the General Counsel's view that an order is not necessary at this time and that a letter requesting information will suffice.

### COMPLAINT

Lawrence C. McCarthy, Communications Director of the National Republican Senatorial Committee being duly sworn complains of the Dixon for Senate Committee, the principal campaign committee of Allan Dixon, Democratic Candidate for United States Senator from Illinois in the 1980 election as follows:

- I. That ticket sales to raise funds for the respondent committee have been made in violation of 2 U.S.C. §441f in that funds which were shown as contributions from Joseph R. Kozlowski and Marjorie A. Kozlowski on August 24, 1979, and similar contributions of approximately the same date from Mitch Maczko were not the funds of the purported donor.
- II. That corporate funds received in the office of the Secretary of State of Illinois which were not official funds were used to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in violation of 2 U.S.C. §441f.
- III. That corporate and personal funds in cash in excess of \$100 from contributors were received in such office and used to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in violation of 2 U.S.C. \$441g.
- IV. That your complainant is informed and believes
  that such illegal procedures have been repeated in many other
  offices of the Secretary of State of Illinois and that such funds

have been knowingly, illegally and willfully diverted to the Dixon for Senate Campaign.

- V. That complainants information is based upon the video tape testimony of Joseph Kozlowski of Mr. Prospect, Illinois, a copy of which is transmitted herewith along with copies of the two checks involved in this matter.\*
- VI. Since massive fund raising by the respondent has been made through employees of the Secretary of State office of Illinois and it is probable that much of it is similarly tainted as the funds here alleged, complainant requests that this Commission in the alternative:
  - a. Make immediate reference to the Attorney General of the United States under 2 U.S.C. \$437g(a)(5)(c).
  - b. If the first alternative is not followed that this Commission enjoin the spending by respondent of funds which may have been raised in this improper manner.

## STATEMENT OF DIXON EMPLOYEE, PARTIAL VIDEO EXCERPT.

"I sell 'em to a person that needs a license. I, either if they don't have personal check, I'll take cash. I receive the cash and in return I go to a friend of mine and I'll go ahead and accept his check and give him cash in return. Corporate checks are not accepted. So, I go to a corporate that I do favors for his employees, the same as the rest of the Supervisors do, for the corporates that they have—we all have different types of friends at various different corporations—therefore, I cannot accept a corporate check, so I say would you mind giving me \$200 in cash instead of this corporate check, because it's it's not acceptable. So, he says: 'sure there's no problem.' I get a \$200 check and I take the cash, and I in return, I go to a friend of mine and he'll give me a personal check which he'll get a thank you note from Mr. Dixon that he donated to his campaign.

Well, he'll say to me 'geesh, my brother's having a hard time--is there any way that he can pass this test? Can you help me?' I say, well listen, how can you help me? And, I say, I'm stuck with so many tickets. And, I say I don't expect to swallow these tickets; I don't expect to eat these tickets. So he says, 'oh, there is no problem.' He says, 'you help my dad, you help my brother out, my sister, whatever, fine I'll be glad to accept the ticket.' And, I'll take care of that person, which every other supervisor does. They all do it. Otherwise, nobody would be able to sell any tickets."

### CORROBORATING TESTIMONY, TAKEN FROM AUDIO TAPE

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- Individual #1. "Well, my husband came home with tickets and with cash he had for the tickets and I took the cash, deposited it in the bank, and wrote him a check on two different occasions as you see, August XX, and September XX, 1979."
- Individual #2. "In August of '79, Mr. X approached me and asked me as a favor to write a check for the Dixon for Senate campaign to the amount of \$100, which I did, and at the same time, he gave me \$100 in cash. I understand this information will be given to the proper authorities and I'm in full understanding of this."

### COMPLAINT

Lawrence C. McCarthy, Communications Director of the National Republican Senatorial Committee being duly sworn complains of the Dixon for Senate Committee, the principal campaign committee of Allan Dixon, Democratic Candidate for United States Senator from Illinois in the 1980 election as follows:

- I. That ticket sales to raise funds for the respondent committee have been made in violation of 2 U.S.C. §44lf in that funds which were shown as contributions from Joseph R. Kozlowski and Marjorie A. Kozlowski on August 24, 1979, and similar contributions of approximately the same date from Mitch Maczko were not the funds of the purported donor.
- II. That corporate funds received in the office of the Secretary of State of Illinois which were not official funds were used to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in violation of 2 U.S.C. §441f.
- of \$100 from contributors were received in such office and used to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee in violation of 2 U.S.C. §441g.
- IV. That your complainant is informed and believes that such illegal procedures have been repeated in many other offices of the Secretary of State of Illinois and that such funds

have been knowingly, illegally and willfully diverted to the Dixon for Senate Campaign.

V. That complainants information is based upon the video tape testimony of Joseph Kozlowski of Mr. Prospect, Illinois, a copy of which is transmitted herewith along with copies of the two checks involved in this matter.\*

VI. Since massive fund raising by the respondent has been made through employees of the Secretary of State office of Illinois and it is probable that much of it is similarly tainted as the funds here alleged, complainant requests that this Commission in the alternative:

- a. Make immediate reference to the Attorney General of the United States under 2 U.S.C. \$437g(a)(5)(c).
- b. If the first alternative is not followed that this Commission enjoin the spending by respondent of funds which may have been raised in this improper manner.

### STATEMENT OF DIXON EMPLOYEE, PARTIAL VIDEO EXCERPT.

"Issell 'em to a person that needs a license. I, caither if they don't have personal check, I'll take cash. I receive the cash and in return I go to a friend of mine and I'll go ahead and accept his check and give him cash in return. Corporate checks are not accepted. So, I go to a corporate that I do favors for his cemployees, the same as the rest of the Supervisors do, for the corporates that they have—we all have different types of friends at various different corporations—therefore, I cannot accept a corporate check, so I say would you mind giving me \$200 in cash instead of this corporate check, because it's it's not acceptable. So, he says: 'sure there's no problem.' I get a \$200 check and I take the cash, and I in return, I go to a friend of mine and he'll give me a personal check which he'll get a thank you note from Mr. Dixon that he donated to his campaign.

Well, he'll say to me 'geesh, my brother's having a hard time--is there any way that he can pass this test? Can you help me?' I say, well listen, how can you help me? And, I say, I'm stuck with so many tickets. And, I say I don't expect to swallow these tickets; I don't expect to eat these tickets. So he says, 'oh, there is no problem.' He says, 'you help my dad, you help my brother out, my sister, whatever, fine I'll be glad to accept the ticket.' And, I'll take care of that person, which every other supervisor does. They all do it. Otherwise, nobody would be able to sell any tickets."

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- Individual #1. "Well, my husband came home with tickets and with cash he had for the tickets and I took the cash, deposited it in the bank, and wrote him a check on two different occasions as you see, August XX, and September XX, 1979."



# MR. THOMAS: Would you swear the witness, please? (Witness sworn.)

JOSEPH P. MC MAHON,

called as a witness by the Federal Election Commission herein, having been by me, the said Cynthia Dykins as Notary
Public aforesaid first duly sworn, was examined upon oral
interrogatories and he did thereupon depose and testify
as follows:

### DIRECT EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Would you state your name, please?
- A Joseph P. Mc Mahon.
- Q Mr. Mc Mahon, are you represented by counsel at this deposition?
  - A Yes, I am, sir.

MR. THOMAS: Counsel, would you like to make an appearance?

MR. ISRAEL: Yes, Mr. Jay Myerson and Fred Israel for the deponent, from the firm of Israel & Raley, 1015
18th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036, and for the record the phone is 202 296-1580.

MR. THOMAS: As a preliminary matter, this morning you have provided me with some documents pursuant to an order that the Commission issued, and I would like,

if possible, for you, Mr. Israel, to clarify, to the extent you can, what these documents represent.

MR. ISRAEL: The Dixon for Senate Committee had a form, which provided information to solicitors on what was required of them and what they might and might not do under the Federal statutes governing the raising of money for Federal election. Then each person who received it was then required to sign that he had read and agreed to comply with them, and we have a number of such signed statements to provide you today for the record, and I will give these to you.

They come in two packages. We are not sure as to the dates that any of these were executed because there is no date on it. We think that the first package I am going to give you, to the best of our knowledge and belief, is for the third and fourth, and that the second package I am going to give you is for the first or second. We are just not sure when they might have been received.

As Charles Smith stated during his deposition, the information contained on each of those forms was also provided verbally to everyone at the start of the solicitation process for the first fund raising.

Then the next thing we have is a list of names of contributors that were supplied by Mr. Guzlas

and which Mr. Guzlas informs us were solicitations in which he was personally involved.

The Committee gave us that, excuse me. We have the list and then we have the checks.

I also have for you this morning copies of the contributor cards concerning contricutions of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph P. Kozlowski. For the record, Mrs. Kozlowski's name is shown here as Marjorie A. Kozlowski, K-o-z-l-o-w-s-k-i. We will provide those to you.

The one that I have given you from Mr.

Kozlowski, the solicitation card, has the reverse side

of the card provided on the second page. In connection with

Mrs. Kozlowski, we have only provided you with the first

side of the card, but we state for the record that the cards

were identical and that the second side is as shown with

Mr. Kozlowski's subscription for the fund raising.

MR. THOMAS: Is there any particular reason why the second side of the contributor card for Marjorie Kozlowski was not provided? Do you know that?

MR. ISRAEL: I don't think so. I just think because they are the same, and we are stating for the record that those are the same. There was no --

MR. THOMAS: No other notations on them --

MR. ISRAEL: No, no.

MR. THOMAS: -- other than the exact same information that appears on Joseph Kozlowski's contributor card reverse side?

MR. ISRAEL: Oh, I am sorry; excuse me. I am sorry.

Let's go off the record.

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. ISRAEL: Let me correct the record. The form of the reverse side is the same for both cards. Office of the Secretary of State in the Cook County area.

Q Have you at any time worked for the Dixon for Senate Committee?

A Yes, sir, I was a volunteer for the Dixon for Senate Committee.

- Q During what period of time?
- A From the time he was elected until --

MR. ISRAEL: Excuse me. The question was what were the dates or the approximate dates when you were a volunteer for the Dixon for Senate Committee?

BY THE WITNESS:

A The approximate dates were from the time that Mr. Dixon was elected, or announced his candidacy for the United States Senate, I was a volunteer.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Do you recall what that date was approximately when he announced his candidacy?

A At the inception of his tenure.

Oh, announced his candidacy for the -- I could not recall the exact date when he announced his candidacy for the United States Senate.

Q You have indicated you were a volunteer. Then
I take it you were not a paid staff member at any time for
the Dixon for Senate Committee?

- A No, no, I was not.
- Q Who asked you to work for the Dixon for Senate Committee?
  - A I just took it upon myself to volunteer.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 2 for identification, 4/16/81.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I show the witness what has been marked as Exhibit 2.

Would you now describe what Exhibit 2 represents, please?

A These are people who have volunteered to form committees to assist Alan in his campaign, Mr. Dixon in his campaign. In various fund raising events they participated also. This is they.

Q Did you compose this list yourself?

A Not necessarily in its entirety, no. I know all these people. They had willingly volunteered on previous occasions when he ran for Treasurer and things of that nature.

MR. THOMAS: Counsel, can you clarify how this list was composed? Do you know?

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. ISRAEL: Let's state for the record. Exhibit 2 was prepared in connection with Mr. Mc Mahon's preparation for his deposition here today. It is dates of the fund raisers for the Dixon for Senate Committee, that is, the fund raisers held in the City of Chicago, with a list as to the best of his memory of the people named here who were on the Committee itself.

MR. THOMAS: By that, do you mean the so-called official committee for the particular fund raisers involved?

MR. ISRAEL: That is correct. This is not intended to be a list of limitations as to people who solicited subscriptions for ticket sales but rather the committee itself.

THE WITNESS: That is correct.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

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Q With regard to this list that you provided,
Exhibit 2, can you state what your role was in forming
any of these particular official committee groups that are
listed here?

A Actually these gentlemen here are all personal friends of mine and personal friends of Mr. Dixon's, and they readily volunteered. There were many others on the Committee, but these were the headliners, so to speak, of the Committee.

It was formed for the purpose of helping
Alan Dixon raise enough funds to make sure he was elected
to the United States Senate.

- Q Do you recall, though, did you call these people and ask them, for example, to serve in this capacity, or did these individuals contact you?
  - A I did, yes.
  - Q You did call them?
  - A And some contacted me on the street.

So there was a call involved. I would call.

They are personal friends. I would see them many times a
week or in a couple of weeks' period, and in chatting
they said they would like to serve on the Committee.

Consequently their names were put on here and they did serve.

Q Now also just to clarify, were these individuals listed here all individuals that you requested to assist or to volunteer as opposed to individuals that, say, Charles Smith requested to assist on the Committee, or do

A This is a list of specific people who I talked to, and they are golfing partners and they are great friends of mine. They were very happy to serve to help Alan.

MR. THOMAS: Perhaps at this time we should also clarify that counsel has provided me with an additional document, which I will have the reporter mark as Exhibit 3.

MR. ISRAEL: That may very well be cumulative, given Exhibit 2, because the dates are the same. You can do what you like.

MR. THOMAS: Let's just identify it and clarify it.

THE WITNESS: It is far more extensive than that, the Committee, but I don't remember ....

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 3 for identification 4/16/81.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

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Q I am now showing Exhibit 3 to the witness and counsel.

Just for identification, can you identify what Exhibit 3 is?

A Exhibit 3 lists the dates of fund raisers for the Chicago Dixon for Senate Committee. It also stipulates

the dates of the affairs as of September 26 of 1979, which was held in the Bismarck Hotel, the March 11th fund raiser, March 11 of 1980, which was also held in the Bismarck Hotel, the August 17 of 1980 fund raiser, which was held at the Mc Cormick Inn, September 23 of 1980 fund raiser which was held in the Bismarck Hotel.

Q Just to clarify again for the record, those are, I take it, the same references that appear on what has been marked as Exhibit 2; in other words, those identify the same fund raising events, is that correct?

A Yes, that is correct.

Q With regard to each of those four fund raisers, would you describe what various activities you undertook to assist with those fund raisers?

A Well, of course I was anxious to make the affair as successful as possible. My personal friends I asked to participate in the purchase of tickets, and they very willingly did so.

I arranged for the band and the social activity for the evening.

Q Charles Smith has told us that he recalls that there was a meeting that you asked him to attend, where several other employees of the Secretary of State's office attended. As I understand it, this was before the first

fund raiser, and there was a discussion of trying to get volunteers to help make ticket sales.

Do you recall any such meeting?

- A I do, but I don't recall the date.
- Q Would you identify all those individuals that you can recall who attended that meeting?

A I am trying to, but as you see here, we have had quite a few of them. So I can't say which people were there at one specific meeting or had been at another meeting. I don't know which.

Is there one specific meeting you are speaking of?

Q To my understanding, there was one initial meeting where yourself and Charles Smith and apparently Robert Guzlas --

MR. ISRAEL: Let's go off for a moment.

MR. THOMAS: Yes.

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q To the extent you can recall one or more meetings, clarify to the extent you can what each of those

meetings was about and who attended each of those meetings, if you can clarify to that extent. If you can't clarify, go ahead -- that's fine -- and state that on the record.

A Well, I really can't clarify because we had meetings of lawyers. We had meetings of businessmen, and it was all related to one specific affair.

Then they would come back and volunteer again to help us again at the next affair and things of that nature.

Q But I was limiting it to meetings that you had where several employees of the Secretary of State's office were in attendance.

Are you stating that there were several meetings at which several employees of the Secretary of State's office were in attendance?

A No. I am indicating there were several meetings of business people and other people interested in his campaign.

Q I am interested in the meetings then of the employees of the Secretary of State's office where the Dixon for Senate Committee fund raising was discussed. Do you recall any of those?

A Yes. I don't recall specifically the dates of those. I do recall that the volunteers from the Secre-

tary of State's office did attend meetings of a meeting.

I know specifically of one, but they may have been present at other meetings, too.

For instance, if there was a meeting of businessmen, maybe they dropped in. Normally we held these in the Bismarck Hotel, which was kind of a place where employees go, too, and they may have popped in.

I don't know, but the only employees that were asked to sell tickets were those who had volunteered to help us.

- Q Before we get too far, though, you have indicated you recall one meeting where several employees --
  - A I do.
  - Q -- of the Secretary of State's office met.
  - A Yes.
- Q Do you recall what the substance of that meeting was?
- A A fund raiser, and they in turn volunteered to be volunteers.
  - Q Do you recall who set up that meeting?
  - A I believe Charlie did, Mr. Smith.
  - Q Did you ask Charlie to set up the meeting?
  - A Yes, I probably did. I could have.

I could have.

- Q You don't know for sure?
- A No, I don't know for sure.
- Q Were you involved in coordinating each of the four fund raisers which are listed in Exhibits 2 and 3?
  - A I participated, yes.
- Q Was Charles Smith also participating in each of those fund raisers, to your knowledge?
- A I don't know specifically if he did, but I would say that generally Charlie would always try to participate. He was a participator.
- Q I am trying to get some feel for who was running the show.
  - A What show?
  - Q For each of those four fund raisers.

Was there any change in who was the primary mover?

MR. ISRAEL: Is the form of your question does he know who the chairman of the committee was who was a full time staff person; is that it?

MR. THOMAS: Maybe those kinds of questions would be helpful to get us the reference.

#### BY THE WITNESS:

A Like, for instance, Kevin Gillogly, the committee for the 26th of September 1979 and March 11 of 1980.

Any of these committee members could have chaired it, and each one spoke.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q At the particular event?

A Yes, those particular events, and also on August 17 of 1980 it was chaired by Emmet O'Neill. I think at that time we did have some employees who had volunteered to serve on the committee.

- Q The August 17, 1980 fund raiser?
- A Yes.
- Q Do you recall specifically which employees?
- A No, I don't recall specifically which employees, but I am sure Mr. O'Neill would; but I don't know.
- Q Are you then stating that those individuals who were the chairmen of those particular fund raisers were the ones that were the primary movers, the ones primarily responsible for planning the activities?
  - A Yes, that is right.
  - Q You yourself were not?
- A Oh, the only thing I would plan for those occasions, if necessary, I would get a band or, you know, I would tell Charlie to.

Charlie did most all of the legwork on all these things, anything that was to fill it in and make it

Q Can you describe how tickets to each of these fund raisers were sold?

MR. ISRAEL: I am sorry. Would you read that back?

BY MR. THOMAS:

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Q Can you describe how tickets to each of these fund raisers were sold?

A No, I can't because I wasn't on scene to watch how they were sold.

Q Did you yourself participate in the sale of any tickets?

A Did I sell any myself?

Sure, to my friends, definitely.

You know, tickets were sold by they were given out upon the return of a solicitation card, which clearly expressed the prohibitions.

O Who was responsible for setting up the system of contributor cards and actual production of the tickets for each of these fund raisers?

A Charlie Smith. Charlie had the printer, you know, knew a printer and et cetera, and it was checked over by lawyers, you know, to make sure it was properly done.

(There was a brief interruption,

after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. THOMAS: All right, let's go back.

I would like, just also to clarify what we are talking about here, to have the reporter mark this as Exhibit 4.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 4 for identification, 4/16/81.)

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

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Q I am showing Exhibit 4 to the witness and counsel. It is a two-page document.

MR. ISRAEL: Front and back.

THE WITNESS: Who is that (indicating)?

We don't know who -

MR. MYERSON: Was this the one we gave you at the last deposition?

MR. THOMAS: Yes.

MR. ISRAEL: This is just for illustrative purposes.

MR. THOMAS: This is for illustrative purposes.

THE WITNESS: Oh, I see.

MR. ISRAEL: Not for specific knowledge or recollection.

MR. THOMAS: This is a document that was provided to the Commission at the deposition of Charles Smith, and I just wanted to have Mr. Mc Mahon, if he could, see if he can identify that and explain whether he had received any contributor cards.

MR. ISRAEL: Form of the question: You are not asking him about this specific one?

MR. THOMAS: That is correct.

MR. ISRAEL: But a question as to the form of what he is looking at, not the content.

THE WITNESS: The form, yes, I understand.

Nothing on the other side?

### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q As I understand it, the first page represents one side of the card. The second page of the exhibit represents the reverse side of that. It is a Xerox.

A I recognize that as one of the solicitation cards: is that it?

Q And you received cards such as these, is that correct?

A I did?

Q Did you receive any such cards so that you could then solicit ticket sales?

A Oh, would I have given to people who I was

Q Yes.

A Yes.

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Q Do you recall where you got the cards that you received?

A Headquarters.

Q Do you recall any specific individual who was in charge of handing those out?

A Well, now which election are you talking about? We had other, you know -- why, for instance, in the last few elections, it would be from our campaign headquarters, which Emmet O'Neill was in charge of.

Q You say in the last few elections, the last few --

A The last election when he was running for Senate, and I think the one prior to that, too.

Q Running for the Secretary of State's office, is that what you mean, referring to other elections?

A Yes.

MR. ISRAEL: For the record, you know, there were two elections for Dixon.

MR. THOMAS: Yes.

MR. ISRAEL: Two Federal elections, one the primary and the other the general.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Do you recall if you received any of those contributor card forms as appear in Exhibit 4--

A I would not have received it. They would have received it at headquarters, wherever it was directed to be mailed back to or given to.

I did not receive these personally because I wasn't that intricately involved, but that was the procedure, to fill out these cards.

MR. ISRAEL: Excuse me; let me clarify.

He is asking you two questions, not whether you received back filled out cards but whether you received blank solicitation cards that you could give to others who wanted to contribute to the campaign.

#### BY THE WITNESS:

A Oh, if I needed them for that purpose, I did.

I don't recall how often I would need one, but I didn't have just a packet of those, no, I did not, not at my disposal. Maybe Charlie had them. I didn't have them.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q So for the four fund raisers we are talking about, for any of those, you don't recall specifically who maintained those blank contributor cards to be dis-

## pensed?

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A No, I don't recall.

I don't recall.

- Q Do you recall ever receiving any of these contributor card forms and then giving them to any other individual so that they could use them to solicit ticket sales?
  - A You mean just the form?
  - Q Yes, the blank forms.
  - A I may or may not have.
- Q You don't recall any specific individual that you may have --
  - A No, I don't. I don't, sir.

I know my own, you know. I filled out my own card.

- Q Do you know if it was acceptable for someone who was given these contributor card forms to in turn give them to other individuals so that those other individuals could solicit contributions with them?
  - A Was it acceptable?
  - Q Yes.
- A Whether or not I as an individual received a card and gave it to somebody else?
  - Q Yes.

MR. ISRAEL: Are you asking him specific -- BY MR. THOMAS:

Q So that they could use the blank cards to solicit contributions.

A A blank card?

MR. ISRAEL: Are you asking him a speculative question or a knowledge question?

MR. THOMAS: A knowledge question.

MR. ISRAEL: Let me say, do you know -- BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Is that right, do you know if it was acceptable?

Was it acceptable -- was there any prohibition against any individual who received these blank contributor cards giving them to someone else so that someone else could use them to solicit contributions with?

- A You mean expressed prohibition?
- O Yes.

A No, I think it was implied, but I don't know if it was expressed.

Q Could you explain what your understanding of the implied prohibition was?

A Well, I would think that a person, if he doesn't know there was a prohibition, maybe he did, but

I don't know really if anybody ever did, not to my knowledge.

MR. ISRAEL: Do you want to take a break?

MR. MYERSON: Yes, just for a couple of minutes.

(There was a brief recess, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q What role, if any, did an individual named

  Bob Guzlas have in the fund raising activities of the Dixon

  for Senate Committee?
  - A He was a volunteer.
  - Q Do you know if he sold tickets?
  - A I would imagine so, sure.
- Q How about an individual named Carl Catuara, what was his role, if any?
  - A I know he was a volunteer.
  - Q Did he sell any tickets for the fund raisers?
  - A I am sure.
- Q Do you know if either Mr. Guzlas or Mr. Catuara gave contributor card forms to any other individuals so that those individuals could sell tickets?
  - A They could have.
  - Q You don't know of your own knowledge, though?

A Well, no, I would not know, but I would imagine they did.

Q What was the role, if any, of an individual named Louis Mitchell in the Dixon for Senate Committee?

A The same as the other two gentlemen you mentioned.

Q To your knowledge, did he sell any tickets for fund raisers for the Committee?

A I would say yes.

Q How about an individual named Mr. Eugene Sullivan?

A I would say yes.

Q Yes, he did sell tickets?

A I would say yes, to the best of my knowledge.

Q Did you yourself authorize those four individuals

I have identified to sell any tickets?

A Charlie would be the person who would handle most of those matters. If they had volunteered, he would know that they were volunteers. I am sure that he would authorize them to sell them.

Q As opposed to you?

A Yes, because I was not as directly involved because my position was to administer the Office of the Secretary of State.

So as a volunteer, I relegated Charlie some responsibility such as that.

I don't know specifically if this is the incident.

Q Were any records kept of which individuals were given these contributor card forms?

A I don't know. I imagine there were, but you would have to ask Charlie.

Q Did you know an individual named Joseph Kozlowski?

A I know the name. I do not know the individual.

To my knowledge, I have never known him. I have never

been casually introduced to him or anything.

I may have met him, maybe, for instance, at a function we may have had and, as you walk around shaking hands with everybody, I may have met him that way; but I have no recollection of ever having met him and I doubt if I can recognize him if I saw him.

- Q Do you know if Joseph Kozlowski ever received any contributor cards so that he could solicit contributions?
  - A Specifically no, I do not know.
  - Q Did you yourself ever give him any?
- A No, I wouldn't recognize -- no, I think I stated that.

- Q To your knowledge, did Mr. Guzlas or Mr. Catuara or Mr. Mitchell ever give any contributor cards to Mr. Kozlowski so that he could solicit ticket sales?
  - A Not to my knowledge, sir.
- Q Have you ever asked them if they gave him any contributor cards?
  - A No, I have not.
- Q Do you know if an individual named Gene Sullivan ever gave any contributor cards to Mr. Kozlowski to sell?
  - A I have no knowledge of him doing that.
- Q To your knowledge, did Mr. Kozlowski ever ask to assist in any way with any of the fund raising activities of the Dixon Committee?
  - A No, to my knowledge, no.
- O Did anyone ever tell you that they may have given contributor cards to Mr. Kozlowski, but, for example, they don't recall?
  - A Me directly, no, sir; I never inquired.
- Q Do you know if Mr. Kozlowski ever actually received any contribution checks on behalf of the Dixon Committee?
  - A No, sir, I have no knowledge.
- Q Has anyone ever told you that they were actually given contribution checks for the Dixon Committee by Joseph

#### Kozlowski?

- A I think I got your question, but you better repeat it, please.
- Q Has anyone ever told you that they received contribution checks for the Dixon Committee from Joseph Kozlowski?
  - A No, no one has told me that. I never inquired.
- Q Were you ever informed by anyone that Joseph Kozlowski was received payoffs for granting driver's licenses?
  - A No, sir.
- Q Were you ever informed that Joseph Kozlowski was using any payoff monies he received to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee?
  - A No, sir.
- Q Were you ever informed by anyone that Mr. Guzlas or Mr. Mitchell or Mr. Catuara were receiving payoffs for granting driver's licenses?
  - A No, or they wouldn't have been there.
- Q Were you ever informed that Mr. Guzlas, Mr. Mitchell or Mr. Catuara were using any payoff monies they had received in granting driver's licenses to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee?
  - A No, sir, I was not, never have been.

Q When, if ever, did you first become aware of allegations that Joseph Kozlowski had received payoff monies for granting driver's licenses?

A The first I heard of it is when I think everybody else did. It was on the tube or something or radio or something.

I didn't see that program, but then I heard about that, about his program where I guess they showed him doing things illegal or something, or he made a statement.

I really don't know what the circumstances are. I know he is alleged to be a bad guy, you know, not an honorable man.

Q Do you remember who told you about this television appearance or whatever?

A No, general talk in the office, you know; that's all.

Q Do you remember ever --

A I don't know specifically who would have mentioned it to me, no.

Q Did you ever discuss it with Charles Smith?

MR. ISRAEL: Are you talking after the television, after the public disclosures that were made in
the newspaper?

MR. THOMAS: Well, the allegations, if at all, I assume it would be after -BY THE WITNESS:

A It may have been discussed, you know, as a part of the news, news of the day, but I don't -- I think Charles would have had more of a contact with him than I would.

I am not talking about ticket-wise or anything of that nature, but he would be more attuned to that circumstance because I knew nothing about him.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Did you ask that any investigation be undertaken to find out if the allegations were true?

A Well, there were investigations with him previously. Charlie informed me that they had an investigation going on.

Q What do you recall he told you about the investigation?

A Charlie Smith had told me that from time to time he had, they thought, perpetrated indiscretions and that they had checked him out at different times.

Q Indiscretions in connection with the sale of tickets?

A No, this is just -- no. See, I would say in

general that I got, from the information that was given to me, that he was just an indiscreet man, and that's all.

Q So you are talking about perhaps employmentrelated actions of his; you are not talking about any
activities he undertook on behalf of the Dixon Committee
or in connection with the sale of tickets for the Dixon
Committee?

A No, no.

Q Those are the indiscretions that you recall having been --

A I just generally don't know much about him.

I just heard he is not a nice type of -- you know, I heard this. I don't know if it is true or untrue, that he was just not a nice guy; that's all, not the right type of person.

I don't know. I have never, to my knowledge, seen him. I may have, you know, in a crowd or something of that nature, but I don't know Mr. Kozlowski.

MR. MYERSON: Could we go off the record for a minute?

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:) MR. THOMAS: Now let's go on the record.

BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Mr. Mc Mahon, just to clarify, you made a reference to indiscretions of Joseph Kozlowski. Would you clarify what you were referring to?
  - Q Fine, thank you.

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There is one other thing I would like to get clarified. Mr. Mc Mahon, we have spoken with Charles

Smith and we have also received an interrogatory response from the Dixon for Senate Committee, and the interrogatory specifically from the Dixon for Senate Committee indicated that you authorized, using that word "authorized", several individuals to sell tickets for the Dixon for Senate Committee.

- A If they were volunteers, I certainly did.
- Q First of all, just to clarify, I would like to mark as Exhibit No. 5 this document.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 5 for identification, 4/16/81.)

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Let me clarify for the record that this list

is a list that we at the Commission have typed up. It is a list of the names that the Dixon for Senate Committee has provided to us in response to an interrogatory question as to which individuals, if any, were authorized to sell tickets by the Dixon for Senate Committee for Dixon for Senate Committee fund raisers.

Now, the response to the interrogatory provided to us indicated that you specifically had authorized these individuals to solicit ticket sales for the Committee. Now, you have indicated, I believe, in your testimony that, as I understand it, that was more within the prerogative of Charles Smith.

- A Charles Smith.
- Q I just wondered if you could, first of all--
- A I recognize all these people, you know; the names I do.
- Q First of all, could you state for the record whether in fact these individuals were authorized to sell tickets, to the best of your knowledge.
  - A You are on the record now?
  - Q Yes.
- A To the best of my knowledge, I think most of these people on this list were people who did participate in our campaign, and also they undoubtedly either purchased

tickets or may have sold them; but I couldn't say. I don't have records stating what they did or did not do.

Q So you of your own personal knowledge don't know if in fact all of these individuals were authorized to sell tickets, is that correct?

A I would say that I have no knowledge of whether or not any authorization was given to these people, but they could very easily have signed a volunteer card, which I have no knowledge of.

MR. ISRAEL: Let's clarify that. May I just, to clarify?

MR. THOMAS: Surely.

MR. ISRAEL: The first two names are yours and Charles Smith's.

THE WITNESS: Oh, yes; yes, right.

Are you saying I specifically should indicate -- well, I know I was qualified.

MR. ISRAEL: Just for the record, your name and Charlie Smith's name, let me just ask the question: There is no question in your mind that the two of you were authorized to solicit --

THE WITNESS: Yes. Now, by authorized, do you mean that we had volunteered, is that correct?

MR. ISRAEL: Yes.

THE WITNESS: That these people had volunteered?

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q By authorization, we are --

A A volunteer person, a person who said, I want to help Alan Dixon. I want to be a volunteer for Alan Dixon," that is a volunteer.

Q I am asking for someone with some authority in the campaign said, "Okay, you can sell tickets for the Committee." That is essentially the question.

MR. ISRAEL: Let's clarify it. Man X comes up and he says, "I would like to sell tickets for the Committee." That we call a volunteer.

The question is do you know if any of these people were given contribution cards by which they could go out and solicit contributions? That is his question.

THE WITNESS: Let me say this. I would say that they could or could not have been, but I would generally say that some people on here I would feel more confident in saying that they definitely were given contribution cards, but I have no firsthand knowledge of it.

They are all good men.

MR. THOMAS: I have no further questions, Mr. Mc Mahon. Thank you for your time.

Do you have any?

(There was a brief interruption, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. ISRAEL: We don't have any questions.

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

THE REPORTER: May the deposition be signed before any notary?

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MR. ISRAEL: Yes, we will take care of it.

AND FURTHER DEPONENT SAYETH NOT.



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#### JOSEPH KOZLOWSKI,

having been first duly sworn, deposeth and saith as follows:

MR. THOMAS: Before we begin this deposition, I would like to note for the record that present at this deposition is Jay Myerson, counsel for the Dixon for Senate Committee. And pursuant to our previous practice in these depositions, he wants to make a statement at the outset.

MR. MYERSON: The Dixon for Senate Committee objections to the Commission's refusal to permit it to cross-examine Mr. Kozlowski. It is our understanding that by my being present, I am not waiving the Committee's objection.

That's correct, is it not?

MR. THOMAS: That's correct.

#### DIRECT EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

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- Q Okay. Would you state your name, please.
- A Joseph Kozlowski.
- Q And Mr. Kozlowski, are you presently employed?
- A No, I'm not. I'm --
- Q When were you last employed?
- A Seven months ago.
- Q Okay. And where was that?

- A Secretary of State's Office.
- Q In what position were you in there?
- A Supervisor.
- Q Supervisor of what?
- A Drivers.
- Q Was that with any particular division, or is drivers the division?
  - A Drivers, the division.
  - Q And how long were you in that position?
  - A Approximately two or three years.
  - Q What were your duties as a supervisor in drivers?
- I'm on medication, so I -- help the clerks when they have problems on their computers. And there's certain codes to reach into Springfield which they didn't have to code, the supervisors only have a special code that they can get on, like DWI, a person can't qualify for a drivers license; therefore, I would send them down to a hearing officer.

  Or clerks that would not be able to fill out a form properly, I would help them to fill out the form or explain the ways to fill the form out.
- Q By and large, was the general function of the division that you were a supervisor in to give drivers licenses to persons, is that the over-all function?

- A No, I didn't give drivers licenses to them.
- Q Well, but --
- A I supervised. I supervised and I watched people that had problems, like with cameras, or if they had problems with computers. I'd have to call Springfield and see that the cameras were operating properly.
- Q But the division was the place where people would go to go through the procedures to get a drivers license issued to them; is that right?
  - A Right.
  - Q Okay. Did you supervise any employees?
- A Well, I supervised the clerks and the camera people and the people on the eyes that weren't qualified -- well, they were qualified, but that had a hard time, they were maybe tired. If they would take breaks, I would fill in for breaks, give vision tests, grade papers. When we had a backlog, I used to help out in any spot that was tied up.
  - Q Right. Who --
  - A Because we were understaffed.
  - Who was your supervisor?
- A My supervisor was -- well, there was six supervisors there. They had a double shift.
- Q How did that work? Who were the six supervisors then?

- A I got -- I got --
- Q There were six people who supervised you?
- A No.
- Q Or are you saying there were six supervisors who worked with you?
  - A Along with me.
- Q Okay. But did you have an immediate supervisor there?

A Upon the advice of my attorney, I respectfully decline to answer that question pursuant to privilege against self-incrimination given to me by the Fifth Amendment of the United States Constitution.

MR. MONTANA: I'm going to just state for the record that as I've indicated to Mr. Thomas in some prior discussions we have had on the telephone and today, in person, that as he knows, the matters about which he intends to inquire in substantial part are under investigation in whole or in part by the United States Attorney's office of the Northern District of Illinois, and in fact, as I understand it, Mr. Kozlowski himself, personally, is under investigation in connection with the U. S. Attorney's investigation; I also understand that certain information about Mr. Kozlowski, tapes and otherwise, were tendered to the United States Attorney's office; so that they have

a substantial amount of information about Mr. Kozlowski Which they're investigating which is related, as I say, in whole or in substantial part to matters about which you wish to inquire as disclosed in your prior interrogatories to Mr. Kozlowski.

Additionally, it could very well be that

Mr. Kozlowski's answers, in addition to the fact that

those answers may tend to incriminate him with respect to

this ongoing investigation, may tend to incriminate him

with respect to other state and, possibly, federal criminal

statutes, so that is the reason for his assertion of the

Fifth Amendment.

MR. THOMAS: Can you state for the record whether he has been subpoensed before any Grand Jury?

MR. MONTANA: He has not, without conceding that that is relevant or irrelevant to whether or not he has a right to assert the Fifth Amendment he has not been subpoensed before any Federal Grand Jury to my knowledge.

THE WITNESS: No.

MR. MONTANA: I mean, I think that's totally irrelevant to his assertion; but in any event, it is a fact that he has not been subpoensed before the Federal Grand Jury.

## MR. THOMAS: Would you swear the witness, please? (Witness sworn.)

#### ROBERT L. GUZLAS,

called as a witness by the Federal Election Commission, having been by me, the said Cynthia Dykins as Notary Public aforesaid first duly sworn, was examined upon oral interrogatories and he did thereupon depose and testify as follows:

#### DIRECT EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Would you state your name, please?
- A Robert Louis Guzlas.
- Q Do you have counsel with you today?
- A Yes, sir.

MR. JALOVEC: Richard S. Jalovec, J-a-1-o-v-e-c, 150 North Wacker Drive, Chicago.

MR. THOMAS: Also present is Mr. Jay Myerson.

Mr. Myerson would like to make a statement on the record

at this time, I believe.

MR. MYERSON: That is right. I represent the Dixon for Senate Committee, and the Dixon for Senate Committee objects to the Federal Election Commission's refusal to permit its counsel to participate in this proceeding and to cross-examine the witness.

The Committee understands and I understand that the Commission agrees that the Committee does not waive its objection by its presence at this deposition.

Is my understanding correct, that you agree that we are not waiving our objection?

MR. THOMAS: Yes, that is understood.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Mr. Guzlas, where are you presently employed?
- A At the Secretary of State's office, 188 West Randolph, Chicago.
  - Q What is your present position there?
- A Right now I am in charge of motorcycle safety for Cook County.
  - Q How long have you been in that position?
  - A One week.
  - Q What was your position before that?
  - A I was Superintendent of Facilities, Cook County.
  - Q How long were you in that position?
- A Approximately, I think, six years. I am not sure.
- Q What in general were your responsibilities as the Superintendent of Facilities?
- A I was in charge of all Secretary of State's offices in Cook County, driver's license, automobile regis-

tration, anything from the Secretary of State's office.

Q Would you briefly describe for me the structure of the Secretary of State's office and the relationship of your position as Superintendent of Facilities to that structure?

A There was the Secretary of State. We had a Deputy Secretary of State, which was Joseph Mc Mahon. We had Assistant Secretary of State, who was in charge of all Springfield operations, and I was directly under Joseph Mc Mahon, Deputy Secretary of State.

Then we had directors under that who would run each facility, and it just ran down the ladder, supervisors.

- Q Have you ever worked for the Dixon for Senate Committee?
  - A Yes.
  - Q When did you work for that Committee?
- A I believe when it was originally formed, I started.
- Q Do you recall approximately what that date was?
  - A No, I do not recall.
- Q What was your position with the Dixon for Senate Committee?

- A I just volunteered to help amy way I could with fund raising, whatever was necessary to help.
  - Q Did you have any title with the Committee?
  - A No, I did not.
  - O You were not paid at any point?
  - A No.
- Q Who asked you to work for the Dixon for Senate Committee?
- A I don't think I was asked. I think I volunteered.
  - O Do you recall who you volunteered to?
  - A Joe Mc Mahon.
  - Q Do you remember when that was?
  - A No, I do not recall.

I think it was soon after he announced that he was going to seek the position of Senator.

- Q Were you involved in any of the fund raising activities of the Dixon Committee?
  - A Yes, sir.
- Q What was the extent of your involvement in the fund raising activities in general?
  - A What do you mean by extent?
  - Q What kinds of activities did you carry out?
  - A I just worked selling tickets and stuff for his

cocktail parties.

O More specifically, do you recall the first time you ever became involved in selling tickets? Do you recall how that came about?

A I just was called in by Mr. Mc Mahon, who said we were having a fund raising and wanted to know if I could do anything to help with this.

Q Do you recall was there ever a meeting where several volunteers were brought together and --

A We had a meeting one lunch hour. We had lunch together downtown, and I don't exactly recall what happened. I have been to so many of those, you know.

We just sat down, and they said we were going to have a cocktail party on such and such a date and would anybody be interested in helping.

Q With regard to that meeting, do you recall who was present at that meeting?

A I think Joe Mc Mahon was there. There was about seven or eight directors.

Q Directors?

A Directors of the facilities.

A couple people from dealer contact.

I am sure I could find a list somewhere if you need it.

Q A list of those who attended that particular meeting?

A Yes.

Q Do you remember approximately when this meeting was? Was it before any of the actual fund raising events took place?

A It was before the fund raiser, probably usually about two months before the fund raiser.

Q When you say "the fund raiser," was there only one fund raiser that you were involved with, or do you recall --

A I think there were approximately three fund raisers. I was involved in two of them. I was not involved in the last one.

Q For both of them was your involvement essentially the same?

A Yes, sir.

Q Of selling tickets?

A Yes.

Q Did Joseph Mc Mahon ask you to sell tickets for both of those?

A Yes.

Q On separate occasions he asked you?

A I don't think he asked me. I think I volun-

teered that I would be glad to work on the Committee.

- Q With regard to that meeting you referred to, specifically do you recall if Carl Catuara was in attendance at that meeting?
  - A Yes, I believe Carl Catuara was there.
  - Q Was Lou Mitchell at that meeting?
  - A Yes, Lou Mitchell was there.
  - Q Was Eugene Sullivan at that meeting?
  - A Yes, Gene was there.
  - Q Was Joseph Kozlowski at that meeting?
  - A No.
- Q What do you recall of the specific process whereby tickets were sold for those two fund raising events that you were involved with? How did it work?
- A I talked to Joe Mc Mahon. He said we have so many tickets that we are going to sell; that we were not to force anyone to buy tickets. It is strictly a thing we do not in working hours, and he said, "Anything you can do to help with them?"

I usually took the tickets, and I distributed them to the directors. In other words, I talked to Lou Mitchell and Sullivan and so on down the line and said, "How many tickets can you sell," and I would give them whatever they requested the first time.

I said, "I will give you additional," or 
"If you can't get rid of them, just give them back to me."

Then they would send the checks back to me, 
and I would bring them down to the Committee.

Q Now let's try to clarify a little bit.

I have used the word tickets and you have used the word tickets. In light of previous testimony where we have talked to other people, it is our understanding that there were so-called contributor cards.

- A Pledge cards, yes. I think pledge cards is --
- Q Correct me if I am wrong. It is our understanding these cards were blank cards that were given to various volunteers so that they could use those in their solicitation of ticket sales.
  - A Right.
- Q And that the actual tickets were not actually given to the volunteers, is that correct?
  - A Right.
- Q Did you yourself then actually receive some of these contributor cards?
  - A Yes.
  - O Do you recall how many you received?
  - A I think 900.
  - Q Do you remember how many you actually gave to

other facility directors?

A I am sure if I find my records and pull them out,
I can tell how many I gave each.

Q Could you, first of all, generally describe what kinds of records you might be referring to? Did you keep a written log, for example?

A I kept a written log of how many tickets I gave to each director, with the numbers on them.

Q Do you still have that log somewhere?

A Since I have been moved out of my office, if I can get my secretary back, I am sure I will be able to find them somewhere.

Q To backtrack a little bit, do you recall who actually gave you those contributor cards?

A I believe I picked them up at the Dixon campaign office.

I don't know. I think the secretary had them at the front counter. I don't --

Q You don't recall getting them from any specific individual?

A I don't remember.

I remember they were on the desk and I picked them up. They had them all ready for me. I just walked in.

- Q When you gave these contributor cards to these various facility directors, did you have any conversations with them at the time?
  - A Yes.
  - Q What conversations, for example, did you have?
- A We just went over them briefly, you know. We wanted them all filled out. We made sure that there were no corporate checks. We wouldn't take cash.

We explained that no one was to be forced to buy a ticket.

It was strictly on a volunteer basis. I explained to them they could not sell them during working hours.

It was just the general instructions we went over every time we had a fund raiser.

Q How did you select which individuals you gave tickets to?

A I selected them by the directors of facilities.

The ones that volunteered, I talked to them if they were willing to help out. I usually went to the director or the person who would be in charge of the facility.

- Q Specifically can you give me the names of those individuals you actually recall having given tickets to?
  - A Like I said before, Lou Mitchell, Carl Catuara,

Joe Garret, George Reynieck, Marge Cantrall, Steve Joyce, Tom Allen, Harry Michalek.

I am sure there will be a few more. That is just off the top of my head right now.

Q When you gave them these contributor cards for them to use in soliciting ticket sales, did you at any point tell them that they in turn should give those contributor cards to other people if they wanted to so that those other people could help them sell tickets?

A Sure.

O You did tell them that?

Do you remember if you stated that expressly or was that sort of an implied thing?

A I think it was kind of implied. I don't think I specifically said, "You can give these to somebody else to sell."

Q Was there a system whereby those individuals that you gave contributor cards to had to sign for the cards they received?

A No, they didn't have to sign for them. I had them all logged in the book and how many they had. They didn't sign for any of them.

Q To your knowledge, who was really in charge of setting up the system for the sale of tickets; in

other words, the concept of printing up contributor cards and the procedure?

A I think there were a couple of different people.

The last one I think it was Tom Allen had the responsibility.

- Q "In the last one," the last fund raiser?
- A Right.
- Q Now, when you say that --
- A I wasn't involved in that one, but Tom Allen was in charge of the last one.

The one before that probably was -- I think it was Joe Mc Mahon. That is who I used to deal with.

I know it was set up -- you know, Joe would start everything off, but I would send the checks and everything back to the campaign office. I would drop them off in the evening or in the morning before going to work. I would have them all listed and stuff.

Q The system that you have described was, as I understand you are testifying, you would give contributor cards to facility directors and then whatever contribution checks they were able to obtain, they would then return to you and you would return that to the campaign --

A With the cards, right. I would return the cards and the checks. The Committee would in turn send then a ticket in the mail or deliver it. I don't know

how they got the tickets.

Q Was there any instance when a check and contributor card was not returned to you from one of the facility directors but was perhaps taken directly to the campaign committee?

A Directly, yes.

Q That would happen on some occasions?

A Quite a few occasions, yes. Mr. Sullivan used to bring his down because he came downtown quite a bit.

Gene was one of them.

There were other times when the people were downtown and they would say they would drop them off, and they would give me a report back.

Q Then they would always report back to you so you could keep a record of it?

A Yes, right.

Q Did you insist on keeping a record of where each one went?

A Yes. There were a lot of checks that were bounced back, that I bounced back, because they were corporate checks. Some got through, and when they ran them through the computer, they saw they were corporate checks. So they were bounced off, and they would call me and tell me that.

- Q Other than those individuals that you have Just identified, the various facility directors, do you recall ever giving any contributor cards to any other individuals yourself?
  - A Yes -- you mean for someone else to sell?
  - Q Yes, for someone else.
  - A No.
- Q You don't recall giving any other tickets to any other individual for them to sell?
  - A . No, no.
- O Did anyone ever ask you if they could receive some of those contributor cards so that they could then use them to sell tickets?
  - A I don't recall anyone ever asking me.
- Q Do you know an individual named Joseph Koz-lowski?
  - A Yes, I do.
  - Q How do you know him?
  - A From working with him.
  - Q What was his relationship with you?
  - A I never dealt directly with the man. I had one

one day, and I went up.

He wouldn't come back from lunch or some-

thing. I went up and I interviewed him after coming back and asked, "Why were you out," and "Why didn't you come back to work," and stuff. I made a recommendation that I wanted him suspended or fired, and he broke down and cried and said that people were picking on him and this office was bad, and it was really a bad scene.

I wrote a report recommending that he be suspended for a while, and the next day I think is the day he went on TV and said he was being harassed.

Q So then your recollection is it was right around sometime just before the last election in October or No-vember?

A Right. You know, I have seen the man many times working, but I have never talked to him. I only talked to him the one time.

Q And you did not give him any contributor cards at any time?

A I did not.

Q Did you ever receive from him any contributor cards or contributor checks?

A If he contributed, yes, I probably have, you know, the ones that were sent back from his facility.

Q But in terms of contributor cards of other individuals other than him or contributor checks of other

individuals other than him, did you, to your knowledge, ever receive any such contributor cards or checks from him?

A I have seen the thing with his name. I have never seen a card or anything from him. I never knew they bought a ticket.

MR. THOMAS: I would like to have marked for identification this document, please, as Exhibit 1.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 1 for identification, 4/16/81.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I am showing Exhibit 1 to the witness and counsel.

By way of clarification, this exhibit consists of two pages, and the document was provided to the Commission this morning by counsel for the Dixon for Senate Committee pursuant to a request for documents we made of them.

Mr. Guzlas, can you identify what has been marked as Exhibit 1?

- A It is one of our pledge cards.
- Q Pledge card meaning one of the contributor cards that we have been referring to in our discussion?

A Right.

Q This particular exhibit, Exhibit 1, has, as you can see, a name written on the card, on the first page of the document.

Have you ever seen that particular card before?

A No.

Q Do you recall ever having received that particular card at any time during the campaign?

A No.

Q Do you know of your own personal knowledge if

Joseph Kozlowski ever made a contribution to the Dixon for

Senate Committee?

A No.

MR. THOMAS: Now I am going to have the reporter mark this document as Exhibit 2.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 2 for identification, 4/16/81.)

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I am showing Exhibit 2 to the witness and counsel.

Exhibit 2 also is a copy, what purports to be a copy of a pledge card, as you have referred to.

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Again, this document was provided to us by the Dixon for Senate Committee this morning.

Can you identify Exhibit 2?

- A These are the same pledge cards that we used for the campaign.
  - O The form is the same?
  - A The same, right.
- Q This particular document again has the name of an individual, and it appears that there are in fact two separate pledge cards represented on this exhibit.

Have you ever seen either of those particular pledge cards?

- A No, I have not.
- Q Do you recall ever receiving either of those two pledge cards?
  - A No, I do not.
- Q You will also note on Exhibit 2, in the upper left-hand corner, appears to be handwritten your name, "Guzlas."
  - A Right.
- Q Do you have any idea how that handwriting got on that copy?
  - A No, I do not.
  - Q Likewise on the lower document?

Q When you were giving out contributor cards to these individuals you have identified, did you set up any system whereby any sort of notation was to be made on those particular contributor cards by any individual?

A No, I did not.

Q So you have no way of knowing what that notation might represent?

A No.

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MR. THOMAS: Let me have marked as Exhibit No. 3 this document, please.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 3 for identification, 4/16/81.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Let me show what has been marked as Exhibit 3 to you and counsel.

Again by way of clarification, this is a document that has been provided to the Commission from the Dixon for Senate Committee.

Can you identify this document?

A It looks like a list that we would send in with the tickets -- what did we finally call those things, pledge cards?

- Q Contributor cards?
- A Or pledge cards. It is a list that we would send in with the cards, that we sent to the Dixon for Senate Committee.
  - Q When you say "we", who are you referring to?
- A Well, my administrative assistant handled all these.
  - Q Have you seen this particular list before?
- A Not to my recollection, no, I can't say that I have.
- Q You will observe on the second page of Exhibit 3, toward the middle of the page, appears the name Joseph R. Kozlowski, and to the right of that --
- A The amount of \$50 and the ticket number, I guess, or the pledge card number is 163.
  - Q Do you know what those notations represent?
- A Yes, that he donated \$50 to the campaign and that his pledge card number was 168, yes.
- Q So then is Exhibit 3 part of the system that you were describing earlier --
  - A Yes.
- O -- that you maintained for keeping track of the particular contributor cards that you issued?
  - A Right.

- Q Is it correct also that with regard to some approximately 900 contributor cards, you somewhere have similar records to these?
  - A Right.
  - Q You maintained copies, that is, of these?
- A I am sure we have copies of these if they came through my office.
- Q To your knowledge, did any of the other individuals to whom you gave tickets, the facility directors that you have identified, did they keep records of the individuals to whom they gave contributor cards?
  - A Not to my knowledge.
- Q Have you had any discussions with them wherein you asked if they kept any such records?
  - A No, I have not.
- Q You didn't ask them to keep those kinds of records?
  - A No.
- Q I don't recall if I asked you this, so I am going to have to ask it again if I have already asked it.

Did Mr. Kozlowski ever ask you for any contributor cards?

- A No, he did not.
- Q Did he ever offer at any point to help you

find any buyers of tickets to any Dixon for Senate fund raiser?

A No, he did not.

I have never talked to Mr. Kozlowski in regards to tickets, fund raisers, or anything; I have never even talked to the gentleman.

Q Has Mr. Catuara or Mr. Mitchell or Mr. Sullivan ever told you that they gave contributor cards to Mr. Kozlowski?

A I think after this investigation started, I think Mr. Sullivan said that he was the one that gave the cards to Mr. Kozlowski.

Q He said that he gave more than one card to Mr. Kozlowski; do you recall?

A I think we were just discussing this because of the subpoenaes and stuff, and we talked about it and he said he was the one who worked with him. He never said how many tickets.

Q Do you recall if he said that Kozlowski came to him and asked him?

A No, I don't recall.

Q Do you recall when --

A I just remember the conversation was we got the subpoenaes and stuff. I think it was Catuara, Mitchell and

myself, and he said, "Gee, I'm surprised that I didn't get one because I'm the guy who gave him the tickets."

That is how it came up in the conversation.

- Q He got one:
- A He got one, okay.
- Q But with regard to that, did he ever follow up and state his recollection of when he gave contributor cards to Kozlowski?
  - A No.
- Q It was just the one statement that you have just referred to?
  - A Yes.
- Q Again just to follow up on that, did Mr. Mitchell or Mr. Catuara or Mr. Sullivan ever say that they actually received contribution checks from Mr. Kozlowski?
  - A No, I don't recall them ever telling me that.
- Q At any time prior to November of 1980, were you informed by anyone that Joseph Kozlowski was receiving any payoffs for the purpose of issuing driver's licenses?
- A No, I am sure if I was, I would have conducted an investigation.
- Q Were you ever informed that he was receiving payoffs which he was in turn turning over to the Dixon for Senate Committee in the form of contributions?

- A Definitely not, no.
- Q Were you ever informed that Lou Mitchell or Carl Catuara were receiving payoffs in connection with the issuance of driver's licenses?

A No. I was not.

Q. When did you first become aware of any allegations: that Joseph Kozlowski may have accepted payoffs in connection with his job?

A I think I read it in the newspaper. Someone called me on the phone and said, "You better read this in the newspaper."

Q Do you recall when that was?

A No, I do not.

I know he was on TV the day after they had the problem out at the Schaumburg facility where he was

He went out with one employee for lunch and the employee said he wanted to go back and Joe said, "I'm the supervisor. I don't have to go back yet."

The guy said, "Well, I want to go back or I will lose my job."

He called his boss; they called me. I hopped in the car and drove out there, and I sat down with Mr. Kozlowski and asked what was happening. He said he was sick, he had some problems, and that everybody was

picking on him.

I said.

You should be back in time."

I looked at his file and said, "You have some bad reports from other supervisors. We are going to suspend you for this and maybe terminate you," and he went crying and said his family was sick and stuff.

So I just recommended a suspension, I think, for 10 days. I think it got cut down to 3.

I think it was the next day he went on TV, stating that he has been harassed and picked on.

Q You have indicated that you were given approximately 900 of the contributor cards.

A I think it was 900 one time, approximately 1100 the other time, for the first. I think there were three fund raisers. I was involved in just the first two.

O Do you recall any other individuals who received such contributor cards other than the individuals you have identified who you in turn gave contributor cards to?

A There were a couple of other individuals. I think Bill Finn from Commercial Driving School received his on his own. He didn't --

Q From Commercial Driving School?

A Right, he got his directly from Joe Mc Mahon.

- Q How do you know that, or do you know that?
- A Well, I went to Bill, and he said, "No. I'll go to Joe directly." So I just dropped it right there.

The guy in charge of dealer contact I believe got his own, too. He didn't go through me.

- Q Do you know who that is?
- A I don't know. I just can't recall his name right now.
  - Q Anybody else that you can recall?
  - A No.
- O Do you recall if there was ever any internal investigation made of the allegations by Joseph Kozlowski when they surfaced?
  - A Yes.
  - Q What was the nature of that investigation?
- A I know a couple of people from Internal Affairs came in and talked to me in regards to my procedure with tickets, and I showed it to them.
  - Q Do you remember who they were?
- A I don't know if it was Nolan and Hines or -I don't -- I can't recall.

I know there were four guys, and it is one of the four, but I don't remember who exactly.

Q Do you remember what the nature of the communi-

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#### cations were?

A They just came in and said they were investigating this, and I told them that my administrative assistant, Pat Kirk, was handling all this stuff, and I turned them over to Pat.

She gave them the information they needed, and I never heard anything more of it.

Q You indicated that you had conversations with Gene Sullivan, where he indicated that he may have been the one that gave contributor cards to Kozlowski.

Did he ever tell you at any point any investigation that he made pursuant to these allegations?

A No.

Q I would request that if you can come up with the remainder of the list of names of the individuals that you gave tickets --

A Do you want them from both fund raisers, for both of them?

Q Yes, if possible I would like them for both fund raisers. I would like you to provide those, if you would, please.

Other than that, I have no further questions. Thank you very much for your time.

THE REPORTER: Is signature waived?

MR. THOMAS: I should ask would the witness like to walve signature?

MR. JALOVEC: I think so, yes.

MR. THOMAS: Okay, fine.

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. JALOVEC: Okay, we will have him look it over first.

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
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

called as a witness by the Federal Election Commission herein, having been by me, the said Cynthia Dykins as Notary Public aforesaid first duly sworn, was examined upon oral interrogatories and he did thereupon depose and testify as follows:

# DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. THOMAS:

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Q Would you state your name for the record, please?

A Eugene A. Sullivan.

MR. THOMAS: At this time I believe counsel for the Dixon for Senate Committee would like to make a statement.

MR. MYERSON: Correct. The Dixon for Senate Committee objects to the Federal Election Commission's refusal to permit its counsel to participate in this proceeding and to cross-examine the witness. The Committee does not waive its objection by its presence at this deposition, and the Committee understands that the Commission agrees that its counsel's presence here does not waive its objection.

MR. THOMAS: That is correct.

MR. MYERSON: Thank you.

### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Mr. Sullivan, where are you presently employed?
- A For the Secretary of State, State of Illinois.
- Q What is your present position there?
- A I am the Acting Facility Director of the Chicago north facility, 5401 North Elston Avenue in Chicago.
  - Q How long have you been in that position?
- A As Acting Facility Director, currently I have been there for 60 days.
  - Q Before that, what position did you hold?
- A I have been in Elston Avenue off and on in different capacities for several years. I was just officing there in 1980 and part of 1979. I was in a different capacity, not in charge of the facility.

In early '79 and from early '79 back to 1976, I was the Facility Director there.

- Q Just to clarify so I understand, you were the director there and then there was a period when you were not the director but you just had office functions there?
  - A That is correct.
- Q During that period, did you have any position or title?

A Yes, I was Assistant Superintendent of Operations for the Cook County facilities in terms of research and development.

Q In those positions you have just described, would you describe generally what your responsibilities were for each of those?

A As the director of the facility, I was responsible for the day to day operations in that facility, which amounted to supervising basically two divisions, Driver's License Division, where people were administered exams and given licenses and instruction permits to learn to drive and also I.D. cards, and also the Motor Vehicle Division, which is basically the sale of license plates, registering vehicles.

Q And in the other position you described?

A In the other position I was just in charge of any new programs that we had in terms of the Driver's License Division and/or the Motor Vehicle Division of the Secretary of State's office as far as the Cook County facilities were concerned.

Q Have you ever worked for the Dixon for Senate Committee?

A Yes.

Q When did you work for the Dixon for Senate

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A I worked as a volunteer after the time that it was inaugurated, which I think was in 1979, some time, I would say, maybe April or May at a meeting asking volunteer workers to help, after my boss at that time, Secretary of State Dixon, announced his candidacy for Senator.

Q Did you say April or May of 1979?

A Yes. I am not sure exactly which month it was that he made his official announcement.

Q From that point on, what activities did you undertake, if any, on behalf of the Dixon for Senate Committee?

A Just as a volunteer worker. They asked me if I would help raise funds through various social events, cocktail parties, and that sort of thing for his candidacy, and I volunteered and said yes, I would.

Q Do you remember when the first of those cocktail party fund raisers was?

A It was in the fall of 1979. I am not sure which month.

Q From the period of April or May, as you have described it, until that period in the fall of 1979, did you undertake any activities on behalf of the Committee?

A In terms of attending meetings and in the preparation and the move of trying to raise funds, yes, I did.

They established a date on which they were going to have a cocktail party to raise some funds.

At that time, they had had several meetings, at which they had volunteers. I was a volunteer at that time.

We were then told to volunteer, you know, what the rules and guidelines were, that they were different with Mr. Dixon as far as the Federal election law was concerned as in contrast to his previous campaigns for State office.

We were given rules and guidelines, such as to solicit contributions, that they couldn't be in cash; for an individual contribution, it couldn't be over \$1,000. They had to be checks, that sort of thing, couldn't use corporation checks, those general rules.

Q You talked about "they talked" about those things. You used that reference.

Who is "they", first of all?

A The "they" that coordinated or called the first meeting generally was Joseph Mc Mahon.

- Q Who attended that first meeting; do you recall?
- A I am not sure. There were probably maybe 20,

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Q Do you recall --

A Several colleagues of mine that worked for the office, with the office at that time, other people that were assigned to Mr. Dixon's campaign staff.

Q Do you recall where that meeting took place, that first one you just referred to?

A If I recall, that first meeting took place in one of the reception rooms at the Bismarck Hotel.

Q At that meeting was there a discussion of plans as to how to go about soliciting sales of tickets for these fund raisers or any of these fund raisers?

A Not at the first meeting, no. That was brought to light at a follow up meeting.

They would just announce the fact that they were going to have such an event, how much it was going to be, and they would be setting down the specific --

Q How much it was going to be?

A I mean if you were to buy a ticket, how much each ticket was going to be worth, you know, how it would be listed, what the amount would be, et cetera, et cetera.

All that hadn't been ironed out or worked out yet.

Q Who was in charge of figuring all of that out

# and implementing that?

A As I say, the meeting was called and chaired by Mr. Joseph P. Mc Mahon, and the details of coordinating it seemed to fall at that time on his administrative aide, Charles Smith.

Q You say you volunteered. Did you go to someone and volunteer or did someone ask you if you would volunteer?

A Mr. Mc Mahon asked me.

Q We have been told by other persons we have talked to that there were four fund raisers on behalf of the Dixon for Senate Committee for the Senate race. There was one in the fall of 1979. There was one in the spring of 1980. There was one in the summer of 1980, and then another one in the fall of 1980.

A That is correct.

Q Is that correct to your recollection?

A That is correct, the best I know.

In Cook County you are referring to?

Q In Cook County.

A Yes.

Q What role, if any, did you have in each of those fund raisers?

A Maybe if we could just take them one at a

time.

In the fall of '79, Mr. Guslas, who is

my boss -- he is Superintendent of Operations for all of

the facilities in Cook County and was also a volunteer who

attended this meeting, the actual fund raising -- called

me and said that he had been given by the campaign committee

certain allotments of ticket invitations for soliciting,

and he gave me my allotment.

- Q Do you remember how many he gave you?
- A It is somewhere between 150 and 200. I am not exactly sure which.
- Q Now, this is just with regard to the first fund raiser you are talking about?
  - A That is right.
  - Q Then what did you do with those?

A With those, I contacted several of the people who worked for me and asked them if they would be interested on their own time for volunteering to solicit ticket sales for his candidacy, and if they were, to let me know and I would make available to them the invitations.

The ones that I did meet with that responded in the affirmative, I told them then -- they had given me a sheet of paper that had the Federal election law rules on them.

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Q Who is "they"?

A The Committee, Mr. Mc Mahon through Charles
Smith, and I just read these rules to the people at that
time so they wouldn't be confused when they went to solicit
somebody, that it wasn't someone who was like the president
of a company or chairman of the board and they would give
them a corporation check, which the Committee cannot accept, that sort of thing.

Q Which individuals do you recall specifically that you gave contributor -- well, ticket solicitation forms to?

A At that time I think it was some of the supervisors that worked for me at the Elston facility.

- Q Who were those individuals?
- A One name is Sam Carramusa.
- Q How do you spell that?
- A C-a-r-r-a-m-u-s-a.

David Greenfield, Joseph Kozlowski, Gil Block.

- Q = B-1-o-c-k?
- A Correct, Joan Annunzio, Frank Perrilli, Jr.
- Q P-e-r-i-1-1-i?
- A Right, Grace Fromandi.

That is all I remember right offhand.

There may have been more.

- Q Do you recall how many tickets you gave to each of those individuals you just named?
  - A I don't recall offhand, no.
  - Q Approximately do you recall?
- A I would say if my allotment was 200, I probably gave them 140, split or divided between them.
- Q Did you give the same amount to each of the individuals that you listed?
  - A No.
  - Q Some you gave more; some you gave less?
  - A Yes.
- Q With regard to those solicitation forms that you gave those individuals, did you tell them what they were to do with those solicitation forms?
- A You mean after they had completed them or if they got --
  - Q Yes.
- A Yes, I told them they could do one of two things. They could either mail them directly to the campaign headquarters, or they could get them back to me and I would see that they would be delivered to campaign headquarters.
  - Q Do you recall which of those two methods was

# used by these individuals in most instances?

A I am not sure. I would probably say over half it was more convenient for them to give it to me and see that I got it back to campaign headquarters.

Q You have indicated you did give tickets to Joseph Kozlowski -- not tickets, I am sorry, the solicitation forms.

Do you recall how many you gave to him?

- A No, not offhand I don't.
- Q Do you recall --

A I know it was probably more than one. It might have been 5, 2, 3.

Q Do you recall if he returned the solicitation forms with contributor checks to you or if he delivered them to the campaign committee offices?

A I am not exactly sure, but I think it was split. I think he returned some to me, but I think, if I recall correctly, one of his contributors or sponsors sent a check and campaign contribution card directly to the heardquarters in his name, Joseph Kozlowski's name.

Q So in other words, what you are saying is

Joseph Kozlowski apparently bought a ticket for himself

and he sent in his own contributor card and check to the

campaign?

A What I am really saying I think is yes, he did

that, okay? I think he turned his own in to me, but someone else bought some tickets, a friend of his or whomever, did not want the tickets, and sent it in to the Committee with a request that the tickets be for Joseph Koslowski.

- Q Do you remember who that individual was that bought the tickets?
  - A I don't offhand, no.
- Q Do you recall what became of those contributor cards; in other words, do you know if in fact the Committee processed them and gave tickets to that individual?
  - A I don't know that.

I know they had two methods in which they were distributing the tickets. They were either mailing the tickets back to the individuals who sent them in, or they had kind of an emergency procedure whereby right near the deadline and it was too late to put things back in the mail, they had a will call thing at the reception itself. So that the individual could just stop at the door and the tickets would be in their name.

But I didn't have anything to do with that.

I don't know how they -- you know, I just know that that

did exist, that procedure.

Q You have indicated that you recall that some individual purchased tickets through Joseph Kozlowski and

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sent the ticket request in to the Committee and asked that tickets be given to Joseph Kozlowski.

What is your recollection based on? Did Kozlowski tell you this?

A My recollection is he had some tickets coming and he asked me if I knew where they were, if I could find out for him where they were. That is how I got familiar with this other procedure because when I called the campaign headquarters, and asked, they said yes, they had received a donation from this individual with that request, but they didn't know exactly how they were going to handle it. They were sure it would be at will call for that individual or Joseph Kozlowski if he went to the affair that evening.

He never got back to me, and I never pursued it any further.

Q You called the Committee, is how you are getting this information?

A Yes.

- Q When you gave contributor cards to Joseph Kozlowski, did you also read to him the requirements that had been given to you from Mr. Mc Mahon through Charles Smith?
  - A The rules, yes.
  - Q When you were given contributor cards or soli-

citation cards from Mr. Guslas, did he inform you that you would be authorised to allow other individuals to be given those contributor cards so that they could assist you in soliciting ticket sales?

A I think he probably mentioned it. More particularly we were told this when we all attended the meeting, which we were both at.

I think Mr. Guzlas was probably just the individual that the campaign headquarters said, "Here, you have your people and they work in these offices. Maybe you can get in touch with them and see that they get these allotments."

I don't think he made up the allotments.

I think he was just a conduit serving it.

- Q You recall at some meeting someone did tell those present that they could give the tickets they received to other individuals so those other individuals could use them to sell?
  - A Yes.
  - Q Do you recall who said that at any meeting?
- A I think it was probably Charles Smith, who might have been going over the specifics and the rules and procedures at that meeting. I don't think it was Mr. Mc Mahon.

Q I am having difficulty putting it in context.

There apparently was a meeting, and you think it was maybe

Charles Smith that said that it would be all right to

give these contributor cards or solicitation cards that

the various volunteers at the meeting there would be receiving to other individuals?

A Yes.

Q So that those individuals could help with the ticket sales?

A Yes.

Q We talked about the first fund raiser. Let's move to the second one.

What do you recall about how the ticket sales were achieved for that fund raiser?

A As far as I was concerned, I could actually talk about the second and third together. I was only responsible as a volunteer for soliciting ticket sales myself. I did not use or talk to any of these people that I had in the past. I was not involved with them. An associate of mine, who succeeded me in the job title there as director of that facility, was a volunteer in those other ones, and if he did it with any of the employees there, it was done through him, not me.

His name is David Greenfield.

- Q Do you know if in fact he did receive solicitation cards and in fact asked any of the other employees to assist in the sale of those?
  - A Yes.
  - Q You know he did do that?
  - A Yes.
  - Q For the second and third fund raisers?
  - A I would say yes.

How I know is I was officing there, and he would come in and ask me. He would get this back and he would say was he doing it right, and did he have them together to send back to the Committee right, you know, that sort of thing. So I am sure he was.

- Q How about the fourth fund raiser, did you have any involvement with that fund raiser?
  - A No.
  - Q You didn't sell tickets yourself even?
  - A No.
- Q Moving back to the second and third fund raiser,
  I want to make sure I am clear.

Did you say you did not give any contribution cards to any other individuals for that fund raiser so that they could assist in the sale of tickets for that fund raiser? A No.

Q The only contribution cards or solicitation cards you received you sold yourself?

A I did myself, that is right.

Q Why did you not give out any tickets to other individuals for the second and third fund raisers?

A I think maybe because these people were not directly working for me. I was not directly involved with them. So I figured if I would have asked them and Mr. Greenfield might have asked them, too, they might have thought because I had done it to them before and I had known them longer, et cetera, et cetera, and I used to be their boss, maybe they would do it for me and not for him.

So I just stayed away. I abstained myself from --

Q It was essentially a reflection of your changing your job position, is that correct?

A Yes.

Q With regard to the second and third fund raisers where you apparently did, you say, sell some of the tickets, do you recall who actually gave you the contributor cards in those instances?

A Yes, if I am not mistaken, I received those from a member of the campaign staff by the name of Tom

tickets?

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Q Did he tell you specifically that you were not to give any of those contributor cards to anyone else so that those other persons could help you sell the

A No, he didn't.

Q I don't think I have clarified. With regard to the second and third fund raisers, do you recall how many contributor cards or solicitation cards you received?

A Not offhand, a general guess maybe 100.

Q You sold all of those yourself?

A I am not sure if I sold them all. What I did sell and what I had left that I didn't sell, they asked me to turn the solicitation cards back to them, and I don't remember what the percentage was.

Q "They" being?

A The campaign committee.

Q To your knowledge, did any other individuals ever give any contributor cards or solicitation cards to Joseph Kozlowski?

A Not to my knowledge, other than possibly if Mr. Greenfield did.

Q And you don't know if he did or did not?

A I don't know, no.

Q You said that you indicated to these various employees that if they were interested in helping you sell tickets, to get in touch with you.

How did you actually communicate that message? Did you send out a memo, for example?

A No, no, I called some of them at home. I talked to some of them before I would get to the office in the morning, that sort of thing. Sometimes we would have a beer after work at night. I would ask to see them.

- Q Do you recall in the case of Joseph Kozlowski the specific conversation where he indicated he would be willing to help you sell some tickets?
  - A Not particularly, no.
- Q Do you recall where you had that conversation with him?
  - A No, I don't.
- Q You don't recall if it was over the phone or in person?
  - A I would tend to think it was in person.
- Q On no other occasion other than the instance you have referred to, where you gave him maybe 5 contributor cards, on no other occasion you gave him any contributor cards or solicitation cards?
  - A No.

- Q Is that correct?
- A That is correct.
- Q Did you keep any record of how many contributor cards you received?
- A Not how many -- no, not how many cards I received.
- Q Did you keep any record of how many contributor cards you sold?
- A All I did, what I did do was I made a record of all of the cards that were sold so that when I sent the record down with the cards and the check, everything matched; but I didn't keep any record of that. I just sent it down when I forwarded it to the Committee.
- MR. THOMAS: Let me have the reporter mark this document as Exhibit No. 1.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 1 for identification, 4/16/81.)

# BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I show Exhibit 1 to the witness and counsel.

By way of clarification, this is a copy of a document that was provided to the Commission by the Dixon for Senate Committee today.

First of all, with regard to the form

which appears on that document, Exhibit 1, can you identify that particular form that is represented there?

A I can identify it, yes, as one of the type of contribution cards that they made, yes.

Q That we have been referring to so far, that is the form, the contributor card or solicitation card that we have been referring to?

A Yes.

Q You will note on Exhibit 1, on the first page, in the space for the name is the notation Joseph R. Kozlowski.

Do you recall ever having actually seen that particular contributor card?

A I can't recall. I mean, I didn't make it out.

It is not my handwriting.

- Q It is not your handwriting?
- A No, it is not my handwriting.
- Q Do you recognize that handwriting?
- A No, I don't.
- Q To step back a moment, you will notice in the lower left corner that there appears a number, No. 168.

  Do you know what that has reference to?

A If I am not mistaken, when they gave out the invitation cards or solicitation cards, they had actual

tickets to go with them, but they didn't give out the tickets. So when we would send them back, if I would talk to them, I would say, "I have X amount of cards," and they would assign ticket numbers because I think it corresponds to the ticket number.

Q Did you keep any record of the number of tickets for each individual you sold tickets to?

A Only to the degree of whatever I sent back to the Committee, if I were given the number in advance and there was an invitation card and a check, I would put the number on the invitation card, and I also put the number on the check in case they got separated.

Q The number, which number?

A The number that I might have been given if I called them and said, you know, "Do you have --" in other words, they kept the allotment of tickets for everybody that had a certain allotment of invitation cards, and they would give those numbers out. If I would call them, they would give those numbers out so I could put them on in case there was any fall back later in which I didn't get the ticket for the person, I could then have them check and see what number was listed on what I sent them.

Q So what you are saying then is you would somehow contact the Committee and ask them about the ticket number that would correspond to the contributor card, '
and you would write that ticket number or those corresponding ticket numbers on the contributor cards before
you turned the card back to the Committee?

- A Into the Committee, right.
- Q Was that the procedure that you were requested to follow by the Committee?
- A I am not sure that that was the official procedure. I just did it because I thought it would help for better record keeping.
- Q Other than that record keeping, you kept no separate record of the contributor cards you received?

A No.

MR. THOMAS: I would like to have the reporter mark this document as Exhibit No. 2.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 2 for identification, 4/16/81.)

### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I am showing the witness and counsel Exhibit 2.

Again by way of clarification, that is a copy of a document that the Commission was given by the Dixon for Senate Committee today.

Can you identify that document?

- A Yes, I can.
- Q What is it?
- A This is a copy of the letter that I had to sign when I became a volunteer and they asked me if I would solicit campaign contributions.
  - Q And you did sign that document, is that correct?
  - A Yes, I did.
  - Q Do you recall when that document was signed?
- A I am not exactly sure. I am not exactly sure even what month it was, but I am sure I signed it in '79.
- Q Do you recall if it was before the first fund raiser or was it after the first fund raiser?
- A I am not exactly sure because there were some questions that were brought up as far as the structure of the record keeping of the fund raiser between the Chicago campaign office and the central campaign office in Springfield.

I think it was mentioned one time that there might be some authorization letters that individuals would have to sign, but after we had our first couple of meetings, we hadn't had these at this time.

I am not exactly sure when I signed that.

I do know that I definitely had to sign it and they had

it available prior to and at the first meeting of the second and third fund raisers. So whatever that potential conflict might have been, you know, the logistics of it was all straightened out prior to those other two.

Q So you signed either that particular document or a document like it for the second and third fund raisers to receive tickets?

A Yes, sir.

MR. THOMAS: Let me have the reporter mark this document as Exhibit No. 3, please.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 3 for identification, 4/16/81.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I am showing this document to the witness and counsel.

Again, this is a document that was provided to the Commission by the Dixon for Senate Committee.

You will note that that document consists of a Xerox duplication of what appears to be two contributor cards, and on each the notation in the name category is that of Marjorie Kozlowski.

- A Yes, sir.
- Q Have you ever seen that document before or what

#### is represented on that document before?

- A Yes, sir.
- Q Can you state when you saw it before?
- A Again I am not exactly sure which one, but I would assume it was probably the second fund raiser.
  - Q Under what circumstances did you see that?
- Me. He turned this in to me, and I think the thing that was in discrepancy here was the fact that the check or money order that was turned in with it did not -- I think there was a card filled out for himself and a card filled out for his wife, and I think I called and was told the cards had to match the check. It was a personal check or whatever.

Because that is my handwriting on that bottom copy there, where it was erased and her name was put in to match the check that I was submitting.

- Q In other words, you are stating you received a check that was drawn by Marjorie Kozlowski, is that correct?
  - A Yes, sir.
  - Q Did you receive two checks?
- A Not that I recall, no. I think it was just one check for the amount of two tickets.

- Q One check for the amount of \$200?
- A Yes.
- Q You are referring now to the bottom part of Exhibit 3, and you are stating that the apparent striking of certain words and the re-writing of the name Marjorie Kozlowski is in your handwriting?
  - A Yes, sir.
- Q Directing your attention to the top of the page, can you recognize that contributor card?
  - A Vaguely I do.
- Q Was this a contributor card that was submitted with a separate contributor check, separate from the one you were just referring to?
  - A I think they were submitted together.
  - Q I don't quite understand the circumstances.
- A I think the check was submitted and there were two cards.
  - Q One check, two cards?
  - A Pardon?
  - Q One check, two cards?
  - A That is correct.

I am trying to figure out why, the reason, you know -- of course, as it indicates here, there had to be more than one check or it wasn't for the same amount

because the card up here indicates for \$200 and this one down here indicates for \$200.

MR. HARTIGAN: Mr. Sullivan, do you know or are you guessing?

THE WITNESS: I don't know for sure. I don't recall exactly.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Of your own independent recollection, do you recall how much money total Marjorie Kozlowski contributed to the Dixon Committee?
  - A No, I don"t.
  - Q You don't recall if it was \$200 or \$400?
  - A Or \$400, right.

MR. THOMAS: I will have the reporter mark this document as Exhibit No. 4, please.

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 4 for identification, 4/16/81.)

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I am showing Exhibit 4 to the witness and counsel.

This is a document that was provided to the Commission by the Dixon for Senate Committee pursuant to an understanding that it will remain confidential and

not be made part of any public file.

Can you identify Exhibit 4?

- A Yes, I can.
- Q What is Exhibit 4?.

A That is a memo from me to my boss, William F. Logan, who was the division administrator at that time, based on a request from Secretary Dixon.

It is a background and resume of my knowledge of this particular employee. It came about as a result of that -- I don't know what you call it -- television expose or whatever.

Q So it was prepared sometime after or very approximate to the general election in 1980?

A Yes, I think maybe it was August. I don't think it was right at election time.

There isn't a date on here, but it seems to me it was in August.

Q In the fifth paragraph on page 1 of Exhibit 4, it states:

"I might note that on 92-14-80 when Mr. Kozlowski returned from Medical Leave of Absence he came to see me about obtaining some tickets for Secretary Dixon's Fund Raiser being held on March 11, 1980. I told him not to bother

"himself about this matter because he had been ill and off work some considerable length of time. He insisted that he at least buy one ticket for himself and I stated that was solely his choice. He did buy one ticket at this time."

Is that paragraph I just read accurate?

- A Yes, sir, best of my knowledge, it is.
- Q Do you recall how much the ticket that he purchased was worth?
  - A I am not sure if it was \$50 or \$100.
- Q Re-directing your attention to Exhibit 1, to your knowledge does Exhibit 1 reflect that particular contribution which is referred to in Exhibit 4?

MR. HARTIGAN: Counsel, I don't think he can answer that question on the basis of what he earlier answered on that Exhibit 1. He said he didn't know. He said it was not his handwriting and he didn't know about it.

Now you are asking him if that is connected with 4, which he can't -BY MR. THOMAS:

Q All right, just on the assumption that perhaps there is refreshing of your recollection somehow and also the possibility that perhaps that particular contributor card, Exhibit 1, was perhaps filled out by someone else but was involved with this transaction that you referred to here.

A It could have been. I am not sure.

I am not sure that I sold him the ticket at that time. What I am sure of is he was sent to see me. He had been on leave of absence for a while while this fund raising was going on. When he returned, his boss, the director, Mr. Greenfield, when he asked him that question, told him he better talk to me, and then this pursued.

Q Do you know why he was directed to talk to you?

A Because he knew I was in more direct contact with the campaign committee.

Maybe that, and maybe I could find out for him or I would know, you know.

- Q But you are stating you don't recall if in fact you yourself sold him a ticket?
  - A At that time, that is right.
- Q I believe you stated earlier that you did receive some contribution cards and checks from Joseph Kozlowski, which you turned in to the Dixon for Senate Committee, is that correct?
  - A That is correct.
  - Q Do you recall if any of those contribution checks

were checks written on a corporate account?

A I don't recall directly. I would assume they weren't, based on what I had told him before, that they weren't acceptable.

So if they wouldn't accept them, I couldn't accept them from someone like himself.

- Q Do you recall the names of the individuals who had made contributions through Joseph Kozlowski?
  - A No, sir, I don't.
- Q Does the name Mitch Maczko refresh your recollection?
  - A It doesn't ring a bell.
- Q When Joseph Kozlowski gave you these checks and contributor cards, do you recall any conversation that you had with him?
- A You are referring back to the September fund raiser?
  - Q Yes.
  - A Not particularly, no.
- Q Do you recall if he told you that he had used his own funds to give to individuals so that those individuals could make those contributions?
  - A I don't recall that he said that.
  - Q Were you ever informed by anyone, including

Joseph Rozlowski, that he was receiving payoffs for granting driver's licenses and then using payoff monies to make contributions to the Dixon Committe?

- A No, sir.
- Q Kozlowski never told you that himself?
- A No. sir.
- Q Were you ever informed by anyone that Robert
  Guzlas or Louis Mitchell or Carl Catuara were receiving
  payoff monies for granting driver's licenses and were using
  such monies to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate
  Committee?
  - A No, sir.
- Q When did you first become aware of these allegations that Joseph Kozlowski may have received payoff monies and may have used those monies to make contributions to the Dixon for Senate Committee?

A I think the first time that I heard about it was when I heard about the television display or expo, newscast, whatever it was.

- Q Did you ever go to Joseph Kozlowski and ask him about these allegations?
  - A No, sir.
  - Q Did you ever discuss the --
  - A If I am not mistaken, at the time that came

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about, he was on a medical leave of absence from our office and had been for some time and to my knowledge.

I have never talked to the gentleman since.

He did come back off medical leave of absence at the end of that summer, but --

Q The summer of 1980?

A That is correct, but he never reported back to my facility. He was put on temporary assignment to a different facility closer to his home.

- Q Who was the head of that facility?
- A A lady by the name of Marge Cantrall.
- Q Did you ever have any discussions about these allegations with Mr. Guzlas?
  - A No. sir.
- Q Did you ever have any discussions about these allegations with Mr. Mitchell?
  - A No, sir.
  - Q With Mr. Catuara?
  - A No, sir.
  - Q With Charles Smith?
  - A No, sir.
- Q Do you recall anyone working with the Dixon for Senate campaign that ever contacted you and asked you about these allegations?

- A One person.
- Q Who was that?
- A The gentleman I wrote the memo to, Mr. Logan.
- Q Was he involved with the campaign committee?
- A I am not sure that he was.

Let's put it I didn't deal with him from that position if he was. I didn't know.

He was one of my bosses, the division administrator for the Secretary of State's office.

Q Did you state that he told you that he had been asked to gather the information by Secretary of State Dixon?

A That is correct.

MR. THOMAS: I would like to take about a fiveminute break just to see if we have any other thoughts. We may be very close to concluding.

MR. HARTIGAN: Fine.

(There was a brief recess, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

 $$\operatorname{MR}$.$  THOMAS: I just have a couple more questions. BY MR. THOMAS:

Q You have indicated that you did give contribution cards to several individuals so that they could solicit

ticket sales.

Did you give the Dixon for Senate Committee the names of those individuals that you gave tickets to to sell or contribution cards to sell?

MR. HARTIGAN: Could I object to that question because I think when we were talking about that earlier, that was a little confusing because there is a difference between the first fund raiser apparently and the second and third fund raisers as to how it was organized and everything else.

So would you mind clarifying as to which fund raiser you are talking about?

MR. THOMAS: My understanding of the testimony so far is that it was only with regard to the first fund raiser that you did give out any contributor cards to any other individuals.

MR. HARTIGAN: Right.

MR. THOMAS: So I would be talking about the first fund raiser.

MR. HARTIGAN: Okay.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q The question is did you forward to the Dixon

Committee the names of those individuals to whom you gave

contributor cards?

- Q Do you recall in what form you gave that notice?
- A No, and I don't know if it was at a meeting or over a telephone call or on paper. I am not sure.
- Q You don't recall any specific individual that you gave that notice to?
  - A No.

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- Q So again, just a further clarification. You are stating that at some point you did tell someone working for the Dixon Committee that you had given some tickets to Joseph Kozlowski?
  - A I am sure I did, yes.
- Q Had the Committee requested that you provide that information?
  - A Yes, they did.
  - Q Do you recall --

A I don't remember the exact specifics of it
now because it was at that time, again, whether or not
they were clear or it had been clarified to us whether or
not anybody that we gave solicitation cards to or I gave
solicitation cards to for the purposes of selling, whether
they had to sign any papers for me that I had to send back

Q But your recollection is at some point the Committee asked you for the names of those individuals you had given contributor cards to?

A Yes, right.

Q And that you subsequently provided those names?

A Right.

Q You have indicated at some point there did come a change in procedure in that you were required to sign a letter or a memorandum, as has been identified in Exhibit 2.

Now, do you recall was there any discussion for the change in procedure, and if so, what that discussion was about, what reasons were behind that change in procedure?

A I am not sure. There was a discussion. I am not sure exactly how that came about.

I think maybe the people that were running the campaign office here in Chicago were told that the central campaign office had found out that anybody who was soliciting this, they had to have on file and have a signed document. So they then contacted all of the people

that had been to their volunteer meeting and said that we have to stop by the campaign headquarters and sign one of these sheets, something along those lines, but I don't recall exactly just when it took place, though.

- Q Were you ever reprimanded or in any sense--
- A No.
- Q -- told that you had done wrong by giving contributor cards to Joseph Kozlowski?
  - A No.
  - Q Or to any of those other individuals you listed?
  - A No, sir.

MR. HARTIGAN: Counsel, just off the record.

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. THOMAS: One other question. We also in the subpoena that was issued to you asked you to produce any documents that you might have.

Do you have any of those documents in your possession?

MR. HARTIGAN: The document that Mr. Sullivan has is the copy of the memorandum to Logan from himself, subject of Kozlowski, which is already your Exhibit 4.

MR. THOMAS: And that is all?

MR. HARTIGAN: Yes. Anything else concerning Kozlowski would be with the Director of Personnel, Secretary of State.

MR. THOMAS: All right, I have no further questions.

Would the witness like a chance to read and sign the deposition or would you like to waive signature?

MR. HARTIGAN: We would like to take a look and read it.

Do you mind if I ask him a couple of questions?

MR. THOMAS: Not at all.

#### CROSS-EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. HARTIGAN:

Q On the instance where you called down to the campaign office concerning the tickets that were purchased by someone else and then left in Kozlowski's name, do I understand it that someone else sent in a check, purchased the tickets, and then just gave the tickets away? Is that the situation or --

A You are recalling when I mentioned that the

### tickets were to be left at the door?

- Q Yes, right.
- A Yes, that is correct, the person --
- Q So whoever purchased the tickets is the contributor and was recorded as such?

A Was the contributor, right, and couldn't use the tickets, and he was giving them away.

- Q To somebody else?
- A To somebody else, yes.
- Q Then in relationship to the second and third fund raisers, you did not ask any of the supervisors if they wanted to volunteer for the fund raiser, is that correct?
  - A That is right.
- Q In the first one, all the volunteers were in fact volunteers; I mean, you didn't put it on them, "We are getting rid of these things and you are a supervisor and you have to help out"?
  - A No.
- Q Would you go over once -- you sort of answered it, but why did you stay away from not asking these fellows on the second and third one, even though you asked them on the first one?
  - A Mainly because even though I was still officing

in the same building, in the same office complex with Mr. Greenfield, we had changed position roles, and I didn't want to burden these employees to think that they should help me out in this matter if I were in fact asking them as versus or in contrast to him. If he would have asked them, I just didn't want the conflict.

Q So some of them --

A In case it might have come up, in case there was any conflict of whether or not they should volunteer to help Mr. Greenfield or they should volunteer to help me.

Q Or the other side of the coin is equally true; they might not volunteer if you asked them or they might not volunteer if Greenfield asked them?

A True, true.

Q In the first fund raiser when you did ask the supervisors who would help out, you know, asked for volunteers, did you explain to each of them the Federal rules as you understood them, and in particular the rules about no contributions over \$1,000, no contribution over \$100 in cash, and no corporate contributions?

A Yes, I did.

Q Because that was the main thing that was different, those three things were the main things that were different, were they not, from any other fund raiser that you had participated in in the past?

A That is right.

Q Those were the supervisors some of which you mentioned earlier, including Kozlowski?

A That I talked to the first time, yes, right.

Q Did you also have available any written material in terms of what they could and couldn't do in a fund raiser? Did you have any copy of anything?

A I had a copy that was given to me, right.

Q Were they told that if they had any questions, they could come back and you would go over the rules with them or try to answer it with them, and if you couldn't get the answer, you could call downtown?

A Sure, yes.

Q Did the question ever come up from any of them or from you to them as to what if somebody doesn't want to contribute in his own name because he doesn't want to be on a Democratic list or something like that?

He is a Republican; he doesn't want to be on a Democratic fund raising list; could he give it in somebody else's name, did that question ever arise?

A It may have, but I don't recall that it did.

Q Did anybody ever tell you that they were in fact accepting funds in somebody else's name?

MR. HARTIGAN: That's it.

MR. THOMAS: All right, I thank you for your

time.

The above named indiviual has worked for the Secretary of States Office since 1972. He has been a supervisor at the Chicago North Facility for approximately 4% years. During the last few years Mr. Kozlowski has experienced a great deal of absenteeism due to health reasons. On several ocassions during the past two years I have had to sign off on Medical Leave of Absence requests by Mr. Kozlowski.

These situations have almost always resulted in his requesting a medical leave of absence for a period of time, which, I might add, was always granted. A brief list of dates of Medical Leaves of Absences granted to Mr. Kozlowski recently are:

9-24-79 to 10-15-79 Doctor's Letter Confirming Request 12-17-79 to 12-31-79 Doctor's Letter Confirming Request 01-10-80 to 02-14-80 Doctor's Letter Confirming Request 05-06-80 to 09-04-80 Doctor's Letter Confirming Request

I might mote that on 02-14-80 when Mr. Kozlowski returned from Medical Leave of Absence he came to see me about obtaining some tickets for Secretary Dixon's Fund Raiser being held on March 11,1980. I told him not to bother himself about this matter because he had been ill and off work some considerable length of time. He insisted that he at least buy one ticket for himself and I stated that was soley his choice. He did buy one ticket at this time.

At no time was there any type of undue pressure to purchase and/or sell Political Campaign Tickets to any of the Supervisors or Employees under my jurisdiction at the Chicag North Facility while I was in charge.

There was one recent incident at this facility involving Joseph Kozlowski on May 6,1980. After returning from

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Greenfield, who was in charge at this time sent Mr. Kozlowski home.

Ex. 4-100

While Mr. Kozlowski was absent for several days his Doctor recommened a Medical Leave of Absence for him. While Mr. Kozlowski was on this leave, sometime within the first thirty days, I talked to his wife and his friend Vincent Franzone and stated that Mr. Kozlowski might have to go

be allowed to come back to work. I said that I had checked into such a program and I would make all the arrangements if they would inform me as to when Mr. Kozlowski's Doctor would be releasing him to return to work.

would be releasing him to return to work.

To my knowledge, Mr. Kozlowski did not persue this assistance by the office to help him with his health problem.

His one month leave of absence also was extended thru two and one-half additional months.

Due to the increased work load and shortage of employees and by personal request of Mr. Kozlowski himself, he was temporarily transferred to the Schaumburg Station upon his return to work on September 4,1980.

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# MR. THOMAS: Would you swear the witness, please? (Witness sworn.)

#### CARL T. CATUARA

called as a witness by the Federal Election Commission herein, having been by me, the said Cynthia Dykins as Notary Public aforesaid first duly sworn, was examined upon oral interrogatories and he did thereupon depose and testify as follows:

#### DIRECT EXAMINATION

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Would you state your name, please?
- A Carl T. Catuara.
- Q Where are you presently employed, Mr. Catuara?
- A The Secretary of State's office.
- Q What is your position there?

MR. MYERSON: Scott, I would like to just get the objection on the record.

MR. THOMAS: Fine.

MR. MYERSON: The Dixon for Senate Committee objects to the Federal Election Commission's refusal to permit its counsel to participate in this proceeding and to cross-examine the witness. The Committee understands that it does not waive its objection by its presence at this deposition, and the Committee understands that the

Commission agrees that it is not waiving its objection by being present at this deposition.

MR. THOMAS: That is correct.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q I am sorry; your present position?
- A Assistant Superintendent of Facilities.
- Q How long have you held that position?
- A On and off for about 15 years.

Well, I would say about the last possibly four years steady.

Q What in general are your responsibilities in that position?

A Going around to the facilities, making sure that policy and procedure is carried out and that employees are doing what they are supposed to be doing and that the supervisors and directors of the facility are doing their job.

Q How many facilities are there that you are supervising?

A There are eight?

Let's see, four, seven, eight in Cook County.

I was mainly responsible for the three large ones in Cook County, and when the Assistant Super-

intendent in the suburban counties was on vacation or sick or something, then I would go out there if it was necessary.

Q With regard to those three that you just mentioned, who were the facility directors?

A Joseph Garret was the director at the south facility. John Mc Donough was the director of the west facility, and Gene Sullivan -- no, wait a minute. Take it back. Dave Greenfield was the director at the north facility.

Q What period of time are you talking about when those individuals were directors?

A Say the last four or five years.

Q You mentioned an individual named Gene Sullivan. What is his position?

A He was the director at the Elston Avenue facility, or the north facility, and then he was made Administrative Assistant, and that is when Dave Greenfield was made the acting director.

Now, dates I can't give you because I am not sure of them.

- Q Approximate dates?
- A I really don't know.
- Q Even years?

A I know it has been within the last, like I say, four years.

Q Have you ever worked for the Dixon for Senate Committee?

- A Yes, I have.
- Q When did you work for that Committee?
- A The last election when Dixon was going to run for United States Senator.
  - Q Did you work during the primary and the general?
  - A Yes, I did.
- Q Do you have any more specific recollection of when you actually first began doing any work for the Committee?

A Like I said, I don't remember dates. It is just that when the Committee was formed, I volunteered my services.

Now, what the dates were, I really don't remember.

Q You say you volunteered your services.Do you remember who you volunteered your services to, whom you spoke with?

A I think a gentleman named Emmet O'Neill, who
I think was responsible for the Committee. I talked with
Emmet and told him I would volunteer my services.

Of Charles Smith that early on before even the first fund raiser for that primary campaign of Mr. Dixon, there was a meeting where several of the employees of the Secretary of State's office got together and they talked about plans to assist with fund raising.

Do you recall such a meeting?

A Yes.

Q Do you recall who was present at that meeting, first of all?

A I know Emmet O'Neill was there and Charles

Smith, some of the directors. I can't recall exactly who
was there.

Q Do you remember what was discussed at that meeting?

A Yes, they discussed the upcoming campaign for Dixon running for United States Senator.

Q More specifically, did they talk about plans about how to go about helping in that effort?

A Yes.

Q Were there any plans made for, for example, what you were going to be doing?

A No, just talked and we volunteered our services, and they said, "Well, we will contact you later and let

"you know what we are doing."

- Q Do you remember where that meeting was?
- A I think it was held in a room at the Bismarck Hotel.
- Q How many fund raising events were you yourself involved with?
  - A I think there was one or two.
  - Q What was the nature of your involvement?
  - A Just selling of tickets.
- Q We have been told that there were essentially four fund raisers for the Dixon Committee, one in September of 1979, the fall, one in March of 1980, spring, then one in the summer of 1980 and then another one in the fall of 1980.
- A I remember the two in 1980. Now, there could have been two before that I wasn't -- I don't remember.
- Q You have described this meeting that you attended. Do you recall if that was in the fall of 1979 just as the campaign was getting under way?
  - A I think it was.
- Q As I indicated, we have been told that there was a fund raiser in the fall of '79. Did you sell tickets, if you know, for that fund raiser?
  - A If there was a fund raiser in '79, I sold tickets

Q Can you be specific in explaining what the procedure was that was used whereby you were assisting in the sale of tickets?

A Other than selling tickets?

Q Explain the procedure; for example, how you got the tickets, who you got them from.

A I think we picked the tickets up at a meeting at the Bismarck. Now, who actually gave them to me, I don't remember.

I know Emmet O'Neill or Charles Smith, one or the other, and we were given the tickets and that was it.

Q Do you remember how many tickets you were given?

A Not exact number. I might have been given 20 or 30, maybe 40.

Q Let me step back.

You have indicated you think you were involved with maybe one or two of the fund raisers. We have been told there were four.

Do you recall if you sold tickets for all four of those?

A If there were four fund raisers, then I probably sold tickets for all four of them. The two latest ones I

I am trying to recall the other two that were earlier.

Q With regard to, say, the last two that you can recall more clearly, do you recall how you got the actual -- I pause now only because we should clarify at this point.

We have also talked to other people, and they have advised us that the procedure actually was not giving out tickets per se but these contributor card forms.

Does that refresh your recollection?

A Yes.

Q Is that what you were talking about when you said you got tickets to sell?

A Yes.

Q Now, the question I was going to ask. With regard to the two fund raisers you recall the most, the most recent ones that you recall more clearly, do you recall how you actually got those kinds of contributor cards?

A At the meeting at the Bismarck.

Q You got tickets for all of the fund raisers at the one meeting at the Bismarck?

A No, no, no, no.

They had meetings at the Bismarck, and the first meeting was called and we volunteered, or I volun-

teered my services. I was willing to do whatever I can to help Alan Dixon run for the United States Senate.

Then at another meeting they decided they were going to go with tickets for a fund raiser, and then tickets were passed out after they were printed. You know, we got the invitations or pledge cards or whatever you call them.

Q That happened in each of the instances that you helped; there was a separate occasion when you received these pledge cards?

A Right.

Q Are you stating that you don't recall in any of those instances the specific individual who gave you pledge cards?

A I really don't remember because there were so many people around.

Q When you got contributor cards, what did you do with the contributor cards?

A I talked to people I knew, business people I knew, and I told them that I was helping Alan Dixon trying to raise some funds and asked them if they would purchase one ticket, two tickets, whatever they could afford.

Q Would they then give a check to you?

A Yes.

- Q What would you do with the checks?
- A I would turn it in downtown to the Dixon Committee.
- Q Did you ever receive tickets from Mr. Robert Guzlas?
  - A No.
- Q Did you ever turn in any contribution checks to Robert Guzlas?
  - A No.
- Q In each instance you recall, you actually turned the filled-out contributor cards and the checks to the offices?
- A To a couple of girls at his office downtown, the Senate Committee office, and I would turn my money in there and get receipts for it.
- Q How was it decided who got contributor cards; do you know?
- A Whoever volunteered, you know, anybody that wanted to volunteer to go in and help, wanted to be on the Committee, just volunteered their services.
- Q Do you recall ever having had to sign for any of the contributor cards that you received?
  - A No.

MR. THOMAS: Let me have the reporter mark for

(The document was thereupon marked Exhibit 1 for identification, 4/16/81.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Let me show you what I have marked as Exhibit 1.

I show that to you and your counsel.

Let me explain also this is a document that has been provided to us by the Dixon for Senate Committee pursuant to a document request we made of them.

A I thought this was just to show us that we could not accept money from corporations and that we offered our services as volunteers and nothing else. I didn't think that I was signing for tickets that were given me.

MR. STEINBACK: It isn't.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q That is what I just wanted to do, was get a clarification.

This is a document that you did sign?

A Oh, yes, I signed that.

This was more or less just instructions as to what we could do and could not do.

Am I right or wrong?

Q Do you recall when this document was given to

A If I am not mistaken, there was a meeting and this was passed out at the meeting after we volunteered our services, and I don't remember if we signed it when we picked up the tickets or at the first meeting or at the second meeting.

I really don't remember when it was signed, but I know we were asked to sign it as instructions as to what we could do and could not do.

Q You will note on the lower left portion of that document there is a reference to ticket numbers, and then there is a notation 351 to 500.

Do you know what that represents?

- A Probably the tickets that were given to me.
- Q You indicated that you received a batch of maybe 40 tickets. Was there a batch only of maybe 40 tickets once or was a similar batch given to you for each of the fund raisers; do you recall?
  - A I don't remember.
- Q Were you at any time told that you could give the contributor cards or pledge cards you received to other individuals so that they could use them to solicit ticket sales?
  - A Speaking for myself, I handled my own because

I didn't want to take a chance on losing tickets or being responsible for tickets and having to come up with ticket money out of my pocket.

- Q Did you sell all the tickets that you received?
- A No, I think I turned some back. How many I don't remember.
- Q But as to the ones that you did get contribution checks for, you yourself sold them?
  - A Me personally myself.
- Q And no other individual sold any of those for you?
  - A (No audible response.)
  - Q The record should reflect you are stating no.
  - A Yes, I sold my own tickets.
- Q Of your own knowledge, do you know if Bob Guzlas ever gave any contributor cards to any other individuals so that they could use them to help sell?
  - A I would have no way of knowing.
- Q Do you know if an individual named Lou Mitchell ever sold any tickets for the Dixon Committee?
  - A He may have, but like I say --
  - Q You don't know?
- A I could say yes; I could say no. I really don't know for certain.

Q How about an individual named Gene Sullivan, do you have any knowledge as to whether he sold any?

A He may have, you know, the same thing. I don't know if any of the fellows sold them or not. They may have, but I can't really say that they sold tickets.

Q Did you keep any written record of how many contributor cards you sold?

A No, I kept a record of the money I had, and once it was turned in and that was all right, I knew I was clear, I just threw everything away. There was no need to keep it.

Q Was the sum and total of what you turned in simply contributor checks and the filled-out contributor cards?

A I think there was a card and a check.

Q In other words, what I am asking is you didn't turn in any other separate written record that you kept?

A No, I think we may have turned in names and Social Security numbers or names and addresses of people that purchased tickets; but my own personal record, once I had all my tickets sold and all my money turned in for whatever I sold, then I just threw my records out.

I felt there was no need to keep them because I didn't have anybody that owed money or anything else. So I just threw the papers away.

Q Did anyone ever come to you and ask you if they could help you sell any of the contributor cards or pledge cards you got?

A No, some people came up to me and said, "Hey, I know you have tickets. I will take one off of you," but nobody ever offers to help you sell tickets; forget it.

Q Do you know an individual named Joseph Kozlowski?

A Yes, I do.

Q How do you know him?

A Former employee; to the best of my knowledge, a disgruntled employee.

Q He was someone you supervised, is that correct?

A Yes.

Q What was his exact position?

A He was a facility service supervisor at the Elston Avenue facility.

Q Did you have day to day contact with him?

A Well, the only time I had contact with him is if I was out in that facility supervising or making sure everything was going right. Then I would see him.

Q What was the nature of his job?

A The supervisor's duties varied. He could have been in charge of the information counter one day. Another day he could have been in charge of the eye counter and the grading of test papers. He could have been the starter outside making sure that all of the cars were taken in proper order, supervising the examiners giving the road test.

Q Was it within his authority to make the decision as to whether someone actually got a license or not?

A I don't know if you would say it was in his authority. If he helped grade papers and someone failed, he should fail them. If they passed, he should pass them; but if someone failed, and he passed them, then that is another story.

I don't think that he was in a position where he could say, "You get a license and you don't," you know.

His job was supervising employees, making sure that they were doing their work.

Q Did Joseph Kozlowski ever receive any contributor cards or those pledge cards from you?

A From me personally, no, never.

I don't even know if Joseph Kozlowski was working for our office at this time because he was ter-

minated. Now, just when he was terminated, I don't know, but he never received cards from me.

Q We have been informed that he took several leaves of absence. Is that what you are referring to as well?

A No, I wasn't referring to that. I know he took several leaves of absence.

I know he was terminated. Now whether he was terminated before the Dixon for Senate Committee came into being or after, I don't know.

That is why this has me puzzled because I have never given him tickets.

- O Did he ever come to you and ask you for tickets?
- A No.
- Q Do you know if anybody else working for the Dixon Committee ever gave Joseph Kozlowski any contributor cards?
  - A I don't know.
  - Q Have you ever talked to any of the other --
  - A No, I didn't talk to him.
- Q No, have you ever talked to any of the other supervisors or facility directors to ask them --
  - A About giving tickets to Kozlowski?
  - Q To ask them if they ever gave tickets to him.
  - A No.

- Q Have you ever talked with Charles Smith about the question of whether any tickets were ever given to Joseph Kozlowski?
  - A No.
- Q Apart from whether Joseph Kozlowski ever got any contributor cards from you, do you know if he ever offered to give you or in fact gave you any contributor checks?
  - A Never.
  - Q He never did?
  - A Never.
- Q Were you ever informed at any point that Joseph Kozlowski was receiving payoffs in exchange for issuing driver's licenses?
  - A Never.
- Q Were you ever informed that he was receiving payoff money and in fact turning the money around and putting it into the Dixon for Senate Committee?
  - A Never.
- Q Were you ever informed that Lou Mitchell or Gene Sullivan were receiving any payoffs and were turning that money around and putting it into the Dixon Committee?
  - A No, never.

Let me ask you if I understand this right.

The question you just asked me, if Lou Mitchell and Gene Sullivan, now, are you saying that someone gave them money to pay them off and they turned around and bought Dixon tickets with it?

- Q That is correct.
- A Okay, no, never.
- Q Were you ever informed that they were given any payoff money for issuing licenses at all?
  - A Never.
- Q Have you yourself ever received any payoff money in exchange for issuing licenses?
  - A Never.
- Q When did you first become aware of the allegation that Joseph Kozlowski had received payoff monies in exchange for issuing licenses?
- A When I was notified by your Committee or your office or whatever.
- Q That is the first time you have heard of this matter?
  - A Yes.
- Q You had not heard of it in the newspapers or any other place?
  - A No. No, because -- was it in a newspaper?
  - Q It is my understanding, yes.

Well, perhaps not in a newspaper. My understanding is that there was some television broadcast.

A At the time this all happened, I was on vacation. I think you are aware of that.

Q Our understanding is that it was sometime just before the general election that this allegation broke.

A Oh, oh, oh, you are talking -- well, they had his face blocked off on television, but we knew who it was; but I don't recall him making any accusations where he named names.

(There was a brief discussion off the record, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

MR. THOMAS: Back on the record. BY MR. THOMAS:

Q By way of clarification, what I was referring to was what we understand was a television broadcast concerning these allegations that funds were used to assist the Dixon for Senate Committee.

Now, is that the allegation which was on the news to which you were referring initially in your testimony?

A No, I thought you were referring to the TV program that came on just before the election in February.

The one you are referring to I saw maybe

30 seconds or a minute on TV, but at that time he never

implicated me or anyone else. So I didn't think you were

even talking about that one.

Q With regard to the allegations concerning the Dixon for Senate Committee fund raising, did you at any point discuss those allegations with any of the other people who assisted, who volunteered to sell tickets?

A No, because I had no knowledge of it until right now.

- Q Were you involved at all in any disciplinary proceedings against Joseph Kozlowski?
  - A Yes, I was.
  - Q What was the nature of those proceedings?

A Joseph Kozlowski had a problem, and I think this was one of the reasons for his many leaves of absence.

One day I was at the north facility and he was gone to lunch and came back from lunch late, had

This happened a few times before, so I came down on him for it, and after that I think he was transferred to another facility, and I guess this is his way of getting even.

He did make a statement, "Well, I'll get even with you."

Q He did state that to you?

A Well, not to me but other employees heard him. He said, "I'll get even with him and Mitchell."

Q Do you recall specifically what individuals he made that statement to?

A No, but I can find out. There were a few employees at the north facility that he made it to or that heard him say it, and this is his way of getting even, I guess.

That wasn't the first time. We had another problem with him at the Schaumburg facility; where he took

caused a problem at Schaumburg.

(There was a brief interruption, after which the taking of the deposition was resumed as follows:)

#### BY THE WITNESS:

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A Sitting here thinking, one of the people that heard him say it was a female supervisor named Joanne Annunzio.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Do you know where she is employed right now?

- A She is employed at the Elston Avenue facility.
- Q Do you know how she spells her last name, just to be sure?
  - A A-n-n-u-n-z-i-o, or something like that.
- Q I also want to clarify something. We just recently spoke with Robert Guzlas, and he told us that he received approximately 900 contributor cards and he said that he gave them to various of the facility directors.

Now, we asked him to provide specific names if he could recall. He did list your name as a person that he had given tickets to.

Is that an inaccurate statement on his part or does that refresh your recollection at all?

A Okay, let me say this. I am trying to think.

It is possible that Bob could have dropped them off to me, but I still think that I picked them up at the meeting. They had them in envelopes with the names on them.

Now, it could be that the first one we got at the meeting. Then the second fund raiser Bob might have given them to me because I missed a few meetings. So it is possible that at one or the other, he might have given me some cards, but I know I picked up my cards at a meeting.

Q You have indicated you don't recall specifically

how many contributor cards you received or how many tickets you sold. Do you recall any more specifically in terms of dollar amount how many tickets you yourself sold?

A No, because I would turn in whatever I sold each week. Like I say, I kept a record to make sure that the money I turned in matched the amount of tickets I had so that when I had everything finished, they couldn't come up and say, "Well, you owe X amount of dollars," or, "You still have this amount of tickets out."

So whatever it was every week, I would turn it in, and after the election was over and I figured I'm all clear and checked out with my money, I just threw everything away.

Q There is one other reference in the videotape that I would like to ask you about.

Mr. Kozlowski made the allegation that on one occasion he recalled you brought several individuals through the facility, Puerto Rican individuals, and that you gave them driver's licenses in exchange for money.

Is that a true statement?

A False, and everything else he said.

MR. THOMAS: All right, I have no further questions. Do you have any questions you would like to ask?

MR. STEINBACK: I may.

MR. THOMAS: Maybe I should clarify also. We should clarify whether you want to see the deposition, whether you want to waive signature?

MR. STEINBACK: We will waive signature, but I would like a copy of the deposition.

I have an inquiry which I would like to make on the record of you, if I might, and that is whether there is now or you foresee an investigation of Carl Catuara in conjunction with this; that is, are you investigating him in particular?

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MR. THOMAS: The way the Commission operates, we make a reason to believe finding before we start investigating someone. We have only made a reason to believe finding against the Dixon Committee and Joseph Kozlowski. No such finding has been made against Mr. Catuara.

MR. STEINBACK: In that event, then I don't think I have any questions of him.

MR. THOMAS: Thank you very much for your time.

MR. STEINBACK: Thank you.

- A. There were certain volunteers that assisted me in the 10th and 12th Comgressional Districts.
  - Q Could you give those peoples' names?
- A. There was a Carolyn Clemenacus. Don't ask me to spell that. A Rona Croll. Lou Mitchel. That is about it.
- Q Could you describe how the Dixon for Senate

  Committee was organized structurally; for example, did it have

  various offices throughout the State or one central location?
  - A There were two offices.
  - @ Where were those offices?
  - A Springfield, Illinois, and Chicago.
  - Q What was the function of each of those?

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- Did you work out of one of these offices, to the eschusion of the other, or did you work out of both?
  - A Oh, no. just strictly the Chicago office.
- O To beaktitack a little bit, was your office, your business office, in Chicago as opposed to Springfield?
  - A Yes.
- Q Were there any particular individuals in charge of those two offices that you just described for the Campaign?
- A Well, as I said, Tom Allen was the coordinator for the office in Cook County. And I think, and I am not sure, that Timothy McInerney was the office manager and coordinator out of Springfield.
- Q Were you, yourself, involved in any of the fundraising activities for the Dixon for Senate Committee?
  - A Yes.
- Q What was the nature of your involvement in those activities?
  - A Which fund-raising activity?
  - Q Maybe we should backtrack. What fund-raising

(Discussion had off the record.)
BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Now, can you state what fund reisers you recall this Committee having had during that period?

- Now, as to each of those, what was the nature of your involvement in those fund-raising activities?
- A. In the first fund raiser, in the Fall of '79, I, at the direction of the Deputy Secretary of State --
  - Q Who was?
- A. Joseph P. McMahon. -- volunteered to coordinate the fund-raising activities for the cocktail party in that I helped in the printing of the invitations, the contribution cards and cocktail tickets, and also coordinated where the cocktail party

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you have identified, would you describe what each of those that each of those that raisers was, how it was structured?

You have indicated, I think, that two of them were

- A. All were cooktail parties.
- Q And where were they held?
- A. Three of them were held at the Bismarck Rotel, and one was held at the McCormick Inn.
- O Did any of those involve the sale of tickets to attend the fund raiser?

MR. ISRAEL: Did any of what?

MR. THOMAS: Any of those fund-raising events you have described, those four fund-raising events.

MR. ISRAEL: I don't understand the question.

MR. THOMAS: Did they require the sale of tickets to attend the fund raiser?

MR. ISRAEL: I think he has already said that --

MR. THOMAS: Istaink he has clarified that at least with regard to one. There were some ticket sales involved.

MR. ISRAEL: My notes show the following:

BY MR. THOMAS:

A Having had some clarifying discussing with counsel off the record, let me clarify the question.

Did those fund-raising events that you have described involve the solicitation of contributions which would then result in the issuance of a ticket to attend a fund-raising event?

A Yes.

(Witness consults with attorney.)

(Discussion off the record.)

MR, THOMAS: Back on the record.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q. With regard to the four fund-raising events you have described, was Tom Allen the person in overall charge of those fund raisers, in planning them?

A No.

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- A. Well, there were volunteers that planted the fund
- O You indicated that you were saked to have tickets printed and to arrange for the location of the first fund raiser, is that correct?
  - A. Uh-huh.
- A Is that what you are referring to, then, in your last answer that, for example, you were the person that was asked to plan and coordinate the first fund raiser?
- A. Well, I was one of a couple of volunteers that did it, yes.
  - Q Let's go through event-by-event, then.
  - A Okay.
- Q With regard to that first event, could you tell me all of the individuals who were involved in planning and coordinating that event?
- A. It would be Joseph McMahon, myself, a gentleman by the name 6f Ray Evans, E-v-a-n-s, Tom Allen, and that is it.
  - A How about the second fund raiser?
- A It would have been Joe McMahon and Tom Allen, and possibly -- no, I am not sure of any other names.

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- 9. How about the third fund raiser?
- A ... When was the third?

MR. ISRAEL: Spring of '80; Summer of '80, Tather.

THE WITNESS: Emmit O'Neill and Tom Allen:

BY MR. THOMAS:

Now, with regard to each of these fund raiders, what individual was actually in charge of deciding who was to solicit -- I am sorry, let me strike that.

Who was in charge of who was to solicit for the sale of tickets?

- A I don't understand the question.
- Q You have identified various individuals who were in charge, you have indicated, of coordinating and planning those particular fund raisers. We have gone through three.
  - A. Uh-huh.
- Q I was trying to find out who among those persons or who else might have been involved in actually deciding what individuals were going to be authorized to solicit persons to buy tickets.

THE WITNESS: Can you repeat the question?

(The reporter read the record.)

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# (Discussion off the record.)

you never't asked the first question as to emether or not there was a formal structure by which only certain people were authorized to sall. He doesn't know how to inswer the question the way you have asked it.

MR. THOMAS: At this point which it would be most beneficial to go through each fund raiser you have described and see if he can get it cleared up as to the precedure used.

MR. ISRAEL: Do you want to know how people were used, is that the question?

MR. THOMAS: That will be part of what we get into.
BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q With regard to the first fund reiser --
- A. Uh-huh.
- Q -- in the Fall of 1979, could you give me a description, generally, of how ticket sales were solicited and how tickets were actually issued to people?

# A. Okay.

MR. ISRAEL: The question was how were ticket sales solicited and how were the tickets actually delivered to the people who responded to a solicitation?

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THE MITTERS: Okay, There was a mostled that I was asked to attend, by Joe McMahon, and he asked if I would volunteer to help set up the mechanisms by which we would put on a cocktail party to raise funds for Allan Dixon. During that meeting I basically said that this would be the first time that we had ever raised funds for a federal candidate, a federal election, therefore -- and I understood that there were certain methanisms or requirements that the federal elections had versus State campaign fund raising.

So in order to get it clarified on what we could -who we could and could not solicit, the campaign treasurer in Springfield sent us up guidelines. At the same time we, Mr. McMahon and myself, met and discussed who we would request to volunteer to help us solicit tickets. Because of previous campaigns there were certain individuals that worked with the Secretary of State's Office that have helped us before. We also decided that we would have a mail solicitation for that cocktail party. And that was about basically it.

I then called a couple of people that had volunteered to help us in the past and asked them if they would attend a meeting where we would discuss soliciting and selling of tickets to campaign fund raisers.

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BY MR. THOMAS:

- 0 Who were those individuals?
- have called one or two other people -- I can't remember the exact names, I think it might have been Game Sullivan, or something, and I also asked beb to check and see if some of the other guys who had helped us in the past would attend the meeting.

The meeting was held in Chicago in the evening, after work, and it was a general social gethering where we just discussed the fact that there was going to be a cocktail fund raiser for Allan Dixon and would these gentlemen help us, as they have done in the past, make the party a success.

- Who attended that meeting?
- A I am not going to be able to tell you everybody.

  I think there were about ten or fifteen people there. Guzlas was there. Carl Cotura, Gene Sullivan, Tom Allen, myself,

  Joe McMahon, Jack Hayes, H-a-y-e-s, and some other individuals.

  I might have mentioned them before, I am not really sure.
  - Q Was Lou Mitchel at that meeting?
  - A No, I don't think so.
  - Now, as I understand it, you then, I take it,

tickets to the fund relear, as well as to have a sail solicitation for the first fund relear?

A We were going to have a mail-out anyway, we always had a mail-out for previous campaigns.

What we were going to do was talk to these gentlemen to see if they would help us because we were running for a completely different office. These gentlemen were now under a personnel code, and we asked them if they would be interested in volunteering to help us on the solicitation. We explained to them. By the time the meeting happened we had the general outline of the federal regulations.

MR. ISRAEL: I think it is important to know this.

When Allan Dixon became Secretary of State you were dealing

with a patronage system in the Office of the Secretary of

State. By the date we are discussing Mr. Dixon had already

gotten legislation through, had legislation sponsored which he

had introduced so that we were now dealing with the merit

system. It is important to lay that out.

MR. THOMAS: Okay.

THE WITNESS: And as in the past, because of the merit code that we had in the office --

MR. EPRARL: That is why I gave it to you, because the key word there was "marit."

THE WITNESS: Let's see. I have got to backtrack a

The civil Service system was passed by the legislature in 1977. It took effect in August or September of 1977.

Allen Diron ran for reelection in 1978. By the time he was running for reelection in 1978, almost 95 percent of the employees were under the merit code. Therefore, there were certain rules that had to be followed within the office under the merit code. So the personnel director sent out a letter saying that no solicitation of tickets, or anything, could be done at the office, within the office, that employees did not have to buy tickets.

At the meeting we had, again, we went over that area, and then also the prohibitions on who could donate in a federal campaign, for example, no corporate checks could be accepted, that any donation of \$100 or more had to be in a check or money order, it could not be cash, and the other prohibitions, the maximum amount an individual could give, a thousand dollars.

We also stated that tickets -- and we had tickets printed up with numbers, the tickets would not be given to the

individuals who ware selling or soliciting, instead they would receive an invitation, if they wanted them, because it was a large card, and also a contribution card, which was also numbered, skay.

number on the contribution card and the ticket. We had printed up approximately 1000 contribution cards and 3000 tickets. So that my original idea was that we would be able to match the ticket and the contribution cards so we would have no problem. We would give them the contribution cards, they would be filled out. The checks --

BY MR. THOMAS:

Are you talking about the various individuals who attended this meeting and who were agreeing to help solicit?

A Yes, the volunteers, we would provide them with the contribution cards and the invitations. They then could handle it one of two ways. We also give them envelopes where the address of the Campaign Headquarters in Chicago was. The individual who was asked to donate to the campaign could mail it in, the contribution card filled out, and the check, to our Campaign Headquarters; or, the individuals soliciting, the

volunteers, could take that contribution and and shock and then turn it in to the Campaign Headquarters.

We can into a problem because on the contribution card instead of a person giving, let's say a hundred dollars, he gave five hundred.

- Q When you say the "person" --
- A. One ticket to the cocktail party was a hundred dollars. The individual would give us a check for \$200.
- Q When you say "the individual," again, do you mean the volunteers?
- A The contributor, the person filling out the card who had given us a check.
  - Q Okay.
- A The contributor would say \$200. Well, the problem was immediately it went out the window because I had a contribution card, one, and I was going to give two tickets out numbered "1" and "2," so that blew the whole thing out the window. So then what we decided to do was, on the contribution card we would write in the ticket number mailed to that individual who had purchased the tickets.

MR. ISRAEL: Off the record.

(Discussion off the record.)

MR, THOMAS: Let's go back on the decord and let

THE WITNESS: So that what would happen is it would be turned in to the Chicago Campaign Headquarters. Chicago Campaign Headquarters would verify that the check and the name on the contribution cards matched, that it was not a check from a corporation, it did not violate the laws as far as they could tell, and the check was then deposited to an account which was set up with, I think it was the First National Bank of Chicago, I am not sure, and at the same time a Xerox copy of the contribution card which indicated the ticket number sent to the individual who was on the contribution card was made, and that Xerox copy was kept in the Chicago office and the Xerox copy of the check and the actual contribution card was sent to the main Springfield headquarters so that they had a record of it and they could then start working on it, because we had a computer program to record all donations for recording purposes.

MR. THOMAS: Let me at this time mark for identification F.E.C. Exhibit No. 2.

(F.E.C. Exhibit No. 2, was marked for identification.)

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- Q. Could you identify that document?
- A Yes. It is a copy of a contribution gard used in the fund-raising activities in Cook County for this Diwon for Senate Consistes:
- Q Is this the contribution card that you were just describing or a duplication of one of those contribution cards you were just describing?
  - A It is a duplination of a contribution card.

MR. ISRAEL: For the record, we have a 2-page document here and we are looking at the Xerox copy which is 2-1/2 x 11 sheets. The Xeroxed portions of the contribution cards which are shown there are shown in the actual size of the contribution card, itself, and page 1 of the 2 pages is the front side of the card and it is entitled "Dixon for Senate Committee," The second line is "Enclosed find check in the amount of" and a blank left to enter the contribution number, and on the second page, which is the back side of the card, it is entitled "Information for Contributors."

about the card.

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THE WITNESS: The card, the Record copy of the card
TOU have there in front of you says on the bottom like just
above where "Pederal law requires," and the number, it says
"One ticket will be issued for each \$50.00 contribution."

"One ticket will be issued for each \$100.00 contribution."

Okay. Three of the cocktail parties were \$100, one of the cocktail parties was a sample of the \$50 contribution card, but the same format was used for all of them, as far as I know.

### BY MR. THOMAS:

Q I note also at the bottom of page 1 of this document appears the handwritten note "dep" and the date "2/29/50." Can you identify then --

A Well, also then in indicating on the card what the ticket number was assigned in 1979, we also indicated on the card for Springfield's Campaign Headquarters information when that check was deposited at the First National Bank because Chicago deposited money in the First National Bank but could not, you know, draw the money out. It was set up, as I understand it, that at the end of every month the First National Bank would automatically transfer all funds except for \$2000

es the best in Springffeld, which was the main deposition for the sampling spinds.

The reason \$2000 was kept buck is because we had a lot of bounding checks.

9 Can you explain, as to this particular document, Exhibit 2, what the figo. 2145" corresponds to? Does that correspond to any particular ticket number?

A No. That was a carry-over from my original, brilliant brain storm, but what it allowed us to do was, for
example, Charles Smith volunteered to help solicit money for
the campaign, would be given a group of contribution cards.

Okay. The individual issuing the contribution cards would
record the numbers of the cards that Charles Smith received.

Okay. So that, therefore, we would know that, let's say
Charles Smith was issued 50 cards, it would be 1-to-50, so

O Now, I believe you described that at a certain point you adopted the procedure of writing on the contribution cards the numbers of the tickets which were sold and could correspond to the particular contribution card.

MR. ISRAEL: I think he said that was as to fund raiser number one.

fund raiser number one. How they did it in the other three fund raisers, I don't know, because I was not involved in the actual operation there. Then we had a full-time campaign coordinator.

#### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Q Does the committee now have a record, then, of those individuals to whom contribution cards were given for the first fund raiser?
  - A They should.
  - Q You don't know?
  - A. I don't know.
  - Q Now, you described the procedures used for

collecting sales for the first fund raiser and for receipt and coposit of the contributions. Let me clarify. Are you saying you do not have any knowledge of how the subsequent three fund raisers differed from the first procedure?

- A Well, in the second three, or second three, fund reisers, I was not involved in that area of it, all I did was.

  I was a volunteer soliciting contributions to Dixon's campaign.

  They used secondar the format that I had set up for the first one but they made changes within their own internal operations, and I was not privy to that operation.
- With regard to those subsequent three fund raisers, who would be most likely in your view to know exactly how those procedures went?
  - A. Tom Allen, Emmit O'Neill or the Campaign Treasurer.
- Q Maybe we should clarify. As I understand it, the Campaign Treasurer has changed during the period that we initially described --
  - A. Uh-huh.
  - Q -- April of '79 through the end of December of '80?
  - A Uh-huh.
- Q You just referred to the "Campaign Treasurer." Who specifically were you referring to, by name?

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MR. ISRAEL: That is in regard to 2, 3 and 4?

MR. THOMAS: Yes, Mir. in regard to This Delects

4, 3 and 4.

THE WITNESS: As Car as I know, the Campaign Treasurer for 2, 3 and 4 was a Joe Wilkins. I am not sure when exactly he became the Campaign Treasurer.

was provided to the Commission pursuant to an interrogatory by
the Commission: It consists of 3 pages. The first page is a

I am showing that document to the witness and counsel.

(F.E.C. Exhibit No. 3, was marked for identification.)

MR. ISRAEL: Scott, off the record?

(Discussion off the record.)

OFFICE CONTENT

MR. ISRAEL: For the record, the check we are looking at, Exhibit 3, is a 3-page document consisting of a check that is drawn on the Dixon for Senate Campaign Committee, paid

to the order of Richard A. Gregolie, dated December 20th, 1979, in an amount of 350,

A letter, which is the second page of Exhibit 5, deted December 26th, 1979, to Mr. Gregoine from a Mr. Keith. And then another page that I can't even tell what it is all about, but someone else can, maybe.

May we confer off the record?

(Discussion off the record.)

MR. THOMAS: Back on the record.

BY MR. THOMAS:

- 0 Mr. Smith, can you identify what has been marked as Exhibit No. 3?
  - A Can I look at it?
  - 0. Sure.

(Document handed the witness.)

- A Well, the first page is a check.

  MR. ISRAEL: Can you identify it?

  BY MR. THOMAS:
- Q Can you identify, meaning not describe what we have presented to you, but do you of your own knowledge recognize what it is?
  - A. I don't understand.

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(Discussion had off the record.)

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BY IO. THOMAS:

- Q Also to clarity, have you ever seen any of these Cocuments before?
  - A. No.
- O New I would like to direct your attention to page

  3 of Emhibit 1. You will note what appear to be certain forms.

  For example, in the upper lefthand corner, a form which contains a name and an address of an individual, and there appears to be a number associated with the form.
  - A. Uh-huh.
  - Q Do you recognize that form at all?
  - A. The form?
  - Q Yes.
  - A Yes.
  - Q What is that form?
- A. That is the format that I understand, or that -no, I am sorry, that is the format that Downstate used in their
  ticket sales. It is really -- it was a 2-part form.
  - Q Can you describe how that form was used, if you know?

compaign fund raisers, had printed up a ticket, and also a contribution card, is what I sall it, a contribution card. It was part of the ticket, it was perforated. Okay. ### BY MR. THOMAS:

- Again to make it perfectly clear, then, what appears on page 3 of Exhibit 3, those forms were not at all used in Cook County in any of the fund raisers that you were involved with, is that correct?
  - A. No. Cook County, we never used that form.

    MR. ISRAEL: Yes, that is correct?

    THE WITNESS: Yes, that is correct.

    BY MR. THOMAS:
- Now, you stated earlier that the individuals who were asked to sell tickets, and who were given these contribution cards, in Cook County, were able to either approach persons, solicit them for contributions, and receive the checks themselves and return those to the Committee or have

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the individuals they solicited send their checks directly to the Dixon Committee. Is that porrect?

- A. They weren't welling tickets.
- Q They were soliciting people to buy tickets.

I understand that what happened was that the individuals soliciting did not have the tickets in hand, them-selves, they were soliciting tickets?

- A Yes. Correct.
- Now, is it correct that they had the option of either receiving the checks from the individuals and returning them, themselves, to the Dixon Committee or having the individuals mail them in an envelope to the Dixon Committee?
  - A Correct.
- Q Now, could you state, if you know, which of those two procedures was used most often?
  - A. No.
- Q To your knowledge, they were both used substantially, neither one was just a rarely used procedure?

MR. ISRAEL: Excuse me. The problem is with the word "used." That would indicate that the Committee itself used a procedure. It is really up to the donor to decide whether somebody is going to deliver the ticket or whether

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he is going to send it in.

MR. THOMAS: I dids't mean to connote that it was
senothing that was imposed as a procedure by the Committee.
The "practice," then, if that is clearer. Was there a more
prayelent practice?

MR. ISRAEL: Again, you are dealing with the Committee practice. He can't tell you about the donor practice.

MR. THOMAS: If he knows how the money came in --

MR. ISRAEL: If the question is can you tell me, if you know, what was the most frequent manner in which contribution cards were received, was it through the mail or by a solicitor bringing the cards back to headquarters and then having the tickets issued, would you please tell me?

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q The latter is the question.

THE WITNESS: Can I have the question repeated?

(The record read by reporter.)

THE WITNESS: The most frequent was the volunteers soliciting -- who solicited people to purchase tickets, would return the contribution cards along with the checks.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q And then the tickets themselves were mailed by the

Committee to the contributors, is that correct?

- A Yes
- 0 Is that true with regard to the first two fund
  - A Pardon me a second.

    (Witness confers with attorney.)

    MR. ISRAEL: Off the record.

    (Discussion off the record.)

    BY.MR. THOMAS:
  - Q Let me restate the question.

The Committee in both the first and second fund raisers always mail the tickets to the contributors.

A We did up until the very last week prior to the fund raiser because of the time problem of getting the tickets to the denor, we set up two criteras: we would either hold the tickets at the door for the fund raiser under the individual denor's name, or if the individual denor didn't want them held at the door the volunteer who was bringing in the contribution card with the check could sign the contribution card stating that the donor, who was receiving Ticket No. 1, has requested that the ticket be given to me, and I will personally hand that ticket to him. And then we had the volunteer sign the

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contribution card to that affect.

- In how many instances would you say the latter Occurred?
  - I would have no idea.
- Do you know of any particular Individual who was a volunteer soliciting the sale of tickets, who was, in fact, given tickets to deliver to the contributores?
  - Uh-hah.

I received a telephone call back in early January from the Treasurer of the Campaign at that time, Joseph Wilkins, who informed me that there were certain questions that had been received from the Federal Election Commission, that an individual by the name of Patrick Caddigan -- I don't know how to spell his name -- would be contacting me to see if I could help him answer some questions regarding the questions submitted by the Federal Election Commission.

Subsequently, I received a telephone call from Mr. Caddigan. It was a 3-way call, Caddigan, myself and Joseph Wilkins, who was the Treasurer at that time. And they asked me if I could remember some of the names of the people who volunteered to help sell tickets, or raise funds, to our

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compaign fund relocks, and I said I couldn't remember them all but I could give them some names, and I gave them this list of names

- Q Did you --
- A Wait, I am not finished.

I subsequently, then, about a week ago, met with Fred Israel and Jay Myerson, and I was asked if this was the list of the names that I had given to Caddigan. I reviewed it and I came up with a couple of additional names that popped late my mind, and I gave those to Mr. Myerson.

- Q Okay. Let me clarify it. Are all of the names which are listed on Exhibit 4 names which you provided, or do you recall?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q They are?
- A. They are all the names that I provided, that I recalled at the time.
- Q Did you at that time examine committee records to find out, for example, the various individuals who were given contributor cards in the manner in which you have described?
  - A Whose committee?
  - Q The Dixon Committee records.

MR. ISRAEL: He has already enemered that question.
THE WITNESS: No.

I I am only trying to find out if, in light of what
you have etated earlier about there was a method whereby
individuals who received contributor cards were given specified
Cards with specified numbers, if there was any effort on your
part to examine those kinds of records and find out if particular individuals had received cards.

BY MR. THOUAS:

MR. ISRAEL: Excuse me. The problem is we may be confusing the witness. I think he is answering the question with regard to how he answered these interrogatories, and in answer to that he said he was operating from memory. If you want to take him back in time and not relate it to this list in Interrogory 5, that is a separate question. That is where I think the confusion is.

MR. THOMAS: Fine. If that needs to be clarified -(Discussion had off the record.)

MR. ISRAEL: The witness can only state what he recognizes as to these names and how they were generated. That was our whole point, and we can't state whether or not these names that Mr. Smith has testified he gave were somehow

MR. THOMAS: This consists of a list of names that Our staff has compiled, again upon the submissions of the Dixon Committee in response to Interrogatory No. 7.

Exhibit No. 3, a check, and then a letter from the Dixon

Committee to an individual. The letter was a letter informity — this list is a compilation of names of individuals to whom the Dixon Committee apparently sent letters informing them that contribution checks they had submitted were not, in fact, proper in form and that they appeared to be contributions in other persons' names, and that they were requesting that the individuals obtain a check from a particular individual apparently in whose contribution the name was made.

MR. ISRAEL: And, Mr. Thomas, it is your statement

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that this list then was compiled directly from the ensuers supplied by dillespie Caddigan, and Gillespie, in response to Question 7-A of the Interrogatories?

MR. THOMAS: Yes.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q My question to you is, examining this list of names, can you now --

MR. ISRAEL: He doesn't have it in front of him. (Document handed to the witness.)

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Can you now state whether any of those individuals were authorized to solicit the sales of tickets?

(Witness confers with attorney.)

(Witness and attorney leave the room for discussion off the record.)

THE WITNESS: For what fund raiser?

- Q For any of the four fund raisers that you previously described.
  - A Yes. Two of the names I recognized were authorized.
  - Q Whose names?
  - A. Robert McKeating and Terrance Link.

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- A. I know specifically in the Fall of '79, and I don't know on the others.
- Both of those individuals. I take it that you are saying were authorized for the Fall, not just one but both individuals?
  - A Both individuals.
- Q Did those individuals, Mr. McKeating and Mr. Link sell, actually sell tickets in Cook County?

MR. ISRAEL: Do you know whether they did or not?
THE WITNESS: No, I don't know.

- O To clarify with regard to the four fund raisers you have described, were the ticket sales intended to be for the most part confined to Cook County alone as opposed to Downstate?
  - A. Yes.
- Now, having identified, then, the individuals listed on Exhibit 5, and having shown you the list of individuals referred to on Exhibit 4 as having been authorized to sell tickets, let me begin with yourself.

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Can you explain to me how authorisation was given to you to sell tickets; in other words, was it done orally or was it done orally or was it done in writing?

A. Well, no, because not all of these people were at that one meeting. There might have --

Q only if you know.

A Yes, the word went out that we were having a fund raiser for Allan Dixon, okay, and then people called up and said "Can I volunteer to help sell campaign contributions," and if they volunteered, we accepted all the help we could get.

Now, you have used the word "we." Were all of these persons directed to one particular individual for them to find out if in fact they could sell tickets? Were they directed to McMahon, for example, or were they directed to you, for example, or could both Mr. McMahon and yourself give the okay to sell tickets?

A. For the first fund raiser, both McMahon and myself could give authorization.

# MR. ISRAEL: Held it for a second.

# BY MR. THOMAS:

- Who sold tickets, or aplicated the sale of tickets, was it tightly confined to a narrow group of individuals or did it in practice work out to be a much broader group that was, in fact, able to authorize ticket sales?
  - A. That is a double question.

It was a broad group that could, if they volunteered to solicit contributions on behalf of the U. S. Senator's campaign as long as they followed the rules laid down by the Dixon for Senate Committee.

- Of the people we have identified as being authorized to sell tickets, were they in turn, or were they authorized to in turn authorize other people to sell tickets?
- A. If an individual asked them if they could help sell tickets and they wanted to volunteer to help do that, yes.
- Q In other words, there was no direction given to these individuals we have identified specifically not to allow

> > THE WITNESS: Can I have the question again?
> > BY MR. THOMAS:

MR. ISRABL: Why don't you do this, why don't you ask him what he did in regard to permitting other people who he had authorized to sell tickets to further authorize. Maybe we can get it that way.

MR. THOMAS: Fine.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Let's begin with the question of were you ever directed specifically not to let anyone else sell any of the tickets that you were authorized to sell?

- A. No.
- Q No such explicit direction was given to you?
- A. No.

O To your knowledge, was any such explicit direction given to any of the other individuals authorized to sail tickets?

A You gotts realize, in the Secretary of State -- or in Allen Dixon's raisers for Secretary of State. He had two; one in '76 and '78, '79. He ran for State Treasurer in 1970.

A lot of people over that time period have taken part in Allen Dixon's campaigns in fund raising.

The directions, because when we were in a new ball game, a Federal election, the directions that we gave to people, that I received, were, "You can help ask people if they want to volunteer to help you sell the tickets, but" -- and here is the "but," -- "they have to follow the rules laid down by the F.E.C. Also they have to follow a set of" -- and we provided a set of mimeographed guidelines to anybody who wanted to volunteer to sell the tickets, okay, and to solicit funds for the campaign.

And as long as Charlie Smith knew that the individual he was asking to was a reliable individual, because you could run into somebody wanting to sell tickets, and when I am speaking of "tickets," I am speaking of the contribution cards, who could have worked for the opposition, you are not going

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to let him solicit because he might just go out and try to selecting your efforts but doing things that were not proper under the Federal Law. So there were guidelines given to individuals on recruiting assistance in soliciting compaign funds.

- Q Again speaking in terms of your own activities, did you, yourself, ever give any contributor cards to other individuals to ask them to solicit sales?
  - A Suce.
- Q Do you know if Robert Guzlas ever gave any cards to other individuals to ask them to solicit sales?
  - A Sure.
  - Are you saying you know, or you know it happened?

    It did happen?
  - A. Right. I gave cards to Bob Guzlas.
- Did Bob Guslas give any cards to individuals other than the individuals listed on Exhibits 4 or 5?
- A. I am sure he did, but I don't know exactly who he gave them to.

MR. ISRAEL: You are sure he did, or he may have?

THE WITNESS: He may have.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Q Do you know an individual named Joseph Kaslowski?

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- Mor do you know him?
- A As a former employee of the Secretary of State's office.
  - p. How long have you known him?
- A. How long have I known him, or how long have I known of him?
- Q Well, let's begin with how long have you known of him?
  - A Since 1977, Pebruary.
  - A Have you ever met him personally?
  - A On occasions.
- Q When was the first time that you met him personally?
- A. It would be at approximately late February, March of 1977.
  - Q All right.

You state that he was a former employee of the Secretary of State's Office. He is no longer employed there?

- A As I understand, he is no longer employed at the Secretary of State's Office.
  - Q Do you know when he ceased employment there?

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- g Before he was suspended, what was his position in the Secretary of State's Office?
- A. Before he was suspended he was on a medical leave of absence from the Secretary of State's Office.
- Q And before that, when he was actively employed, what was his position?
- A. He was a supervisor at the Elston Avenue Facility, and then he had been transferred to either Schaumberg or the West Side.
  - Q When was he transferred?
- A. I do not remember the exact time period, but it was after he came back off his first medical leave of absence.
  - Q Do you have any estimation of when that was?
  - A It could -- no, I don't.
  - Q 1977, '78, '79?
  - A It would have been '79 and '80.
- Q Do you know if it was before or after the first fund raiser that we have discussed?
- A. I think he was on a medical leave of absence. I think he was on a medical leave of absence in 1979.

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Q The entire year?

- A For a period of time, and I am not sure when that period of time was,
- Q. When he was actively employed in the Secretary of State's Office, who were his supervisors?
  - At what period? I mean, he was employed under us.

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BY MR. THOMAS:

- @ How do you know that?
- A. When Mr. Kaslowski went on television with his charges, Gene Sullivan was directed to prepare a memorandum tegarding Joseph's allegations. I was given a copy of that memorandum, and in that memorandum Gene Sullivan stated that he was not authorized to sell tickets.

MR: ISRAEL: "he" being Mr. Keelowzki?

THE WITNESS: "he" being Mr. Kaslowski.

BY MR. THOMAS:

- Aside from what that memorandum stated --
- A Gene Sullivan also verbally told me that Joseph Kaslowski was not authorized by him to sell tickets, and in fact, Kaslowski had requested, according to Gene Sullivan, to me, verbally, had requested of Gene to solicit tickets while he was on a medical leave and Gene had turned him down.

We -- let's leave it.

- Q When did Gene Sullivan orally tell you this?
- A. When all this crap started.
- Q Now, when was Gene Sullivan referring to when he said that Kaslowski approached him and asked him if he could sell tickets?

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A. Well, starting with the first fund raiser, as I recall the thing, when I heard about Kaslowski's accusations, okay, I probably picked up the phone -- not "probably," I picked up the phone and called Sullivan up and said "What the hell is going on with Kaslowski," because we had been working on a program with Kaslowski to help him overcome his medical problem. In fact, we were going to fire Kaslowski a long time ago. What I mean by that is a year and a half ago.

Sullivan said, "I don't know, but I never authorized him to do anything like that." But I said -- Sullivan said that he wanted to give a donation to Dixon's campaign and he gave a check to Sullivan and filled out the contribution card.

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Do you know if he ever gave contribution dands to anyone also so that they could assist in selling tickets?

- My personal knowledge, I have no idea.
- You indicated that you had a conversation, or communication of some type with Carl Cotura regarding whether Joseph Kaslowski had actually received contribution cards to assist in solicitation?

MR. ISRAEL: Sorry, he said Sullivan.

MR. THOMAS: We went through the entire list of names.

THE WITNESS: When I went through the list we had general conversations, yes.

- Q Do you recall specifically when that conversation was, and specifically what was said?
- A. Specifically, the exact date of the conversation, no; specifically what was said, no. I can give you a --
  - Q Can you give a general description of what was said?
- A. Sure. We got together almost every other night after work at the Garden Lounge, and in one of those conversations at the Garden Lounge we were discussing Joe and I just

Beginning then with Carl Coture, did he ever tell you that he was obtaining funds through his function in the Secretary of State's Office improperly and then using those moneys to put into the Dixon Campaign contributions?

MR. ISRAEL: Did he ever tell you he was breaking the law?

THE WITNESS: I don't -- you know, you are going to have to rephrase it. I don't know where you are coming from. BY MR. THOMAS:

I am just asking if Carl Cotura ever in his conversations with you about the status of his ticket-sales activities, ever told you that he was obtaining funds through his duties at the Secretary of State's Office improperly, and that he was using those moneys to make contributions to the Dixon Campaign Committee?

Can I talk to him?

(Discussion off the record.)

THE WITNESS: The answer to the question, no.

BY MR. THOMAS:

Did Louis Mitchel ever tell you in any of the a

convergations you had about ticket sales with him, that he had received funds improperly through his position in the Selectory of State's Office and had used those funds for the Dixon for Senate Committee?

A. No, and if they had, first of all they are admitting to me, as the Assistant Deputy Secretary of State, that they were committing illegal acts, if that had happened they would have been fired and they would have not been allowed to continue selling tickets for this office. So, if you are going to ask the same question for Guslas, too, the answer is no.

A Prior to the time that the matter we are discussing here, the allegations we are discussing here came to public light, did anyone else ever inform you that in their view Carl Cotura, or Louis Mitchel, or Bob Guzlas were receiving funds improperly through their official position, and were placing those moneys in the Dixon Campaign Fund?

Q Was the first time that you ever became aware of these allegations in September of 1980, or was it before?

A It could have been before. I am not sure, because there was rumors floating around that O'Neill's people had gotten something that they thought was really hot to offset

We then turned part of this information over to the Federal Attorneys because they had also received the same complaint, okay; but that is the basic — that is the knowledge I have of the investigation and why it took place, and it had nothing to do, as far as I knew, of the investigation, regarding any solicitations for contributions.




