Dear Congressman Lujan:

On February 1, 1983, the Commission found no reason to believe that your Committee violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1), a provision of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act") and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) a provision of the Code of Federal Regulations by failing to include the § 441d statement on certain campaign solicitation letters and invitations. But, reason to believe was found that your Committee violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) by failing to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain yard signs and billboards used in the Committee's 1982 federal election campaign. However, after considering the circumstances of this matter, the Commission has determined to take no further action and close its file. The file will be made part of the public record within thirty days. Should you wish to submit any materials to appear on the public record, please do so within ten days.

The Commission reminds you that your failure to attach the § 441d statement to campaign materials expressly advocating your re-election nevertheless appears to be a violation of the Act and you should take immediate steps to insure that this activity does not occur in the future.

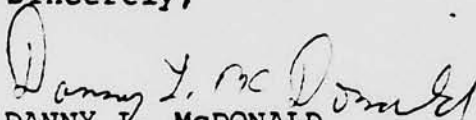

The Federal Election Commission has reviewed the allegations of your complaint dated October 12, 1982, and Representative Lujan's response to the allegations, and determined that there is reason to believe that the Respondent violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1), a provision of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act") and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) a provision of the Code of Federal Regulations by failing to include the § 441d statement on certain campaign solicitation letters and invitations. But, reason to believe was found that the Respondent violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) by failing to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain yard signs and billboards used in the Respondent's 1982 federal election campaign. However, after considering the circumstances of this matter, the Committee has determined to take no further action and close its file.

The Federal Election Campaign Act allows a complainant to seek judicial review of the Commission's dismissal of this section. See 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(8). Should additional information come to your attention which you believe establishes a violation of the Act, you may file a complaint pursuant to the requirements set forth in 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 111.4.

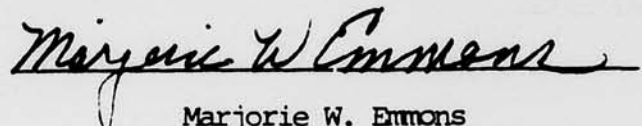

SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

Complaint alleges that Representative Manuel Lujan, Jr. violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) by failing to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain pieces of the Lujan for Congress's (Finance Committee) (hereinafter "the Committee") printed campaign materials.

FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

On October 22, 1982, the Commission received a formal complaint from Jan Alan Hartke alleging violations of the Act by Representative Manuel Lujan, Jr. 1/ Both Mr. Lujan and Mr. Hartke were candidates for election to the United States

1/ The complaint specifically names Representative Lujan as the Respondent in this matter but makes no reference to his principal campaign committee, Lujan for Congress (Finance Committee).

House of Representatives from the First Congressional District of New Mexico.

The complaint specifically alleges that Representative Lujan violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) by failing to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain printed letters, invitations, yard signs, and 4'X 8' billboards that advocate his re-election.

Representative Lujan's response was received in this Office on November 16, 1982; included in his response were selected samples of his printed campaign materials. All the samples provided carried the required disclaimer notice. See Attachment I.

Letters

Representative Lujan, in his response, in part, states:

To the best of my knowledge, no letters soliciting funds nor advocating my election were mailed without statement of specific sponsor.

All the sample letters provided by the Respondent have the required § 441d statement or disclaimer notice, and are, therefore, in compliance with 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1).

Invitations

As for certain invitations that failed to have the notice attached, he states:

Invitations to receptions hosted on behalf of the ...committee do not require a disclaimer notice stating who authorized and

paid for the invitations. Although the primary purpose of the reception is to gain support for ...(the) campaign and those invited may be solicited for contributions at the reception, a disclaimer notice is not required because the invitations will not include any statement which expressly advocates the election...or any statement which specifically solicits contributions (or mentions the possibility of soliciting contributions) to his campaign. (Ref. AO 1980-67: Notices on Invitations. Opinion requested by the Russell B. Long Committee. Published in Volume 6, Number 9, the Federal Election Record, September 1980).

Although bulletin prepared by organization outlined biographical material and characterized his votes, it does not fall within the reporting and identification requirements of this title where it did not refer to any election, or candidacy or to any electoral opponent. (Ref. Federal Election Commission v. Central Long Island Tax Reform Immediately Committee, C.A.N.Y. 1980, 616 F.2d 45.)

In this matter, as in the Long Advisory Opinion, invitations to a political event were distributed by the Committee. The invitations carried no disclaimer notice because the invitations did not contain any specific statement expressly advocating the election and/or defeat of a candidate or a solicitation for campaign funds.

In AO 1980-67, the Commission held, in part, that:

"...in the absence of language which either expressly advocates the election or defeat of a candidate or constitutes a contribution solicitation, that is, requests contributions or gives notice of a fundraising event or activity, a communication does not come within the scope of § 441d."

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Therefore, in view of the above, the Respondent is not in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1), because the invitation(s) in question does not contain language expressly advocating his election or constitute a campaign contribution solicitation. Attachment II.

Yard Signs and Billboards

The Committee does concede, however, that it failed to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain yard signs and billboards.

It would appear that the committee should properly have stated the specific sponsor on the face of such material. However, having noted the oversight, stickers using the disclaimer were promptly attached to the panels and to the billboards. Yard signs were immediately recalled where possible and those having not yet been put out were stamped with the disclaimer wording.

The small signs, reference the one attached to the original complaint, appear not to fall within the reporting and identification requirements since they do not expressly advocate election, set forth party affiliation, nor mention any specific election or name any electoral opponent.

Based on the above response, it is apparent that the Committee violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) 2/ by failing to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain yard signs and billboards used in the Committee's 1982 federal election campaign. Attachment III. However, because the violation was voluntarily corrected as soon

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as the "oversight" was noted (this, of course, does not indicate how long the yard signs and billboards were without the disclaimers), we recommend that the Commission find reason to believe but no further action should be taken and the file closed in this matter.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Find no reason to believe that Lujan for Congress (Finance Committee) violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) concerning certain campaign solicitation letters and invitations.
2. Find reason to believe that Lujan for Congress (Finance Committee) violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1) by failing to attach the required disclaimer notice to certain yard signs and billboards used in Lujan for Congress's (Finance Committee's) 1982 federal election campaign; and take no further action.
3. Take no further action and close the file.
4. Send the attached letters.

Dear Mr. Edwards,

I am, today, in receipt of a letter dated October 27, 1982, over the signature of Kenneth A. Gross, Associate General Counsel, notifying me of the filing of a complaint which alleges that my committee may have violated certain sections of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended.

Upon thoroughly reading and reviewing the complaint I would like to cite the following matters in support of my contention that no willful misconduct was intended either by myself or by my committee.

1. RE: Communications without statement of specific sponsor.

To the best of my knowledge, no letters soliciting funds nor advocating my election were mailed without statement of specific sponsor.

2. The requirements of 11 CFR 110.11 (a) (1) do not apply to bumper stickers, pins, buttons, pens and similar small items upon which the disclaimer cannot be conveniently printed. (Ref. Chapter 1 - Federal Election Commission Regulations, April, 1980, p. 75)

3. RE: Invitations without statement of specific sponsor.

Invitations to receptions hosted on behalf of the ...committee do not require a disclaimer notice stating who authorized and paid for the invitations. Although the primary purpose of the reception is to gain support for ... (the) campaign and those invited may be solicited for contributions at the reception, a disclaimer notice is not required because the invitations will not include any statement which expressly advocates the election... or any statement which specifically solicits contributions (or mentions the possibility of soliciting contributions) to his campaign. (Ref. AO 1980-67: Notices on Invitations. Opinion requested by the Russell B. Long Committee. Published in Volume 6, Number 9, The Federal Election Record, September 1980.)

It would appear that the committee should properly have stated the specific sponsor on the face of such material. Yard signs were immediately recalled where possible and those having not yet been put out were stamped with the disclaimer wording.

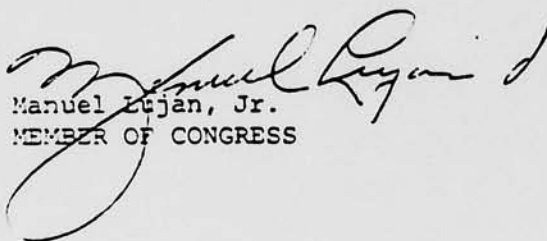

I must repeat my contention that at no time was the disclaimer omitted in any act of willful misconduct. I am extremely proud of my committee's efforts in my behalf and would have no reason for omitting them as specific sponsors.

INTERIOR AND INSULAR AFFAIRS — 1969 to date

RANK: Congressman Lujan became the Top Ranking Republican on the 43 member committee at the start of the 97th session of Congress in 1981. He is responsible for developing policy positions on all major issues to come before the committee. The Interior Committee has jurisdiction over all activity in the U.S. Department of Interior as well as the Nuclear Regulatory Commission. As Ranking Republican, Congressman Lujan is a member of all five of the committee's subcommittees.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY — 1977 to date

Congressman Lujan is the Top Ranking Republican on the Energy, Research and Production Subcommittee. Congressman Lujan sponsored seven major environmental protection bills from 1978 including the Clean Air Act of 1970 and the Clean Water Act of 1970. More recently, Lujan successfully sponsored legislation setting aside more than 600,000 acres of New Mexico land as wilderness areas, ensuring its beauty and enjoyment for future generations.

EDUCATION

Congressman Lujan believes neither the Congress nor the Department of Education should sit as a "National School Board" and has worked to maximize local control over education decisions. That belief has led him to sponsor legislation providing federal funds for our schools that are not accompanied by counter productive regulations guiding their use. Mr. Lujan is a strong supporter of bilingual education and the student loan program. His work with the New Mexico state treasurer in 1972 and the State Investment Council led to the adoption of a loan program that has become a model for other states.

WATER AND POWER

As a member of the Water and Power Subcommittee of the House Interior Committee, Congressman Lujan has sponsored every major water bill enacted into law for the past 12 years. He is a strong advocate of state control of water resources and of the water desalting program. He has fought for increasing acreage limits imposed on certain irrigated land in the West.

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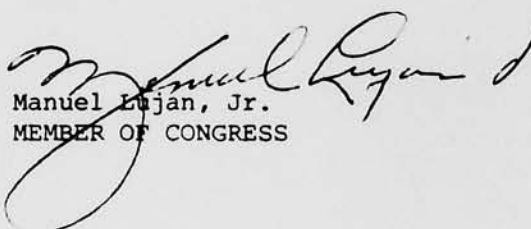

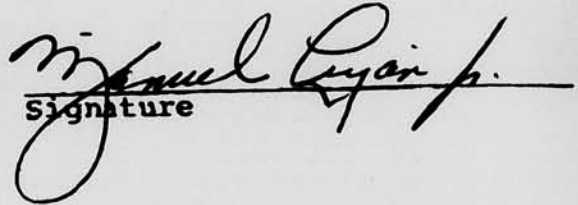

I am proud to have served the First District of New Mexico in the United States Congress for the past fourteen (14) years and I hope to have the opportunity of continuing to do so in the future.

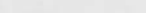

Dear Friend,

The 1982 campaign year has entered its final month and I can almost hear your sigh of relief. I know that all the political rhetoric tends to run together so that you can no longer tell which fellow is for what. But, it really has its purpose. Albuquerque has grown and people don't get to know one another as well as they did when Albuquerque was a smaller city. I want you to know what I believe and how I feel about things so that you will be able to cast your ballot from an informed decision.

My political philosophy is conservative. I must admit, however, that I am concerned about older Americans who live on Social Security and I am certainly not going to vote to cut their benefits. Neither am I going to vote for any piece of legislation that diminishes benefits to veterans and their families. I firmly believe that we as a nation should do business with the same restraint and fiscal planning that keeps you and me from getting in over our heads in our personal money management. I absolutely believe that we should have a balanced budget. 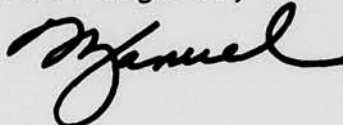

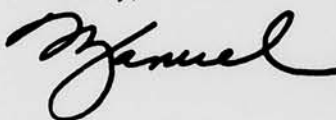

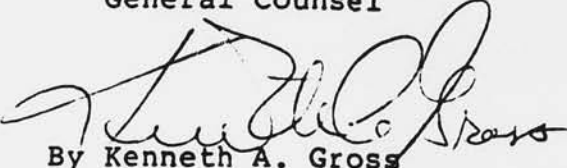

Today, I am in receipt of a letter over the signature of Danny L. McDonald, Chairman of the Federal Election Commission informing me that the Commission found no reason to believe that my Committee violated 2 USC 441d(a)(1), of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971.

In paragraph two of the letter the Commission reminds me that failure to attach the 441d statement to campaign materials expressly advocating my re-election appears to be a violation of the Act and admonishes me that I should take immediate steps to insure that this problem does not occur in the future.

As a matter of public record, I would like it duly noted that the committee, having identified the oversight, immediately attached stickers using the disclaimer wording to the panels and to the bill boards. Yard signs were immediately recalled where possible and those not yet placed were promptly stamped with the disclaimer wording. My Committee was diligent in its efforts to rectify the error.

To the best of my knowledge, at no time was the disclaimer omitted in any act of willful misconduct and steps were immediately taken to rectify the oversight. Not only will every good faith effort be made to insure that such an oversight never occurs again, but the oversight, once noted, was promptly corrected.

I would appreciate your making this letter of assurance to the Federal Election Commission a part of the permanent record and available for public scrutiny.
