

This matter was initiated by a signed, sworn and notorized complaint by Thomas H. Dahl, a candidate for the United States House of Representatives from Alaska. The Commission found reason to believe that Congressman Donald E. - 4. While in Juneau on April 16, 1984, Congressman Young attended a spaghetti dinner organized in his honor. The event was publicized by a newspaper advertisement that listed the time, place, and admission price. It did not state who authorized or paid for the advertisement. The advertisement stated that it was, "Sponsored by Juneau Alaskans for Congressman Don Young." The principal campaign committee registered by Congressman Don Young with the FEC is known as, "Alaskans for Don Young." There are no other authorized committees.
- 5. Respondents contend that approximately 100 people attended the dinner. Adults were charged \$6.00 and senior citizens and children were charged \$3.00. The proceeds were then mailed to Alaskans for Don Young and, in turn, all expenses were paid by that Committee. Those proceeds constitute contributions.

- 6. 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a) and 11 C.F.R. 110.11(a) require that whenever any person solicits a contribution through a newspaper, such communication must state who paid for and authorized the solicitation. The sponsorship statement, or "disclaimer", included in the publication advertising the dinner does not meet the Act's specific requirements.

### BACKGROUND

On September 5, 1984, the Commission found reason to believe that Congressman Donald E. Young and Alaskans for Don Young and Robert Bohnert, as treasurer: (1) violated 11 C.F.R. § 106.3(b) by failing to report as an expenditure the cost of a government conveyance for campaign-related travel; and (2) violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a) by failing to include an adequate disclaimer on an advertisement. On September 7, the Commission issued questions to Congressman Young and the authorized political committee. Congressman Young responded for both parties on September 17, 1984. On September 26, 1984, Congressman Young submitted a letter requesting pre-probable cause to believe conciliation.

### FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

On April 14, 1984, a group of Congressional representatives including Congressman Young went to Juneau, Alaska on a U.S. Coast Guard airplane. They were on official government business inspecting the Coast Guard's Alaskan operations and conducting field hearings. The Coast Guard provided air transportation for five official trips within Alaska as well as the return trip to Washington.

While in Juneau on April 16, 1984, Congressman Young attended a spaghetti dinner organized in his honor. The well-attended event was publicized by a newspaper advertisement that listed the time, place, and admission price. See Attachment 1. It did not state who authorized or paid for the advertisement. Instead, the advertisement stated that it was, "Sponsored by Juneau Alaskans for Congressman Don Young." There is no committee registered with the Commission as "Juneau Alaskans for Congressman Don Young." The only authorized committee that Congressman Young has registered with the FEC is "Alaskans for Don Young". The General Counsel's investigation has revealed that the sponsorship statement was inadequate. Government Conveyance

The regulations require that a candidate who uses a government conveyance for campaign travel must report the cost of the travel as an expenditure. 11 C.F.R. § 106.3(b). While the majority of Congressman Young's five city tour through Alaska was official government business, a candidate who makes campaign-related and non-campaign-related stops must report the expenditures allocable for campaign purposes. Where a candidate conducts any campaign-related activity during a stop, the entire stop is campaign-related and, thus, reportable. 11 C.F.R. §

The central question is whether the dinner was campaignrelated. The regulations state that, "[c]ampaign-related

- 3 activity shall not include any incidental contacts." The FEC's Explanation and Justification provides one illustration of conduct that would render an appearance campaign-related. It states: If a candidate makes a non-political speech for a civic association luncheon, and on the way out chats with a few attendees about his upcoming campaign, that conversation would not convert the appearance into a campaign-related event. However, if during the course of the speech the candidate asks for support, that would convert an otherwise non-campaign event into one which is campaign-related and would require that travel costs be allocated and reported as expenditures. The Office of the General Counsel is of the opinion that whether an event is "campaign-related" depends upon the setting in which the remarks are made, the timing of the event at which the remarks are made, the reaction that the remarks evoke, as well as the remark's themselves. If during an elected official's remarks he expressly advocated his reelection or solicited contributions, C.L. that would be compelling evidence that the event was campaign-C related. 10 It does not appear that Congressman Young expressly 0 advocated his reelection in the advertisement or at the dinner. The advertisement merely promoted a spaghetti dinner which was held four months before the primary in which the Congressman was unopposed. However, the dinner was campaign-related because the proceeds from the dinner were mailed to the Congressman's Committee and all expenses were, in turn, paid by that Committee. As a general matter, a person who transmits money to a political committee or candidate - any portion of which is thereafter available at the committee or candidate's discretion

for the purpose of influencing a federal election - has made a contribution in the full amount of the funds so transmitted. fact that the contributor obtains an item of intrinsic value does not remove the transaction from the contribution definition. 2 U.S.C. \$ 431(8). AO 1979-76. See also MUR 1095. Since it appears that the dinner was campaign-related, it follows that the Congressman should have reported the travel costs. The regulations state that Congressman Young should have reported the cost of a flight aboard an aircraft comparable to that used by the Coast Guard to convey the representatives from Washington to Juneau to Washington. 11 C.F.R. § 106.3(b)(2). 0 However, 11 C.F.R. § 106.3(d) provides an exception which we 0 consider controlling: Costs incurred by a candidate for the... House of 10 Representatives for travel between Washington, D.C. and the State or district in which he or she 0 is a candidate need not be reported herein unless 1 the costs are paid by a candidate's authorized committee or by any other political committee. 1/ ( Since this trip was not paid for by the candidate's authorized 10 00 committee or any other political committee, it does not appear that Congressman Young had to report the cost of the flight from Washington to Juneau. Accordingly, it is the Office of the General Counsel's opinion that the Commission take no further Young's use of the airplane did not constitute a contribution since a contribution is a gift of "anything of value made by any person or a payment by any person. (emphasis added). 2 U.S.C. § 431(8)(A). According to 431(11), Person does not include the Federal Government or any authority of the Federal Government."

As discussed above, the admission price to attend the spaghetti dinner is a contribution because the Committee received funds that became available for political purposes. AO 1979-76. Whenever any person solicits any contribution through any newspaper, such communication must state who paid for and authorized the solicitation. The disclaimer included in the publication advertising the dinner does not meet the specific requirements of 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a).

Congressman Young observed that his liason to the Committee as well as the Committee's treasurer instructed the local volunteers to include the proper disclaimer. However, "due largely to the (local volunteer's) inexperience and unfamiliarity with FEC regulations, the Juneau area volunteers forgot or misunderstood the importance of the precise language of the disclaimer." See Attachment 2. The Congressman adds, "they also wished to be recognized for their individual area effort vis a vis other volunteer groups in other towns and cities throughout Alaska, hence the "Juneau" Alaskans for Don Young." While these may be mitigating factors, it is the Office of the General Counsel's opinion that there is a violation of 2 U.S.C.

# Senate OKs ax hikes "A" to reduce federal deficit

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved \$48 billion in tax increases today, capping a week of congressional action to cut federal budget deficits by raising taxes on many people rather than reducing government payments to a few special interests.

Bleary-eyed senators voted 76-5 to endorse the tax measure at the end of a 19-hour session. The Senate then joined the House in adjourning for a recess until after Easter.

The legislation would raise revenues \$46 billion over the next three years. The House passed a similar \$49 billion measure on Wednesday.

Negotiators from both chambers will work out a compromise version of the measure later. But since the Senate measure is being folded into a larger omnibus deficit-reduction package, it is unclear how and when such a compromise will be reached.

Drafting a compromise is weeks away because the House and Senate also want to settle on significant reductions in federal spending that, with the tax increases, would cut record budget deficits by up to \$150 billion to \$200 billion over the next three years. During that same period, the deficits are

expected to total between \$500 billion and \$700 billion.

Major provisions of the Senate bill that affect individuals include:

 An extension through 1987 of the 3 percent excise tax on local and long distance telephone service.

 Raising the liquor tax of \$10.50 per proof gallon to \$12.50. Beer and wine would not be affected.

 Ending in 1988 the practice by which a taxpayer could avoid taxation on up to \$450 o interest earned each year.

## Seek facts, not hysteria, about orca plan — Young

Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska, today said the state's decision whether to allow Sea World to capture Alaska killer whales should be based on "facts, not hysteria."

Young, who supports the Sea World effort, said in an Empire Interview this morning that very little is known about Alaska's orcas, and the research to be conducted in conjunction with the capture of two whales a year for the next five years is badly needed.

"People are basing their decision on emotion, not facts," Young said.

"If the facts are laid out then an intelligent decision can be made — there's been too much hysteria on this."

Young said there is a great deal of support in Alaska's scientific community for the Sea World research since no other funding is available to study oreas.

While he originally requested hearings by the National Marine Fisherles Service on the Sea World permit to be in Alaska,

Young said the state Department of Flah and Game will still be involved in the process.

On his upcoming re-election campaign, Young said he didn't want to get into a negative mode with his challengers until the Democratic candidate is decided in the August primary.

Whoever his opponent is in the election, Young said he will run on his experience, stressing the importance of his seniority on congressional committees important to

Alaska.

Young is the senior member of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, which oversees park land, mining and water issues. He could also be the senior member of the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, which handles the Count Guard, fisheries and marine transportation and trade.

## Aleutians may get CG base

Guard next year may have a
facility in the Aleutian Islands
to patrol Alaska's growing bottomfish industry and oil exploration in the Navarin Basin,
Congressman Don Young said
Thursday.

During a news conference, Young said he was told the Coast Guard may have a facility in "Unalaska, Dutch Harbor or Cold Bay" sometime next year.

"We cannot service this area now ... from Kodiak Island," he said. "We've got to get somebody out in this very active area."

The cost has not been estimated, he said, but "it's going to be a considerable amount of money."

Young has been traveling in Alaska with members of the Coast Guard subcommittee of the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee. The trip, with hearings in Juneau and Kodika, was designed to give the committee members a look at the Coast Guard in Alaska.

The committee is taking a look at the Coast Guard appropriation contained in the fiscal 1986 federal budget. A member of Young's office said the rest of the committee on Thursday was traveling to Pradhoe Bay.

Young also said he was not optimistic that the Army's new 10,000-man light infantry division will be based in Alaska, despite efforts of Alaska's congressional delegation.

"Absolutely, this is where they should be," he said. "But when you look at the figures, it's going to be difficult to get that division into Aleska. The cost per unit is quite high."

He said it has been estimated that Fort Greely would have to be greatly expanded or "rebuild to handle the division and its dependents. Fort Wainwright might be able to handle the influx, he said.

"I'm not easily that optimistic. I'd like to say we're going to get it, but I'm not contiden," he said. DON YOUNG

#### SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS

Complainant is an opponent of respondent Young for the Alaska U.S. House seat. Complainant alleged that Young received transportation to Juneau, Alaska on a U.S. Coast Guard airplane, and while in Juneau engaged in partisan political activity.

In support of the allegation, complainant attached a copy of a newspaper advertisement for a "spaghetti dinner for Congressman Don Young." The advertisement did not state who authorized or paid for it, but did contain the following message: "Sponsored By Juneau Alaskans for Congressman Don Young." There is no committee registered with the Commission by that name; however, Congressman Young's principal campaign committee is called "Alaskans for Don Young." Congressman Young has no other authorized committees registered with the Commission.

#### FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

Congressman Young's use of the government airplane did not constitute a contribution. The Act, at § 431(8)(A), defines "contribution" as a gift of "anything of value made by any person" or a "payment by any person" (emphasis added). According to § 431(11), the term "Person . . . does not include the Federal Government or any authority of the Federal Government." The exclusion of the federal government from the meaning of "person" is repeated at 11 C.F.R. § 100.10.

The regulations at § 106.3 require that a candidate who uses a government conveyance for campaign travel must report the cost of the travel as an expenditure. The report filed with the Commission by Alaskans for Don Young covering the period April 1, 1984 through June 30, 1984, did not list any expenditures for the cost of the government conveyance. Whether Congressman Young had to report the cost of the travel turns on whether the dinner was a campaign-related activity. On the facts presently before the Commission, the Office of the General Counsel cannot detemine if the dinner was campaign related. The Committee's response deferred to the response from the Congressman, and his response referred only to the use of the Coast Guard plane, except for a brief statement that the dinner was held after working hours and "was unrelated and incidental to official activity . . . . " The response included a substantial volume of documentation indicating that the Congressman conducted official business on the trip. regulations, at § 106.3(b)(3), state that campaign-related activity does not include "incidental contacts." Attending a campaign

-3fundraiser would be more than an "incidental contact," however. The Commission has stated, "Where a candidate makes one campaignrelated appearance in a city, the trip to that city is considered campaign-related." Explanation and Justification of Regulations, 1978, page 11. If the April 16 dinner was a campaign event, § 106.3 may have been violated. The disclaimer on the advertisement for the dinner may be in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 44ld(a) and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a). If an advertisement expressly advocates the election or defeat of a candidate or solicits a contribution, the advertisement must state who paid for and authorized it. The advertisement in this CO matter did not appear to expressly advocate Young's reelection, 10 0 but the advertisement did state that there was an admission fee 0 to attend the dinner. The admission fee was a contribution within the meaning of § 431(8)(A) of the Act if its purpose was 10 to influence a federal election. The advertisement did not state 0 the purpose of the admission fee. The report of Alaskans for Don Young did not itemize small contributions. With the facts ( presently before the Commission, the Office of the General 10 00 Counsel cannot determine the purpose of the dinner's admission fee and therefore cannot determine whether the advertisement solicited contributions. If the advertisement solicited contributions, 2 U.S.C. § 441d and 11 C.F.R. § 110.11 have been violated. If the entity whose name (Juneau Alaskans for Congressman Don Young) appears on the advertisement is not in fact the respondent's principal campaign committee, and the entity is a political committee within the meaning of 2 U.S.C. § 431(4), the

-4entity violated the registration and reporting requirements of the Act at §§ 433 and 434 and of the regulations at Parts 102 and 104. If the entity is not an authorized committee within the meaning of 2 U.S.C. § 431(6), the entity also violated § 432(e)(4) of the Act and § 102.14(a) of the regulations by using the name of a candidate in its name. With the facts presently before the Commission, the Office of the General Counsel cannot determine the status of the entity or the violations it may have committed. Mr. Dahl's allegation is false since the aircraft was used to transport myself and other authorized personnel to Alaska to hold official Congressional hearings. I have enclosed copies of correspondence that clearly demonstrate the offical nature of the hearings and the use of the airplane in question. An official printed transcript of the Committee hearing record will be available soon.

The spaghetti dinner Mr. Dahl refers to did take place, but was held after regular working hours, after the conclusion of official business involved in the field hearing. The dinner was unrelated and incidental to official activity which took place earlier that day.

None of the costs of transportation of myself or others on the Coast Guard aircraft are allocable to my campaign committee since the purpose for my being in Juneau and the purpose of the aircraft use was to conduct official U.S. Government business. Any costs associated with campaign activities have been paid by my campaign committee and have been or will be reported in standard Federal Election Commission Reports.

## Senate OKs try hikes "A" to reduce federal deficit

By CLIFF HAAS The Associated Press

WASHINGTON Senate approved \$48 billion in tax increases today, capping a week of congressional action to cut federal budget deficits by raising taxes on many people rather than reducing government payments to a few special

Bleary-eyed senators voted 76-5 to endorse the tax measure at the end of a 19-hour session. The Senate then joined the House in adjourning for a recess until after Easter.

The legislation would raise revenues \$48 billion over the next three years. The House passed a similar \$49 billion measure on Wednesday.

Negotiators from both chambers will work out a com-

promise version of the measure later. But since the Senate measure is being folded into a omnibus reduction package, it is unclear how and when such a compromise will be reached.

Drafting a compromise is weeks away because the House and Senate also want to settle on significant reductions in federal spending that, with the tax increases, would cut record budget deficits by up to \$150 billion to \$200 billion over the next three years. During that same period, the deficits are interest earned each year.



Dear Mr. Steele:

On June 28th 1984, I received by certified mail a copy of a complaint (MUR 1729) filed with you by Mr. Thomas H. Dahl. Mr. Dahl asserts that I used a United States Coast Guard aircraft to raise funds for my reelection campaign. Mr. Dahl's allegation is false since the aircraft was used to transport myself and other authorized personnel to Alaska to hold official Congressional hearings. I have enclosed copies of correspondence that clearly demonstrate the offical nature of the hearings and the use of the airplane in question. An official printed transcript of the Committee hearing record will be available soon.

The spaghetti dinner Mr. Dahl refers to did take place, but was held after regular working hours, after the conclusion of official business involved in the field hearing. The dinner was unrelated and incidental to official activity which took place earlier that day.

None of the costs of transportation of myself or others on the Coast Guard aircraft are allocable to my campaign committee since the purpose for my being in Juneau and the purpose of the aircraft use was to conduct official U.S. Government business. Any costs associated with campaign activities have been paid by my campaign committee and have been or will be reported in standard Federal Election Commission Reports.

If upon review of the enclosed material, you still have questions concerning the nature of this trip, please contact me. I would appreciate receiving notification of any decisions you reach in this matter.

The Commission, the Clerk and the Secretary will work out mutually agreeable procedures for implementing these sections.

PART 106 —
ALLOCATION OF
CANDIDATE AND
COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

§ 106.1 Allocation of expenditures among (or between) candidates and activities

Expenditures made on behalf of more than one candidate are to be allocated between the candidates based on the proportion of the benefit which each can reasonably be expected to derive. For example, a bill-board which advertised Senate candidate Smith and House candidate Jones in equal prominence should be allocated 50% - 50%.

Authorized expenditures by a committee or candidate on behalf of another candidate are reported as a contribution to the authorizing candidate. However, expenditures by political parties under 2 U.S.C. §441a (d) will only be reported by the party.

The administrative expenses and other non-candidate-related expenses of a multicandidate committee do not have to be allocated among candidates, as long as they are not made on behalf of a specific candidate. Where such a committee has both Federal and non-Federal activity, administrative expenses have to be allocated between the two activities on a reasonable basis.

§ 106.2 Allocation of expenditures among States by candidates for Presidential nomination

This section covers the allocation of expenditures of Presidential candidates by State. Generally, expenditures must be attributed to the individual States based on the voting age population likely to be influenced by the expenditure. There are two exceptions: (1) expenditures relating to a national campaign headquarters need not be attributed to individual States and (2) expenditures for travel between States need not be attributed to individual States.

§ 106.3 Allocation of expenses between campaign and noncampaign related travel

All travel paid for by a candidate's authorized committees must be reported.

A candidate's campaign-related travel is reportable, no matter who pays for it. Where a candidate makes one campaign-related appearance in a city, the trip to that city is considered campaign-related. Incidental contacts on an otherwise non-campaign stop do not make the stop campaign-related. For example, if a candidate makes a non-political

speech to a civic association lunger, and on the way out chats with a few attendees about his upcoming campaign, that conversation would not convert the appearance into a campaign-related event. However, if during the course of the speech the candidate asks for support, that would convert an otherwise non-campaign event into one which is campaign-related and would require that travel costs be allocated and reported as expenditures.

Individuals other than candidates have to allocate their mixed campaign/non-campaign travel expenses on a reasonable basis. If a candidate's spouse and children travel with a candidate but do not campaign, their expenses are not reportable as expenditures.

Expenses incurred by a candidate for the House or Senate for travel to or from his State or district and Washington, D.C., are not reportable as an expenditure unless paid from a campaign account.

Candidates using a Government conveyance for campaign travel must report as an expenditure the comparable commercial rate for the travel. For candidates required by law or by national security to have special staff and equipment, the cost of that travel is exluded from reportable expenditures.

§ 107.1 Reports by municipal and private host committees

This Section follows 2 U.S.C. §437.

§ 107.2 Reports by political parties

This section follows 2 U.S.C. §437 but exempts the reporting requirement for State and subordinate party committees that spend funds for delegate and alternate travel expenses and for certain events at the convention such as receptions. The Commission believes that these types of expenditures were not intended by the statute to be reported under 2 U.S.C. §434.

§ 107.3 Convention reports; time and content of filing

This section requires the convention report to be filed no later than 60 days after the convention but no later than 20 days before the general election in accordance with 2 U.S.C. §437. If there is financial activity subsequent to this report, quarterly reports are required to reflect those transactions in order to obtain full disclosure.

§ 107.4 Convention expenses; definition

This section merely refers to Part 120 of the convention financing proposed regulation, which contains a detailed definition of convention expenses.

NOTE: The reporting requirements for conventions receiving Federal funds under 26 U.S.C. §9008 are treated in Part 124.

I am writing to request that the Coast Guard and Navigation Subcommittee conduct a field hearing in Alaska this spring.

The purpose would be to conduct oversight hearings on Coast Guard operations in the 17th Coast Guard District, which encompasses the entire State of Alaska. As you are aware, the Coast Guard conducts a variety of activities in Alaska and has virtually every type of Coast Guard facility. In addition, the field hearings could focus on Arctic transportation and development and the need for future Coast Guard resources in that area.

This opportunity would permit us to visit not only specialized marine safety, search and rescue, and long range aids to
navigation (LORAN) facilities, but also the large multi-mission
installation they have at Kodiak. This facility combines
virtually all Coast Guard functions and is the site of an air
station, activities support center, communications station, and
berthing for several Coast Guard cutters. The expanse and harsh
climate of Alaska and its waters present unique problems for the
Coast Guard to overcome in executing their many missions. The
vast areas of the Gulf of Alaska and Bering Sea are a particular
challenge for their fisheries law enforcement duties. Therefore,
I believe the hearings would be beneficial to the Committee.

Specifically, I believe we would be able to conduct hearings in Anchorage and Juneau as well as visit facilities in Sitka, Cordova, Valdez, and Kodiak during the Easter recess which begins on April 14. I, of course, would be more than happy to assist you in any way possible in making the arrangements for these hearings.

Even with the problems presented to the subcommittee the bottom line is the base is extremely vital to the community. I appreciate your concerns and your willingness to understand mine. I would like to reiterate some of my own concerns. Namely, local hire, 10 base privileges for civilian employees, types of exchange merchandise and the base-town committee. 0 Local hire is my primary concern due to the economic crisis and because I feel the Coast will save expenses if it hires more people locally. I strongly believe our local job service could be put to good use in aiding the base to find and employ local qualified people who are willing to work. As for base privileges, I understand NAFA and civil service employees position and am hopeful the Coast Guard command will consider all the implications of the reduction of privileges. Fewer privileges drive the NAFA employees to take as much advantage as possible of the base exchange privilege and this could result in local businesses losing their patronage.

page 2 In view of the conflict brought I by the sale of furniture through the Base Exchange I hope the Coast Guard command will consider excluding those lines of merchandise handled by local dealers. I feel this will eliminate unfair competition as well as eliminate possible bad feelings between the base and the community. I see the base-town committee as one of the most effective means for trouble shooting any potential conflicts between the community and the base. Open lines of communication are very necessary in any situation where there is two groups with differing viewpoints. I will continue to encourage the community to participate and hope you will see fit to encourage the Coast Guard to stay active with the committee. I firmly believe the Coast Guard community and the Kodiak area have the same interests and am certain we will continue to work together for the best interests of the state. ## Senate OKs tax hikes "A" to reduce federal deficit

By CLIFF HAAS The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved \$48 billion in tax increases today, capping a week of congressional action to cut federal budget deficits by raising taxes on many people rather than reducing government payments to a few special interests.

Bleary-eyed senators voted 76-5 to endorse the tax measure at the end of a 19-hour session. The Senate then joined the House in adjourning for a recess until after Easter.

The legislation would raise revenues \$48 billion over the next three years. The House passed a similar \$49 billion measure on Wednesday.

Negotiators from both chambers will work out a com-

promise version of the measure later. But since the Senate measure is being folded into a larger omnibus deficit-reduction package, it is unclear how and when such a compromise will be reached.

Drafting a compromise is weeks away because the House and Senate also want to settle on significant reductions in federal spending that, with the tax increases, would cut record budget deficits by up to \$150 billion to \$200 billion over the next three years. During that same period, the deficits are

expected to total between \$500 billion and \$700 billion.

Major provisions of the Senate bill that affect individuals include:

• An extension through 1987 of the 3 percent excise tax on local and long distance telephone service.

• Raising the liquor tax of \$10.50 per proof gallon to \$12.50. Beer and wine would not be affected.

 Ending in 1988 the practice by which a taxpayer could avoid taxation on up to \$450 of interest earned each year.
