My opponent, Olin Teague, is between a rock and a hard place. By his own actions, he has placed himself into a position where he now must either admit to a serious violation of the Federal Election Campaign Laws or admit that he intentionally deceived the press and the people.

Last night, I sent the following telegram to Congressman Teague:

You have been quoted in the newspapers twice in recent weeks attributing statements to the Federal Election Commission in regard to your publicized complaint against me. You said they said quote the Federal Election Commission thought there might be some criminal thing there unquote and quote they will investigate the allegation unquote.

We have been assured by the Federal Election Commission that they would make no such statements. Their policy is to respond to complaints only in writing and to both sides. We have, despite numerous

Paragraph (3) (B) of this section states: "Any notification or investigation made under paragraph (2) shall not be made public by the Commission or by any other person without the written consent of the person receiving such notification or the person with respect to whom such investigation is made."

I can assure you that I have not consented in writing to Teague's vile news releases.

So, the big question becomes: Will Teague confirm his previous statements to the press that he was notified by the FEC that "it will investigate the allegation." It is evident that he made public this notification, if there was one. If guilty, Teague and other violators would be subject to fines of not more than \$2000, or if they "knowingly and willfully" violated the provisions, the fine could not be more than \$5000.

I really doubt that Teague has violated this law, because as we stated in the telegram, we have been assured by the FEC that they would not make such statements. So, the alternative is that Teague "knowingly and willfully" deceived you and me and the people of the Sixth District into believing that the FEC had taken his false charges against me seriously.

Everyone concerned is entitled to the truth from Teague.

I sincerely hope that he will clear up this matter immediately.

In the Fort Worth Star Telegram, on August 13th, Congressman Teague called me a liar. He may just prove that he is the liar.

I would like to make a few additional remarks concerning the complaint supposedly filed by Congressman Teague. Having never been informed by either Teague or by the Federal Election Commission as to the specifics of the complaint, I can only go by what has been told to us by others or by what has been printed in newspapers.

The first indication that a complaint had been filed or was going to be filed was a call to my campaign headquarters, around August 10th, from Mr. Les Whitten in Washington, an associate of columnist Jack Anderson. Whitten stated that he was writing a story about a complaint filed with a federal agency by Congressman Teague accusing us of forging Senator Henry Bellmon's name to a mailgram. I do not know how he learned of such a complaint. (As far as we could determine, if such a complaint was filed, it was not before September 1st.)

After a short conversation with some of my campaign staff, Whitten stated that he had thought that he had found a big story, but there was apparently nothing to it. To my knowledge, nothing about this matter ever appeared in Jack Anderson's column.

If forgery on our part was the charge, Senator Bellmon certainly proved this false when he was in Dallas and Fort Worth on behalf of my campaign on August 13th. The Fort Worth Star Telegram, on August 14th, quoted the Senator as saying he

"had seen it and had authorized its use by Mowery."

Next, we heard and read that Teague's complaint was that we had provided false information about his voting record on energy legislation in the mailgram. However, at the time of Senator Bellmon's visit, we released a 24-page research booklet that documented Congressman Teague's terrible attendance record on energy votes. This provided proof that Teague had, in fact, been absent for 8 of 11 important energy votes in 1975.

Everything we said and did has been proven to be accurate and true and honest and above board.

By the middle of August, we thought that the matter had been settled. We felt as if we had won the battle that Teague had started. My opponent's blatant attempts to scuttle our fundraising events with Senator Bellmon, and his insulting remarks about my honesty, had given my campaign a credibility that we could not have gotten with \$20,000 in television advertising.

Our only action relating to the affair following this was the requesting of confirmation of the existence of the complaint and its charges against me. We wrote three letters and made several telephone calls to the FEC. Yet, to date, we have never received any official reply or notification from them.

Then Teague renewed his attack against me. On September 19th, the Associated Press carried a story from Washington that was so full of falsehoods that I was frankly amazed that AP would carry it.

My campaign personally talked to Senator Bellmon last Thursday to be sure that we were not wrong about the facts.

The AP story stated that Senator Bellmon had since apologized to Teague. Senator Bellmon not only said he had not apologized, but said that he had not even talked to Teague or his office since his August appearance here.

The AP story continued by saying that Bellmon's press secretary said Friday (September 17?) that the Senator regrets allegations were made which "would not stand up under a simple check of the record." Again, Senator Bellmon stated last Thursday that he had not talked to anyone on his own staff, nor to Teague or Teague's office, about the matter. He emphatically stated that if such a statement had been made that it had been without his knowledge or authorization.

It would appear that someone in Congressman Teague's office is not above simply making up quotes and information for public statements by Teague. There was certainly little fact in this AP story.

My last comments will be in regards to the very concept of a complaint filed by Congressman Teague in this matter. As far as we can determine from discussions with our legal counsel and with members of the FEC, the Federal Election Commission's sole area of concern and jurisdiction is campaign finances. Any candidate could publicly state the most obvious lies about their opponent, and the FEC would have absolutely no role in checking that abuse. Fair campaign practices in a broad sense is not their business, and Congressman Teague knows this. He has simply exploited the name of the FEC to provide some legitimacy to his

His use of this federal agency for publicity purposes is outrageous. It suggests a contempt for our system of government and for the people and for the press.

It would seem that getting elected again is worth any price to Teague.

I want to win this election, but I refuse to resort to saying anything that is not true. I guess that I'm lucky to have an opponent whose voting record is so bad that the truth is more powerful than anything I could make up.

Teague files complaint about Mowery's tactics

U. S. Rep. Olin Teague said Thursday he has lodged a complaint with the Federal Election Commission about what he considers dirty tricks by his Republican opponent in the general election, Wes Mowery.

The matter surfaced earlier this week when a mailgram sent by Mowery to prospective supporters and signed by Oklahoma Sen. Henry Bellmon was made public.

The communication contains a line blasting Teague for having a high record of absenteeism on energy-related legislation.

Teague said he has been assured by Bellmon that he had not authorized his name to be used in that manner.

Mowery, Teague said, "is just lying when the greatest need in our country today is for honesty in government."

"I've called the Federal Election Commission and they think there might be a criminal thing there," he said.

"I've turned it all over to them."

On Wednesday, Mowery said he had told the senator "that I was perfectly capable of handling the job of disclosing to the people the painful record of Olin Teague."

Mowery, in fact, launched an attack on Teague's voting record, saying Teague had voted only 58 per cent of the time during the last two years and that his record was even worse on energy-related legislation.

Teague defended his record Thursday, saying he had worked hard for one bill in particular earlier this year, but was in Fort Worth for a meeting on the day that it came up for a vote.

Teague told the Star-Telegram editorial board on March 22 that he was here instead of in Washington partly because he had lined up enough votes for the energy bill being considered that day that his own vote wasn't needed for passage.

Teague denounced the low esteem in which Washington politicians are held now.

"People are just sick and tired of Washington, period," he said.

"They don't care who you are or what you do, they fault you."

"For 20 years I've walked that district talking about the greatness of government, but this year I've had some problems," he said.

Teague said while he personally is not discouraged by it, he has encountered a widespread belief that "people in public life are not living up to what they should live up to."

Teague is a member of the House Ethics Committee, but plans to get off that committee so he can devote more time to other work.

"I spent 27 hours last week on the eth-

ics committee and I don't think I accomplished one thing," he said.

"Come January -- I didn't ask on this committee -- I'm going to tell them I'd like to be taken off," he said.

On another matter, Teague said he is concerned that some people in the oil industry might be turning against him.

He said he has long defended and worked for reasonable energy legislation and couldn't understand how Mowery, the executive vice president of the American Association of Petroleum Landmen, could be running a rough campaign against him or, indeed, running against him at all.

He said his opponent came to see him about a year ago and told him the Republican party was tired of having Carl Nighlazzo as its nominee -- Nighlazzo won the GOP nomination in several previous elections -- and that he would be running so the party could at least put up a respectable candidate.

The congressman said Mowery told him he really didn't plan to wage a hard campaign, that the GOP was aiming more toward winning the seat after Teague retires.

If that was so, Mowery certainly has changed his mind.

Mowery said Wednesday he had collected about \$25,000 so far, that his campaign was building steam and that he intended to win the congressional seat.

"Many of my supporters have, in the past, been Teague supporters," Mowery said. "We are going to have the resources to tell the people of the 6th District what Olin Teague has not been doing and what I will do as a hard working U.S. congressman."

Bellmon labels his efforts pre-Mowery, not anti-Teague

U.S. Sen. Henry Bellmon, a former Republican governor of Oklahoma, who has been at the center of the campaign controversy between U.S. Rep. Olin Teague and his Republican opponent, Wes Mowery, said here Friday that he was only trying to help out a friend.

"When Wes lived in Oklahoma, he helped me when I ran for governor," Bellmon said. "I think it is only proper for a politician to befriend the people who befriended him when he was running for office."

It was a mailgram sent to prospective Mowery supporters and signed by Bellmon that apparently sparked the battle be-

tween Teague and Mowery.

It accused Teague of being absent when eight of a dozen energy-related bills were up for consideration on the floor of the House.

Although a spokesman for Bellmon said earlier this week that Bellmon's aides hadn't seen the communication, Bellmon said he had seen it and had authorized its use by Mowery.

The only change made between the time Bellmon authorized it and the time it was sent out, said the senator, was the replacement of the word "opponent" with Teague's name.

Bellmon said he hadn't

talked to Mowery this week about the mailgram but that he had received some telephone calls from mutual friends.

Bellmon was one of the sponsors of a fund-raising reception for Mowery Friday afternoon at the Petroleum Club of Fort Worth.

As his spokesman had stressed earlier in the week, Bellmon said he had come to Fort Worth to help out a friend, not to attack Teague.

JUNE 1976

pp. 25-6 §437g. Enforcement

(a) (1) Any person who believes a violation of this Act or of chapter 95 or chapter 96 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 has occurred may file a complaint with the Commission. Such complaint shall be in writing, shall be signed and sworn to by the person filing such complaint, and shall be notarized. Any person filing such a complaint shall be subject to the provisions of section 1001 of Title 18, United States Code. The Commission may not conduct any investigation under this section, or take any other action under this section, solely on the basis of a complaint of a person whose identity is not disclosed to the Commission.

(2) The Commission upon receiving any complaint under paragraph (1), and if it has reason to believe that any person has committed a violation of this Act or of chapter 95 or chapter 96 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, or, if the Commission, on the basis of information ascertained in the normal course of carrying out its supervisory responsibilities, has reason to believe that such a violation has occurred, shall notify the person involved of such alleged violation and shall make an investigation of such alleged violation in accordance with the provisions of this section.

(3) (A) Any investigation under paragraph (2) shall be conducted expeditiously and shall include an investigation, conducted in accordance with the provisions of this section of reports and statements filed by any complainant under this title, if such complainant is a candidate.

(B) Any notification or investigation made under paragraph (2) shall not be made public by the Commission or by any person without the written consent of the person receiving such notification or the person with respect to whom such investigation is made.

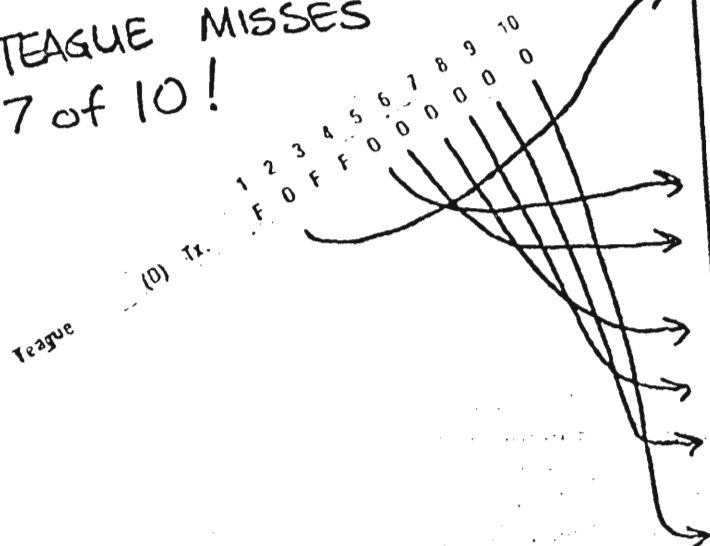
(c) Any member of the Commission, any employee of the Commission, or any other person who violates the provisions of subsection (a)(3)(B) shall be fined not more than \$2,000. Any such member, employee, or other person who knowingly and willfully violates the provisions of subsection (a)(3)(B) shall be fined not more than \$5,000.

Dear Mr. Teague:

This letter is in response to your complaint of September 1, 1976, alleging violations of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the Act). I have reviewed your allegation and have concluded that the Federal Election Commission does not have authority over the matters set forth.

Section 441h of Title 2 of the Act prohibits the fraudulent misrepresentation of campaign authority, but a review of the legislative history of this provision indicates that this section of the Act was meant to deal with situations in which a candidate makes false and damaging statements about or on behalf of another candidate. (See Congressional Record, daily ed., April 11, 1974, S5845.) That type of situation does not seem to exist in the present case. Accordingly, upon my recommendation, the Commission has decided to close its file in this matter.

You are probably aware that Art. 14.10. (Campaign communications) of the Texas Election Code makes it unlawful for "... an individual to misrepresent his identity ... in any writing or oral communication relating to the campaign ... with the intent to injure any candidate or influence the vote on any measure." This provision seems broader in scope than 2 U.S.C. §441h of the Federal law; therefore, you may wish to pursue your case under state law.

Dear Sirs:

I realize that the Commission would not have received my letter of September 18 until today, but I feel compelled to send to you a press clipping that substantiates my position and introduces even further questions about Congressman Teague's behavior.

This news article indicates:

1. Congressman Teague is continuing to use the name of the FEC to give legitimacy to his erroneous complaints about my campaign.
2. The date of the complaint is now placed within "last week", September 12-18, which is two weeks after your legal counsel stated the complaint was filed, and a month after the date that Teague had publicly claimed earlier.
3. The Teague campaign reports that they have received acknowledgment from the Federal Election Commission that the complaint will be investigated, an acknowledgment that my campaign has never received.
4. My opponent still maintains that the mailgram signed by Senator Bellmon had not been authorized by him when it was, in fact, approved.
5. The emphasis of Teague's complaint has now shifted from his first publicized accusation that the mailgram was a forgery to a claim that the voting record information was false.

I enclose the research packet that was distributed at the time

September 20, 1976

we held the fund-raising events with Senator Bellmon. Also enclosed is a press release we have sent out today in our effort to put to rest this barrage of attacks against my integrity and the credibility of my campaign.

I would reiterate, however, that I cannot properly defend myself until the Commission informs me of the complaint or complaints filed against me, the actual filing dates of such complaints, the specific allegations involved, and the progress of the investigation.

Through the end of last year, Teague had voted on a per cent of the recorded votes in the House since January. That means he did not cast a vote on 167 of the votes, which did indeed make him from the inconsequential to the fairly important, depending on one's point of view.

In contrast, Dallas Republican Jim Collins had a 66 per cent voting participation. Dallas Republican Alan Steelman had 93 per cent and Grand Prairie Democrat Dale Milford 91 per cent.

Some might argue that Teague is a busier man than most. He is chairman of the House Science and Technology Committee and is second ranking Democrat on the Veterans Affairs committee, as well as chairman of one of its subcommittees.

Generally, the real spade work on legislation is done at the subcommittee level. But Milford, Collins and Steelman also have subcommittee responsibilities.

STEELMAN is ranking Republican on subcommittee of the environment and energy and interior committee. He is also ranking Republican on a post office and civil service subcommittee, and Milford is chairman of a science and technology subcommittee.

On the 360 recorded votes examined, Teague was paired on 20, which means that he made his po-

sition for or against the legislation known. But a pair does not count on the score-board and thus does not influence the outcome of a vote.

Milford was never paired, and Collins and Steelman each paired only once on those votes.

Teague misses many votes on amendments to bills but will make the final vote on legislation. Considering that important changes are sometimes made during the amending process and that amendment votes are frequently close, Teague could be adjudicating a significant part of his legislative responsibility.

Whether or not Teague merely eliminated the inconsequential from the issues he votes on is debatable, and based on the record, he would be challenged on his assessment of what is of consequence.

AMONG THE VOTES

Teague has missed this year are these: a \$26 billion aid program for the elderly; \$638 million in additional funds for the Veterans Administration; \$200 million in emergency mortgage relief; an \$11 billion supplemental appropriations bill; legislation setting targets for the fiscal year 1976 budget; extension of the emergency livestock credit bill; 13 weeks of additional unemployment compensation; \$276 million for Environmental Protection Agency research and development, and decontrol by 1980 of "hold" domestic oil.

Many of these vote margins were so wide that Teague's vote could not conceivably have mattered one way or the other and perhaps he knew that, but he was still elected to vote the people's interest.

According to Congressional Quarterly, which chronicles congressional activity, in 1974 the average House member voted 87 per cent of the time. Milford came in low last year, scoring only 84 per cent, but Collins had a 94 per cent participation and Steelman voted 91 per cent. Teague's voting participation was 86 per cent.

For the 93rd Congress (1973-74), Collins led with 94 per cent, Steelman had 92 per cent, Milford had 91 per cent, and Teague had 86 per cent.

TEAGUE'S VOTING participation has not been very good for the last five years but has definitely declined, from 90 per cent in 1970 and 78 per cent in 1972.

Admittedly, there are more recorded votes than in past years because the House is using an electronic voting system; but that also means it only takes 15 min-

utes for the vote, versus the 25 minutes when the names were called alphabetically — twice.

Besides reflecting the easier voting system, the greater number of recorded votes points up another significant difference in the House over the years:

The issues are more complex and the solutions are less tangible.

"I may be criticized for missing some roll calls," Teague was quoted as saying, "but it won't mean that I'm not attending to my congressional business."

But it might mean that he isn't attending to some of the people's business that is going on on the floor.

Flood (D Pa.) motion that the House concur with the Senate's deletion of a House-passed amendment that would prohibit the Department of Health, Education and Welfare from requiring schools to integrate by sex their physical education classes and from requiring professional and honorary fraternities and sororities to integrate their membership by sex. Agreed to 215-178: R 40-85; D 175-93 (ND 153 35; SD 22 58), July 18, 1975.

302. HR 7014. Energy Conservation and Oil Policy Act. Heston (R N.Y.) motion to allow contingency plans for gasoline rationing under suspension to become effective as long as neither chamber approved them within 60 days, instead of requiring congressional approval of the plans within that time. Rejected 155-241: R 119-3; D 34-128 (ND 11-176; SD 25-52), July 18, 1975. A "yea" was a vote supporting the President's position.

303. HR 571. Fair Trade Repeal. Jordan (D Texas) motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill to repeal federal antitrust exemptions for state "fair trade" laws that allowed manufacturers to set the retail price of their products. A two-thirds majority vote (251 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules. Motion agreed to 350-111: R 123-8; D 227-3 (ND 183-2; SD 74-19; M 1-11), 1975.

304. HR 8240. Veterans Administration Salary Limits. Roberts (D Texas) motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill to allow the Veterans Administration to pay its doctors \$13,500 and dentists \$6,000 above the \$35,000 salary ceiling for other federal employees. Motion agreed to 382-3: R 130-1; D 252-2 (ND 181-2; SD 71-0), July 21, 1975. A two-thirds majority vote (257 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules.

305. HR 558. Child Support Programs. Corman (D Calif.) motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill to modify programs for the collection of child support payments from parents who deserted their families. Passed 357-57: R 106-26; D 251-11 (ND 186-1; SD 65-10), July 21, 1975. A two-thirds majority vote (263 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules.

306. S.J. Res 23. Robert E. Lee Citizenship. Ellberg (D Pa.) motion to suspend the rules and pass the joint resolution to restore posthumously the full rights of citizenship to General Robert E. Lee of Virginia. Motion agreed to 407-10: R 141-1; D 266-9 (ND 179-9; SD 87-0), July 22, 1975. A two-thirds majority vote (278 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules.

307. HR 6950. Legislative Branch Appropriations, Fiscal 1976. Adoption of the conference report on the bill to appropriate fiscal 1976 appropriations of \$927,546,570, plus \$207,391,365 for the three-month transition period, for operation of the legislative branch, the Library of Congress and related agencies controlled by Congress. Adopted 374-15: R 102-37; D 272-8 (ND 187-4; SD 85-4), July 22, 1975. The President had requested \$938,265,425 for fiscal 1976 and \$27,303,115 for the transition period.

308. H Res 655. Oil Price Controls. Adoption of the resolution disapproving, and thereby blocking, the proposed plan of President Ford to gradually lift price controls on domestic oil. Adopted 262-167: R 27-114; D 191-35 (ND 191-7; SD 44-46), July 22, 1975. A "nay" was a vote supporting the President's position.

300. HR 4035. Oil Pricing Policy. Adoption of the conference report on the bill to extend authority for oil price controls to Dec. 31, 1975, and extend for 20 days the period for congressional review and the opportunity to veto any change in oil price controls. Adopted 239-172: R 18-118; D 221-54 (ND 178-9; SD 43-45), July 17, 1975. A "nay" was a vote supporting the President's position

(Republicans and some Democrats tried to defeat this procedural motion in order to obtain an opportunity to amend the rule to permit additional floor amendments to be offered to the bill.) Motion agreed to 222-180. R 0-145, D 222-15, ND 179-8; SD 43-37, Feb. 27, 1975.

17. HR 2166. **Tax Reductions.** Adoption of the rule (H Res 259) providing for floor consideration of the bill to cut federal taxes by \$21.3-billion, and allowing certain floor amendments, including one to repeal the oil and gas depletion allowance. Adopted 242-162. R 15-119, D 227-43 (ND 181-5, SD 46-38), Feb. 27, 1975.

Adopted 248-163. R 44-94, D 204-69 (ND 172-17, SD 32-52), Feb. 27, 1975. A "yea" was a vote supporting the President's position.

22. HR 2166. **Tax Reductions.** Conable (R N.Y.) amendment to substitute a \$12-billion rebate on 1974 income taxes for the House committee's provisions granting an \$8.1-billion rebate of 1974 taxes and reducing 1975 income taxes by another \$8.1-billion. Rejected 160-251. R 121-17, D 39-234 (ND 5-184, SD 34-50), Feb. 27, 1975. A "yea" was a vote supporting the President's position.

23. HR 2166. **Tax Reductions.** Passage of the bill to cut federal taxes by \$16.2 billion for individuals over two years and \$5.1-billion for businesses over three years and repealing the percentage depletion allowance for most oil and gas income retroactive to Jan. 1, 1975. Passed 317-97. R 79-60, D 238-37 (ND 185-4, SD 53-33), Feb. 27, 1975.

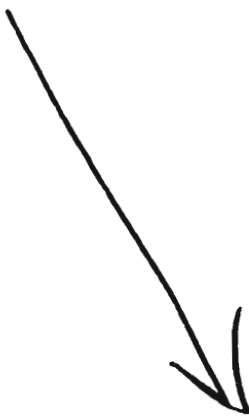

House removes controls on oil from stripper wells

WASHINGTON — The House gave final congressional approval Tuesday to a bill that removes price controls from oil produced from stripper wells and extends the life of the Federal Energy Administration through 1977.

But even after months of debate, most Texans still opposed the measure, which the House passed 293-88.

The Senate had approved it by a voice vote Monday.

The bill lifts federal controls from the so-called stripper wells, which produce less than 10 barrels a day, but account for 12 to 15 per cent of all domestic crude oil.

But it also extends the life of the FEA through the end of next year and gives it \$227 million. Rep. Ron Paul of Houston, an ardent opponent of the FEA, has called it a bureaucratic threat to the "well-

being and the very survival of the remnants of our free society."

The agency, which was due to expire June 30, has had new life breathed into it for brief periods until this compromise legislation was worked out, but without much help from Texans.

Rep. Bob Krueger, D-New Braunfels, at a House conference, urged his colleagues to approve the bill as the least objectionable one that could get through Congress. The removal of price controls on stripper-well oil, is, he said, "an important step toward independence."

Rep. Jim Wright agreed that the legislation is "the best we can get." The stripper provision "is of sufficient importance to warrant voting for it," he said.

But 11 of the 24 Texas congressmen voted against it, and four did not vote.

Those opposed were: Reps. Bill Archer, R-Houston; Omar Burleson, D-Anson; Eligio de la Garza, D-Mission; Jim Collins, R-Dallas; Henry Gonzalez, D-San Antonio; Abraham Kazen, D-Laredo; Dale Milford, D-Grand Prairie; W.R. Poage, D-Waco; Ron Paul, R-Lake Jackson; Ray Roberts, D-McKinney, and Richard White, D-El Paso.

Absent during the vote were Reps. Alan Steelman, R-Dallas; Sam Hall, D-Marshall; J.J. Pickle, D-Austin, and Olin Teague, D-College Station.

Reps. Jack Brooks, D-Beaumont; Bob Eckhardt, D-Houston; Jack Hightower, D-Vernon; Barbara Jordan, D-Houston; Krueger; George Mahon, D-Lubbock; Charles Wilson, D-Lufkin; Wright, and John Young, D-Corpus Christi, voted for the bill.

The League of Women Voters published the response of candidates to various questions including, "How do you propose that Congress deal with the problem of energy conservation?"

The total response by Teague: "As Chairman of the House Committee on Science and Technology I have authored, the Congress has passed and the President has signed into law a number of bills over the past year and a half designed to make this country non-dependent on the oil producing countries of the world. A subject he has studied is energy and he warns that the country better start looking for alternatives to oil and natural gas.

"We can no longer expect oil and gas to be the answer forever to energy," said Mowery.

"We simply have to go looking into other sources..coal, other minerals, nuclear, solar, tidal, whatever it may be." he said.

"I think pricing and availability are the key words in dealing with energy. I have no doubt that free enterprise can provide the necessary energy for us to grow." said Mowery.

He said he favors removal of controls on energy industries.

"I regret we've seen an industry (oil) virtually dismantled by government action and yet at the same time the people who have dismantled it have provided nothing that would be an incentive to find an additional barrel of oil or an additional ton of coal." he said.

Mowery said he was particularly concerned about the multi-billion-dollar deficit in the federal budget and suggested that a balanced budget is the only means to halt inflation.

When Teague's record began to be exposed, he immediately began to try to convince people that "it just wasn't so", tried to force cancellation of fund-raising efforts for Wes Mowery, and forced the following reply from Mowery.

STATEMENT FROM WES MOWERY, Candidate for Congress,
6th District, Texas.

I have been shocked by the blatant attempts of my opponent, Congressman Olin Teague, to mis-use his influence as a congressman to prevent me from mounting a strong campaign against him. It is obvious that Olin Teague is scared, and well he should be. If I had a voting record like his, I wouldn't want it exposed either.

As is customary in a campaign, I arranged with a friend of mine, U.S. Senator Henry Bellmon of Oklahoma, to appear with me at two fund-raising events this week. Teague has done all in his power to scuttle this project from the first day our invitations were sent out.

First, Teague had one of his supporters contact Senator Bellmon, and then Teague talked to Bellmon personally. What did they hope to accomplish? Did they expect the Senator to break his word and not come to Fort Worth and Dallas in my behalf?

Senator Bellmon was not coming to Texas to talk against Teague. I would not consider asking him to do this. We asked the senator to discuss with us the reasons why Congress couldn't pass a reasonable national energy policy.

We told the Senator that I was perfectly capable of handling the job of disclosing to the people the pitiful record of Olin Teague.

Senator Bellmon, a long-time friend of mine, is a man of integrity and proven leadership, and I sincerely regret that my opponent's actions have placed the Senator in the middle of our fight. I hope Congressman Teague's behavior will not embarrass Senator Bellmon.

Being unable to force the cancellation of these fund-raising events, Teague has now set about trying to deceive the people in a vain effort to keep them from attending the events. Yesterday, we began getting phone calls from the news media wanting to know what it was all about, had Senator Bellmon not authorized the mail-o-gram

which we sent out over his signature. Again, it is obvious that Teague has had his supporters contacting all of you, trying to discredit my campaign and Senator Bellmon.

I would like to take just a few moments to show you why Olin Teague is so scared ... is so determined that my campaign should not raise enough money to communicate with the people. He knows that if the truth is known, it will cause his defeat on November 2.

It is a fact that Olin Teague has the 4th worst voting record last year in the entire House of Representatives. There are 435 members in that House.

CONGRESSIONAL QUARTERLY, publisher of Congressional Roll Call - 1975, listed the 16 most important votes for all of 1975. Teague was absent on 7 of these most important votes. Two of these key votes critically affected the oil industry. Teague was absent on both of these.

On February 27, 1975, Teague again was not there to vote on the amendment by which Congress repealed the depletion allowance on oil and gas income. This disastrous action by Congress has done much to continue our energy shortage.

The second of these most important votes was the Energy Conservation and Oil Policy Act. Again, Teague was absent on

July 23rd and did not vote on an amendment to this bill setting prices paid for oil. This bill was important not only to oil men but also was vitally important to the economy of Texas.

In the November-December, 1975, issue of PETROLEUM INDEPENDENT, there was a tabulation of votes on key energy legislation. Of the 10 votes shown, Olin Teague was absent on 7.

I realize that Olin Teague was quite ill during 1975 and spent a good deal of time in the hospital. He even sent out a newsletter, picturing himself in a hospital bed. If his bad voting record was strictly a result of this, I would say nothing about it, but in 1974 he voted only 58% of the time, too, and this bad voting record continues into 1976.

Earlier this year, he was absent again on the Omnibus Energy Bill, and just this morning in the Fort Worth STAR-TELEGRAM, he was reported as being absent on a very important vote to remove price controls from oil produced from stripper wells, and extending the life of the Federal Energy Administration through 1977.

Energy is only one issue of importance to the people. You can study any other issue and find the same pattern of missing vitally important votes on critical bills which Olin Teague must consider, (quote) "of little consequence" (unquote).

It is plain for everyone to see that Olin Teague is simply not doing the job he was elected to do. That is the main issue of this campaign.

And, lastly, I would like to send a message to Congressman Teague. His attempts to side-track my campaign have been as unsuccessful as his attempts to represent the 6th district of Texas. That respondent sent out a fundraising mailgram with the signature of Senator Henry Bellmon of Oklahoma on it, without Bellmon's knowledge of the contents of such mailgram.

PRELIMINARY LEGAL ANALYSIS

This matter does not seem to be within the jurisdiction of the Commission because of the narrow application of 441h. 441h, if read literally, prohibits fraudulent misrepresentation by speaking or writing for or on behalf of any other candidate. It is not a broad prohibition of all fraudulent misrepresentations of identity. Moreover, the legislative history of 441h reinforces this interpretation. When Senator Bayh

offered the amendment, he noted that it was meant to address the problem of "dirty tricks" - campaign abuses brought to light during the 1972 campaign. Senator Bayh notes, as examples of such abuses, false accusations made by the Committee to Re-elect the President regarding Senators Humphrey and Jackson. Senator Bayh remarked that his amendment would address cases where ". . . not only does the candidate or his agent know that statements about another candidate are false but that they are, in fact, damaging to him." (Congressional Record, daily ed., April 11, 1974, S5845). Since, in this case, there is no statement made by a candidate about another candidate, which statement is damaging to the latter, §44lh does not seem to apply.

It should be pointed out that if the Commission finds no jurisdiction under the Federal Election Campaign Laws, the complainant is not without a remedy. Under Texas state law, there is a provision in the election code (Art. 14.10. Campaign communications) which makes it unlawful for ". . . an individual to misrepresent his identity . . . in any writing or oral communication relating to the campaign . . . with the intent to injure any candidate or influence the vote on any measure." This provision is broader in scope than 44lh, and if evidence of the requisite intent exists, complainant might have a case under the Texas state law.

This letter is in response to your complaint of September 1, 1976, alleging violations of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the Act). I have reviewed your allegation and have concluded that the Federal Election Commission does not have authority over the matters set forth.

Section 441h of Title 2 of the Act prohibits the fraudulent misrepresentation of campaign authority, but a review of the legislative history of this provision indicates that this section of the Act was meant to deal with situations in which a candidate makes false and damaging statements about or on behalf of another candidate. (See Congressional Record, daily ed., April 11, 1974, S5845.) That type of situation does not seem to exist in the present case. Accordingly, upon my recommendation, the Commission has decided to close its file in this matter.

Should additional information come to your attention which you believe to be within the jurisdiction of the Commission, please contact me again. The staff member assigned to this case was Judy Browning (telephone no. 202/382-4055).

Dear Sirs:

Almost one month ago, I wrote to the Federal Election Commission requesting confirmation regarding a complaint against my campaign that Congressman Olin Teague had publicly stated he had filed on August 12, 1976. A copy of the news article is again enclosed. My letter to you was written on August 25, and sent the same day by certified mail. The letter briefly described the controversy between my opponent and myself that prompted his false and insulting accusation against me. I expressed to you my belief that I was entitled to know if the complaint was filed and, if it had, the specific charges that it involved.

Having received no reply after one week, my campaign called the Commission and discussed this matter with one of your legal counsel, Charlie Steele, on September 3. He agreed with us that we had the right to know at least if the complaint was filed, and said he would call us back. We did not receive that call.

The following Tuesday, September 7, we again telephoned the Commission. This time we talked to another legal counsel, Gloria Sulton. She called us back that day, and informed us that Congressman Teague had indeed filed the complaint against us, but that it had been filed on September 1, more than two weeks after the date he had originally claimed. She further stated that the Commission had received our letter requesting confirmation of the complaint before the complaint was filed, which must have been a matter of just a few days. Those are circumstances that I find extremely suspicious.

We were then told that your normal procedure would mandate that we be informed of the specific allegations and the status of the inquiry within a few days after the complaint was filed. We have yet to receive such notification, or any reply to our letter whatsoever.

In the meantime, our opponent's offensive remarks against my honesty more than a month ago continue to enjoy the legitimacy that the invoking of the Federal Election Commission imparts. The very existence of the complaint has been used as a public relations weapon against me.

That situation, in itself, is plainly unfair. Yet it is superceded by the fact that Congressman Teague's campaign has tried this tactic again. Enclosed is a copy of an article published yesterday in a local paper. The Federal Election Commission has again been named as a means to infer credibility to an attack that is absolutely, unequivocally, and totally false.

A few weeks ago, my campaign contacted a Republican organization in Washington, D.C., and asked if photographs were available of the House of Representatives in session. We were told that it was doubtful, but that they would look into the matter. A day or two later, this group informed us that no photographs of the House floor were allowed. They then said that they had been granted permission through proper channels for photographs to be taken by the organization's staff photographer of the committee room in which the Science and Technology Committee meets, an action on their part that we had never requested. My campaign aide saw no possible use for such pictures, but indicated that they might as well be taken and sent to us.

My campaign hired no photographer for this unnecessary effort, nor did any public relations firm. We were assured that the taking of photographs of a committee room was not uncommon, and that it had been appropriately cleared. We did not request photographs of the committee in session, do not nor have ever had any such photographs in our possession, and have no knowledge if such photographs of a full committee room even exist. We did, in fact, receive the photographs of the empty room, showing Teague's chair and portrait. The pictures were somewhat amusing, but were never considered for any use whatsoever. The very idea of our planning to superimpose any photographs for any campaign purpose is categorically false. A brochure using the set of pictures received from Washington was never even conceived by any person associated with my campaign, much less "prepared." While Congressman Teague's absentee record is clearly the major issue of this Congressional contest, my campaign has completely focused its research upon House roll call votes. We have no evidence at this point to attack Teague's attendance in committee, and

would never even infer such a charge without solid proof.

Therefore, the supporters of Congressman Teague have simply manufactured a ridiculous story, which they have again sought to bolster by citing the Federal Election Commission's authority. I cannot continue to be the victim of this strategy, and would suggest that the Federal Election Commission should not continue to be the vehicle for such campaign abuses. It is a perversion of the ideals of clean and honest campaign practices for which the Commission was designed to uphold.

I strongly urge you to notify me immediately of the allegations lodged against my campaign in the belated complaint by Congressman Teague of September 1, and request that I be promptly informed if this latest absurd threat by Teague materializes.

Teague files complaint about Mowery's tactics

U. S. Rep. Olin Teague said Thursday he has lodged a complaint with the Federal Election Commission about what he considers dirty tricks by his Republican opponent in the general election, Wes Mowery.

The matter surfaced earlier this week when a mailgram sent by Mowery to prospective supporters and signed by Oklahoma Sen. Henry Bellmon was made public.

The communication contains a line blasting Teague for having a high record of absenteeism on energy-related legislation.

Teague said he has been assured by Bellmon that he had not authorized his name to be used in that manner.

Mowery, Teague said, "is just lying when the greatest need in our country today is for honesty in government."

"I've called the Federal Election Commission and they think there might be a criminal thing there," he said.

"I've turned it all over to them."

On Wednesday, Mowery said he had told the senator "that I was perfectly capable of handling the job of disclosing to the people the pitiful record of Olin Teague."

Mowery, in fact, launched an attack on Teague's voting record, saying Teague had voted only 58 per cent of the time during the last two years and that his record was even worse on energy-related legislation.

Teague defended his record Thursday, saying he had worked hard for one bill in particular earlier this year, but was in Fort Worth for a meeting on the day that it came up for a vote.

Teague told the Star-Telegram editorial board on March 22 that he was here instead of in Washington partly because he had lined up enough votes for the energy bill being considered that day that his own vote wasn't needed for passage.

Teague bemoaned the low esteem in which Washington politicians are held now.

"People are just sick and tired of Washington, period," he said.

"They don't care who you are or what you do, they fault you."

"For 30 years I've walked that district talking about the greatness of government, but this year I've had some problems," he said.

Teague said while he personally is not discouraged by it, he has encountered a widespread belief that "people in public life are not living up to what they should live up to."

Teague is a member of the House Ethics Committee, but plans to get off that committee so he can devote more time to other work.

"I spent 27 hours last week on the ethics committee and I don't think I accomplished one thing," he said.

"Come January — I didn't ask on this committee — I'm going to tell them I'd like to be taken off," he said.

On another matter, Teague said he is concerned that some people in the oil industry might be turning against him.

He said he has long defended and worked for reasonable energy legislation and couldn't understand how Mowery, the executive vice president of the American Association of Petroleum Landmen, could be running a rough campaign against him or, indeed, running against him at all.

He said his opponent came to see him about a year ago and told him the Republican party was tired of having Carl Nigliazzo as its nominee — Nigliazzo won the GOP nomination in several previous elections — and that he would be running so the party could at least put up a respectable candidate.

The congressman said Mowery told him he really didn't plan to wage a hard campaign, that the GOP was aiming more toward winning the seat after Teague retires.

If that was so, Mowery certainly has changed his mind.

Mowery said Wednesday he had collected about \$25,000 so far, that his campaign was building steam and that he intended to win the congressional seat.

"Many of my supporters have, in the past, been Teague supporters," Mowery said. "... We are going to have the resources to tell the people of the 6th District what Olin Teague has not been doing and what I will do as a hard-working U. S. congressman."

"This statement is not only completely true but easily proven. Six weeks ago when Teague first made these charges, I issued a 24-page research report which reproduced vote tabulations from Congressional Quarterly reports and other reliable sources which completely documented the accuracy of our statement.

"The 11 votes we were referring to included the Omnibus Energy Bill, S 622, regarded by many as the single most important piece of energy legislation in recent times and 10 votes considered by Petroleum Independent magazine as most important in 1975. Then, just last month he was absent for the vote on HR 12169 that removed price controls from stripper wells and extended the life of the Federal Energy Administration. The amazing aspect of this last example is that Teague was present for the seven other roll call votes that day, August 10th, including three lopsided votes on behalf of the Swine Flu program.

"Teague can call me a liar all he wants to but that will not change the documented fact that he is not doing his job.

"First, I would like to ask Mr. Teague how many times he is going to file this complaint. On August 13th he was quoted in the Fort Worth STAR-TELEGRAM as stating he had lodged this complaint. We started immediately asking the Federal Election Commission if the complaint had been filed, what it was, and what action they planned regarding it. After numerous personal and telephone inquiries, we wrote a letter to the Federal Election Commission on August 25th. Having received no reply on September 3rd, we called the FEC, asking about the complaint, and they said they would call us back, which they did not.

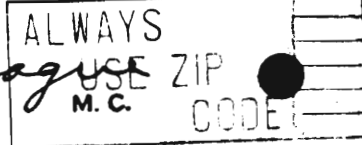

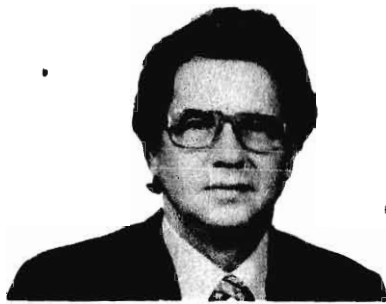

I would like to request confirmation as to a complaint against my campaign allegedly filed before the Federal Election Commission by Congressman Olin Teague. A recent controversy developed when Congressman Teague falsely accused my committee of forging a fund-raising mailgram that went out over the signature of Senator Henry Bellmon, a mailgram that Senator Bellmon did, in fact, approve. It is not my intention in this letter to argue my case in the event such a complaint was actually lodged against me, since the truth can easily be ascertained from Senator Bellmon. I do, however, need to determine the validity of Congressman Teague's public statement regarding the complaint in order to completely resolve this matter, and I would like to know the specific charges against me if they exist.

Furthermore, if the complaint was not filed, I believe it is in the best interests of the Commission to discourage efforts by political candidates to cloak reckless campaign charges with the legitimacy that a formal complaint to the Commission infers.

Enclosed is a copy of an article appearing in the Fort Worth STAR-TELEGRAM newspaper on August 13, 1975, that documents Congressman Teague's public statement. I am confident you will agree that I am entitled to know if the complaint was filed and the particular allegations involved. Your earliest reply will be appreciated.

Teague files complaint about Mowery's tactics

U. S. Rep. Olin Teague said Thursday he has lodged a complaint with the Federal Election Commission about what he considers dirty tricks by his Republican opponent in the general election, Wes Mowery.

The matter surfaced earlier this week when a mailgram sent by Mowery to prospective supporters and signed by Oklahoma Sen. Henry Bellmon was made public.

The communication contains a line blasting Teague for having a high record of absenteeism on energy-related legislation.

Teague said he has been assured by Bellmon that he had not authorized his name to be used in that manner.

Mowery, Teague said, "is just lying when the greatest need in our country today is for honesty in government."

"I've called the Federal Election Commission and they think there might be a criminal thing there," he said.

"I've turned it all over to them."

On Wednesday, Mowery said he had told the senator "that I was perfectly capable of handling the job of disclosing to the people the pitiful record of Olin Teague."

Mowery, in fact, launched an attack on Teague's voting record, saying Teague had voted only 53 per cent of the time during the last two years and that his record was even worse on energy-related legislation.

Teague defended his record Thursday, saying he had worked hard for one bill in particular earlier this year, but was in Fort Worth for a meeting on the day that it came up for a vote.

Teague told the Star-Telegram editorial board on March 22 that he was here instead of in Washington partly because he had lined up enough votes for the energy bill being considered that day that his own vote wasn't needed for passage.

Teague bemoaned the low esteem in which Washington politicians are held now.

"People are just sick and tired of Washington, period," he said.

"They don't care who you are or what you do, they fault you."

"For 30 years I've walked that district talking about the greatness of government, but this year I've had some problems," he said.

Teague said while he personally is not discouraged by it, he has encountered a widespread belief that "people in public life are not living up to what they should live up to."

Teague is a member of the House Ethics Committee, but plans to get off that committee so he can devote more time to other work.

"I spent 27 hours last week on the eth-

ics committee and I don't think I accomplished one thing," he said.

"Come January — I didn't ask on this committee — I'm going to tell them I'd like to be taken off," he said.

On another matter, Teague said he is concerned that some people in the oil industry might be turning against him.

He said he has long defended and worked for reasonable energy legislation and couldn't understand how Mowery, the executive vice president of the American Association of Petroleum Landmen, could be running a rough campaign against him or, indeed, running against him at all.

He said his opponent came to see him about a year ago and told him the Republican party was tired of having Carl Nigliazzo as its nominee — Nigliazzo won the GOP nomination in several previous elections — and that he would be running so the party could at least put up a respectable candidate.

The congressman said Mowery told him he really didn't plan to wage a hard campaign, that the GOP was aiming more toward winning the seat after Teague retires.

If that was so, Mowery certainly has changed his mind.

Mowery said Wednesday he had collected about \$25,000 so far, that his campaign was building steam and that he intended to win the congressional seat.

"Many of my supporters have, in the past, been Teague supporters," Mowery said. "... We are going to have the resources to tell the people of the 6th District what Olin Teague has not been doing and what I will do as a hard-working U. S. congressman."

On March 29, 1990, the Federal Election Commission (the "Commission") received a sua sponte letter from Congressman Arlan Stangeland concerning a possible violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a) by the Re-Elect Stangeland Committee (the "Committee") for failing to include a disclaimer in a fundraiser invitation.

II. FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

Pursuant to 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a), whenever a candidate or his or her authorized committee makes an expenditure for the purpose of financing any communication used for soliciting any contributions through any direct mailing or any other form of general public political advertising, such communication shall contain a disclaimer, clearly stating that it was paid for by such authorized committee. See 11 C.F.R. § 110.11(a)(1) and 11 C.F.R. § 102.16. While the term "direct mail," as it applies to 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a), is not defined by the Act or regulations, the

Commission, in the past, has looked to 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.7(b)(16) and 100.8(b)(17) which define "direct mail" to mean "any mailing(s) by commercial vendors or mailing(s) made from lists which were not developed by the candidate." See MUR 2692.

This matter deals with an invitation to a fundraiser, which was held on Thursday, March 29, 1990.¹ Congressman Stangeland states that invitations to the fundraiser were sent by overnight mail on Friday, March 23, 1990. Congressman Stangeland further states that on the following Monday, March 26, 1990, it was brought to his attention that the invitations contained no disclaimer. He immediately mailed a follow-up letter to all addressees of the invitations stating that "[t]his event is being paid for by the Re-Elect Stangeland Committee" The follow-up letters also were sent through overnight mail.

In his letter to the Commission, Congressman Stangeland does not indicate who assisted the Committee in the production and distribution of the fundraiser invitations nor how the Committee acquired the names of the recipients. Thus, it is unclear whether the invitations constituted direct mail or another form of public political advertising requiring a disclaimer under 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a). However, even assuming that the invitations were direct mail or some other type of public political advertising, there are several mitigating factors in this matter which warrant consideration. First, the Committee mailed out an addendum to the

1. The fundraiser consisted of a breakfast, at a cost of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), followed by a private-round-table meeting with Secretary of Agriculture, Clayton Yeutter, at a cost of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00).

original invitation, which stated that the event in question was being paid for by the Committee. Second, the Committee acted quickly to remedy its error by mailing the addenda on the next business day following the day the invitations were mailed, and by incurring the added expense of overnight mail. Finally, Congressman Stangeland himself brought this matter to the Commission's attention and there was never any external notice that a violation had occurred.

In light of the foregoing considerations, this Office recommends that the Commission decline to open a MUR.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Decline to open a MUR.
2. Approve the appropriate letter.
