COMPLAINT

The Republican Party of New Mexico, by and through its Chairman, John Dendahl, brings this complaint pursuant to 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(1). The Republican Party of New Mexico may be reached at 2901 Juan Tabo NE, Suite 116, Albuquerque, NM 87112.

I. SUMMARY

Phil Maloof is the Democrat candidate for United States Congress from the first district of New Mexico, both for the November 3 general election and the June 23 special election. Maloof has established two principal campaign committees, Friends of Phil Maloof ("Friends Committee") (FEC ID #C00333757) and Supporters of Phil Maloof ("Supporters Committee") (FEC ID #C00336354). Over the past two months, Mr. Maloof and his two campaign committees have repeatedly demonstrated a reckless disregard for and/or unconscionable ignorance of basic federal election laws intended to inform the voting public. Federal election laws apply to Phil Maloof. The Commission should take prompt and firm action to enforce the law and put an end to Maloof's pattern of unlawful conduct.

II. FACTS & VIOLATIONS OF LAW

A. Failures to Include Legally-Required Disclaimers on Campaign Materials

Federal law requires individuals or committees who make communications expressly advocating the election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate to "clearly state" who paid for such communications. 2 U.S.C. § 441d. Maloof's campaign committees violated this federal law on multiple occasions. Specifically:

1. Advocacy Piece Accompanying Illegal Absentee Ballot Requests Lacks Disclaimers

In May 1998, the Maloof committees mailed roughly 110,000 absentee ballot requests to voters in the first district. Because Maloof's mailing violated state law, a judge issued a temporary restraining order until the legality of the Maloof-generated ballot requests could be determined. (See "*Ballot-Application Debacle*," editorial from *The Albuquerque Tribune*, May 30, 1998, Attachment #1.) Maloof's mailing also violated federal law, by including an advocacy piece that does not state who paid for it. (See *Maloof Absentee Ballot Mailing*, Attachment #2.) The Commission has consistently penalized campaign committees that failed to disclaim who paid for campaign advocacy fliers. See MUR 4121 (fining Rep. Lipinski's campaign committee \$6,000 for three disclaimer violations).

2. Four-by-Eight Foot Billboards / Yard Signs Lack Disclaimers

Numerous four-by-eight foot signs have been posted in locations around the district, advocating Phil Maloof's election. (See photo of sign, Attachment #3). These signs do not state who paid for them and whether they were authorized by the Maloof committees, as required by law. 11 C.F.R. § 110.11 (requiring disclaimers on "outdoor advertising facility, yard sign"). Again, the Commission has repeatedly upheld the requirement that campaigns include disclaimers on billboards, yard signs and other outdoor displays, and the Maloof campaign and committees are not exempt from this law.

3. Television Advertisement Disclaimers Improperly Located

The Maloof campaign aired television advertisements with improper disclaimers. While these ads acknowledged who paid for them, the disclaimers appeared in the middle of the ads. Federal communications regulations require campaign disclaimers to appear at the beginning or end of campaign commercials, to better inform the public of the sponsor. 47 C.F.R. § 73.1212(d). While the Maloof campaign pulled its ads, it did so only after its unlawful activity was caught and reported. (See "*Maloof application processing halted*," *The Albuquerque Tribune*, May 30, 1998, Attachment #4). Voters have the right to expect honesty from federal candidates, and the Commission has the duty to require candidates' compliance with the law. The improperly disclaimed television ads further demonstrate Maloof's pattern of either reckless disregard for the laws or unconscionable ignorance of the rules governing federal campaigns.

4. Fund-raising Invitation

Yet another Maloof solicitation / advocacy piece mailed without a disclaimer invites would-be donors to a June 17, 1998 fund-raiser. (See *Disclaimerless Invitation*, Attachment #5). This invitation fails to state who paid for its printing and mailing, in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(1). It appears that the invitations were paid for by the hostess - her home

telephone number of _____ is provided as RSVP contact point - resulting in a violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(2) as well.

B. Failure to File Required Reports

As has been stated, Phil Maloof created two separate committees to run in the June 2 and June 23 elections. (*See Maloof Statements of Candidacy, Attachment #6*). While these committees both registered with the Commission, their reporting has failed to comply with multiple federal laws. These failures are consistent with the pattern of nondisclosure detailed above and evident in Maloof filings at the state level as well. (*See Article by The Associated Press carried in The Albuquerque Tribune, June 2, 1997, Attachment #7*).

1. Untimely Filing of Candidacy Statement

Federal law requires individuals who raise or spend more than \$5,000 towards a congressional campaign to file with the Commission within 15 days. 2 U.S.C. § 432 (e) (1) and 431(2)(A). Phil Maloof crossed this threshold on September 2, 1997, when he paid an Albuquerque political consultant \$9,915.00 (which he loaned to his own campaign). Under the law, Maloof's Statement of Candidacy should have been filed with the FEC by September 17, 1997. It was not.

By the end of September, 1997, Maloof had raised and spent \$10,285.60 on his Congressional bid, by November 30 that figure had increased to \$34,739.53, and by year's end Maloof had raised \$38,501.09 to run for Congress. However, Maloof's Statement of Candidacy was not filed in September, October, November, December - or even January, 1998. In fact, Maloof waited until February 11, 1998 to file his Statement of Candidacy, 147 days after it was legally required. (Maloof's likely defense - that he was "testing the waters" - cannot be believed in light of the size of his expenditures and the nature of the payments. Candidates truly testing the waters do not spend \$2,400 on telephone deposits and \$4,500 on rent, as Maloof did).

It appears that Maloof delayed complying with 2 U.S.C. 432(e)(1) for one of two reasons: ignorance of the law or intentional non-compliance to avoid public disclosure requirements. Ignorance of the law is no excuse. But intentional non-compliance - running a stealth campaign for five months - is a far more serious matter. By failing to properly report his candidacy in September, when the facts required it, Maloof may have been seeking to dodge two legally-required public disclosures: the year-end FEC filing due pursuant to 2 U.S.C. 434(a)(2)(B)(ii), and a personal financial disclosure report required by section 101(c) of the Ethics in Government Act of 1978. The Commission has traditionally enforced disclosure requirements and punished non-compliance, and it should do so here.

2. *Failure to identify affiliated Committees*


Neither the Friends Committee nor the Supporters Committee lists the other as an "affiliated organization" on line 6 of their FEC Form 1 (*See Maloof Committees' Statements of Organization, Attachment #8*). Both Committees declare that question on the form to be "Not Applicable." However, under federal law, principal campaign committees of the same federal candidate are always affiliated, and affiliated committees must acknowledge each other on the most basic public disclosure document - the Statement of Organization. 2 U.S.C. § 433(b)(2). Here again, Maloof failed to comply with federal law.

III. PRAYER FOR RELIEF

The Maloof Campaign Committees' pattern of noncompliance with public disclosure laws is far more than a few innocent mistakes. Multimillion dollar campaigns such as Maloof's are expected to learn and comply with federal laws, and its failure to do so represents unacceptable ignorance (or willful violation) of the Federal Election Campaign Act. The irony here is that Maloof has made an anti-criminal law he sponsored as a New Mexico state senator the centerpiece of his campaign for Congress. This is a candidate from whom rigorous compliance with the law should be expected.

The Commission should take swift and appropriate actions to deter future violations of the law by Maloof's campaign committees. Further, the Commission should hold Maloof committees to the same disciplinary standard applied against other committees that failed to comply with these laws in the past.



Ballot-application debacle

Three points about the latest election-related fiasco in the Bernalillo County Clerk's Office:

■ First, the Phil Maloof for Congress campaign was wrong to print its own headquarters as the return address on thousands of absentee-ballot applications it mailed to voters — even if the campaign believed it had permission.

Ron Godbey, the county Bureau of Elections chief who resigned over the incident, rightly believes that routing the applications back to the candidate threatens the integrity of the election process.

Absentee-ballot applications should be mailed directly to the County Clerk's Office, where they can be expected to get processed in an even-handed manner. Sending them to a politician's campaign office first raises the question of whether the candidate will screen applications, sending along to the clerk only the ones favorable to him. This isn't to say that the Maloof campaign necessarily did anything underhanded. But it's not the way to conduct an election free of the taint of suspicion.

■ Second, County Clerk Judy Woodward should never have allowed the situation to get so far.

Maloof campaign officials say Woodward approved their plans to send their own copies of the absentee-ballot application to voters in Bernalillo County. Woodward admits she approved something. But she denies she approved printing the Maloof campaign's address on the applications — a possible violation of state law. State election officials argue the law allows candidates to reprint the forms but forbids them from altering them in any way. (Other candidates have been reprinting and mailing out applications, too — but haven't been adding their own return addresses. Even Sen. Pete Domenici has gotten into the act, writing a letter on behalf

of candidate Heather Wilson that was included in a Republican mailout of absentee-ballot applications.)

Trib readers by now are aware of the consequences. A judge has ordered Woodward to stop processing the Maloof applications, pending a hearing Thursday. Godbey has resigned.

Woodward should have kept a closer eye on the forms. She rightly admits that "this was my error." Remember also that Woodward was criticized in 1996 by the District Attorney's Office for her "inept" handling of the general election that year. These are signs of a disturbing pattern.

■ Third, partisanship is out of place in a county clerk's office.

Godbey is a Republican running for office. Woodward is a Democrat. Maloof is a Democrat. The state Republican Party, well, is Republican. The mix in this case is proving volatile, with many of the players trying to make political hay.

A clerk's office is supposed to handle elections — and its other functions, including record-keeping — without regard for anyone's political affiliation. If someone comes in and asks for service, he or she is supposed to get it, never mind if he or she is a Democrat, Republican, Green, whatever.

So why are we holding partisan elections to fill such slots?

Surely, making such elections non-partisan would eliminate some of the troubles the office suffers. That's especially clear in this case.

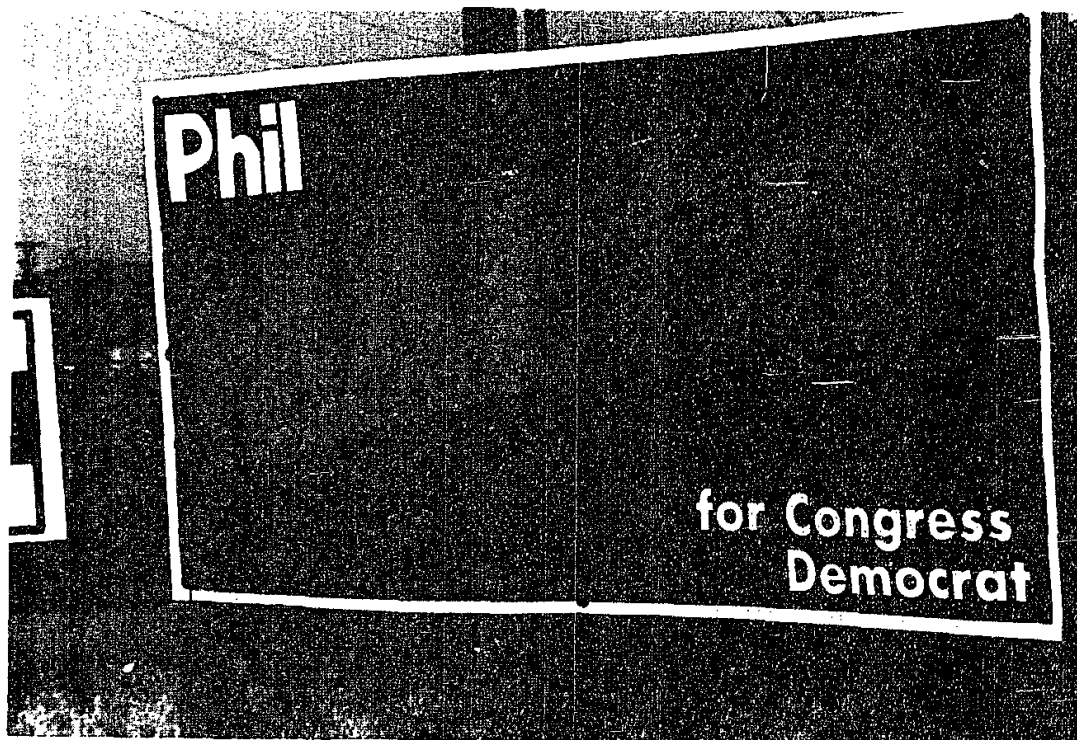

Maloof application processing halted

A state district judge, responding to a lawsuit by Republicans, ordered the county clerk to stop accepting the forms and not send out any absentee ballots based on them.

The state Republican Party has issued a battle cry against state Democrats as the 1st Congressional District race draws near.

The Republicans went to court Friday to stop Bernalillo County Clerk Judy Woodward from accepting absentee-ballot applications from voters who used a form provided by Democratic candidate Phil Maloof.

District Judge W. Daniel Schneider issued a temporary restraining order against the mailing of the ballots and scheduled a preliminary injunction hearing for Thursday.

The GOP has also accused Maloof of violating Federal Election Commission rules in his television advertisements.

State Democratic Party Chairman Ray Sena of Santa Fe said Republicans are drawing straws to distract the public from real issues.

"It appears to me that what is going on is the Republicans have no viable solutions or candidates to run and they are trying to win elections on technicalities," Sena said. "Let's talk about the issues."

Maloof mailed out about 100,000 forms for absentee ballots in the 1st District, Woodward

the problem centers on the return address on the applications. The return address says "Vote by Mail Center/Care of Phil Maloof for Congress," instead of the County Clerk's Office.

Bernalillo County election bureau chief Ron Godbey quit Thursday after Woodward overruled his decision not to accept the applications. Godbey said he felt the applications threatened the integrity of the election process.

Woodward said Thursday she told Maloof's campaign in April that it could send copies of absentee-ballot applications to county voters. But she said she didn't know the campaign planned to use its headquarters' address.

It's in question whether people who used a Maloof application will get an absentee ballot for the June 23 special election.

Maloof, Republican Heather Wilson and Green Party candidate Bob Anderson will face off in that election to fill the last few months of the term of the late Rep. Steve Schiff, who died in March.

Also on Friday, the Maloof campaign asked Albuquerque television stations to pull his TV advertisements after GOP accusations surfaced that they may violate FEC rules.

Federal rules say the ads must identify who they are sponsored by in the first four seconds or last four seconds of the commercial. Instead, the Maloof advertisement identified the sponsor in the middle.

Major party voters on Tuesday will select nominees for the November general election. The winner of that election will serve a two-year term in the U.S. House.

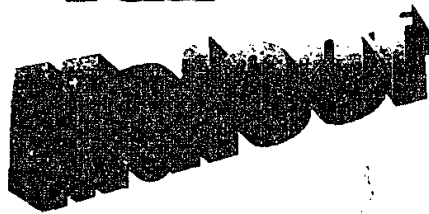
State law says applications for absentee ballots "shall only be made on a form prescribed, printed and furnished" by the secretary of state. The bureau of elections allowed candidates to reprint the forms, but warned they cannot be altered.

SANTA FE — More than a dozen New Mexico legislators, judges and members of the executive branch failed to completely disclose their incomes with the secretary of state.

A comparison of Corporation Commission records and disclosure statements on file found incomplete disclosure statements from 14 officials, including Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley, state Supreme Court Chief Justice Gene Franchini and state Treasurer Michael Montoya.

State Sen. Joseph Fidel and Rep. Jerry Sandel did not disclose they are in business with lobbyists.

Corporation Commission records show Fidel, a Grants Democrat, and Charles Young, lobbyist for the New Mexico Automotive Dealers Association and the Health Insurance Association of America, have been on the board of directors of Zia Operating & Production of Albuquerque since 1986.

Sandel, a Farmington Democrat, and lobbyist Marie Eaves are officers and directors of Chaparral Oil & Gas of Aztec.

State law does not prohibit legislators or other officials from having financial relationships with lobbyists. But a 1993 state law requires officials to disclose employer information, sources of gross income of more than \$5,000, business interests of \$10,000 or more and memberships on boards of for-profit businesses.

Legislators, holders of statewide offices, state agency heads and members of boards and commissions subject to Senate confirmation must file annual financial disclosure statements. Candidates for the Legislature and statewide offices also must file.

A person who knowingly violates the Financial Disclosure Act can be subject of fines of up to \$6,000 and up to a year in jail.

Fidel hasn't listed his involvement with Zia Operating & Production on disclosure statements dating back to 1994, the first year such statements were required. Fidel's 1997 financial disclosure statement did list other business interests, including banking, real estate and insurance.

Fidel said he forgot to list Zia because it isn't producing income for him and because it is out of state.

The Automotive Dealers Association, represented by Young, donated at least \$900 to Fidel last year. He described Young as a close friend he has known for about 20 years.

Sandel disclosed his interest in Chaparral on his 1994 statement but not on statements since.

Sandel said he didn't think about disclosing his Chaparral interest because he isn't a majority owner.

"It's just an oversight. I don't have anything to hide," he said.

Eaves, who retired this year after several years of lobbying for Public Service Company of New Mexico, donated \$250 to Sandel's campaign in 1995, and PNM locked in at least \$200.

Chaparral Oil & Gas supplies natural gas to PNM, according to a spokeswoman for the utility.

Other findings:

■ Bradley and Labor Secretary Clinton Harden Jr. failed to disclose they serve on the board of a marketing company. They said the company, while active under corporation laws, has never done any business.

■ It's an obvious oversight on disclosure statements, Harden said.

■ Franchini is on the boards of two companies not listed on his disclosure statement. He said he thought he was no longer on the board of one corporation and said the second is being dissolved. Both companies involve family members.

■ Montoya didn't disclose he serves on the board of a business owned by his sister, but said he didn't know it was an

officer and director. Montoya said the corporation isn't doing any business and is kept legally active for legal reasons.

■ Senate Majority Leader Timothy Jennings, a Roswell Democrat, is on the board of three corporations he did not list. Jennings said he didn't think to list a small family company he has little to do with. He said the other two corporations are affiliated with a company he did list on his disclosure form. He called the omissions an oversight.

■ Sen. Phillip Maloolf, an Albuquerque Democrat, is on the boards of two family corporations not listed on his statement. A lawyer for the Maloolf businesses said records of one corporation are in error and that Maloolf has never served on its board. Maloolf's board membership with the second company was overlooked, the lawyer said.

■ Sen. Carroll Leavell, a Jal Republican, serves on the board of two companies he did not list. Leavell said he resigned from one of the boards but forgot to list his membership on the second, which holds a small amount of real estate.

■ Sen. R.L. Stockard, a Bloomfield

Republican, did not disclose serving on the board of a natural gas accounting company run by his wife. "I never even thought about it," he said.

■ Rep. James Rogers Madalena, a Jemez Pueblo Democrat, didn't list being on the board of a marketing company because, he said, he doesn't have a financial interest in it.

■ Rep. Steven Pearce, a Hobbs Republican, didn't disclose that he serves on the board of a construction company. Pearce said he didn't know whether he forgot to list the corporation or was told he didn't have to since it is not doing business.

■ Rep. Gary King, a Moriarty Democrat, didn't disclose being on the board of Pine Canyon Ranch, a family business. He said he didn't think to list Pine Canyon since the family businesses generally are not corporate partnerships.

■ Rep. William Porter, a Las Cruces Democrat, didn't disclose serving on the board of a product-development company. Porter said he didn't think he had to list the corporation since it is not doing business.
