Dear Mr. Velasquez:

This letter responds to the complaint filed with the Commission by LaRouche's Committee For A New Bretton Woods (hereinafter Complainant) on January 18, 2000, which was served on CNN on February 3, 2000. Enclosed herewith is a signed Statement of Designation of Counsel. CNN appreciates the opportunity to respond and does so as follows.

The Complainant alleges that CNN made an illegal corporate contribution to the presidential campaigns of Vice-President Albert Gore and Bill Bradley when it sponsored a debate between the two candidates and did not invite Lyndon H. LaRouche to also participate. CNN is not owned or controlled by a political party, political committee or candidate. Therefore, CNN may "stage" candidate debates without violating the prohibition on corporate contributions as long as the structure of the debates meets the criteria set forth in 11 CFR §110.13(b), and the selection of candidates follows CNN's pre-established objective criteria.

The debate complained of took place on January 27, 2000. Structurally, the debate involved two of the candidates seeking the Democratic nomination in August. In inviting these two candidates, CNN considered each candidate in relation to its preestablished criteria set forth below:



- 1. Was the candidate actively campaigning;
- 2. The candidate's ability to fundraise/level of financial support;
- 3. Percentage of votes won in a caucus or primary¹;
- 4. Where did the candidate stand in the public opinion polls.

At the time of the debate CNN had no evidence that Mr. LaRouche was actively campaigning. Mr. LaRouche had not raised a significant amount of money and was not factoring high enough in public opinion polls. As a result of this analysis, CNN did not extend Mr. LaRouche an invitation to participate in the January 27 debate.

CNN's coverage of political news stories, including its participation in staging political debates, is both balanced and fair and not to the benefit of any particular candidate or political party. Notwithstanding the fact that CNN has complied with the Commission's rules regarding the staging of candidate debates, CNN expressly reserves its rights under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. CNN respectfully requests the Commission take no further action against it and dismiss CNN from this MUR.
