Dear Ms. Bonfiglio:

On March 2, 2006, the Federal Election Commission found that there is reason to believe America's Foundation and you, in your official capacity as treasurer, violated 2 U.S.C. §§ 441b(a) and 434(b)(3)(A), provisions of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended ("the Act"). These findings were based on information ascertained by the Commission in the normal course of carrying out its supervisory responsibilities. See 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(2). The Factual and Legal Analysis, which more fully explains the Commission's findings, is attached for your information. Please note that you have a legal obligation to preserve all documents, records and materials relating to this matter until such time as you are notified that the Commission has closed its file in this matter. See 18 U.S.C. § 1519.

We hope to resolve this matter expeditiously and with the Committee's cooperation. In addition to any factual and legal materials the Committee or you believe are relevant to this matter,

We would appreciate this information being submitted to the Office of General Counsel within 30 days.

If you intend to be represented by counsel in this matter, please advise the Commission by completing the enclosed form stating the name, address, and telephone number of such counsel, and authorizing such counsel to receive any notifications and other communications from the Commission.

FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

RESPONDENTS: America's Foundation and Barbara W. Bonfiglio, MUR 5645 in her official capacity as treasurer

I. GENERATION OF MATTER

12 This matter was generated based on information ascertained by the Federal Election

- 13 Commission ("Commission") in the normal course of carrying out its supervisory
- responsibilities. See 2 U.S.C. § 437g(a)(2).

II. FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

A. <u>Introduction</u>

17 This matter involves the payment of \$54,078.47 in fundraiser costs related to Senator

- Rick Santorum's leadership PAC, America's Foundation, and his authorized committees,
- 19 Santorum 2000 and Santorum 2006 (together, "the Santorum committees"). The costs at issue
- 20 relate to four fundraiser events: golf tournaments at the Country Club of Hershey,
- Pennsylvania held on May 14, 1999, August 24, 2000, and May 17, 2002; and a fundraiser held
- 22 at the home of Stan Rapp in Hummelstown, Pennsylvania on June 30, 2003. The \$54,078.47
- 23 in costs was not paid by the Santorum committees; of this amount, \$14,604.45 relates to the
- 24 May 17, 2002 golf tournament, which benefited America's Foundation. Because America's
- 25 Foundation did not pay these costs, they were therefore aware, or should have been aware, that
- an outside party paid the costs.

¹ Although only a portion of the activity discussed herein directly benefited America's Foundation, the activity of the other committees is also relevant to America's Foundation to the extent that it provides some context to the pattern of activity and involves the same individuals

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The outside party that paid the costs was Highmark Inc. ("Highmark"), an insurance company based in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Highmark's use of corporate funds to defray the Santorum committees' fundraiser costs (specifically in this case, America's Foundation's) was primarily the work of one Highmark officer, Bruce Hironimus, then-Vice President for Government Affairs. In this position, Mr. Hironimus lobbied Members of Congress and federal and state government officials concerning health care issues. Over the course of several years, Mr. Hironimus used Highmark expense reports and check requests to authorize the use of corporate funds to pay the costs of the four fundraising events for the Santorum committees. Mr. Hironimus organized and hosted the three golf tournaments, which were attended by Senator Santorum and raised approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000 in contributions each. The fourth fundraising event took place at a private home.

B. Facts²

Mr. Hironimus's involvement in Santorum fundraising was initially sought by Santorum 2000 in early 1999. Mr. Hironimus was invited by Senator Santorum by letter dated February 1, 1999 to participate in Santorum 2000's Pennsylvania State Finance Committee, "a critical part" of the Senator's 2000 election campaign. Mr. Hironimus then attended a planning meeting that included Santorum 2000 employee Nadine Maenza and approximately 30 Santorum supporters. At that meeting, Mr. Hironimus volunteered to organize a fundraiser for Santorum 2000 in the form of a golf tournament at the Country Club of Hershey, where he was a member. This event was ultimately held on May 14, 1999.

² The facts relevant to this matter occurred both prior to and after the effective date of the Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act of 2002 ("BCRA"), Pub. L 107-155, 116 Stat. 81 (2002). Accordingly, the activity prior to BCRA is subject to the provisions of the Act as it existed at that time and the activity after BCRA is subject to the Act as amended by BCRA. However, the statutory provision at issue, 2 U S.C. § 441b(a), was not amended by BCRA in a manner relevant to the activity in this matter.

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1 Nadine Maenza sent a facsimile to Bruce Hironimus dated April 10, 1999, thanking 2 him for his "hard work" on the fundraiser event and asking for a copy of the invitation. 3 Ms. Maenza's facsimile further stated: 4 Also, enclosed is a list of past contributors to your event that I am 5 excluding from [the] mailing for the Dan Beren event. Please let me know if 6 there are other people, who are contributors of Santorum, that you are working 7 on for your event. The last thing I want is for them to get two invitations so 8 close together. You can either fax or e-mail that information 9 (MaenzaN@aol.com). 10 Finally, Ms. Maenza stated that she needed the address and occupation/employer of every 11 12 donor and also "of those that give in-kind contributions (as for the prizes that are not purchased 13 by [the] campaign)." Mr. Hironimus has stated that he does not think he ever discussed in-kind 14 contributions with Ms. Maenza. In addition to communications with Ms. Maenza, 15 Mr. Hironimus communicated with Senator Santorum's scheduler Karen Garber to set the golf 16 tournament fundraiser date for May 14, 1999. 17 The invitation to the fundraiser event reads "Please join U.S. Senator Rick Santorum, 18 Friday, May 14, 1999, [a]t the Country Club of Hershey, West Course." The invitation lists a 19 program of lunch, golfing and a reception. The invitation asks for \$1,000 per participant. 20 Bruce Hironimus hosted the May 14, 1999 golfing fundraiser event, attended by 21 Senator Santorum, who at the conclusion thanked Mr. Hironimus for coordinating the event. 22 Assisting Bruce Hironimus at the event were one or more employees of Greenlee Partners LLC

("Greenlee"), a consultant that provides contract lobbying services to Highmark. These

individuals were paid for their work by Keystone Strategies, Inc. ("Keystone"), a political

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- 1 fundraising subsidiary of Greenlee:³ This work was tallied up in a Keystone invoice for
- 2 \$1,388.08 dated July 12, 1999. This invoice was addressed to Santorum 2000, but was paid for
- 3 with Highmark funds. Bruce Hironimus stated in an interview that he thinks that Santorum
- 4 employee Nadine Maenza was aware of the Greenlee employees' role.
- 5 The May 14, 1999 golfing fundraiser event raised approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000
- 6 for Santorum 2000. According to Mr. Hironimus, Highmark funds totaling \$16,536.87 paid all
- 7 the costs of the fundraiser event, including:
 - The \$1,388.08 paid to Keystone;
 - Greens fees, carts, food and beverages;
 - Prizes and handouts, such as golf clothing and equipment, given to contributors.
 - Santorum 2000's disclosure reports do not contain disbursements that appear to be related to the event. Nor did the committee disclose the receipt of any in-kind contributions
- 13 from Highmark or from Mr. Hironimus.⁴
- Bruce Hironimus organized a similar golfing fundraiser event for Santorum 2000 the
- next year, on August 24, 2000. His contact at the committee remained Nadine Maenza. The
- invitation reads "Please join U.S. Senator Rick Santorum" at the Country Club of Hershey
- West Course and contains a program of brunch, golf and a reception spread over the course of
- 18 the day.⁵ The invitation asks for \$1,000 per participant and asks for responses by May 5, 2000.
- 19 A separate invitation document, a letter from Mr. Hironimus dated January 21, 2000, contains

³ The paid work performed for Keystone also included drafting and mailing the invitations and thank you letters for the golfing fundraiser event

⁴ Santorum 2000's only reported receipt from Mr. Hironimus was a direct \$250 contribution on October 4, 1999 The committee disclosed Mr. Hironimus's employer as KHP Services, Inc., which is a subsidiary of Highmark

⁵ The stated date of the event is May 19, 2000 Due to rain, the event was postponed until August 24, 2000.

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1 much of the same information but also the disclaimer "Paid for by Santorum 2000." The letter

2 also states that "[t]he event is purposely planned for limited participation so that each of us will

3 share significant time with Rick [Santorum]."

4 Like the 1999 golfing fundraiser event, Bruce Hironimus hosted the August 24, 2000

event, and Senator Santorum attended it; at the conclusion, Senator Santorum thanked Mr.

6 Hironimus for coordinating the event. Also like the prior event, employees of

7 Greenlee/Keystone assisted Mr. Hironimus at the 2000 event. This event also raised

approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000 for Santorum 2000. Highmark funds totaling \$14,998.34

9 paid for the golfing, food and beverages, prizes, and at least some of the invitations and thank

you materials. As with the earlier event, Mr. Hironimus has stated that Highmark funds paid

all the costs of the 2000 fundraiser event, and Santorum 2000's disclosure reports do not

indicate otherwise. Nor do those disclosure reports disclose the receipt of any in-kind

contributions from Highmark or from Mr. Hironimus.

Two years later, Bruce Hironimus organized a third golfing fundraiser event in support of Senator Santorum, this time for the Senator's leadership PAC, America's Foundation.

Mr. Hironimus's letter to Nadine Maenza dated February 12, 2002 confirms Senator

Santorum's participation at the May 17, 2002 "Hershey fundraising event." By letter dated the next day, February 13, 2002, Mr. Hironimus invited certain individuals to join him as a "Chairperson" of the May 17, 2002 event, a "fundraiser in support of our friend U.S. Senator Rick Santorum." Several weeks later, on March 22, 2002, Nadine Maenza sent a facsimile to

Mr. Hironimus stating that America's Foundation was Senator Santorum's "priority" at that

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time, "due to the Fall Senate elections that he is so involved with," and enclosing that

2 committee's mission statement.

Bruce Hironimus's general invitation to the 2002 fundraiser event was in letter form, dated March 28, 2002 and titled "Santorum 2002 Golf Outing." The invitation begins, "Please join us for an afternoon on the golf course in support of U.S. Senator Rick Santorum, America's Foundation Political Action Committee" and describes the event as "a fundraiser for Rick's critically important political interests." Like the invitations to the 1999 and 2000 events, the 2002 invitation states that the event will be held at the Country Club of Hershey West Course and describes a program of golf, lunch and a reception. The invitation asks for a "minimum of \$1,000 per golfer" and asks contributors to "send [their] checks and direct any questions for further information to Megan Martin," an employee of Greenlee who also performed work for Keystone. An accompanying second page of the invitation asks for name and address information as well as preferred tee time and other golfing data. Finally, a document titled "Santorum 2002 Golf Outing" describes the golf tournament in detail, noting

Like the 1999 and 2000 event, Bruce Hironimus hosted the May 17, 2002 event, and Senator Santorum attended it; again at the conclusion, Senator Santorum thanked Mr. Hironimus for coordinating the event. Megan Martin assisted Mr. Hironimus at the event. This event raised approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000 for America's Foundation. Highmark funds totaling \$14,604.45 paid for the golfing, food and beverages, prizes, and invitations and thank you materials. As with the earlier events, Mr. Hironimus says that Highmark funds paid

that Senator Santorum would play several holes with each foursome.

⁷ Ms. Martin's contact at America's Foundation was Nadine Maenza, to whom Ms. Martin says she may have mailed contribution checks and coordinated Senator Santorum's time of arrival at the fundraiser event.

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all the costs of the 2002 fundraiser event,⁸ and America's Foundation's disclosure reports do
 not indicate otherwise. Nor do those disclosure reports disclose the receipt of any in-kind

3 contributions from Highmark or from Mr. Hironimus.⁹

The fourth Santorum fundraiser event for which Highmark funds paid costs was a reception for Senator Santorum in support of Santorum 2006 held at the home of Stan and Gretchen Rapp in Hummelstown, Pennsylvania on June 30, 2003. Unlike the three golfing fundraiser events, Bruce Hironimus did not organize and host the Rapp reception and Highmark did not pay all the costs. Highmark did, however, pay \$7,568.40 for the catering and \$370.41 for wine for the event. Mr. Hironimus has stated that he had no communication with any committee staff regarding that event, but rather communicated only with Megan Martin, discussing the catering cost with her. Santorum 2006's disclosure reports do not contain disbursements that appear to be related to the catering or wine costs of the Rapp reception. Nor did the committee report the receipt of any in-kind contributions from Highmark or from Mr. Hironimus.

⁸ These costs included the work Megan Martin performed for Keystone, which included drafting and mailing the invitations and thank you letters for the 2002 golfing fundraiser event and working at the event itself. A Keystone invoice addressed to Mr. Hironimus at Highmark was paid for with Highmark funds.

⁹ America's Foundation's only reported receipt from Mr Hironimus was four years earlier, a direct \$1,000 contribution on April 8, 1998.

Nor was Mr. Hironimus involved with drafting the invitation, which contains a disclaimer that it was paid for by Santorum 2006. The invitation identifies two contacts. Megan Martin, at Greenlee Partners (which was a Highmark contractor), and Nadine Maenza, at Santorum 2006 Ms. Martin's work on the Rapp reception was not paid for with Highmark funds.

¹¹ Ms Martin has stated that she does not recall discussing the catering bill with Nadine Maenza, who Ms Martin states would have been responsible for that aspect of the Rapp reception, the \$7,568.40 cost of which was paid by Highmark. Ms. Martin also stated that she did not discuss the wine with Mr Hironimus, the \$370.41 cost of which was paid by Highmark.

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C. Discussion

As described, \$54,078.47 in Santorum committee fundraiser event costs were defrayed with Highmark funds, including \$14,604.45 in costs for the America's Foundation golf tournament on May 17, 2002. These costs paid by Highmark constituted something of value in connection with an election, and thus constituted contributions to the Santorum committees. See 2 U.S.C. § 431(8)(A)(i). Contributions by Highmark, a corporation, are prohibited by 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a). No person, including a political committee or a candidate, may knowingly accept or receive a corporate contribution. 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a). Further, political committees are required to disclose the receipt of contributions, including in-kind contributions. See 2 U.S.C. § 434(b)(3)(A); 11 C.F.R. § 100.52(d)(1) (formerly at 100.7(a)(1)(iii)(A)). Bruce Hironimus and Megan Martin informed the Commission that they never discussed the costs of the fundraiser events with Nadine Maenza or anyone else at the Santorum committees: 12 nevertheless, the committees should have been aware that the costs of the fundraiser events were being paid by an outside source. Although the available information shows that Nadine Maenza made one inquiry regarding in-kind contributions, her inquiry was made prior to the first of the fundraiser events at issue here. 13 and in light of the circumstances

America's Foundation was aware that the May 17, 2002 event took place at a country club and involved golfing, food and beverages, prizes and invitations, as the candidate himself attended. The available information does not show that America's Foundation incurred any

- that the committees did not incur any costs - that inquiry was by itself insufficient.

¹² Mr. Hironimus described his activity as being on his own behalf, not on behalf of Highmark, a position belied by Highmark's payment of all the fundraiser event costs

¹³ Nadine Maenza asked Bruce Hironimus in her April 10, 1999 facsimile to provide in-kind contribution information to her, but he did not do so.

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1 costs regarding this event, which raised approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000 and featured the

2 candidate. America's Foundation should have been aware that a fundraiser event of this nature

3 would involve substantial expenses, yet they apparently paid nothing.

4 The circumstances suggest that America's Foundation was aware, or should have been

aware, that an outside party paid the costs of the May 17, 2002 golf tournament; yet America's

6 Foundation did not disclose the receipt of in-kind contributions. See 2 U.S.C. § 434(b)(3)(A).

7 America's Foundation was aware that Bruce Hironimus organized and hosted the May 17,

2002 golf tournament, but disclosed no in-kind contributions from him.¹⁴ Neither did

America's Foundation disclose the receipt of in-kind contributions from Highmark, the actual

10 source of the fundraiser costs.

Thus, in addition to what appears to be a knowing receipt of in-kind contributions,

America's Foundation did not disclose the receipt of such contributions. See 2 U.S.C.

13 §§ 441b(a) and 434(b)(3)(A).

D. Conclusion

The circumstances in this matter raise sufficient questions warranting an investigation

into whether America's Foundation knowingly accepted or received corporate contributions.

17 Further, as noted, America's Foundation did not disclose the receipt of in-kind contributions

relating to the fundraiser event costs.¹⁵ Therefore, there is reason to believe that America's

¹⁴ In-kind contributions from Mr. Hironimus in any event would not have been permissible contributions, as the costs at issue would have suggested significant excessive contributions on his part. The costs of the 2002 golf tournament exceeded \$14,000, far above the applicable contribution limit of \$5,000 per year. See 2 U.S.C. § 441a(a)(1)(C).

¹⁵ As stated earlier, neither did the committee disclose the receipt of in-kind contributions from Bruce Hironimus
