GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT

Under the Enforcement Priority System, the Commission uses formal scoring criteria as a basis to allocate its resources and decide which matters to pursue. These criteria include, without limitation, an assessment of the following factors: (1) the gravity of the alleged violation, taking into account both the type of activity and the amount in violation; (2) the apparent impact the alleged violation may have had on the electoral process; (3) the complexity of the legal issues raised in the matter; and (4) recent trends in potential violations of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the "Act"), and developments of the law. It is the Commission's policy that pursuing relatively low-rated matters on the Enforcement docket warrants the exercise of its prosecutorial discretion to dismiss cases under certain circumstances, or to find no reason to believe the Act has been violated.

The Office of General Counsel has scored MUR 7312 as a low-rated matter and has determined that it should not be referred to the Alternative Dispute Resolution Office. 1 For the reasons set forth below, we recommend that the Commission find no reason to believe the allegation that the Committee to Elect Rusty Oliver and Michiel Victor Cameron in his official capacity as treasurer ("the Committee")² violated 52 U.S.C. § 30104(a) or 11 C.F.R. § 104.1.

The Complainant alleges that the Committee failed to file its October 2017 Quarterly Report or its 2017 Year-End Report.³ The Committee asserts that it had not raised or spent more than \$5,000 by the end of 2017, and was therefore not required to file either disclosure report.⁴

Within fifteen days of becoming a candidate,⁵ the candidate must designate a principal campaign committee by filing a Statement of Candidacy.⁶ The principal campaign committee must then file a Statement of Organization no later than ten days after designation by the candidate.⁷ If the individual seeking federal office has not attained candidate status, his or her principal campaign committee may choose to, but is not required to, file disclosure reports.⁸

There are no available facts showing that the Committee was required to file a 2017 October Quarterly Report or 2017 Year-End Report, and the Committee denies that it passed the reporting threshold for either period. Therefore, we recommend that the Commission find no reason to believe that Committee to Elect Rusty Oliver and Michiel Victor Cameron in his official capacity as treasurer violated 52 U.S.C. § 30104(a) or 11 C.F.R. § 104.1.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Find no reason to believe that Committee to Elect Rusty Oliver and Michiel Victor Cameron in his official capacity as treasurer violated 52 U.S.C. § 30104(a) or 11 C.F.R. § 104.1;
- 2. Approve the attached Factual and Legal Analysis and the appropriate letters; and
- 3. Close the file as to all respondents.
