GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT

Under the Enforcement Priority System, the Commission uses formal scoring criteria as a basis to allocate its resources and decide which matters to pursue. These criteria include, without limitation, an assessment of the following factors: (1) the gravity of the alleged violation, taking into account both the type of activity and the amount in violation; (2) the apparent impact the alleged violation may have had on the electoral process; (3) the complexity of the legal issues raised in the matter; and (4) recent trends in potential violations of the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the "Act"), and developments of the law. It is the Commission's policy that pursuing relatively low-rated matters on the Enforcement docket warrants the exercise of its prosecutorial discretion to dismiss cases under certain circumstances and, where appropriate, to find no reason to believe that a violation occurred.

The Office of General Counsel has scored MUR 7334 as a low-rated matter and has determined that it should not be referred to the Alternative Dispute Resolution Office. For the reasons set forth below, we recommend that the Commission dismiss all of the allegations.²

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The Complaint alleges that Mike Strada for Sheriff and Kim Strada, in her official capacity

2 as treasurer (the "Strada Committee") made a prohibited in-kind contribution, which John McCann

- 3 for Congress and Ralph Contini, in his official capacity as treasurer (the "Committee"), accepted.
- 4 Specifically, the Complaint alleges that the Strada Committee, a state committee, paid for a
- 5 February 21, 2018, "Meet & Greet" fundraiser for McCann, and contends that the Strada Committee
- 6 may have paid for it with funds not subject to the limitations and prohibitions of the Act.⁴ The
- 7 Complaint included a copy of an invitation flyer for the fundraiser that includes the disclaimer "Paid
- 8 for by Michael Strada for Sheriff." The Committee responds that it paid for the event and reported
- 9 the disbursement on its 2018 April Quarterly Report.⁶

Candidates for federal office are prohibited from receiving funds in connection with an election for federal office unless the funds are subject to the limitations, prohibitions, and reporting requirements of the Act.⁷ Candidates for state or local office, or agents of such candidates, are prohibited from spending any funds for a public communication that refers to a clearly identified candidate for federal office, and that promotes or supports any candidate for that federal office, unless the funds are subject to the limitations, prohibitions, and reporting requirements of the Act.⁸ Additionally, political committees are required to file reports of receipts and disbursements with the Commission, including itemizing contributions to the reporting committee from persons whose

- 1 contribution or contributions have an aggregate amount or value in excess of \$200 within the
- 2 calendar year. Itemized in-kind contributions must be reported as both itemized contributions and
- 3 itemized expenditures on the same report. 10 The Act and Commission regulations define
- 4 "contribution" as any "gift ... or anything of value made by any person for the purpose of
- 5 influencing any election for Federal office."11 "Anything of value" includes all in-kind
- 6 contributions.¹² Whenever any person makes a disbursement for a public communication that
- 7 expressly advocates the election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate, he or she must include a
- 8 disclaimer. 13 Public communications authorized by a candidate, an authorized committee of a
- 9 candidate, or an agent of either but paid for by another person, must clearly state that the
- 10 communications were paid for by such person but authorized by the political committee. 14 If the
- communication is not authorized by a candidate, an authorized political committee of a candidate,
- or its agents, the communication shall clearly state the name and permanent street address,
- telephone number, or World Wide Web address of the person who paid for the communication and
- state that the communication is not authorized by any candidate or candidate's committee.¹⁵
- The Committee's Response and its 2018 April Quarterly Report indicate the Committee paid
- some costs related to the fundraiser, and the face of the invitation shows that the Strada Committee

- paid for the flyer. Also, the disclaimer on the flyer does not contain all required information.
- 2 However, in furtherance of the Commission's priorities relative to other matters pending on the
- 3 Enforcement docket and in light of the modest amounts likely at issue, we recommend that the
- 4 Commission exercise its prosecutorial discretion and dismiss all of the allegations. 16

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Dismiss the allegation that John McCann for Congress and Ralph Contini, in his official capacity as treasurer, violated 52 U.S.C. §§ 30125(e)(1)(A), 30104(a) and (b)(2)(A), or 11 C.F.R. §§ 104.3(a)(3)(i)(A), 104.13(a)(1) and (2), or 300.61; pursuant to the Commission's prosecutorial discretion under *Heckler v. Chaney*;
- 2. Dismiss the allegations that Mike Strada for Sheriff and Kim Strada, in her official capacity as treasurer, violated 52 U.S.C. §§ 30120(a)(2) or (3), or 30125(f)(1); or 11 C.F.R. §§ 110.11(b)(2) or 300.71; pursuant to the Commission's prosecutorial discretion under *Heckler v. Chaney*;
- 3. Approve the attached Factual and Legal Analysis and the appropriate letters; and
- 4. Close the file as to all Respondents.

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I. INTRODUCTION

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This matter was generated by a complaint alleging violations of the Federal Election

- 13 Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the "Act") and Commission regulations by the Committee.
- 14 It was scored as a low-rated matter under the Enforcement Priority System, by which the
- 15 Commission uses formal scoring criteria as a basis to allocate its resources and decide which
- 16 matters to pursue.

17 II. FACTUAL AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

A. Factual Background

The Complaint alleges that Mike Strada for Sheriff and Kim Strada, in her official capacity as treasurer (the "Strada Committee") made a prohibited in-kind contribution, which John McCann for Congress and Ralph Contini, in his official capacity as treasurer (the "Committee"), 1 accepted. Specifically, the Complaint alleges that the Strada Committee, a state committee, paid for a February 21, 2018, "Meet & Greet" fundraiser for McCann, and contends that the Strada Committee may have paid for it with funds not subject to the limitations and prohibitions of the Act. 2 The Complaint included a copy of an invitation flyer for the fundraiser

- that includes the disclaimer "Paid for by Michael Strada for Sheriff." The Committee responds
- 2 that it paid for the event and reported the disbursement on its 2018 April Quarterly Report.⁴.

B. Legal Analysis

Candidates for federal office are prohibited from receiving funds in connection with an election for federal office unless the funds are subject to the limitations, prohibitions, and reporting requirements of the Act.⁵ Candidates for state or local office, or agents of such candidates, are prohibited from spending any funds for a public communication that refers to a clearly identified candidate for federal office, and that promotes or supports any candidate for that federal office, unless the funds are subject to the limitations, prohibitions, and reporting requirements of the Act.⁶ Additionally, political committees are required to file reports of receipts and disbursements with the Commission, including itemizing contributions to the reporting committee from persons whose contribution or contributions have an aggregate amount or value in excess of \$200 within the calendar year.⁷ Itemized in-kind contributions must be reported as both itemized contributions and itemized expenditures on the same report.⁸ The Act and Commission regulations define "contribution" as any "gift ... or anything of value made by any person for the purpose of influencing any election for Federal office." "Anything of value"

- 1 includes all in-kind contributions. 10 Whenever any person makes a disbursement for a public
- 2 communication that expressly advocates the election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate,
- 3 he or she must include a disclaimer. 11 Public communications authorized by a candidate, an
- 4 authorized committee of a candidate, or an agent of either but paid for by another person, must
- 5 clearly state that the communications were paid for by such person but authorized by the political
- 6 committee. 12 If the communication is not authorized by a candidate, an authorized political
- 7 committee of a candidate, or its agents, the communication shall clearly state the name and
- 8 permanent street address, telephone number, or World Wide Web address of the person who paid
- 9 for the communication and state that the communication is not authorized by any candidate or
- 10 candidate's committee. 13

The Committee's Response and its 2018 April Quarterly Report indicate the Committee

- 12 paid some costs related to the fundraiser, and the face of the invitation shows that the Strada
- 13 Committee paid for the flyer. Also, the disclaimer on the flyer does not contain all required
- 14 information. However, in furtherance of the Commission's priorities relative to other matters
- 15 pending on the Enforcement docket and in light of the modest amounts likely at issue, the
- 16 Commission dismisses all the allegations consistent with the Commission's prosecutorial
- 17 discretion to determine the proper ordering of its priorities and use of agency resources. Heckler
- 18 v. Chaney, 470 U.S. 821, 831-32 (1985).
