37	I. INTRODUCTION		
38	The Complaint alleges that Bill Po	sey and his principal campaign committee, Friends of	
39	Bill Posey (the "Posey Committee"), accepted prohibited and excessive contributions from the		
40	American Muscle Car Museum, Inc. (the "Museum"), Mark Pieloch, the President and owner of		

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- the Museum, and his wife, Tetiana Pieloch, in connection with campaign events the Posey
- 2 Committee held at the Museum in 2018 and 2019. The Complaint further alleges that the
- 3 Museum denied a request from a representative for Jim Kennedy for Congress, Posey's
- 4 opponent, to host a similar fundraiser. Finally, the Complaint alleges that the Posey Committee
- 5 failed to report contributions received and expenditures made at those events.³
- Respondents deny the allegations and contend that the Posey Committee's use of the
- 7 Museum was exempt as a contribution under the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as
- 8 amended (the "Act") and Commission regulations. They claim that Pieloch personally owns the
- 9 venue at which the events took place; neither Pieloch nor the Museum charge fees for use of the
- venue, which is made available to other civic and non-profit organizations on similar terms; and
- Pieloch frequently volunteers his time for civil and charitable events held at the Museum.⁴
- 12 Further, Respondents argue that even if a contribution resulted from the use of the venue, the
- monetary value was likely *de minimis*, and the Commission should dismiss the matter in the
- 14 exercise of its prosecutorial discretion.⁵
 - The available information indicates that the Posey Committee's use of the venue did not
- result in a prohibited corporate contribution because Pieloch, not the Museum, owns the real

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1 property where the Museum is located and personally owns the cars displayed at the Museum.

2 Further, Pieloch does not appear to have made an excessive contribution to the Posey Committee

3 because the exemption for a community room or church likely applies. While there may be a

4 question as to whether Jim Kennedy's campaign was denied use of the venue because of partisan

considerations, Respondents provided sworn statements, averring that such considerations did

not play a role in rejecting the request. Further, the likely dollar amount of the potential

violations appear to be low. We therefore do not recommend that the Commission use its

resources to investigate this matter.⁶

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Accordingly, we recommend that the Commission find no reason to believe that: (1)

American Muscle Car Museum, Inc., made, and Posey and the Posey Committee accepted, a prohibited corporate in-kind contribution in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30118(a); (2) Mark Pieloch consented to the making of such contribution in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30118(a); and (3) the Posey Committee failed to report corporate contributions in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30104(b). In addition, we recommend that the Commission dismiss the allegations that Mark and Tetiana Pieloch made, and Posey and the Posey Committee, accepted excessive contributions in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30116(a) and (f), and that the Posey Committee failed to report excessive contributions in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30104(b). Finally, because the available information does not indicate that the Posey Committee failed to report contributions raised or expenditures made in connection with these events, we recommend that the Commission find no reason to believe that the Posey Committee violated 52 U.S.C. § 30104(b).

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II. FACTUAL BACKGROUND

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- 2 Friends of Bill Posey is the principal campaign committee of U.S. Representative Bill 3 Posey, who represents Florida's Eighth Congressional District. Nancy Watkins is the Posey 4 Committee's treasurer. Jim Kennedy is Posey's opponent in the 2020 general election. 5 The Museum, a section 501(c)(3) organization established under the Internal Revenue 6 Code, 7 is a private automobile museum located in Melbourne, Florida. 8 Mark Pieloch, a Florida 7 businessman, is the President and Curator of the museum and owns the real estate where the Museum is located. Records for Pieloch's property describe the property as a "Permanent 8 9 Exhibit" consisting of one "commercial unit" and "0" residential units. 10 Pieloch also owns the more than 300 automobiles displayed at the Museum. ¹¹ Mark and Tetiana Pieloch are supporters 10
 - In 2016, Pieloch established the Museum to make the property and automobiles available for tours and use by civic and charitable organizations.¹³ The Museum does not lease the

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- premises or the vehicles, nor is it open for general public admission. ¹⁴ The Museum states that it
- 2 never charges any fee for activities held at the venue, 15 and that Pieloch volunteers his time to
- 3 welcome attendees and give free tours of his automobiles. 16
- The Posey Committee held three campaign events at the museum: two campaign
- 5 fundraising events on February 19, 2018 and September 11, 2018, and a campaign rally for
- 6 supporters and their families on September 7, 2019. 17 According to its disclosure reports filed
- 7 with the Commission, the Posey Committee disclosed no itemized contributions made on the
- 8 date of the first fundraiser held on February 19, 2018; seven itemized contributions totaling
- 9 \$3,950 made on the date of the second fundraiser held on September 11, 2018; and three
- itemized contributions totaling \$1,255 made on the date of the campaign rally/fundraiser held on

The Museum states that Complaint's assertion that the Museum maintains a "regular entry price to the museum [that] is and has been \$100 per person" and "discount[ed] the admission price by 95% for attendees of the Posey Committee's event," is mistaken. Each organization that uses the venue decides whether to request contributions, and how much to request, in connection with their events, and each organization handles their own contributions without involvement of the Museum. The event date is posted as "Saturday, September 7th 10 AM − 1 PM" and states "\$5 per Person and \$20 per Family." The invitation to the Posey fundraising event held at the Museum on September 11, 2018 states: "Please join Former Race Car Driver Congressman Bill Posey For a Special Event to Benefit the Friends of Bill Posey Committee Florida District 8." It displays the name "American Muscle Car Museum," the time 6-8 pm, \$100 general attendee admission, half price for military personnel, police and firefighters and a "\$1,000 –VIP Attendee" ticket, which includes "VIP Reception and private tour with Congressman Posey and American Muscle Car Museum owner, Mark Peiloch."

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September 7, 2019. The Posey Committee also disclosed disbursements for food and catering around the time of the events. 19

The Complaint alleges that on an unidentified date, the Kennedy campaign formally requested to use the Museum to hold a fundraising event but was told that the Museum did not participate in political campaigns "but made an exception for Mr. Posey." The Museum denies this allegation. According to Andrew Mackey, the Museum's Event and Media Coordinator, the Museum's availability is limited as the venue is closed on major holidays, for maintenance and cleaning, and whenever Pieloch is away on travel. He further avers that due to high demand, the venue became fully booked through 2020 by late 2018, and the Museum began declining requests for new bookings at that time. Mackey states that in October 2018, the Museum posted a message on its website that stated: Mackey states that in October 2018, the Museum posted a message on its website that stated: Mackey acknowledges that after the Posey campaign event in September 2019, he

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- 1 requested to hold an event at the Museum.²⁴ Mackey states that he advised the Kennedy
- 2 representative, as he did other requestors, that the venue was fully booked through 2020.²⁵
- 3 Mackey stated that "the call ended there" and that he did not tell the Kennedy agent that the
- 4 Posey event in September 2019 was an "exception." He also avers that he declined the
- 5 Kennedy request solely due to the scheduling backlog and not because of the Kennedy "group's
- 6 partisanship."²⁷ Mackey states that the Museum is now closed due to the coronavirus pandemic
- 7 and the events scheduled for 2020 have been postponed or cancelled. 28
- 8 According to Amber Steigerwald, the Posey Committee's finance director, the success of
- 9 the Posey Committee's first fundraising event at the Museum spurred it to hold two more events
- there.²⁹ She states that she "may have seen Mr. Pieloch at a social event later in 2018 or early
- 11 2019 and discussed again that the [Posey] Committee would hold another event at the museum in
- 12 2019," "ultimately scheduling the event for September 7, 2019." She asserts that "[t]he
- 13 Committee understood and believed that the Museum customarily made its event space available

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- to groups in the Melbourne area to host private events at no charge on a first-come, first-served,
- 2 space-available basis."³¹

III. LEGAL ANALYSIS

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A. Legal Standard

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7 The Act defines the term "contribution" to include "any direct or indirect payment,

- 8 distribution, loan, advance, deposit, or gift of money, or any services, or anything of value . . . to
- 9 any candidate [or] campaign committee . . . in connection with any election "32 The term
- 10 "anything of value" includes all in-kind contributions. 33 In-kind contributions include, among
- other things, "the provision of any goods or services without charge or at a charge that is less
- than the usual and normal charge for such goods or services."³⁴
- The term "contribution," however, does not include "the use of real or personal property,
- including a church or community room used on a regular basis by members of a community for
- noncommercial purposes, ... voluntarily provided by an individual to any candidate. .. in
- rendering voluntary personal services on the individual's residential premises . . . for candidate-
- 17 related . . . activities . . . "35 Under Commission regulations, no contribution results where an
- individual, in the course of volunteering personal services on his residential premises to a

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- 1 candidate, provides the use of his real or personal property for candidate-related activity.³⁶ In
- 2 addition, Commission regulations exempt a volunteer's use of a church or community room,
- 3 provided that such a church or community room be "used on a regular basis by members of the
- 4 community for non-commercial purposes and the room is available for use by members of the
- 5 community without regard to political affiliation."³⁷
- A treasurer of a political committee must file reports of receipts and disbursements in
- 7 accordance with the provisions of 52 U.S.C. § 30104(b) and 11 C.F.R. §§ 104.1 and 104.3.³⁸
- 8 Reports must itemize contributions aggregating more than \$200 from a contributor during a
- 9 calendar year³⁹ by providing the name, address, and occupation of the contributor and the date
- and amount of receipt of the contribution.⁴⁰
- 11 Corporations are prohibited from making a contribution to a federal candidate or his or
- her authorized campaign committee, 41 and an officer or director of a corporation may not consent
- 13 to such contribution. 42 Further, the Act prohibits any person from making excessive

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1 contributions.⁴³ Candidates and political committees may not knowingly accept prohibited or 2 excessive contributions.⁴⁴

B. The Commission Should Find No Reason to Believe that the Museum or Pieloch Made Unreported, Prohibited In-Kind Contributions to Posey and the Posey Committee

The Complaint alleges that the Museum, a non-profit corporation, made prohibited in-kind contributions to Posey and the Posey Committee by allowing the Posey campaign to hold campaign events at the Museum at no charge. Respondents, however, contend the corporate contribution rules do not apply because Pieloch, not the Museum, owns the facility and vehicles, and the Museum does not lease the premises or charge any admissions for events. Publicly available property records confirm Pieloch's ownership of the premises. Accordingly, the facts do not indicate that the Museum made a prohibited contribution, and there were no in-kind corporate contributions to disclose.

We therefore recommend that the Commission find no reason to believe that the Museum made, and Mark Pieloch consented to the making of prohibited, in-kind contributions, in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30118(a). Further, we recommend that the Commission find no reason to believe that Posey and the Posey Committee accepted prohibited corporate in-kind contributions in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30118(a) and that the Posey Committee failed to report such contributions in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30104(b).

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1 2 3	C. The Factual Record Does Not Support Finding Reason to Believe that Pieloch Made Unreported Excessive Contributions to Posey and the Posey Committee		
4 5	Although the facts indicate that the Museum cannot be held liable for making a		
6	prohibited contribution, Pieloch, as the actual owner of the property in question, may have made		
7	an excessive contribution in connection with the Posey campaign's events. Respondents contend		
8	that providing the free use of the Museum is exempt as a contribution under the Act and		
9	Commission regulations.		
10	Here, the record suggests that the exemption for use of a church or community room		
11	applies to the Posey Committee's free use of Pieloch's property, provided that the Museum was		
12	"used on a regular basis by members of the community for non-commercial purposes" and was		
13	"available for use by members of the community without regard to political affiliation." ⁴⁶ The		
14	Museum and Pieloch submitted a sworn declaration by Mackey, the Museum's Event and Media		
15	Coordinator, attesting that Pieloch made the event space available on a regular basis to members		
16	of the community for noncommercial purposes, ⁴⁷ and that Pieloch volunteered his time to attend		
17	events, welcome guests, and give tours of the Museum. 48 We are not aware of any facts		
18	indicating otherwise.		
19	In order to qualify for this exemption, however, the Museum must be made available		
20	"without regard to political affiliation," a factor that is at issue here because the Complainant

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- 1 alleges that the Museum refused to host a similar fundraiser for Kennedy and both Pieloch and
- 2 his wife, Tetiana Pieloch, are supporters of Posey, each having made maximum contributions to
- 3 Posey's 2018 and 2020 Congressional campaigns. 49
- The Museum denies that any partisan considerations played a role in declining Kennedy's
- 5 request, and Mackey's sworn declaration avers it was unable to schedule the event during the
- 6 requested period because the Museum was fully booked.⁵⁰ Mackey provides specific facts
- 7 detailing how the Museum allowed the Posey campaign to hold its events on February and
- 8 September 2018, before the Museum posted its policy on the backlog on the Museum website in
- 9 October 2018.⁵¹ With respect to the September 2019 event, he further avers the Museum had
- made a commitment to the Posey Committee in September 2018.⁵² Furthermore, based on
- firsthand knowledge, Mackey admits that he spoke to a representative from Kennedy's campaign
- and provides details of the particular conversation, stating that he rejected the Kennedy
- campaign's request because the Museum's schedule was full beginning in October 2018.⁵³
- Mackey avers that he declined the Kennedy request solely due to the scheduling backlog and not
- because of the Kennedy "group's partisanship." ⁵⁴
 - Although we cannot conclusively determine whether the Museum denied the Kennedy
- campaign's request on a non-partisan basis, the circumstances in this matter do not warrant the

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1 further expenditure of Commission resources. The Complaint alleges that the Museum denied its

2 request to hold an event there, claiming "[i]t was stated that they do not participate in political

campaigns but made an exception for Mr. Posey."55 But the Complaint does not provide any

4 other facts indicating who was speaking, when the conversation occurred, or what was exactly

discussed. And as described above, the Museum has provided a sworn declaration rebutting the

Complaint's allegation with specificity.

Moreover, the dollar value of the potential violation does not appear to be significant.

8 First, Pieloch does not appear to charge a fee for the use of the Museum to any organization, and

assessing a value for the rental of the venue may be difficult. Second, Commission reports

appear to confirm that the Posey Committee paid for the other expenses related to holding the

campaign events in question. These factors appear to counsel against the Commission using its

limited resources to conduct an investigation to resolve the factual disputes in this matter.

Accordingly, we recommend that the Commission dismiss the allegations that the use of

the venue resulted in unreported excessive contributions from the Pielochs to Posey and the

Posey Committee, in violation of 52 U.S.C. §30116(a) and (f) or that the Posey Committee failed

to report these contributions in violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30104(b).⁵⁶

Although the Posey Committee contends that the use of the Museum qualifies for the exemption at 11 C.F.R. § 100.75, the available information does not support Respondents' assertion that the Museum is part of the Pielochs's personal residence. Respondents provided no information to support their assertion that the Museum functions as Pieloch's personal garage and is an annex of or extension of Pieloch's personal residence. As a factual matter, the Museum is not referred to as part of the Pieloch's residence or his garage and the Museum's website does not describe it as such. Moreover, the property records describe the venue as a commercial unit.

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1 2 3 4	D. The Commission Should Find No Reason to Believe that the Committee Failed to Report Contributions Received and Expenditures Made at the Campaign Events
5	The Complaint alleges that the Posey Committee failed to disclose contributions from
6	donors who attended the Posey Committee's campaign events held at the Museum and
7	expenditures made at the campaign events at issue. The Posey Committee states that it paid all

8 expenses for and reported all contributions received at and expenditures made in connection with

9 the event as required by the Act, and the low ticket price may have resulted in many

contributions falling below the itemization threshold.⁵⁷ Posey Committee disclosure reports 10

reflect receipt of contributions made on the dates of two of the fundraising events and

disbursements for catering, food, and beverage around the time of these events. 58 We have no

information that the Posey Committee failed to report any contributions or expenditures in

connection with these events. Accordingly, we recommend that the Commission find no reason

to believe that the Posey Committee failed to report contributions raised and expenditures made

in connection with these events.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 18 1. Find no reason to believe that American Muscle Car Museum, Inc. made and Mark 19 Judson Pieloch consented to the making of a prohibited in-kind contribution, in violation 20 of 52 U.S.C. § 30118(a);
- 22 Find no reason to believe that Bill Posey accepted a prohibited in-kind contribution in 2. 23 violation of 52 U.S.C. § 30118(a);

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Steigerwald avers that for all three events: 1) the Museum did not charge the Posey Committee for the use of its event space and neither the Museum nor Pieloch expended any funds in connection with the events; 2) the Posey Committee set ticket prices for each of the events (\$100 as the lowest price for the February 19th and September 11th events) and a lowest ticket price of \$5 per person and \$20 per family for the September 7th event, kept the funds received from each event, and reported all receipts and disbursements collected or made in connection with each event, in disclosure reports to the Commission; 3) the Posey Committee's staff and volunteers ran the event, including keeping the event schedule, setting up the food, checking in guests and collecting contributions and donor forms; and 4) the Posey Committee paid the vendor directly, using its own funds, for all the costs of the events, such as invitations, name tags, refreshments and event supplies. Steigerwald Decl. ¶ 8.
