STATEMENT OF REASONS OF COMMISSIONER ELLEN L. WEINTRAUB

- **58**: Number of matters that have come before the Federal Election Commission containing allegations involving former President Trump, his committees, or his family members.
- **28**: Number of those matters where the Commission's nonpartisan professional staff in the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") has recommended reason to believe that a violation occurred.¹
- **0**: Number of times a Republican Commissioner has voted to approve an OGC recommendation against Mr. Trump.

The outcomes are no longer surprising. My colleagues purport to be treating the former President and the current President alike,² but the data is clear: At the FEC, Mr. Trump is in a category by himself.
