17 18	The Complaint arises out of an internal governance dispute within the Libertarian Party			
19	of Michigan Executive Committee, Inc. (the "State Party Committee"), a state party committee			
20	affiliated with the National Libertarian Party ("National Party Committee"). 1 There is a dispute			
21	as to whether Angela Canny Thorton and Joseph Brungardt, among others, are authorized			
22	representatives of the State Party Committee. <sup>2</sup> Complainant is the Chair of the National Party			
23	Committee, who alleges that Thornton and Brungardt are not authorized representatives and			
24	violated the fraudulent misrepresentation provision of Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971,			
25	as amended (the "Act"), when Thorton filed an Amended Statement of Organization listing			
26	herself as treasurer and Thorton and Brungardt solicited funds on behalf of the State Party			
27	Committee. <sup>3</sup> The Complaint further alleges that Respondents did not deposit the contributions			
28	they raised into the State Par	ty Committee's designated bank accounts. <sup>4</sup>

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1 The Response denies the allegations and states that both Thornton and Brungardt have 2 legitimate claims as officers of the State Party Committee, asserting that they were duly elected 3 during the July 2022 candidate nominating convention, at which time Thornton was elected as treasurer and Brungardt as Chair.<sup>5</sup> According to its disclosure reports, the State Party Committee 4 5 received \$8,000 in contributions during the 2022 election cycle and \$6,907.42 so far during the 6 2024 election cycle.<sup>6</sup> 7 Based on its experience and expertise, the Commission has established an Enforcement 8 Priority System using formal, pre-determined scoring criteria to allocate agency resources and 9 assess whether particular matters warrant further administrative enforcement proceedings. These 10 criteria include: (1) the gravity of the alleged violation, considering both the type of activity and 11 the amount in violation; (2) the apparent impact the alleged violation may have had on the 12 electoral process; (3) the complexity of the legal issues raised in the matter; and (4) recent trends 13 in potential violations and other developments in the law. This matter is rated as low priority for 14 Commission action after application of these pre-established criteria. Given that low rating and 15 the apparent low dollar amount at issue, we recommend that the Commission dismiss the 16 complaint consistent with the Commission's prosecutorial discretion to determine the proper ordering of its priorities and use of agency resources.<sup>7</sup> We also recommend that the Commission 17

Here, the Complaint does not allege conduct by a third-party to deceive contributors but rather an internal governance dispute that is currently being litigated in state and federal court. See Comerica Bank v. Libertarian Party of Mich. Exec. Comm., Inc., et al., No. 23-000557 (Mich. Washtenaw County Cir. Ct. 2023); see also Libertarian Nat'l Comm., Inc., v. Michael J. Saliba, et al., No. 23-11074 (E.D. Mich. 2023), aff'd in part, vacated in part, No. 23-1856 (6th Cir. 2024). Under these circumstances, including
