22 **I. INTRODUCTION**

23 The Complaint in this matter alleges that Frank D. Lucas, a candidate for Oklahoma 3rd
24 Congressional District, and his principal campaign committee, Lucas for Congress and Susan
25 Balkenbush in her official capacity as treasurer (the "Committee"), made "questionable"
26 fundraising disbursements for travel, lodging, meals, and entertainment related to the National
27 Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, Nevada, which the Complaint suggests constituted potential
28 conversion of campaign funds to personal use, in violation of the Federal Election Campaign Act
29 of 1971, as amended (the "Act"). The Complaint surmises that the disbursements may have been
30 personal because there were no noticeable increases in contributions to the Committee following
31 the rodeo and Lucas owns a ranching business. The Responses deny that the expenses at issue

1 were for personal use and assert that all of the Committee's disbursements were related to
2 fundraising events surrounding the Rodeo.

3 As explained below, the Complaint's allegations of personal use are speculative and not
4 supported by the available information. Accordingly, we recommend that the Commission
5 dismiss the allegation that Lucas and the Committee violated 52 U.S.C. § 30114(b) and
6 11 C.F.R. § 113.1(g) by converting campaign funds to personal use.

7 **II. FACTUAL BACKGROUND**

8 Representative Frank Lucas has been a member of the U.S. House of Representatives,
9 representing Oklahoma's 3rd Congressional District, since January 3, 2003.¹ He was a 2024
10 candidate for the same district and won re-election.² Lucas for Congress is Lucas's principal
11 campaign committee; Susan Balkenbush is its treasurer.³

12 The Complaint alleges that, from 2011 to 2023, Respondents used campaign funds to
13 make disbursements totaling \$95,812.22 for "questionable" fundraising expenses related to the
14 annual National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, Nevada,⁴ resulting in the conversion of campaign
15 funds to personal use.⁵ The Complaint provides tables derived from the Committee's disclosure
16 reports, reflecting expenses for meals, lodgings, transportation, and entertainment.⁶ The
17 Complaint claims that these expenses are not campaign-related because there were "no

1 noticeable increases in donations in the days and weeks following the rodeo” and because they
2 “appear to be more of a personal nature” given Lucas’s family ranching business.⁷ The
3 Complaint does not provide any information beyond these assertions to support these allegations.

4 The Response from Lucas and the Committee contends that the disbursements were, in
5 fact, related to fundraising surrounding the Rodeo.⁸ Further, the Response argues that the
6 Complaint is facially speculative and lacks a factual basis to support the allegations.⁹ The
7 Response points out that federal “campaigns routinely pay for tickets for donor fundraising
8 events connected to sporting events and other forms of entertainment,”¹⁰ noting that: the
9 National Finals Rodeo is attended by donors and stakeholders with a strong interest in rural and
10 agricultural issues; it would be normal for Lucas, who represents a rural district and has served
11 on the House Committee on Agriculture, to hold fundraisers at this event; and a review of
12 disclosure reports show that other campaigns and political committees make disbursements “for
13 tickets and related expenses to attend the National Finals Rodeo every year” and “to attend other
14 rodeos, concerts, baseball games, and the like.”¹¹

15 III. LEGAL ANALYSIS

16 The Act affords federal candidates and their campaign committees wide discretion in the
17 disposition of their campaign funds and provides that contributions accepted by a candidate may
18 be used by the candidate “for otherwise authorized expenditures in connection with the campaign
19 for Federal office of the candidate” and “for ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in

1 connection with duties of the individual as a holder of Federal office.”¹² The Act prohibits the
2 conversion of campaign funds by any person to “personal use.”¹³ “Personal use” is the use of
3 funds in a campaign account “to fulfill a commitment, obligation or expense of any person that
4 would exist irrespective of the candidate’s campaign or duties as a Federal officeholder.”¹⁴

5 The Act and Commission regulations list certain uses of campaign funds that constitute
6 *per se* conversion to personal use, including home mortgage, rent, utility payments,
7 non-campaign-related automobile expenses, other non-campaign-related trips, and admission to a
8 sporting event, concert, theater or other form of entertainment, unless part of specific campaign
9 or officeholder activity.¹⁵ For other payments, the “Commission will determine, on a case-by-
10 case basis, whether other uses” of campaign funds constitute personal use by applying the
11 “irrespective test,” that is, whether the payment fulfills a commitment, obligation, or expense
12 that would exist irrespective of the candidate’s campaign or duties as a federal officeholder.¹⁶
13 Commission regulations specify that meal, travel, and vehicle expenses are evaluated on a case-
14 by-case basis.¹⁷ Such expenses are not personal use “[i]f the candidate can reasonably show that
15 the expenses at issue resulted from campaign or officeholder activities.”¹⁸

16 At the outset, the claim that there was no noticeable increase in contributions after the
17 rodeos is speculative and not a basis to infer that the payments were for personal use. Campaign
18 activities may be less successful than intended or they may have longer-ranger purposes. In any

1 event, the legitimacy of disbursements is not based on whether they successfully resulted in
 2 contributions. Further, the mere fact that Lucas owns a ranching business is insufficient to
 3 support the allegation that the expenses were personal rather than campaign-related. As the
 4 Committee's Response notes, the event appears to be frequented by numerous campaigns as a
 5 fundraising event.¹⁹ In addition, many of the disbursements include fundraiser or fundraising in
 6 their name and, on their face, appear legitimate.²⁰ The Commission has previously voted to
 7 dismiss allegations in circumstances involving unsupported claims of personal use.²¹

8 In conclusion, we recommend that the Commission dismiss the allegation that the
 9 Committee and Lucas violated 52 U.S.C. § 30114(b) and 11 C.F.R. § 113.1(g) by converting
 10 campaign funds to personal use.

11 IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

12 1. Dismiss the allegation that Frank D. Lucas and Lucas for Congress and Susan
 13 Balkenbush in her official capacity as treasurer violated 52 U.S.C. § 30114(b) and
 14 11 C.F.R. § 113.1(g) by converting campaign funds into personal use;
