On January 8, 2025, the Federal Election Commission reviewed the allegations in your Complaint received May 20, 2024, and on the basis of the information provided in the Complaint and information provided by the respondents, determined to exercise its prosecutorial discretion to dismiss the allegations contained in the Complaint. Accordingly, the Commission closed the file in this matter.

Documents related to the case will be placed on the public record today. *See* Disclosure of Certain Documents in Enforcement and Other Matters, 81 Fed. Reg. 50,702 (Aug. 2, 2016). A copy of the General Counsel's Report, which more fully explains the Commission's finding, is enclosed.

The Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended, allows a complainant to seek judicial review of the Commission's dismissal of this action within 60 days of the dismissal, which became effective today. *See* 52 U.S.C. § 30109(a)(8).

**Alleged Statutory and
Regulatory Violations:**

52 U.S.C. § 30114(b)
11 C.F.R. § 113.1(g)

The Complaint alleges that 2024 congressional candidate Alison Esposito and her principal campaign committee, Esposito for Congress and Taylor Moose in her official capacity as treasurer (the “Committee”),¹ violated the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the “Act”), by converting campaign funds to personal use when the Committee paid a New York City parking vendor \$1,083 on November 22, 2023, \$529 on January 2, 2024, and \$529 on February 1, 2024, for a total of \$2,141, allegedly for Esposito’s personal parking.² The Committee states that the payments were “mistaken” and that it reversed the January 2 and February 1, 2024 payments 21 days before the Complaint was filed, that Esposito reimbursed the Committee for the November 22, 2023 payment two days after the Complaint was filed but two

1 days before the Committee received the Complaint, and that it would disclose the chargebacks
2 and reimbursement on its next report.³

3 Based on its experience and expertise, the Commission has established an Enforcement
4 Priority System using formal, pre-determined scoring criteria to allocate agency resources and
5 assess whether particular matters warrant further administrative enforcement proceedings. These
6 criteria include (1) the gravity of the alleged violation, taking into account both the type of
7 activity and the amount in violation; (2) the apparent impact the alleged violation may have had
8 on the electoral process; (3) the complexity of the legal issues raised in the matter; and (4) recent
9 trends in potential violations and other developments in the law. This matter is rated as low
10 priority for Commission action after application of these pre-established criteria. Given that low
11 rating, as well as the low apparent dollar amount at issue, we recommend that the Commission
12 dismiss the Complaint consistent with the Commission's prosecutorial discretion to determine
13 the proper ordering of its priorities and use of agency resources⁴ and close the file as to all
14 Respondents effective 30 days from the date the certification of this vote is signed (or on the next
