## INDEPENDENT EXPENDITURES OF \$21 MILLION REPORTED IN '88, FEC STUDY SHOWS

WASHINGTON -- Of the \$21.1 million in independent expenditures made during the 1988 federal elections, two-thirds focused on presidential candidates, with 33 percent spent in connection with congressional races, according to a study by the Federal Election Commission.

Total independent spending in 1988 actually decreased nine percent from the \$23.4 million spent in 1984, with expenditures exclusively for or against presidential candidates dropping 19 percent below 1984 levels to \$14.1 million. Independent expenditures in congressional elections reached \$7 million, 22 percent off the record \$9 million spent in 1986.

The report, which tracked 150 PACs, 20 individuals and 36 other groups that filed reports, summarizes the '88 elections by charting which candidates, candidate types (i.e. incumbent or challenger), or parties were favored by independent expenditures. Also detailed is a historical comparison of spending by cycle, and rankings of the most active individuals or groups.

### Highlights of the study include:

- A total of \$16.4 million was spent on behalf of 641 federal candidates.
- Independent spending favored Democrats in the House; Republicans in the Senate; and congressional incumbents over challengers.
- Independent expenditures on behalf of candidates favored Republicans with \$13.7 million compared to \$2.8 million for Democrats.
- Democratic candidates witnessed \$4.2 million spent against them compared to \$439,000 for Republicans.
- Negative spending of \$4.7 million was highest since 1982 when it totalled \$5.1 million.

- Independent expenditures made on behalf of presidential candidates benefitted George Bush with \$9.7 million, compared to \$519,000 for Michael Dukakis; while negative spending went as follows: \$3 million against Dukakis and \$75,000 against Bush.

Under federal election law, independent expenditures are monies spent to finance a communication which advocates the election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate. Such expenditures must be made without the cooperation or consultation of a candidate or campaign and are not limited like direct contributions.






### Independent Expenditures in Presidential Campaigns
