8 Dear Mr. Jones:

9 We are responding to the advisory opinion request you submitted on behalf of the  
10 American Veterinary Medical Association (“AVMA”) regarding the application of the Federal  
11 Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended (the “Act”), and Commission regulations to  
12 AVMA’s proposed activity. AVMA asks whether it may solicit members of the Student  
13 American Veterinary Medical Association (“SAVMA”) to make contributions to AVMA’s  
14 separate segregated fund, the American Veterinary Medical Association Political Action  
15 Committee (“AVMA PAC”). The Commission concludes that AVMA may solicit contributions  
16 from members of SAVMA to AVMA PAC.

17 ***Background***

18 The facts presented in this advisory opinion are based on your letter dated July 3, 2013,  
19 which included the bylaws and articles of incorporation for AVMA and SAVMA, ~~and~~ your  
20 telephone conversation with Commission staff on July 25, 2013, and your comments dated  
21 August 20, 2013.

22 AVMA is a non-profit membership organization incorporated under Illinois law. It is  
23 registered as a tax-exempt organization under section 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code.  
24 According to its bylaws, the mission of AVMA is to “improve animal and human health and  
25 advance the veterinary medical profession.” *American Veterinary Medical Association Bylaws*,  
26 Art. I, Sec. ~~23~~.

1 AVMA’s membership rules require an individual to have earned a professional degree in  
2 veterinary medicine or to be involved in teaching veterinary medicine or in veterinary research.  
3 *AVMA Bylaws*, Art. II, Sec. 3(a)-(c). More than 80% of veterinarians in the United States are  
4 members of AVMA, and more than 99% of AVMA members have full voting rights within the  
5 organization.<sup>1</sup> Most of these members qualify to be voting members on the basis of having  
6 graduated from veterinary school as SAVMA members in good standing. *See AVMA Bylaws*,  
7 Art. II, Sec. 3(a)(1)(iv).

8 AVMA has two governing bodies: the Executive Board and the House of Delegates.  
9 The AMVA Executive Board consists of 15 elected AVMA members and is charged with the  
10 overall management of the affairs of AVMA. *AVMA Bylaws*, Art. V, Sec. 1. The AVMA House  
11 of Delegates, which establishes the organization’s policies and has power to amend its bylaws,  
12 *id.*, Art. VII, Sec. 1, is comprised of one delegate and one alternate delegate from each of  
13 68 constituent organizations, including SAVMA. *Id.*, Art. VII, Sec. 2.<sup>2</sup> AVMA’s House of  
14 Delegates also elects three of the members of AVMA’s Executive Board. *Id.*, Art. VI,  
15 Sec. 14(a).

16 SAVMA is a non-profit membership organization of veterinary students. SAVMA is  
17 incorporated under Illinois law and holds tax-exempt status under a “group exemption” from the  
18 Internal Revenue Service, which recognizes SAVMA as a “subordinate organization” to

1 AVMA.<sup>3</sup> According to its bylaws, SAVMA’s mission is to “enhance the veterinary profession,  
2 to educate the public, and to promote contact and exchange of ideas between veterinary students,  
3 veterinarians and the parent organization, the American Veterinary Medical Association.”  
4 *Bylaws of the Student American Veterinary Medical Association*, Art. II, Sec. 3. SAVMA’s  
5 bylaws must “correlate” with AVMA’s bylaws and must be approved by AVMA’s Executive  
6 Vice President. *Id.*, Art. XV, Sec. 4; *see also id.*, Art. III, Sec. 1(d) (providing that SAVMA  
7 members must abide by AVMA Bylaws).

8 Most SAVMA members join the organization by joining a student chapter of AVMA.

9 There are thirty-~~two~~-three student chapters of SAVMA. These chapters have over 10,000  
10 members combined, representing approximately 92% of all veterinary students in the United  
11 States. SAVMA cooperates with AVMA in inviting veterinary students to join SAVMA. ~~Two~~  
12 ~~people on staff at AVMA work with t~~The AVMA Student Advisor and/or the AVMA Vice  
13 President ~~to arrange visits by one or the other to~~ each campus with a SAVMA-student chapter,  
14 where the ~~y AVMA Student Advisor or the AVMA Vice President~~ explains to students the  
15 benefits of joining SAVMA. They also distribute brochures and send emails to students  
16 encouraging them to become members of SAVMA. In addition, SAVMA-student chapter  
17 officers meet with students at their respective schools to solicit membership.

18 SAVMA has two governing bodies: the SAVMA Executive Board and the SAVMA  
19 House of Delegates. The SAVMA Executive Board is charged with the overall management of  
20 the affairs of SAVMA and consists of 14 elected SAVMA members. *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. VII,  
21 Secs. 1-2; Art. VI, Sec. 3. The SAVMA House of Delegates is the principal “legislative” body

1 of the organization and elects the members of SAVMA’s Executive Board. *SAVMA Bylaws*,  
2 Art. VIII, Sec. 1; Art. VI, Sec. 3. The voting members of the SAVMA House of Delegates  
3 consist of one Junior Delegate and one Senior Delegate from each veterinary school that meets  
4 certain standards. *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. VIII, Sec. 3. The AVMA Vice President and AVMA  
5 Staff Advisor are both empowered to act on behalf of SAVMA. *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. V,  
6 Secs. 2-3.

7 Two members of SAVMA’s Executive Board — its President and President-Elect — are  
8 ~~full voting~~ delegates in the AVMA House of Delegates: the President with full voting power,  
9 and the President-elect as the President’s alternate. *AVMA Bylaws*, Art. VII, Secs. ~~1(e)-(f);~~  
10 ~~§2(d), 15-16; see~~ *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. VI, Secs. 2(A)(b)(v), 2(B)(b)(iv). SAVMA’s President  
11 also attends and participates (without voting power) in AVMA Executive Board meetings.  
12 *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. VI, Sec. 2(A)(b)(vii).

13 SAVMA’s membership dues are determined by the SAVMA House of Delegates and are  
14 paid to SAVMA. *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. IV. SAVMA members enjoy many benefits otherwise  
15 available only to AVMA members. These benefits include significantly reduced subscription  
16 rates on AVMA professional journals, access to the “members only” page of the AVMA website,  
17 eligibility to sign up for multiple “members only” newsletters, and participation in AVMA’s  
18 group health, professional liability, and life insurance programs.

19 SAVMA members receive a member identification number when they join and retain that  
20 number if they become members of AVMA. More than 97% of SAVMA members become  
21 members of AVMA upon graduating from veterinary school, and some of the remaining 3%  
22 become members of AVMA at a later time.

23 ***Questions Presented***

1       1. *Are members of SAVMA “members” of AVMA whom AVMA may solicit for contributions*  
2             *to AVMA PAC under the Act and Commission regulations?*

3       2. *Is SAVMA an affiliate organization of AVMA under the Act and Commission regulations?*

4       ***Legal Analysis and Conclusions***

5       1. *Are members of SAVMA “members” of AVMA whom AVMA may solicit for contributions*  
6             *to AVMA PAC under the Act and Commission regulations?*

7             Yes, members of SAVMA are members of AVMA whom AVMA may solicit for  
8 contributions to AVMA PAC under the Act and Commission regulations.

9             The Act prohibits a corporation from making any contribution in connection with a  
10 Federal election. 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a). The Act provides, however, that the term “contribution”  
11 does not include “the establishment, administration, and solicitation of contributions to a separate  
12 segregated fund to be utilized for political purposes by a corporation, labor organization, [or]  
13 membership organization.” 2 U.S.C. § 441b(b)(2)(C); *see also* 2 U.S.C. § 431(8)(B)(vi),  
14 (9)(B)(v).

15             Under 2 U.S.C. § 441b(b)(4)(A), a corporation may solicit contributions to its separate  
16 segregated fund only from the corporation’s stockholders and their families and the corporation’s  
17 executive or administrative personnel and their families. An exception set forth in 2 U.S.C.  
18 § 441b(b)(4)(C) allows a membership organization to solicit contributions to its separate  
19 segregated fund from the organization’s members.

20             Commission regulations define a “membership organization” to include a trade  
21 association or corporation without capital stock that: (1) is composed of members who have the  
22 authority to operate or administer the organization pursuant to its bylaws; (2) expressly states in  
23 its bylaws the qualifications and requirements for membership; (3) makes its bylaws available to

1 its members upon request; (4) expressly solicits persons to become members; (5) expressly  
2 acknowledges the acceptance of membership, such as by sending a membership card or  
3 including the member's name on a membership newsletter list; and (6) is not organized primarily  
4 for the purpose of influencing the nomination or election of any individual to federal office.  
5 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(1); *see also* 11 C.F.R. § 100.134(e).

6 AVMA meets all six of these criteria. First, it is a voluntary membership organization  
7 whose voting members (comprising 99.8% of its membership) operate the organization by  
8 directly and indirectly electing its Executive Board ~~and House of Delegates~~. Second, AVMA's  
9 Bylaws clearly set forth the organization's requirements for membership. Third, AVMA's  
10 mission statement, strategic plan, bylaws, and other organizational documents are available to  
11 AVMA's members on AVMA's web site, www.AVMA.org. Fourth, AVMA expressly solicits  
12 persons to become members on its website, and by assisting SAVMA in its membership efforts.  
13 Fifth, AVMA acknowledges membership by placing members on mailing lists and giving them  
14 identification numbers and individual profile pages on the AVMA website. Sixth, AVMA's  
15 primary purpose relates to advancing the interests of the veterinary medical profession, not to the  
16 election of individuals to federal office. Therefore, the Commission concludes that AVMA is a  
17 membership organization within the meaning of the Commission's regulations. 11 C.F.R.  
18 § 114.1(e); *see also* 11 C.F.R. § 100.134(e).

19 Commission regulations provide that the "members" of a membership organization  
20 include all persons who satisfy the requirements for membership in that organization,  
21 affirmatively accept the organization's invitation to become a member, and meet certain other  
22 criteria. 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(f), 114.1(e)(2). AVMA's membership rules require an individual  
23 to have earned a professional degree in veterinary medicine or to be involved in teaching

1 veterinary medicine or in veterinary research. Because SAVMA members are veterinary  
2 students, they do not meet any of these threshold requirements. Thus, SAVMA members do not  
3 qualify as “members” of AVMA under the general rule in 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(f) and  
4 114.1(e)(2).

5 However, under 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(g) and 114.1(e)(3), the Commission may  
6 determine on a case-by-case basis that persons who do not precisely meet the requirements of the  
7 general rule are “members” for purposes of an organization’s solicitations for its separate  
8 segregated fund. To qualify as members under this regulation, the individuals must “have a  
9 relatively enduring and independently significant financial or organizational attachment to the  
10 organization.” 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(3); *see, e.g.*, Advisory Opinion 2003-13 (OPHTHPAC).  
11 Commission regulations offer as one example, “student members [of an organization] who pay a  
12 lower amount of dues while in school.” 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(3).

13 SAVMA members have significant and enduring financial and organizational  
14 attachments to AVMA. SAVMA members are required to abide by AVMA Bylaws and “other  
15 policies, rules and regulations as [AVMA] may adopt.” *AVMA Bylaws*, Art. II, Sec. 1. The  
16 Commission has previously found that a binding agreement to follow an organization’s rules  
17 constitutes a significant organizational attachment. *See* Advisory Opinion 2003-13  
18 (OPHTHPAC). SAVMA members participate further in the governance of AVMA by electing  
19 the SAVMA President and President-Elect, who have ~~full~~-voting rights in AVMA’s House of  
20 Delegates, as described above. SAVMA members also have financial attachments to AVMA,  
21 including eligibility for certain benefits of AVMA membership, such as participation in  
22 AVMA’s group health, professional liability, and life insurance programs, reduced subscription  
23 rates on AVMA’s professional journals, and access to “members only” pages of the AVMA



1 website. *See* Advisory Opinion 2011-08 (American Society of Anesthesiologists) (citing similar  
2 factors in concluding that retired members of professional association were “members” for  
3 solicitation purposes). And these attachments are enduring, as more than 97% of SAVMA  
4 members convert to AVMA members upon graduation from veterinary school, and more than  
5 80% of veterinarians are members of AVMA. *See* Advisory Opinion 2003-13 (OPHTHPAC)  
6 (finding that ophthalmologists-in-training had enduring connections to national ophthalmological  
7 association where 93% of all ophthalmologists were members of association).

8 For the foregoing reasons, the Commission determines that SAVMA members qualify as  
9 “members” of AVMA under 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(g) and 114.1(e)(3), and that AVMA may  
10 therefore solicit SAVMA members for contributions to AVMA PAC.

11 2. *Is SAVMA an affiliate organization of AVMA under the Act and Commission regulations?*

12 Yes, SAVMA is an affiliate organization of AVMA under the Act and Commission  
13 regulations.

14 Under Commission regulations, in the case of a membership organization which has  
15 “several levels,” a person who qualifies as a member of any of the “affiliate[d]” membership  
16 organizations also qualifies as a member of the other affiliates for purposes of 11 C.F.R. Part  
17 114. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(5). The Commission uses the factors set forth at 11 C.F.R.  
18 § 100.5(g)(2)-(4) to determine whether entities are affiliated. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(5).

19 Section 100.5(g)(2) provides that entities are affiliated if they are established, financed,  
20 maintained or controlled by the same person. Section 100.5(g)(4)(ii) then describes several  
21 factors relevant to determining whether there is evidence of SAVMA being established,  
22 financed, maintained or controlled by AVMA.

1 SAVMA meets at least three of these factors. First, AVMA participates directly in the  
2 governance of SAVMA, as two of AVMA's officers are expressly authorized to act on  
3 SAVMA's behalf, and SAVMA's bylaws must correlate with AVMA's bylaws and be approved  
4 by AVMA's Executive Vice President. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 100.5(g)(4)(ii)(B). Second, most  
5 AVMA members were once SAVMA members, and more than 97% of SAVMA members  
6 become AVMA members. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 100.5(g)(4)(ii)(F) (describing factor as “[w]hether a  
7 sponsoring organization . . . has any members . . . who were members . . . of another sponsoring  
8 organization”). Third, AVMA had a “significant role” in the formation of SAVMA, 11 C.F.R.  
9 § 100.5(g)(4)(ii)(I), and SAVMA still maintains its tax-exempt status through its relationship  
10 with AVMA. Therefore, the Commission concludes that SAVMA is an affiliate organization of  
11 AVMA under the Act and Commission regulations. As such, members of SAVMA qualify as  
12 members of AVMA under 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(5).

13 This response constitutes an advisory opinion concerning the application of Commission  
14 regulations to the specific transaction or activity set forth in your request. *See* U.S.C. 437f. The  
15 Commission emphasizes that, if there is a change in any of the facts or assumptions presented,  
16 and such facts or assumptions are material to a conclusion presented in this advisory opinion,  
17 then the requestors may not rely on that conclusion as support for its proposed activity. Any  
18 person involved in any specific transaction or activity which is indistinguishable in all its  
19 material aspects from the transaction or activity with respect to which this advisory opinion is  
20 rendered may rely on this advisory opinion. *See* U.S.C. § 437f(c)(1)(B). Please note the analysis  
21 or conclusions in this advisory opinion may be affected by subsequent developments in the law  
22 including, but not limited to, statutes, regulations, advisory opinions, and case law. The cited

10 Art. VI, Sec. 2(A)(b)(vii).

11 SAVMA’s membership dues are determined by the SAVMA House of Delegates and are  
12 paid to SAVMA. *SAVMA Bylaws*, Art. IV. SAVMA members enjoy many benefits otherwise  
13 available only to AVMA members. These benefits include significantly reduced subscription  
14 rates on AVMA professional journals, access to the “members only” page of the AVMA website,  
15 eligibility to sign up for multiple “members only” newsletters, and participation in AVMA’s  
16 group health, professional liability, and life insurance programs.

17 SAVMA members receive a member identification number when they join and retain that  
18 number if they become members of AVMA. More than 97% of SAVMA members become  
19 members of AVMA upon graduating from veterinary school, and some of the remaining 3%  
20 become members of AVMA at a later time.

## 21 ***Questions Presented***

22 1. *Are members of SAVMA “members” of AVMA whom AVMA may solicit for contributions*  
23 *to AVMA PAC under the Act and Commission regulations?*

1           2. *Is SAVMA an affiliate organization of AVMA under the Act and Commission regulations?*

2           ***Legal Analysis and Conclusions***

3           1. *Are members of SAVMA “members” of AVMA whom AVMA may solicit for contributions*  
4           *to AVMA PAC under the Act and Commission regulations?*

5           Yes, members of SAVMA are members of AVMA whom AVMA may solicit for  
6           contributions to AVMA PAC under the Act and Commission regulations.

7           The Act prohibits a corporation from making any contribution in connection with a  
8           Federal election. 2 U.S.C. § 441b(a). The Act provides, however, that the term “contribution”  
9           does not include “the establishment, administration, and solicitation of contributions to a separate  
10          segregated fund to be utilized for political purposes by a corporation, labor organization, [or]  
11          membership organization.” 2 U.S.C. § 441b(b)(2)(C); *see also* 2 U.S.C. § 431(8)(B)(vi),  
12          (9)(B)(v).

13          Under 2 U.S.C. § 441b(b)(4)(A), a corporation may solicit contributions to its separate  
14          segregated fund only from the corporation’s stockholders and their families and the corporation’s  
15          executive or administrative personnel and their families. An exception set forth in 2 U.S.C.  
16          § 441b(b)(4)(C) allows a membership organization to solicit contributions to its separate  
17          segregated fund from the organization’s members.

18          Commission regulations define a “membership organization” to include a trade  
19          association or corporation without capital stock that: (1) is composed of members who have the  
20          authority to operate or administer the organization pursuant to its bylaws; (2) expressly states in  
21          its bylaws the qualifications and requirements for membership; (3) makes its bylaws available to  
22          its members upon request; (4) expressly solicits persons to become members; (5) expressly  
23          acknowledges the acceptance of membership, such as by sending a membership card or



1 including the member's name on a membership newsletter list; and (6) is not organized primarily  
2 for the purpose of influencing the nomination or election of any individual to federal office.

3 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(1); *see also* 11 C.F.R. § 100.134(e).

4 AVMA meets all six of these criteria. First, it is a voluntary membership organization  
5 whose voting members (comprising 99.8% of its membership) operate the organization by  
6 directly and indirectly electing its Executive Board. Second, AVMA's Bylaws clearly set forth  
7 the organization's requirements for membership. Third, AVMA's mission statement, strategic  
8 plan, bylaws, and other organizational documents are available to AVMA's members on  
9 AVMA's web site, [www.AVMA.org](http://www.AVMA.org). Fourth, AVMA expressly solicits persons to become  
10 members on its website, and by assisting SAVMA in its membership efforts. Fifth, AVMA  
11 acknowledges membership by placing members on mailing lists and giving them identification  
12 numbers and individual profile pages on the AVMA website. Sixth, AVMA's primary purpose  
13 relates to advancing the interests of the veterinary medical profession, not to the election of  
14 individuals to federal office. Therefore, the Commission concludes that AVMA is a membership  
15 organization within the meaning of the Commission's regulations. 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e); *see also*  
16 11 C.F.R. § 100.134(e).

17 Commission regulations provide that the "members" of a membership organization  
18 include all persons who satisfy the requirements for membership in that organization,  
19 affirmatively accept the organization's invitation to become a member, and meet certain other  
20 criteria. 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(f), 114.1(e)(2). AVMA's membership rules require an individual  
21 to have earned a professional degree in veterinary medicine or to be involved in teaching  
22 veterinary medicine or in veterinary research. Because SAVMA members are veterinary  
23 students, they do not meet any of these threshold requirements. Thus, SAVMA members do not

1 qualify as “members” of AVMA under the general rule in 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(f) and  
2 114.1(e)(2).

3           However, under 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(g) and 114.1(e)(3), the Commission may  
4 determine on a case-by-case basis that persons who do not precisely meet the requirements of the  
5 general rule are “members” for purposes of an organization’s solicitations for its separate  
6 segregated fund. To qualify as members under this regulation, the individuals must “have a  
7 relatively enduring and independently significant financial or organizational attachment to the  
8 organization.” 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(3); *see, e.g.*, Advisory Opinion 2003-13 (OPHTHPAC).  
9 Commission regulations offer as one example, “student members [of an organization] who pay a  
10 lower amount of dues while in school.” 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(3).

11           SAVMA members have significant and enduring financial and organizational  
12 attachments to AVMA. SAVMA members are required to abide by AVMA Bylaws and “other  
13 policies, rules and regulations as [AVMA] may adopt.” *AVMA Bylaws*, Art. II, Sec. 1. The  
14 Commission has previously found that a binding agreement to follow an organization’s rules  
15 constitutes a significant organizational attachment. *See* Advisory Opinion 2003-13  
16 (OPHTHPAC). SAVMA members participate further in the governance of AVMA by electing  
17 the SAVMA President and President-Elect, who have voting rights in AVMA’s House of  
18 Delegates, as described above. SAVMA members also have financial attachments to AVMA,  
19 including eligibility for certain benefits of AVMA membership, such as participation in  
20 AVMA’s group health, professional liability, and life insurance programs, reduced subscription  
21 rates on AVMA’s professional journals, and access to “members only” pages of the AVMA  
22 website. *See* Advisory Opinion 2011-08 (American Society of Anesthesiologists) (citing similar  
23 factors in concluding that retired members of professional association were “members” for

1 solicitation purposes). And these attachments are enduring, as more than 97% of SAVMA  
2 members convert to AVMA members upon graduation from veterinary school, and more than  
3 80% of veterinarians are members of AVMA. *See* Advisory Opinion 2003-13 (OPHTHPAC)  
4 (finding that ophthalmologists-in-training had enduring connections to national ophthalmological  
5 association where 93% of all ophthalmologists were members of association).

6 For the foregoing reasons, the Commission determines that SAVMA members qualify as  
7 “members” of AVMA under 11 C.F.R. §§ 100.134(g) and 114.1(e)(3), and that AVMA may  
8 therefore solicit SAVMA members for contributions to AVMA PAC.

9 2. *Is SAVMA an affiliate organization of AVMA under the Act and Commission regulations?*

10 Yes, SAVMA is an affiliate organization of AVMA under the Act and Commission  
11 regulations.

12 Under Commission regulations, in the case of a membership organization which has  
13 “several levels,” a person who qualifies as a member of any of the “affiliate[d]” membership  
14 organizations also qualifies as a member of the other affiliates for purposes of 11 C.F.R.  
15 Part 114. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(5). The Commission uses the factors set forth at 11 C.F.R.  
16 § 100.5(g)(2)-(4) to determine whether entities are affiliated. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(5).

17 Section 100.5(g)(2) provides that entities are affiliated if they are established, financed,  
18 maintained or controlled by the same person. Section 100.5(g)(4)(ii) then describes several  
19 factors relevant to determining whether there is evidence of SAVMA being established,  
20 financed, maintained or controlled by AVMA.

21 SAVMA meets at least three of these factors. First, AVMA participates directly in the  
22 governance of SAVMA, as two of AVMA’s officers are expressly authorized to act on  
23 SAVMA’s behalf, and SAVMA’s bylaws must correlate with AVMA’s bylaws and be approved

1 by AVMA’s Executive Vice President. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 100.5(g)(4)(ii)(B). Second, most  
2 AVMA members were once SAVMA members, and more than 97% of SAVMA members  
3 become AVMA members. *See* 11 C.F.R. § 100.5(g)(4)(ii)(F) (describing factor as “[w]hether a  
4 sponsoring organization . . . has any members . . . who were members . . . of another sponsoring  
5 organization”). Third, AVMA had a “significant role” in the formation of SAVMA, 11 C.F.R.  
6 § 100.5(g)(4)(ii)(I), and SAVMA still maintains its tax-exempt status through its relationship  
7 with AVMA. Therefore, the Commission concludes that SAVMA is an affiliate organization of  
8 AVMA under the Act and Commission regulations. As such, members of SAVMA qualify as  
9 members of AVMA under 11 C.F.R. § 114.1(e)(5).

10         This response constitutes an advisory opinion concerning the application of Commission  
11 regulations to the specific transaction or activity set forth in your request. *See* U.S.C. 437f. The  
12 Commission emphasizes that, if there is a change in any of the facts or assumptions presented,  
13 and such facts or assumptions are material to a conclusion presented in this advisory opinion,  
14 then the requestors may not rely on that conclusion as support for its proposed activity. Any  
15 person involved in any specific transaction or activity which is indistinguishable in all its  
16 material aspects from the transaction or activity with respect to which this advisory opinion is  
17 rendered may rely on this advisory opinion. *See* U.S.C. § 437f(c)(1)(B). Please note the analysis  
18 or conclusions in this advisory opinion may be affected by subsequent developments in the law  
19 including, but not limited to, statutes, regulations, advisory opinions, and case law. The cited
